In N.C. History and Biography, Vol. VI. page 88, Abraham Transon, the son of Philip Transon who was a French Huguenot who fled to and married in Germany but later emigrated to Pa. and in 1860 moved from Pa. to N.C. and settled at Bethania and continued his trade of wagon-maker. Abraham was born in Pa. but most of his life was spent in N.C. at Bethania. He married Phaff of the family from which the town in N.C. is named, in Forsyth Co. His son, Philip, was born in Bethania, where he also learned the trade of wagon-maker, but moved to Phafftown, where he lived until his death, aged 79 years. His wife was Mary Stoltz, a daughter of Jacob and Eva (Shultz) Stoltz, who was born near Bethania. They reared 8 children: Jonathan, Lydia, Ephraim, Alexander, Augustine, Jacob, Evan and Julius. Mrs, Eva Transon, died at tge age of 74.

Julius, also a wagonmaker, in 1862, enlisted as a musician, in Salem Band, and went to war in the 26th Reg. Fought during the war, and at its end resumed work in the wagon factory, and taught and tuned pianos for thirty years. Retired in 1914. In June 10 1855, he married Julia Conrad, of Lewisville Township, Forsythe Co. N.C.-- the daughter of Leonard and Rebecca (Lasth) Conrad-- and reared 6 children: Stephen, Isabella, Mary, Caroline, Minnie and Fannie.
