Book 11 page 123: Oct. 25 1786, The State grants (#1299 at 50 shillings the 100 acres), to Nicholas Rochester 200 acres on the waters of Second Creek, beginning at a pine, going east 40 chains to a white oak grub, south 50 chains to a post oak saplin, west 40 chains to an oak, then north to the beginning.

: Deed from Nicholas Rochester to Clement Lanier for 200 acres Dec. 1 1787 proved by Wm. Ingraham.

Book 11 page 302: Dec. 1 1787, Nicholas Rochester--no wife signs--lets Clement Lanier (both of Rowan Co. N.C.), have 200 acres on the waters of Second Creek, beginning at a pine, going east 40 chains to a white oak grub, south 50 chains to a post oak saplin, west 40 chains to an oak, then north to the beginning, for 80 pounds, witnessed by Thomas Ingram & William Ingram & proved by the latter in Feb. court of 1788.

Nathaniel Rochester

Historic Hillsboro, page 10: "A FAMOUS CITIZEN Among the first citizens that lived in Hillsboro was Nathaniel Rochester. He bought a large tract of land on Gate's Creek. He left Hillsboro about 1783, moving to Hagerstown, Maryland. He became a partner there with Colonel Thomas Hart in a mill. In 1803 he bought an interest in the land where the present city of Rochester is. In 1810 he moved again, going to New York State. A few years later he went to Rochester to live. The town had become prosperous and had been named Rochester for Nathaniel Rochester of Hillsbor."
