May 9 1792: "Ordered that Elizabeth Sheppard, formerly E. Chapman Admx: of James Chapman deceased, and Nathan Sheppard who hath intermarried with said Elizabeth do appear at next Court and give other Security, or deliver the personal Estate of said James deceased into the hands & possession of Charles Hunt her present Security".

Feb. 4 1783: "Ordered by the Court that Letters of Administration on the Estate of James Chapman deceased, issue to Betty Chapman Widow & Relict of the deceased Who qualified according to Law and gave Bond in the Sum of 800 Specie".

Book 9 page 223: March 21 1780, The State grants (#172 at 50 shillings the 100 acres) to James Chapman 640 acres in forks of Yadkin River next Wm. Bryant, William Bryant & James Wilson.

Book 13 page 426: On Nov. 26 1793, Elizabeth Shepard of Rowan Co.N.C., lets Erasmus Chapman have bill of sale for 9 head of cattle, 1 feather bed, 40 bushels of corn at 29 cents the pound, 1 trunk at 40 shillings, 1 chest at 1 pound, 2 walnut bedsteads, a small wheel at 2 pounds &c., witnessed by Nathan Chaffin Sr. & Jr. & proved by Nathan Chaffin Jr. in Feb. 1794.

: Deed from Elizabeth Shepard to Erasmus Allen for Sundries Nov. 26 1793 is proved by Nathan Chaffin.

: Deed from Elizabeth Shepard to Edward Stonestreet for sundries on Nov. 23 1793 is proved by Erasmus Chapman.

Book 13 page : On Nov. 23 1793, Elizabeth Shepard lets Edward Stonestreet have 1 sow, 11 goats, 3 pots, 2 ovens &c, for 10 pounds, witnessed by Nancy & Erasmus Chapman & proved in Feb. 1794.

Book 13 page 935: On April 29 1795, Nancy Chapman lets Alexander Long have a negro boy "Daniel" about 12 years old, for 50 pounds, witnessed by William Chapman & M. Stokes & proved by the latter in May 1795.

Book 25 page 141: On Aug. 28 1817, William Hudson lets William Jarvis have 198 1/4 acres on the road from Huntsville to Salisbury next Allen Chapman, ---Stonestreet & Michael Willson, for \$650.00, witnessed by Wm. Chaffin, & Wm. Fulford & proved by the latter in Feb. 1819. (No wife signs).

Marriage bonds: John A.Chapman to Rachel Cunningham March 29 1806 signed by William Andrews.

The will of Hugh Allen (book H page 523) made March 6 1828. Wife Martha... Nieces & Nephews: David, Martha, Catherine, Elizabeth & Ann Foster, Eliza Brown & Hugh Masters. Exr.: James Jamison. Witnesses: John Foster & James F. Jamison.

Marriage bond: Hugh Allen to Martha Swan Nov. 10 1792 signed by Richard Tretter (Jo. Chambers)

Feb. 5 1778: Deed from Richard & Sarah Auten to Hugh Allen for 628 acres Jan. 26 1776 proved by Samuel Hart.

May 6 1772: Deed from Archabald Morrowson to Richard Aulton for 628 acres March 7 1772 proved by Alexr. Morrison.

The will of Thomas Swan (book D page 27) made while "weak in body"--no date. Wife Catharina. Among other children: Martha Allen to have 30 pounds. &c. The will of Thomas Swann was proved Feb. 3 1796.

The will of Joseph McConnachie (book E page 64) proved the wife of Thomas Swann, Catharina, to be his daughter.

The will of Hugh McConaughey (book D page 210) probated 1800 proves Catharina to be his sister.

Book 23 page 304: On Sept. 28 1814, Thomas Swann Sr.'s widow, Catharina Swann, lets her sons, Matthew & James, have land left her by her husband.

The will of Erasmus Wethers Allen of Rowan Co.N.C. (book 6 page 259) made Oct. 26 1787. Wife Sarah. Daughters: Mary (her 4 children: Allen, Erasmus, Streshley & Salley), Susannah Dewitts (her 5 children: Frances, Salley, William, James & Thomas), Rachel Poeve(?), Hannah Estes, Milly White, Petty Chapman & Sally Terrel. Sons: William & Thomas. (Seven children in all it seems & I may not have them right). Exrs: son William & Allen Chapman. Attests: Edward Vs. Harbin (Jr. or Jr.), Jesse Bryan & Andrew Hunt.

Aug. 5 1789: The will of Erasmus Allen is proved by Jesse Bryan & Edward Vs. Harby. Allen & ---- qualified as executors.

Nov. 4 1789: "William Allin one of the Exrs. of Erasmus Allin came into Court and Qualified". An inventory of the estate is returned.

Book 14 page 88: Sept. 10 1781, James Chapman of Culpepper Co.Va., binds himself on bond of '500 pounds to let Erasmus Allen of Amherst Co.Va., have the northern part of the 640 acres bought of Thomas Bryan but entered by said Chapman with Col. James Brandon E.R., witnessed in Chesterfield by William Chapman & Joshua Render & vouched for by Alexander Craig as C.C. Book 14 page : March 11 1794, Nathan Sheppard & Elizabeth Sheppard (through their attorney Joseph Brevard) as administrators of James Chapman admit the wrong of Wm. Chapman as executors of deceased Erasmus Allen,

Book 22 page 671 or 771 (numbered twice): Nov. 21 1799, John Chapman of Chesterfield Co.S.C.--no wife signs--as heir-at-law of deceased James Chapman, lets Erasmus Chapman of Rowan Co.N.C., have 200 acres next ---Bryan, Michael Wilson, John Hill & Allen Chapman (being part of the 640 acres granted by The State to said deceased Jas. Chapman & devolved to said heir), for 150 pounds, witnessed by Wm. Thornton & Benjamin Chapman & proved by the latter

Book 13 page 610: On April 11 1789, Erasmus Allen & wife Sarah let Michael Willson have 43 acres on Brian's Mill Creek next James Forbis, John Johnston, James Chapman & James Willson, for 20 pounds, witnessed by Andrew Hunt & Milly White & proved in May 1794 by Andrew Hunt.

:Deed from Erasmus Allen & wife to Michael Willson for 43 acres on April 11 1789, proved by Andrew Hunt.

Feb. 6 1777: Erasmus Allen & James Blair are securities for William & Milly White on bond of 1000 pounds when they qualify as administrators of the deceased Reuben White.

May 9 1777: A bench warrant is issued against William White, administrator of Reuben White, to account with next court. "Ordered That James Chapman be joined with Miley White and Wm White in Adminr: of the Estate of Reuben White deceased---Securities Wm: Sharp, Jos: Steele, Chrisr: Beekman & Allen in the Sum of 6000". It seems that William White is suspected of secreting the will of the deceased Reuben White, so John White, Thomas Whitson, William Faries & Joseph Dobson Sr. are summoned to give testimony at next court.

Aug. 8 1777: These come to court & William White is required to give bond of 6000 pounds as Admr. with Charles Adams as security. William Faries is a schoolmaster. It is ordered that Esq. Charles McDowell or Esq. Matthew Sharpe of Burke Co.N.C. examine John White, Thomas Whitson, Joseph Dobson, William Faries & James Levenport about the will of deceased Reuben White.

Book 14 page 878: Nathan Sheppard & wife Elizabeth (adminsrs. of deceased James Chapman) are to defend a suit & charges made by Allen Chapman & William Allen ("executors of deceased Erasmus Allen") on a debt. It seems that James Chapman made a bond at Chatham for 500 pounds specie (equal to 388 pounds, 17 shillings & 9 pence lawful N.C.money) on Sept. 10 1781 and hadn't paid it. His executors, Nathan & Elizabeth Sheppard, also refuse to pay it. The bond: James Chapman of Culpeper Co.Va., is to deed over some land--probably 270 acres--which he got from Thomas Bryan & entered with Col. James Brandon E.R., when he got a full title--this is part of 640 acres) to Erasmus Allen of Amherst Co. Va. The suit seems to be started in Chesterfield Co.Court in South Carolina on March 11 1794. (More to it).

Aug. 8 1792: "Administration on the Estate of James Chapman deced. granted to Nathan Sheppard in right of his wife, who qualified & gave bond with Hardy Jones Security in the Sum of 500.0" (over)

Gaither, for 350 pounds, witnessed by Peter Eaton & John Dial & proved by the latter in Oct. 11 1814. Book 9 page 222: March 21 1780, The State grants (#180 & 50 shillings the 100 acres) to William Allen 528 acres near his spring, Wm. Williams, Peter Eaton, Shadrack Williams, Zadock Martin & John Ferbush. all of Rowan Co

Book 9 page 416: On Jan. 5 1784, William Allen & wife Sarah, let George Gentle have 140 acres next Shadrack Williams, Zadock Martin & Peter Eaton, for 50 pounds, witnessed by Joseph Bryan & Evan Ellis & proved by the latter in May 1784. skipped

Book 17 page 401: Thomas Allen--no wife--lets Brumbly Coker (both Rowan) have 162 acres on Elishas Creek, for 200 pounds, witnessed by John Powell & Samuel Smith who proved it in Nov. 1800.

Book 9 page 417: On Jan. 5 1784, William Allen & wife Sarah, let Evan Ellis have 388 acres on Cedar Creek & Sugar Tree Creek next William Allen's spring, William Williams, Peter Eaton, George Gentle & John Forbest, for 100 pounds, witnessed by Joseph Bryan & George Gentle. Deed from William Allen & wife to Evan Ellis for 388 acres Jan. 5 1784 proved by George Gentle.

Book 11 page 63: On Sept. 14 1767, John Brunts & wife Elizabeth, let Abraham Wiltey (all or Rowan Co.N.C.) have 500 acres on east. side of Dutchmans Creek & both sides of Seder & Cub Creeks next said Wiltey's Mill-dam, for 735 pounds, witnessed by . (This had belonged to Peter Beam who let John Allen have it, who let Joseph Bryan have it, who let Richard Jacks have it, who let John Brunts have it). July 10-11 1767 proved Saml Bryan. July 14 1767: Lease & release from John Allin to Joseph Bryan for 697 acres

Book 29 page 277: On July 17 1826, William Allen--no wife signs--lets James Cornell--both of Rowan Co.N.C.--have 100 acres next John Barlow, John Brunt, Edmond Atcheson & Doyle Bowden, for \$390.00, witnessed by Wm. Depoyster? & Nathan Cornell & proved by the latter in Feb. 1827. (This is part of a State Grant of 200 acres made to James James).

Book 29 page 315: On March 4 1824, Joseph Allen--no wife signs--lets William Hawkins--both of Rowan Co.N.C.--have 9 acres on Dutchmans Creek next Samuel Smith, for \$100.00, witnessed by Peter Eaton & James Smith & acknowledged in Feb. 1827. carried out elsewhere

Book 10 page : On April 11 1763, Peter Beam & wife Mary let John Allen have 697 acres on both sides of Dutchmans Creek, Cedar Creek & Cubb Creek next Squire Boone & Isaac Free, for 5 shillings, release being WING 1000 acres witnessed by William Steel, John Braly & John Jacks on Sept. 1763. (

: Lease & release from Peter & Mary Beam to John Allen for 697 acres April 11 1763 is proved.

: Deed from Earl Granville to Peter Beam for 697 acres Dec. 21 1761 is proved by John Frohock, a witness.

Feb. 14'71: Lease & release from Richard Jacks & wife to John Brunts for 500 acres Feb. 9 1771 proved by William Roberts.

Book 17 page 412: On Dec. 2 1799, Catharine Beck & son Daniel of Sevier Co. Tenn. (she has power from said son who is lawful age also from daughter Elizabeth & husband Joseph Lanning), let Ludwick Beck have 196 acres on Dutchmans Creek, which had belonged to her deceased husband, Jacob Beck, who willed it to them, for 127 pounds & 10 shillings. (This land on west side of Dutchmans Creek was next Squire Boon & Isaac Free & is part of a tract of 697 acres Earl Granville let Peter Beam have Dec. 21 1761, he transferred it to John Allen, he let Joseph Bryan have it; he & wife Alice let Richard Jacks have it, he & wife Ann let Abraham Adams have it, he & wife Trifina let Michael Beam have it, he & wife Elizabeth let Jacob Beck have it).

Book 6 page 468: July 10 1767, John Allen--no wife signs--lets Joseph Bryan (both of Rowan Co.N.C.) have 697 acres on both sides Dutchmans Creek, Cedar Creek & Cubb Creek next Squire Boone & Isaac Free, for 5 shillings--the release price being 100 pounds on next day--witnessed by Samuel Bryan & William Bryan & proved in July 1767. (Peter Beam deeded this to said John Allen on April 11 1763)

Book 19 page 88: On May 24 1804, William Allen & wife Polly of Montgomery Co.N.C., let Joseph Haden have 11 2/3 acres on Swearing Creek next lot #5 which William Ellis & wife let Joseph Haden have, for \$50.00, witnessed by Frederick Miller & H.Ditamothe & proved in Nov. 1804. (This is 1/5 of a tract of 237 acres granted by The State to Humphrey Brooks & after his death fell to his wife, & after her death fell to his daughter Polly as her 1/4 part, & Polly is now the wife of William Allen.). Refer to paper on Humphrey Brooks for this family.

Book 26 page 277: On Jan. 7 1815, Benjamin Williams & wife Catharine let James Cornell (all of Rowan Co.N.C., have 100 acres next John Barlow, John Brunts, Edmond Etcheson & Doyle Bowden, for \$325.00, witnessed by James James, Jesse Bowden & Nathan Cornell & proved by last named, while Willie P. Jones & George Coker testify as to the willingness of Catharine. (This is part of the 200 acres which was granted to James James & he willed it to Benjamin & Catharine Williams). (over)

Feb. 10 1791: "Be it remembred that the petit Jury being charged on their Oath to inquire William Allen is disordered in his head, insane, or lunatick, do find that the said William Allen is uniformly insane and not fit to take care of himself, the Court therefore order that William Bell, John Harvey & Daniel Baxter be Guardians to the sd. Willm Allen of whom no bond is required"

Roster of N.C. Soldiers in American Revolution (D.A.R.) page 318: Hugh Allen served in Salisbury District--no number given but the only Hugh mentioned.

Book 12 page 700: Oct. 8 1792, Hugh Allen--no wife signs--lets Jacob Freeze (both of Rowan Co.N.C.) have 239 acres on Sills Creek on the original line of Thomas Swann next Daniel Baxter & Richard Auten, for 200 pounds, witnessed by Walt Braly & John Braly Jr. & proved by the latter in Nov. 1792. (This is part of a State Grant to said Hugh Allen & part of a tract which Richard Auten conveyed to him).

Book 20 page 48: May 13 1805, Jacob Freeze--no wife signs--lets William Shilton (both of Rowan Co.N.C.) have 239 acres on Sills Creek next Thomas Swann, David Baxter & Richard Auten for \$500.00, witnessed by Elen Braly & Hugh Braly & proved by the latter in Aug. 1805. (Hugh Allen let said Freeze have this).

Book 9 page 137: Aug. 17 1779, The State grants (#47 at 50 shillings the 100 acres) to Richard Allen? or Otten 155 acres on branch of Thompsons Mill Creek next Andrew McCollum, John Patton & Hugh Allen.

Book 22 page 417 or 517 (numbered twice), Sept. 15 1817; John Dwiggins Sr.--no wife signs--lets Samuel Smith (both of Rowan Co.N.C.) have 35 acres on Dutchmans Creek next Alexander, John Temlinson, Joseph Allen,--- Dwiggins & said Samuel Smith, for 87 pounds & 10 shillings, witnessed by Daniel Dwiggins & John Frost & proved by the latter in May 1812.

The Annals of Haywood County, N.C. (by W.C. Allen in 1935), page 607: "In Medieval England and Scotland, there were two lines of the Allen family. The Alans of Scotland were Gaelic, or Celtic; the Alynes, of Kent, southeastern England, were Norman-French. Representatives of both of these lines came to America between the year 1637 and 1750, and became merged as Allans, Allens, or Allyns. They were full Americans prior to the Revolution."

"Maurice Allen was the first of the name to set foot upon the soil of America. He came over from England with John White in 1587 and remained on Roanoke Island as a member of the "Lost Colony". The next of whom we have any record, was the Rev. John Allen, who graduated from the University of Cambridge with the degree of A.B. in 1615 and with A.M. in 1619. He was born in Norfolk, England, and came to Massachusetts in 1637. He was a Congregational minister and organized a church at Dedham, Massachusetts, which he served as pastor until 1671."

"Dr. Daniel Allen, a son of the Rev. John Allen, graduated at Harvard in 1675 with the degree of A.B. and with A.M. in 1678. He married Mary Anna Bendall. One son, Eleazar, also a graduate of Harvard, came to North Carolina in 1726 and lived in Wilmington until his death in 1750. He was a distinguished lawyer, and was for some years chief-justice of the province of North Carolina."

"About the same time that Eleazar came to Wilmington, James Allen, a kinsman, came from Prince Edward County, Virginia, to what is now Halifax County and established himself as a planter and slave owner on the Roanoke river. His son, also named James, succeeded his father as a planter and slave owner. During the American Revolution, he was an officer in the Continental army and served successively as major, lieutenant-colonel, and colonel of the Halifax Regiment of volunteers, the last position in 1781."

"George Allen, probably a brother of Colonel James Allen, was born in 1743. He, too, became a soldier of the Revolution, and some time either during or after the war, settled in Wake County. He married Lucretia Rives, and the following children were reared: Benjamin, George, Rolica, William, Elizabeth, Robert, Susan,

Moore, long a physician of Canton; Philander Clark, born in 1838, left two children, George and Perry, both of whom live in Cecil township; Orlando, born in 1840, left six children, James, Thomas, Elizabeth, Lena, Rufus, and Effie, all of whom removed from the county; and William Ethelbert, born in 1822 and died in Haywood County in 1903, married Mayy Elizabeth Williams.

"William Ethelbert Allen, the last mentioned of the children of Ely Rieves Allen and Catherine Smith Allen, was born in Iredell County where his father and mother were living. He removed to Buncombe County in 1858, and before and during the Civil War, he was Colonel of the Home Guards. He located in Haywood County in 1870, where he died in 1903. All of his children were born in Buncombe County, but lived most of their lives in Haywood. His two sons, Gay Leonidas and Robert Henry, now (1935) live in Canton. Ely Rieves Allen, William Ethelbert Allen's father, moved to Buncombe County in 1858 and died there.

"George David Simpson Allen, the second son of Ely Rieves Allen and Catherine Smith Allen, was born in Iredell County in 1824. He came to Haywood County in 1858 and located at Pigeon River (Canton), where he practiced medicine for a number of years before moving to Waynesville.

"While in Canton during the 60's and the 70's, Dr. Allen's practice covered a wide territory. He answered calls from both the East and West Forks of the Pigeon river, from Crabtree, Fines Creek, Cattalochee, and Jonathan's Creek town-

ships in Haywood County; Scott's creek, East LaPort, and Caney Fork in Jackson County; and some times trips to Turkey Creek and other places in Buncombe County.

"DR. RUFUS L. ALLEN, a son of Dr. G.D.S. Allen and Nancy Adeline Edmondston Allen, a daughter of Ninian Edmondston, was born on the old Edmondston estate in the upper Pigeon Valley, July 12, 1864. His grandfather was Ely Rieves Allen, who was born in Wake County in 1793. His great grandfather, George Allen, born in 1743, served under General Nathaniel Greene during the Revolutionary War.

"Dr. Allen was educated at the Waynesville Academy and Vanderbilt University, Nashville, Tennessee. He received his medical training at the University of Maryland, from which he was graduated in 1885 with the degree of M.D. In the same year, he located in Waynesville for the general practice of his profession. For forty-five years, he was one of the leading physicians of this part of North Carolina.

"In professional circles, Dr. Allen held an important place.*****

"Two other branches of the Allen family, who apparently are not related, have figured in the life of the county. William Allen, a soldier of the American Revolution whose name is on the marker in the court house square in Waynesville, came here in the early settlement days and was influential in the organization of the county. He was one of the ten of the Revolutionary soldiers, who are buried in Haywood County.

"Ernest L. Withers, secretary of the Waynesville Chamber of Commerce, is a son of W.A. Withers and Matticia Allen Withers, a daughter of William Allen and a great granddaughter of William Allen of the Revolution. Ernest Withers is prominent in the business and social life of Waynesville. He married Lillie Satterthwaite, a daughter of S.C. and Hester Ann Smathers Satterthwaite. They have two children, Hester Ann, a graduate of Agnes Scott College, and Ernest L., Jr., who is attending college (1935).

"William C. Allen, the author of this work, came to Haywood County from Halifax in 1899. He was born in the last mentioned place, a son of James V. Allen and Maria Aaron Allen, both of Halifax. He is a grandson of John Allen and a great grandson of Colonel James Allen, who was the commanding officer of the Halifax Regiment during the last year of the Revolutionary War. He married, December 20, 1887, Cottie Wilkinson; a daughter of Jordan and Mary Jane Windley Wilkinson, both of Beaufort County, North Carolina. Their children are William C. Allen, Jr., of Raleigh, and Lillian May, who was, prior to her marriage to Humes H.W. Hart, of Cincinnati, an instructor in home economics at the University of Tennessee. They have two children, Humes, Jr., and Allen."

" 1776. On Feb 13 marched to Cross Creek having understood that the Scotch Tories were committing depredations. On the way they were joined by Col. Martin Armstrong at Old Richmond with Surry County militia. In Randolph County they were joined by Col. Alexander Martin of the Continental Line with a small body of troops. Before their arrival a battle had been fought between Tories and under General Macdonald and King militia under General Moore, in which the Tories were defeated with considerable loss, and a great number of prisoners taken. 

Alan Carl of 246 Cherokee Road, Nashville 5, Tennessee, on Aug. 24, 1945, asking for information of George Brandon, born in 1703, probably in Scotland, made his will in 1772 in Rowan Co., N.C., & died the following year. She thinks he must have been the father of George, John, Christopher, Abraham, Jane, Mary, Elizner & Sidney & the name of his wife Miriam(?) & that his eldest son, George, the second must have married before his father's death & had George the third in 1770, who married in 1797, Sidney McGuire (born in 1774 & died in Rutherford Co., Tenn. as did her husband, George III in 1844). She has no marriage bonds to connect the links & would like a photostatic copy of the will of Geo. I.

She is also interested in the marriage record of John Dunn who married Mary Allen prior to 1802; also in the family of Jacob Nelson who taught school in Robeson Co., N.C. in the late 18th century & at Mt. Olive Academy in 1807--the name of his wife & children.
