(This is part of the land which Karl Granville let Jonathan Miller have & he let said Auten have on April 5 1785).

Book 10 page 342: Aug. 4 1785, James Fitzpatrick mortgages to Samuel Young (both planters of Rowan Co.N.C.) 410 acres on south side of south fork of Yadkin River where said Fitzpatrick now lives next Joseph Orten, Hugh Cathey on & down the river-bank, for 92 pounds, 3 shillings & 2 pence, witnessed by Nancy, John & Edward Fitzpatrick & proved by the latter in Nov. 1785.

(This is a subdivided tract which Sheriff Nathan Chaffin let said Beard have).

Book 12 page 613: Nov. 11 1791 or 95?, John Bellups & John Gayle, gentlemen of Mecklenburg Co?, Va. let Samuel Young, a yeoman of Rowan Co. N.C., have the negro slaves, Levin, Annis (age about 20 years) & child Bridget (age about 2 years), for \$500.00, witnessed by James Trotter, William Young & Samuel Young Jr. & proved by Samuel Young in May 1792

Book 13 page 736: Sept. 12 1794, Samuel Young, a yeoman of Rowan Co. N.C. lets Townsend Burroughs of ---- have a negro named Leaven aged 24 or 25 years; a wench named Bridget aged about 7 or 8 years, a black stud-horse 4 years old with a bald face & his 4th off hind foot white, a feather bed & furniture now in the house of Joseph Young, for 225 pounds, witnessed by Benjamin McKinzie & Abel Armstrong & proved by the latter in Nov. 1794.

Book 13 page 741: Sept. 13 1794, Samuel Young, a yeoman of Rowan Co. N.C., lets Townsend Burris of ----, have a black horse with a "Stare" in his "fourhead" 14 or 15 years old, called Spoker, also 3 head of horned cattle, & Milk cows as are on the plantation of Joseph Young, (which descended to me as willed by my father) also my share of the crop or on foot on the said plantation of my brother, Joseph Young, for 40 pounds, witnessed by Allen Burris & Benjamin McKinzie & proved by the latter in Nov. 1794.

Book 13 page 732-3: July 29 1794, Robert Powers, owing Samuel Young lets him have the negro wench named Pink & her child named Rosy, witnessed & proved by Joseph Young in Nov. 1794.

Book 13 page 735: On Sept. 12 1794, Samuel Young, a yeoman of Rowan Co. N.C. no wife signs--lets Benjamin McKinzie, a saddler, have a negro wench named Pink about 17 years old & her child, Rose, about 7 or 8 months old, for 70 pounds, witnessed by Townsend Burroughs & Abel Armstrong & proved by the latter in Nov. 1794.

Aug. 7 1801: "Administration on the estate of Benjamin McKinzie granted to Charles M. Kinzie qualified & gave bond with William Lourance in the Sum of 300".

Iredell Co. N.C. book B page 66; Aug. 28 1793, Fergus Sloan Jr. & present wife Prudence, let William & Archibald Young--all of Iredell Co. N.C.--have 38 acres on the south side of Buffelow Creek next Fergus Sloan Sr. & William Stevenson, for 207 pounds, witnessed by Jarel Harbin & Abner Sharpe & proved by the latter in Feb. 1794. (This had been granted to the said Fergus Sloan on Nov. 27 1792).

Iredell Co. N.C. book B page 29; Aug. 28 1793, Fergus Sloan Jr. & Fergus Sloan Sr.--no wives sign--let William & Archibald Young (all of Iredell Co. N.C.) have 200 acres on Buffalow Branch next the old tract of said Fergus Sloan Sr., for 5 pounds, witnessed by Jaret Harbin & Abner Sharpe & proved by the latter in Feb. 1794.

The will of Nicolaus Copple (book G page 111) made Dec. 15 1807 & probated in Sons; Jacob, Nicholas (has had 24 pounds of Maryland money), Philip (has had 58 pounds, 17 shillings & 6 pence Maryland money), John (has had 43 pounds of Maryland money). Daughters; Mary Fox (has had 30 pounds & 11 shillings of Maryland money), Barbary Stoner (has had hers but has heirs), Grandchildren; Philip Copple & heirs & Susanna Lambeth (has had her part of \$57.00, but gets what should have gone to their father). Others; the heirs of Christiana Yong (she has had 43 pounds of Maryland money). Exrs; sons Nicholas & Philip. Witnesses; E. Morgan & Phillbert Wright.

Frances ("Fanny") Wells Young married Edward Emerson Smith & live with Batesburg, South Carolina & have in 1849, three great grandchildren & eighteen grandchildren. She was named for her aunt-in-law Fannie Younger who first married Capt. or Lieutenant Durcan, and in Texas, then married Capt. James Young. Edwina Emerson Smith is the wife of Billie Smith by his father Colvert. Billie Smith married & his son James Monroe, (half brother of E.E.) named his son E.E. Jean Smith of Bishopville, (the daughter of James Monroe Smith by his last wife, Mollie Denton of about Warkau--buried at Bishopville), married Ben West & runs the most exclusive dress-shop in Asheville is interested in genealogy.

John Young was probably Scotch-Irish. He lived on a large plantation (still owned by the family), in what was formerly York--now Cherokee Co., S.C. He had twelve children. Twelve slaves, & <sup>his wife died at childbirth</sup> ~~with father's name in the will~~ The others were: His twin brother, was George W. Young, (the father of Mrs Ed E Smith, et al.) Pinkney, Capt. James of the Confederacy, & Martha & Mary (twins)

Book 18 page 456: May 15 1802, Esq. Jacob Fisher (as high-sheriff of Rowan Co.N.C., on an execution against Charles McKenzie for ---, no goods or chattels to be found, with orders to sell & did sell on May 7 1802) lets John McClelland of Salisbury, N.C., have 50 acres on Stoney Branch of Third Creek next Abel Armstrong, for \$30. & 6 pence, witnessed by George Smith & D.Woodson & proved by the latter in Nov. 1802.

Book 34 page 207: May 27 1839, Sarah Irwin lets John Irwin (both of Rowan Co.N.C.) have her interest in 91 acres on north side of Third Creek next James Kerr, formerly Joseph Young's, & the meeting house, for \$25.00, witnessed by Stephen F. Swan & J. Young & proved by the latter in Aug. 1839. (This has belonged to her deceased father John Irwin).

Book 76 page 533: May 17 1894, S.W.Eaton & wife R.A., E.T.Eaton of Rowan Co.N.C., R.Q.A. Teague & wife E.J. of Davie Co.N.C., L.V.Swann & J.F.Swann of Iredell Co.N.C., let J.V. Young of Rowan Co.N.C., have 228 acres near Cleveland on the creek next ---Hobson & the branch, for \$1500.00, witnessed by J.A.Lyerly, M.L.Smoot & Anthony S.Bonn & acknowledged Anthony Bonn as Clerk of Court at Baltimore Maryland made affidavit as did L.W.Elliott of Davidson Co.N.C. as to said Bonn being Clerk of Court &c. (B.F. Eaton & Lucy Eaton let E.F.Eaton & others have this on ---see book 47 page 269).

McKee & Benjamin Brevard, for \$900.00, witnessed by Andrew Sumrow & James Sloan & proved by the latter in Aug. 1821. (This is part of land which Earl Cranville let John Dickey have).

The Younge Family (by Selah Younge Jr. of Montclair, N.J.). page 40: Rev. John Younge (son of Rev. Christopher Younge of Southwold, England born about 1545 died 1626), born at Southwold, England, in 1698, died in Feb. 1671-2, at Southwold, Suffolk Co., N.Y., married secondly, after 1630, Joan Harris, after 1630, in England, the widow of Richard Palgrave. She had married at Great Yarmouth, England, Jan. 24, 1725, Richard Palgrave who died May 20 1730, & their daughter, Anna Palgrave, baptised at Yarmouth, Jan. 24 1725-6 (Palgrave Memorial), came to Salem, Mass., with the family of her step-father, the Rev. John Younge, & married Nicholas Woodbury--this being attested in 1710 by several elderly people who knew her. (New England Historical Register XXIX, page 219.) Her stepfather, the Rev. John Younge was the first settler of Southwold, Long Island & brought over his parish.

Young Family (from Rev. T.J. Allison--now in possession of T.T.Allison, but given by Miss Alexander to Miss Edith C.Thomason).

"William and Mary Young as far back as can be ascertained, lived on the "Lard Alexander Place" which was to the left of the public road leading from Charlotte to Concord--about 17 miles from Charlotte, and 6 or 7 miles from Concord. They sold this farm and bought about  $\frac{3}{4}$  of a mile from Poplar Tent Church--on the Concord-Beatty's Ford Road. They had the following children:

"1. James Young, born July 22, 1777. He married Mary, daughter of Robert Allison who died 1827. Children: Sarah, Robert, William Lee, James Graham, Mary Ann, Elizabeth, John Co. and Joseph. Married again, 1 daughter Chatherine J. He died 1850.

"2. Joseph Young, born July 29, 1779. He married Miss Symonton and lived on his father's place near Poplar Tent Church. He died 1835. He was a tailor. By 1st marriage he had a son Robert; by second a daughter Sarah.

"3. Silas Young, born May 1, 1781. First wife Elizabeth Meek; 2nd Lavinia Bost. Children of second wife: Sarah, John, Jane, Margarette, Hettie, Laura, Edward. Died 1858. Widow lives with R.W. Johnston of Hickory whose first wife was her daughter (May 21, 1888.) She died May 30, 1900 aged 90. Born Feb. 2-20-1810 Poplar Tent Cemetery. H.A.)

"4. Mary Young, born Nov. 16, 1782, married James Hope. Moved to Missouri.

"5. Margarette Young, born July 13, 1784. Married William, son of Robert Allison. Lived in Charlotte. Children: Sarah, Robert Washington, Jane and Ann. Married (2) to Gillespie, one child Thomas Gillespie of Columbia, S.C.

"6. Nancy Young, born 1786. Married William Robb.

"7. Jennie Young, born April 21, 1787, married Henry Coram; Children; Mary and Columbus.

"8. Martha Young, born Nov. 25, 1789. Married William Clark of Gaston County. Children: Rufus, Harriet, James and Franklin.
