Book 15 page 43: On March 19 1796, Thomas Thompson & wife Elizabeth, ^{of Rowan Co. N.C.} let Etheldred Andrews (of Martin Co. N.C.) have 300 acres in Rowan on the west side of Cedar Creek next Col. Hunt & Major John Johnston, for 300 pounds, witnessed by John Ellis & Thomas Bayless & proved by John Ellis in May 1797.

Book 9 page 309: On March 21 1780, James Poore has a State Grant (#148) of 300 acres on the west side of Cedar Creek next --- Hunt & Capt. John Johnston. Nov. 4 1783: Deed from James & Eleanor Poor to Thomas Thompson for 300 acres on Sept. 20 1783 proved by Valentine Moulder.

Book 9 page 326: Sept. 20 1783, James Poar & wife Elenor let Thomas Thompson-- all of Rowan Co. N.C.--have 300 acres on the west bank of Cedar Creek next --- Hunt & Capt. Johnson, for 180 pounds, witnessed by Susanna Moulder? & Valentine Moulder? & proved by Valentine Moulder in Nov. 1783.

Book 18 page 174: On Nov. 10 1800, Etheldred Andrews--no wife signs--lets Jacob Black (both of Rowan Co. N.C.) have 130 acres on west side of Cedar Creek next Lewis Hicks, John Garner & said Creek, for 130 pounds, witnessed by John Mock & Thomas Bayliss & acknowledged in Nov. 1801.

Book 21 page 537: On May 7 1808, Etheldred Andrews gives a negro boy to his son William Andrews, witnessed by John Chapman & A. Hunt & proved in May 1808.

Book 23? page 447: On Feb. 16 1804, Etheldred Andrews--no wife signs--lets Joab Teague (both of Rowan Co. N.C.) have 85 acres on the west side of Cedar Creek next Samuel Austin, Joab Teague & Robert Field, for \$400.00, witnessed by Robert Fields & John Ellis & proved by the latter in Feb. 1812. (This is part of 300 acres indentured by James Poor on March 21 1780, he & wife let Thomas Thompson have it on Sept. 20 1783 & he & wife let Etheldred Andrews have on March 19 1796).

Book 22 page 333 or 433 (numbered twice): March 29 1808, Joab Teague--no wife signs--lets John Bayless (both of Rowan Co. N.C.) have 137 1/2 acres on the west bank of Cedar Creek next Samuel Austin, John Garner, --- Easton, the dividing line, Robert Field & said Teague (between the last two), for 274 pounds, witnessed by Jesse Ellis & John Ellis & proved by the latter in Feb. 1812. (This is part of the 300 acres granted by The State to James Poor on March 21 1780, he let Thomas Thompson have it Sept. 20 1783, he & wife let Etheldred Andrews have it March 19 1796 & he let said Teague have it Feb. 16 1804).

Book 23 page 71: Feb. 16 1804, Etheldred Andrews--no wife signs--lets Robert Fields (both of Rowan Co. N.C.) have 85 acres on Cedar Creek next said Field following the creek, for \$400.00, witnessed by Joab Teague & John Ellis & proven by the latter in Feb. 1814. (This is part of 300 acres granted James Poore March 21 1780, who let Thomas Thompson have it Sept. 20 1783--see book 9 page 326--he & wife let Etheldred Andrews have it March 19 1796--see book 15 page 44)

Book 22 page 496 or 596: Dec. 27 1802, Richard Cornell & wife Sarah let Robert Field--all of Rowan Co. N.C.--have 448 acres on Cedar Creek next Eldred Andrews, Peter Eaton, Nathan Chaffin, Enoch Hunt, Daniel Hunt & John Phillips, for 952 pounds, witnessed by Nathan Chaffin & Daniel Hunt & proven by the latter in Aug. 1812. (See Hunt)

Book 11 page 629: March 5 1788, Joseph Jacob of Wilk Co. N.C.--no wife signs--lets William Taylor of Rowan Co. N.C., have 100 acres on both sides of Hunting Creek next Benjamin Gaither, James Taylor, said Jacob, Elias Lovelace & Azariah Gatton, for 100 pounds, witnessed by Thomas Prather & Elias Lovelace & proved by the latter in Feb. 1789.

Book 18 page 580: May 4 1802, George Hunt of Rowan Co.N.C. (as executor of the will of John Andrews) lets Azariah Gatton of Iredell Co.N.C., have 160 acres on north bank of Hunting Creek next --- Posados, John Little & Charles Anderson, for \$800.00, witnessed by Thomas L. Cowan & Enoch Hunt & proved by the latter in Feb. 1803.

Book 17 page 481: Jan. 27 1801, James Andrew of Rowan Co.N.C.--no wife signs--lets Charles Anderson of Iredell Co.N.C., have 347 acres on the north bank of Hunting Creek next James Wallace & John Andrews, for 500 pounds, witnessed by John Prather, William Howard & Michael Anderson & proved by the last named in Feb. 1801. (This is parts of 4 different tracts which his father left him).

Book 13 page 227: Dec. 20 1791, The State grants (#2062 at 10 pounds the 100 acres), 200 acres to James Andrews ^{waters of Hunting} on north side of Hunting Creek next said Andrews & --- Boxelorr(?). It begins on the north bank of said Creek on the corner of said Andrews, at a pine, goes south 43 chains to a boxelder on the creek bank, then up the several meanders of the creek to the beginning.

Book 11 page 329: Oct. 25 1786, The State grants (#1098 at 50 shillings the 100 acres) to Samuel Reed 200 acres on the waters of Hunting Creek, beginning on the corner of Jacob Nichols at a black oak, going west 16 chains to a white oak on the corner of the said Nichols, south with his line 16 poles to a pine, east 3 chains to a hickory, south 28 poles to a post oak, east 26 chains to a white oak on the line of Thomas Penry, north 12 chains to a white oak on the corner of said Penry, east 5 chains to a white oak on the corner of Robert Luckey, north 65 chains to a post oak, west 19 chains to a white oak on the line of Jacob Nichols, then to the beginning.

Book 18 page 425: March 13 1802, George Hunt (as executor of deceased John Andrew's will) lets John Little--all of Rowan Co.N.C.--have 200 acres on Hunting Creek next Jacob Nicholas, Thomas Penry & Robert Luckie, for 105 pounds, witnessed by John Daves & Obadiah Smith & acknowledged in Nov. 1802. (This is State Grant #1098 made to Samuel Reed on Oct. 25 1786).

Book 13 page 286: Dec. 1 1791, Samuel Reed of Green Co. Georgia--no wife signs--lets John Andrew of Rowan Co.N.C.--have 200 acres on Hunting Creek next Jacob Nichols, Thomas Penry & Robert Luckey, for 50 pounds, witnessed by Richard Veatch, John Howard & Thomas Prather & proved by the last named in Aug. 1793. (This is part of the grant #1098 from The State to said Reed on Oct. 25 1786).

Book 11 page 327: Oct. 25 1786, The State grants (#1098 at 50 shillings the 100 acres) to Samuel Reed 200 acres on Hunting Creek next Jacob Nichols, Thomas Penry & Robert Luckie.

Book 10 page 96: Nov. 4 1784, The State grants (#744? at 50 shillings) to John Adams 200 acres on Bear Creek next John Bryant, Mary Luckey, Thomas Pennery, Ralph Vancleave, Valentine Huff & Benjamin Gaither.

Book 10 page 619: Jan. 11 1787, John Adams--no wife signs--lets James Andrews have 100 acres in forks of Yadkin River on Bear Creek next Thomas Pennery, Rulof Vancleave, Valentine Huff & Benjamin Gaither, on a branch, for Samuel Bryan & proven by the latter in Feb. 1789. witnessed by Thomas Huey &

Book 12 page 51: Feb. 6 1787, James Andrews--no wife signs--lets Margaret Claniare or Clamare (?)--both of Rowan Co.N.C.--have 100 acres on Bear Creek next Thomas Pennery, Ralph Vancleave, Valentine Huffs & Benjamin Gaither on up a branch, for 35 pounds, witnessed by Basler Dottoro & Basell Gaither & proved by the latter in May 1790. (This land was sold by Sheriff after her marriage to Wm.H. Hancock to Isaac Jones in 1794--refer to Hancock).

Refer to Samuel Bryan for other 100 acres of above grant.

Book 11 page 525: On April 25 1788, James Andrew, a planter, (Sarah also signs) lets Obadiah Smith--all of Rowan Co.N.C.--have 300 acres on Yadkin River bank next the deeded land of David Bailey, Humphrey Marshal (but excluding the 100 acres sold to Samuel Clerke,) for 50 pounds, witnessed by Elizabeth Freeland & Ja McCulloh & proved by Elizabeth Freeman in Nov. 1788.

Book 10 page 482: April 15 1786, James Andrews--no wife signs--lets Samuel Clarke (both of Rowan Co.N.C.) have 100 acres next said Andrews, for 75 pounds, witnessed by Joseph Williams & Moses Linster & acknowledged in Aug. 1786. (This is part of the 300 acre State Grant made to said Andrews)

Book 14 page 112: Dec. 22 1794, James Andrew & wife Sarah let Robert Andrew (all of Rowan Co.N.C.) have 160 acres in forks of Yadkin River on west side next said James & Humphrey Marshal, for 100 pounds, witnessed by Harrod Pruet, Jno. Chune? & Obadiah Smith & proved by last named in Aug. 1795.

Book 18 page 46: Jan. 16 1800, Moses Linster of Rowan Co.N.C.--no wife signs--lets John Pines of (both planters) have 100 acres next James Andrews, for 112 pounds & 10 shillings, witnessed by William Foy? & Abel Armstrong & acknowledged in May 1801. (This is part of the State Grant to James Andrews who let Samuel Clark have it & he let Moses Linster have).

Book 28 page 665: March 8 1825, Anthony Fraley--no wife signs--lets Jesse Tatum (both of Rowan) have 100 acres next James Andrews, for \$220.00, witnessed by Thos. Smoot & L. Owings & proved in 1828. (Part of 300 State Grant made to Jas. Andrews who let Samuel Clerk have who transferred it to Moses Linster who let John Payne & it was sold by high-sheriff Alexr. Frohock on execution, to Isaac Hull who let Thos. P. Ives who let said Fraley have, but

Book 16 page 268: On May 10 1798, Moses Linster gives to his son, Isaac, 169 acres on the north side of South River next said Moses Linster, Boons road, & next the original tract from Earl Granville to James Andrews, crossing the river, witnessed by Henry Buckner & George Bool & proved by the latter in May 1798.

July 20 1762: Deed from Earl Granville to James Andrew for 137 acres Dec. 21 1761 is proved by John Frohock.

Book 4 page 819: On Dec. 21 1761, Earl Granville lets James Andrew of Rowan Co.N.C., have 137 acres on both sides of Boon's road on the north side of the Yadkin River, for 10 shillings, recorded July 22 1762.

Book 7 page 75: On Jan. 28 1769, James Andrews & wife Sarah, let William Nesbit, have 137 acres on the north side of South Yadkin River "on both Sides Boon's road" on the river bank, for 35 pounds, witnessed by max Chambers & David Nesbet & proved in Feb. 1797. (Earl Granville let him have this).

May 5 1775: Deed from William Nesbet to Moses Leinster for 137 acres Nov. 23 1773 is acknowledged. Book 8 page 315: Nov. 23 1773, William Nisbet, a merchant,--no wife signs--lets Moses Linster, a shoe-maker (both of Rowan Co.N.C.) have 137 acres on north side South Yadkin River & both sides Boon's road on river bank, for 60 pounds, witnessed by David Nisbet & Benjamin Heide & acknowledged in May 1775. (Jas. Andrews let him have Jan. 8 1769)

Book 6 page 438: On July 22 1763, James Andrews--no wife signs--lets John Frohock (both of Rowan Co.N.C.) have all the tract of 340 acres on the river-bank crossing Second Creek & including its mouth, which is in the fork of the south Yadkin River & Second Creek, for 50 pounds, witnessed by Benjamin Robison, William Nassery & William Frohock & proved in July 1767. (Earl Granville let him have this on Dec. 21 1761).

July 16 1767: Deed from Jamis Andrews to John Frohock for 340 acres July 22 1763 is proved by Will Frohock.

July 20 1762: Deed from Earl Granville to James Andrew for 340 acres Dec. 21 1761 is proved by John Frohock.

Book 4 page 821: On Dec. 21 1761, Earl Granville lets James Andrew of Rowan Co.N.C., have 340 acres vacant land in the forks of South Yadkin River & Second Creek at the mouth of the latter, for 10 shillings, recorded on July 22 1762.

Jan. 20 1762: Lease & release from Henry White to James Andrew for 320 acres may 25-26 1761 is proved.

Book 4 page 668: May 25 1762, Henry White of Anson Co.N.C.--no wife signs--lets James Andrew of Rowan Co.N.C., have 320 acres on Gilliepie for 5 shillings--the release price being 5 pounds on next day--witnessed by Alpheus Pain & Henry Foster & proved in Jan. 1762. (This is on the lower end of a tract upon which Henry White formerly lived). (See John Witherspoon for this). (over)

nessed by Dugless Hayden & William Hayden & proved in Feb. 1786. (Lord Granville granted this to James Andrews on Dec. 21 1761, he let Esq. John Frohock have it July 22 1763 & his will left it to Esq. Thomas Frohock

Book 35 page 359: Nov.2 1841, Geogr Andrews out of love for his son, James Ebenezer Andrews, gives him a negro woman named Rose & man named Robert Addison, his sheep, cows & many other things.

Oct.23 1761: Lease & release from Alphaus Payn & wife Elizabeth to Robert King for 320 acres Sept.1-2 1761 proved by Francis Beaty.

Oct.23 1761: Lease & release from Henry White & wife Joanna to Alpheus Payne for 320 acres proved by Esq. Francis Beaty.

Book 2 page 399: March 25 1752, Earl Granville lets Henry White a gentleman of Anson Co.N.C., have 640 acres next John Holmes & Joseph White, for 3 shillings, witnessed by James Campbell & William Alexander & proved by the latter on May 27 1756.

Book 6 page 451: The will of Thomas Johnston made while sick & weak on Dec. 19 1766 & probated recorded in July 1767. Wife: (1/3 of movable estate--the rest of the estate goes to his four children who must be bound out). Land is to be divided between his two sons. Exrs: Thos. Gillespie & John McConnel. Witnesses: James Scandrett & James Graham. (John Frohock is Clerk of Court).

Book 5 page 352: Oct. 8 1763, John Witherspoon, a weaver, & Elizabeth, let Thomas Johnston (all of Rowan Co.N.C.) have 320 acres "on Gillespies Creek it being a part of Henry White' place where he did Live on the Lower end", for 65 pounds, witnessed by William Luckie & Thomas Braly & proved in Oct. 1763. (This had originally been granted by Earl Granville to Henry White on May 26 1761).

Oct. 11 1763: Deed from John Witherspoon & wife Elizabeth to Thomas Johnston for 320 acres Oct. 8 1763 proved by William Luckey.

: Deed of conveyance from James Andrew to John Weatherspoon for 320 acres Jan. 20 1762 proved by Thos. Gillespie.

Book 4 page 762: Jan.20 1762, James Andrew, a farmer--no wife signs--lets John Weatherspoon (both of Rowan Co.N.C.) have 320 acres on Gillespies Creek, for 4 pounds & 10 shillings, witnessed by Alpheus Pain & Thomas Gillespie & proved on July 22 1762. (This is part of the land which Earl Granville granted to Henry White on May 26 1761 & where he lived). *over*

April, 19 1757: "whereas by the Last will and testament of John Andrew Decd. is Appointed that Joshua Nichols & Alexander McCorkall Capt. John Kerr & John Martin were appointed to value & divide the Estate of the sd. John Andrew, It is therefore Ordered by the Court that the sd. Persons do it Accordingly"

Book 18 page 174: On Nov. 10 1800, Etheldred Andrews--no wife signs--lets Jacob Black (both of Rowan Co. N.C.) have 130 acres on west side of Cedar Creek next Lewis Hicks, John Garner & said Creek, for 130 pounds, witnessed by John Mock & Thomas Bayliss & acknowledged in Nov. 1801.

Book 9 page 309: A State Grant (#148) of 300 acres on the west side of Cedar Creek next ---Hunt & Capt. John Johnston, made to James Poore on March 21 1780

Nov. 4 1783: Deed from James & Eleanor Poor to Thomas Thompson for 300 acres made Sept. 20 1783 & proved by Valentine Moulder. (Book 9 page 326)

Nov. 4 1783: Deed from William Dickens to Valentine Moulder for 118 acres on Aug. 19 1783 proved by John Allen.

Book 15 page 43: On March 19 1796, Thomas Thompson & wife Elizabeth, let Etheldred Andrews (of Rowan Co. N.C.) have for 300 pounds, 300 acres of land in Rowan Co. on the west side of cedar Creek next that of Col. Hunt & Major John Johnston witnessed by John Ellis & Thomas Bayless in May term 1797 & proved by John Ellis.

Book 21 page 537: On May 7 1808, Etheldred Andrews gives to his son William Andrews, a negro boy aged 18 years, by the name of Harry, witnessed by John A. Chapman & A. Hunt in May term of 1808.

Book 14 page 707; On March 13 1797, John Johnston & wife Elizabeth, let Lewis Hicks have 968 acres on Dutchmans Creek & Cedar Creek next James McMahan, John Ellis, Phillip Swathlanders, Atheldred Andrews, Peter Eaton, Brittain Bayless, a Sugar tree & James Pores, for 1210 pounds, witnessed by Brytan Bayless & Henry ? & proved in May 1797. (I judge that Isaiah West has property near this & that Charles Hunt owns land adjoining--see page 579).

Book 18 page 445: On Dec. 8 1801, Lewis Hicks & wife Charlotte, let Batson Naylor of Virginia, have 139 acres on Dutchman Creek next a sugar tree, Peter Eaton, Jno. Garner & Wm. McMahan, below a spring, for \$417.00, witnessed by Samuel Austin & Ephraim Caty & proved Nov. 1802.

Book 13 page 422: On _____, James Andrew lets Esq. John McCorkel have 38 acres on south side of Back Creek next said McCorkel & John Lourance for 40 pounds, witnessed by Joel McCorkle & George Andrews & acknowledged in Feb. 1794. Feb. 8 1794: Deeds from: John? Andrews to John McCorkle for 38 acres & from John McCorkle to James Andrew for 30 acres Feb. 1 1794 are acknowledged. Feb. 5 1773: Deed from Saml. Martin to Jno? Andrews ---Dec. 2 1772 proved by Joseph Erwin. Another from him to Jno Buntin on same day proved by same.

Book 8 page 84: Samuel Martin lets James Andrews have for 10 shillings Dec. 2 '72 "starling" _____ acres on both sides of Gillespie's Back Creek (a fork of the Second on the west side of the Yadkin River) next land of Alexander McCorkal, John Bountine & John Lowrance witnessed by Joseph Erwin & John Buntin in Feb. 1773. (This is part of a tract of 608 acres from Earl Granville to Samuel Martin).

Book 8 page 85: Samuel Martin lets John Buntin have for 10 shillings "starlin" _____ acres on Gillespie's Back Creek (as above deed) next James Andrews, William Barr & John Kilpatrick & witnessed by Joseph Erwin & James Andrews in Feb. 1773. (This is part of a tract of 608 acres from Earl Granville to Samuel Martin)

Feb. 6 1778: "George Marshall Constable in the Room of John Luckey" See Capt. Wm. Armstrong

Feb. 2 1779: "James Andrew to serve in the Stead of George Marshall" as Constable.

Feb. 8 1782: James Andrew appointed Constable in Capt. Fairson's(?) company Andrews.

Nov. 12 1785: "James Bunton Constable in room of James Andrews"

Feb. 6 1787: "Thomas King in the Room of John Bunton" as Constable.

May 9 1788: "John Wasson in the room of Thomas King, gave Bond with approved Security & qualified" as Constable.

Nov. 11 1796: Administration on the estate of James Andrews deceased, issued to John Andrews son & John Andrews son-in-law, who gave bond of 1200 pounds witnessed by Burgess Gaither & William Luckey. An inventory of the estate is filed.

Book 4 page 819: Dec. 21 1761, Earl Granville lets James Andrew of Rowan Co. N.C., have 137 acres vacant land on the north side of South Yadkin on both sides Boon's road on the river bank, for 10 shillings, witnessed by James Campbell, William Gibson & John Frebeck & proved on July 23 1762.

Book 7 page 75: On Jan. 28 1769, James Andrews & wife Sarah, let William Nesbit have 137 acres on north side of South Yadkin & "on both Sides Boon's road", & the river bank for 35 pounds witnessed by Max Chambers & David Nisbet in Feb. 1797. (This he got of Earl Granville).

Book 4 page 725: July 20 1762, George Hall--no wife signs--lets David Andrews (both of Rowan Co. N.C.) have 357 acres on north side Fourth Creek next Alexander Reed, for 5 shillings--the release price being 26 pounds next day--witnessed by Robert Bell & Francis Beatey & proved May 9 1783: Deed from John Andrews to James Gay for 357 acres May 3 1783 proved by George Reed.

Book 9 page 257: May 9 1783, John Andrews--no wife signs--lets James Gay (both of Rowan Co. N.C.) have 357 acres on north side of Fourth Creek next Alexander Reed, for 200 pounds, proved by George Reed in May 1783. (This was originally indentured by Earl Granville's agent, Thomas Child, to George Hall on July 20-21 1762 & was willed by David Andrews to John Andrews on Dec. 5 1774. Marriage bonds: Martha A. Andrews to John N. Adams May 6 1829 signed by John Andrews

Book 31 page 867: On Oct. 1 1832, John Houston (as attorney-at-law in Rowan Co. N.C. for John N. & Martha Adams of Missouri) lets Amos Andrews of Rowan have 473 acres on both sides of Back Creek next George Andrews, John M. Lowrance, John J. Poston, --- Cowan & John F. McCorkle, or their 1/4 of the tract which came to them by descent from the death of Esq. John Andrews, for \$200.00 witnessed by John M. Lowrance & Samuel Barr & acknowledged in May 1833.

Book 33 page 57: May 18 1833, John Houston of Rowan Co. N.C. (as attorney of William E. Andrews of Washington Co. Pa.) lets Solomon Simmons of Rowan Co. N.C., have 175 acres on Back Creek next John Shives & George Andrew, for \$75.00, witnessed by D.C. Kebane & Martin Pless & acknowledged in May 1836.

Book 33 page 58: March 11 1836, John Houston of Rowan Co. N.C. (as attorney of Margaret A. Andrew of Cape Gerardeau Co. Missouri) lets Solomon Simmons of Rowan Co. N.C. have 175 acres on Back Creek next John Shives & George Andrews, for \$75.00, acknowledged in May 1836. (This came to her as the daughter of deceased Esq. John Andrews of Rowan Co. N.C.).

Book 32 page 715: March 23 1833, William E. Andrews of Washington Co. Pa., appoints his trusted friend John Houston of Rowan Co. N.C. to get what is due from the estate of his father Esq. John Andrews, certified by the clerk of court, Thomas Officer while Judge of the 14 district of Pa. (Washington, & Greene counties) proves identity of the clerk.

Amos Andrews of Massachusetts

I am seeking a John Andrews, born 1762, in Va., who went to Georgia after the Revolution, where he lived and died. Nothing is known of his parents - their names & etc - so this JOHN named in the will of DAVID of Rowan county may be my man. If you can help me any with this, I assure you I will deeply appreciate the favor. At present there is nothing in this case - that is I am not even hired to work on it, but if I could locate and prove names of the parents of this JOHN, born circa 1762 in Va., I feel sure there would be some thing to it. If you can help me with this, I shant forget it, and if I can work up this line and ever seal it, I will surely remember you in any settlement made.

Send me a line once in a while for I am always interested in what you are doing and how you are getting along. Again thanking you for your many kindnesses in the past and with every good wish, I am,

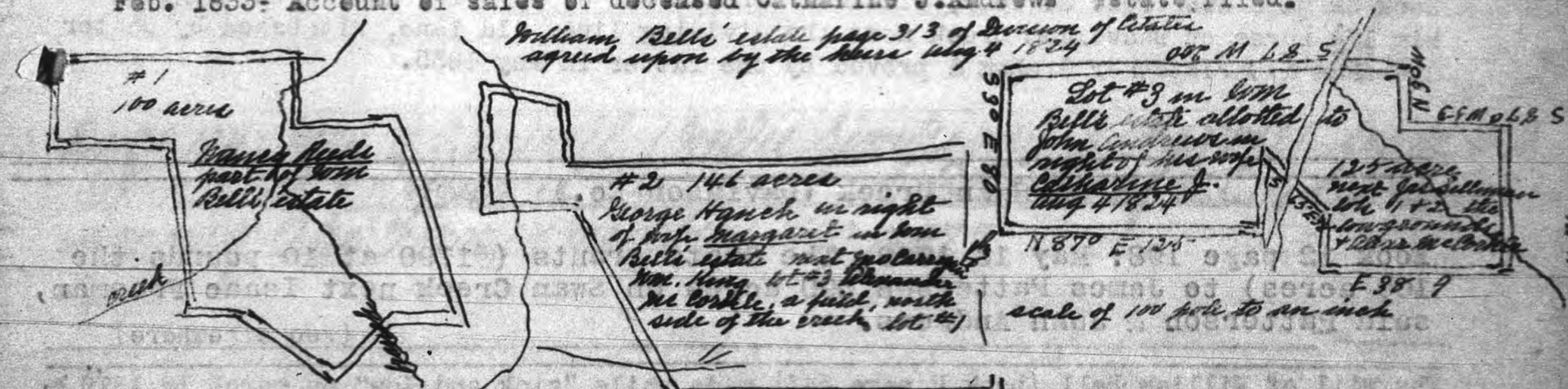

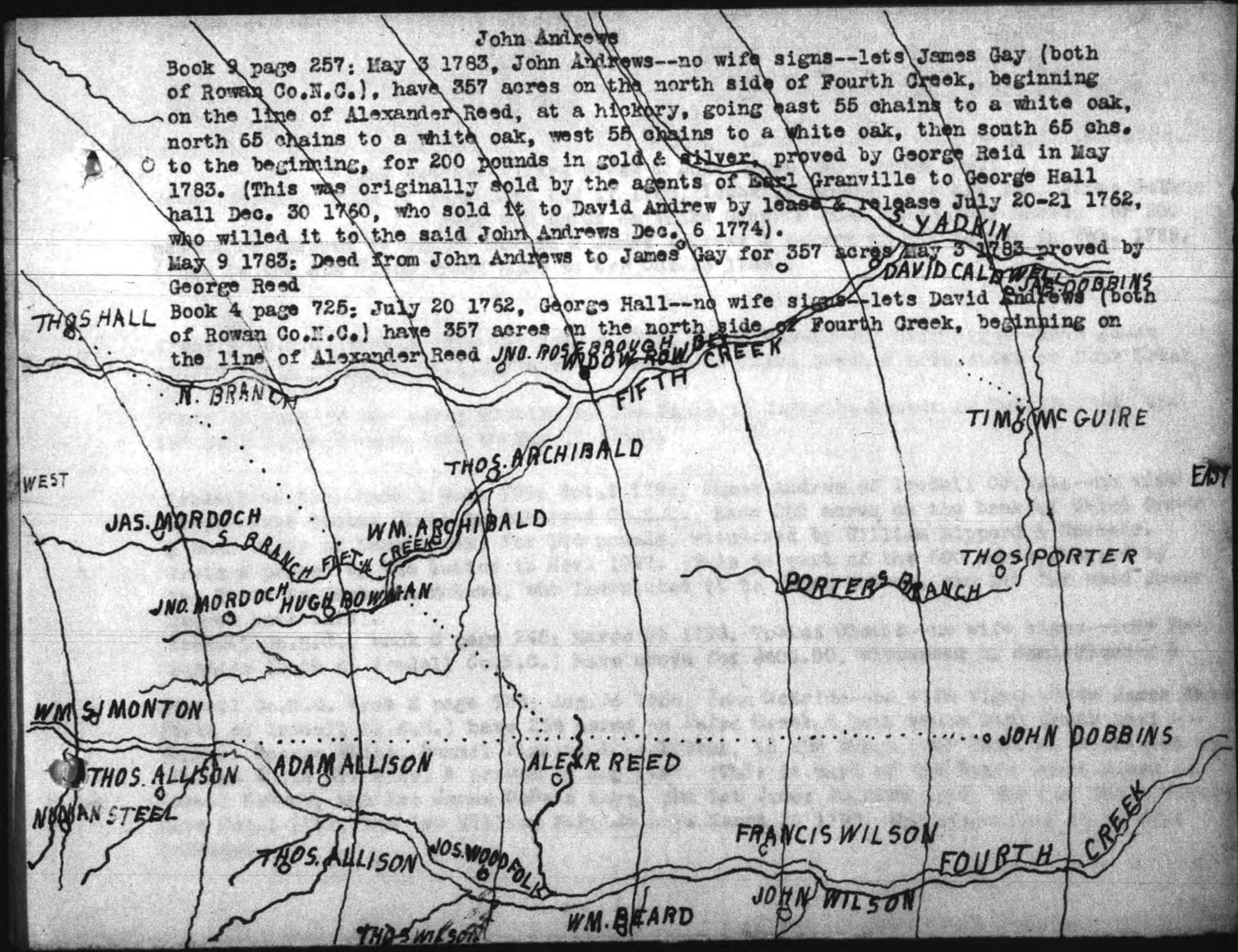

Prominent Living North Carolinians (by Jerome Dowd in 1888) page 239: "ALEXANDER BOYD ANDREWS, ESQ. of Raleigh, Was born on the 23d day of July, 1841, in Franklin county, near Franklinton. He is descended from prominent and honorable families upon both sides. His father, William J. Andrews, of Edgecombe, was one of the leading merchants of Henderson. His mother, Virginia Hawkins, was a daughter of Col. John D. Hawkins, of Franklin county, and her mother was the daughter of Alexander Boyd, a sturdy Scotchman, of Mecklenburg county, Virginia. It was after this maternal great-grandfather that he was named. Another great-grandfather, Col. Jonas Johnston, was a revolutionary hero, and was wounded in the historic battle of Moore's Creek. His elder brother, John, a bright promising lad, died of yellow fever in Norfolk in 1855. His mother dying in 1852 and his father surviving her but a short while, their eight children, four sons and four daughters, were left to the care of their grand parents, Colonel and Mrs. Hawkins. Never were orphans more fortunate in their lot. The influence of the grand parents is clearly marked in the career of the subject of this sketch."*****"In September, 1869, Colonel Andrews married Julia, the daughter of Colonel William Johnston of Charlotte, and has five children. In 1873 he moved to Raleigh where he has since resided. He brought with him his devoted old grandmother, to whom he was always tenderly attached, and she made her home with him until her death." In 1859 he was made General Superintendent, Purchasing Agent & Paymaster for a large railroad contract by his uncle, Gen. Phil. B. Hawkins. He was among the first volunteers & enlisted as a private in Col. (later Major-General Robert Ransom's regiment of N.C. Cavalry) soon appointed Lieutenant, then Captain of Company B. during his first year of service. At Jack's Shop, Madison Co. near Charlottesville, Sept. 22 1863, "While cheering on his men the gallant Captain Andrews fell, shot through the lungs. No braver man or better man has fallen during the war. He was universally beloved", but the wound was not fatal after all, tried twice to return to his command in 1864 but was too weak. Found his home in waste & disorder, began former pursuits, became Superintendent of N.C. Railroad in 1875, Colonel of the Governor's Staff in 1876, Assistant President of Richmond & Danville road, President of University railroad & many others. Married Julia, the daughter of Col. Wm. Johnston of Charlotte in Sept. 1869 & has five children, removed to Raleigh in 1873,

Book 19 page 41: April 3 1802, Jesse Haden & wife Rosanna let Joseph Kincaid--all of Rowan Co.N.C.--have 100 acres next Dugless Haden's tract & James Andrew, for \$213.50, witnessed by James Williams & Isaac Linster & proved by the latter in Aug. 1804.(This was granted by The State to James Andrew now deceased & later sold by the Sheriff).

Book 19 page 935: April 3 1802, Jesse Haden--no wife signs--lets Joseph Kincaid (all of Rowan Co.N.C.) have 100 acres on the river-bank next Robert Andrews (now Benjamin Hudgen's) & said Haden, for \$213.00, witnessed by James Williams & Isaac Linster & proved by the latter in Aug. 1804. (This is part of the State Grant to James Andrew which was later sold by The Sheriff to Douglas Haden).

Book 11 page 525: April 25, 1788, James Andrew, a planter--Sarah Andrew also signs--lets Obadiah Smith, (All of Rowan Co., N.C.), have 300 acres beginning on the Yadkin River bank on the corner of the deeded land of David Bailey at a white oak & going with his line north 31 chains to a black oak on the line of the said Bailey, west 55 chains to a black oak, south 55 chains to the line of Humphrey Marshall, east 55 chains to a stake on the river bank, then with its meanders or various courses to the beginning, ^{for 50 acres} witnessed by Ja. McCulloh & Elizabeth Freeland & proved by Elizabeth Freeman in Nov. court of 1788. (This excludes the 100 acres sold Samuel Clarke).

Book 9 page 223: March 21 1780 The State granted (#524) at 50 shillings the 100 acres to James Andrews 300 acres on the west bank of the Yadkin River beginning on the corner of the deeded land of David Bailey at a white oak & going north 31 chains to a black oak on the line of the said Bailey, west 55 chains to a white oak, south 55 chains

Book 18 page 482 : April 15, 1786, James Andrew--no wife signs--lets Samuel Clarke, (both of Rowan Co., N.C.), have 100 acres beginning on the northwest corner of said James Andrew at a black oak & going east 23 chains & 30 links to a heap of stones, south 42 chains & 50 links to a pine, west 23 chains & 50 links to a black oak on the line of the said tract, then to the beginning, for 75 pounds, witnessed by Joseph Williams & Moses Linster & acknowledged in Aug. court of 1786.

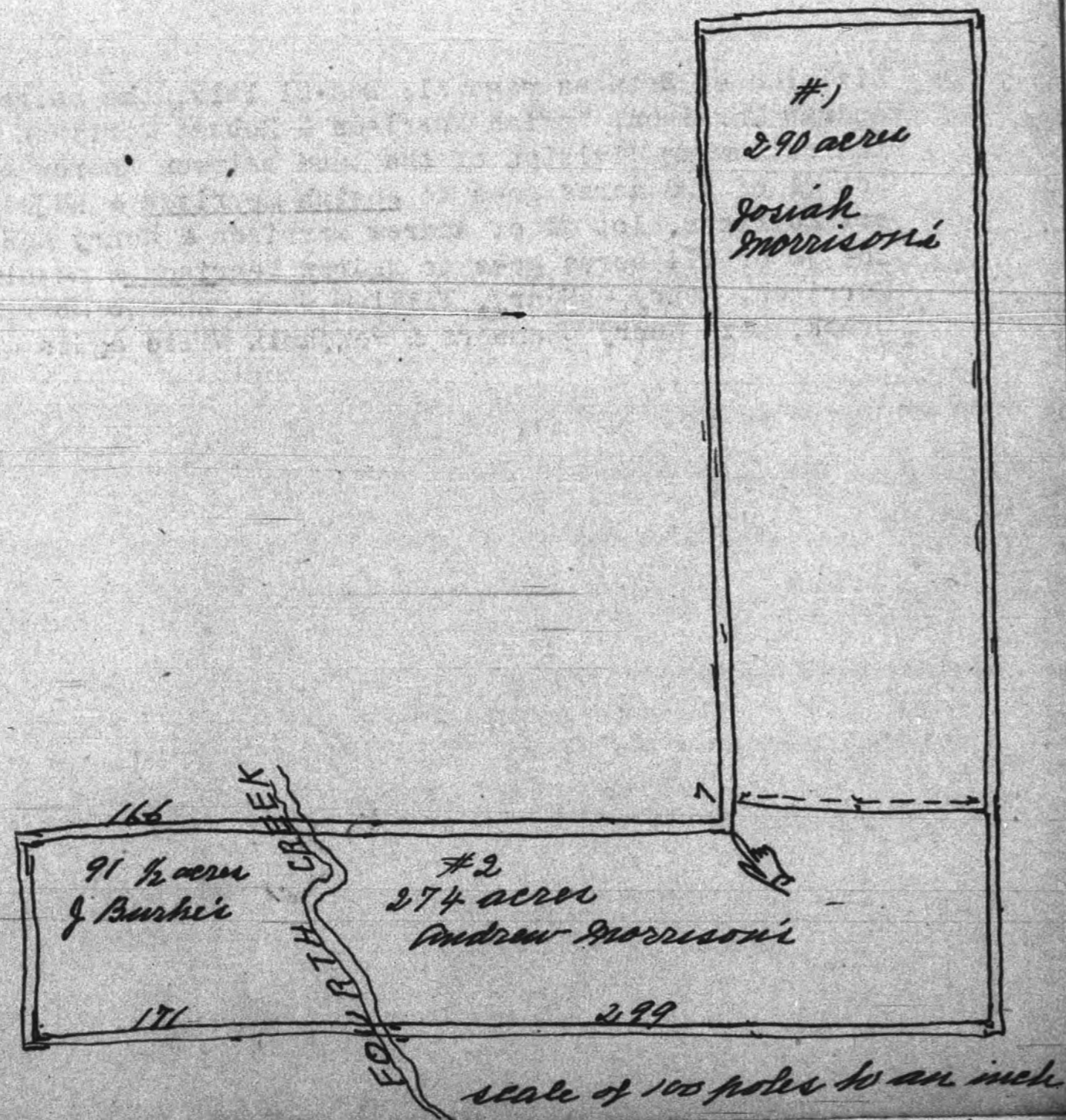

the following division of the land between Andrew & Josiah Morrison.
Lot #1 of 290 acres goes to Josiah Morrison & adjoins Joseph Chambers, James Kerr, Rob-
ert Morrison, lot #2 of Andrew Morrison & Henry McHenry.
Lot #2 of 274 acres goes to Andrew Morrison & adjoining Robert Morrison, lot #1 of Josiah

N.C., have 627 acres on both sides of Davie's Creek, beginning on its south side on the corner of George Davis's Sr.'s at a white oak, going east 98 chains to two black oaks, north 64 chains to a black oak, west 98 chains to a post oak in a meadow, south with the line of Davie's 64 chains to the beginning, for _____, with the yearly rent of 25 shillings & 1 penny (which is at the rate of 3 shillings sterling the 100 acres)
