Oct. 13 1767: "Orderd by the Court that Alexander Martin be Appointed Atto. for the Crown for this Court &c"

Jan. 12 1768: "Ordered that Mr Alexander Martin act as an Attorney for the Crown during the siting of this Court"

Jan. 16 1767: Deed from William Harrison to Alexr. Martin for 1/4 lot #5 in north square of Salisbury beginning at S.corner, on Aug. 14 1765 proved by Daniel Little. (over)

For 10 shillings, proved July 22 1762.

July 20, 1763: Deed from Earl Granville to Alexr. Martin for 436 acres Dec. 21 1761 proved by John Frohock.

May 6 1772: Alexr. Martin & Wm. Raper are securities for Thomas Stanton when he gets ordinary licence for his home. (Alexr. Martin seems to go security for many people).

Oct. 15 1766: "Alexander Martin Esqr. Appeard in Open Court Prodused a Commission from the Attorney General Appointing him Depu Kings Attorney for this County who Quallified According to Law"

Oct. 15 1766: "On Motion of Alexr. Martin Orderd that Richard Stanton have Letters of Adm of the Estate of Thomas Stanton Dece. and Offerd for Scu. According to Law, Alexr. Martin John Huntr in the Sum of 200. Pounds Proc money". (Fee pd J.F. = 24/. with a note for the ballance).

Aug. 9 1780: "On Motion of Alexander Martin Esq: John Garrison was brought into Court on Writ of Habeas Corpus, and upon this Courts examining the Alligations against said John for Harboursing a Deserter from the Continental Army this Court discharged said John Garrison".

Dr. Ruple's History of Rowan Co. (under head of Episcopacy in Rowan) tells: "Among the names of the old ante-Revolutionary Churchmen was Alexander Martin, who lived in Salisbury until Guilford County was erected. He had a brother who was a clergyman of the Church of England, and lived in Virginia. The former was quite a distinguished man. He was a prominent lawyer by profession, and was frequently commissioned by the crown to hold the District Court at Salisbury. He presided over the Court which was held on the first day of June, 1775, during the sitting of which Captain Jack passed through on his way to the Continental Congress at Philadelphia, with the Mecklenburg "Resolves" of the thirty-first of May. He was a colonel in the Continental Army, and fought under LaFayette at the battle of Brandywine. He was elected Governor of the State in 1782, and again in 1789. He was also Governor in 1781, during the enforced absence of Governor Burke, who had been captured by the Tory Colonel Fannen, of Chatham. He never married. The last office he held was that of United States Senator, wo which he was elected in 1799. He died in 1807."

The Fayetteville Gazette of Sept. 15 , tells of the arrival of Gov. Alexr. Martin from his seat at Danbury on the preceding Saturday--was met by Capt. Dudley's troop of Light Horse & received by Capt. Winslow's Company of artillery on the State House square in Fayetteville--then the capital of N.C.--and dinner was provided at DeKyser's Inn &c. On Nov. 27 , Gov. Alexr. Martin tells of the gift of Col. Benjamin Smith's gift of 20,000 acres to the University of N.C.--Col. Smith was then living at Belvidere, Brunswick Co. N.C.

Wheeler's History page 181 of Vol. II. : Gov. Alexr. Martin of Guilford Co. N.C. was born in New Jersey, the son of an Irishman from Tyrone Co. who emigrated to America in 1721. Alexr. has a liberal education--his brother, Colonel James Martin of Revolutionary war, resided in Salisbury & became Judge, dying in Mobile Alabama--; another brother Thomas Martin who was graduated at Princeton, taught school in Va. & became a minister in the Episcopal Church; & another brother, Samuel Martin, who was in the Revolution fighting as Captain in battle of Eutaw, married the widow Campbell of Mecklinburg & died of influenza in Charlotte. Gov'r. Martin lived in Danbury, N.C.

Martin to Thomas Henderson who transferred it to Esq. Alexr. Martin) for 250 pounds; acknowledged in Feb 1809

It is claimed by the Dalton-Hunter connection that the aunt of Gov. Alexander Martin & Col. James Hunter Sr., a native of Ireland, who was one of the pioneer settlers of Rockingham Co. N.C. as a young man. 436 acres on east side Dann River & both sides of Jacobs Creek next John Moss in River.

May 13 1769: Deeds from George Peares to Esq. Alex. Martin for 1/2 lot #7 in south square of Salisbury Sept. 14 1768--also lots #21-22 in same on Sept 13 1768 proved by George Magoune.

(Part of 20 acres which Hugh Forster let Martin Armstrong have).

Book 17 page 130: On Sept. 23 1799, Esq. Alexr. Martin of Rockingham Co. N.C., lets Barnard Cryder, a "Tavern Keeper" of Salisbury, N.C. have 1/4 of lot #1 in east square (36 sq. poles), on Corbin St., next --Cryder, John Johnson, & Paul Barringer's half--now Esq. Richmond Pearson's, for 100 pounds witnessed by Coonrod Gillam & Henry Giles & proved by latter in Feb. 1800. (Trustees let Jas. Bowers, have it, he let Esq. Jno. Brevard & he let Alexr. Martin).

Giles & Benj. Tores & proved by Henry Giles in Aug. 1802. Alexander Martin have it).

The Charlotte Observer of Sunday, Oct. 31 1926, contains an article written by Dr. Archibald Henderson, JACKSON'S HISTORY-MAKING PILGRIMAGE ACROSS NORTH CAROLINA MOUNTAINS, in which: "The name of Alexander Martin, famous in our history, has a certain association with the name of Andrew Jackson. Martin, born in Lebanon, Hunterdon county, New Jersey, about 1738, and graduated from the College of New Jersey, September 29, 1756, emigrated to North Carolina about 1760. In the little hamlet of Salisbury, he at once established himself as a merchant; and the following advertisement appeared in the Pennsylvania Gazette of December 10, 1761: "Notice is hereby given to Alexander Martin, merchant, in Salisbury, N.C., that his father, Hugh Martin, of Hunterdon County, New Jersey, died 9th March last, and left him and his brother James executors of his will; wherefore, said Alexander Martin, if not inconvenient to his business, is desired to return home, to settle his late father's affairs, but if his coming should be attended with disadvantages to him, he is requested not to come by his mother, Jane Martin."

Dr. Henderson adds that Alexander Martin succeeded in his mercantile affairs and quickly attained prominence in this community. Buying a lot & store-house in 1765, he was appointed justice of the county in the same year by Gov. Tryon. Having qualified as an attorney the next year, he was soon practicing in the superior court of Salisbury & Hillsboro. When the town was incorporated, he was made a commissioner and held the office in Aug. 7 1771. He moved to Guilford County in 1772--possibly by the influence of his brother-in-law, Thomas Henderson, who had married his sister, Jane Martin. This brother-in-law was a brother of Judge Richard Henderson, the president of the Transylvania Land company, who was born in Granville Co., N.C., on March 19, 1752 & appointed Clerk of Guilford County when this county was established, which office he retained until Rockingham County was cut off and he resigned to take up the same office in Rockingham. Thomas Henderson settled at Danbury then. His brother, Major Pleasant Henderson, at one time steward of the University of North Carolina, married Sarah Martin, (daughter of James Martin & wife Ruth Rogers,) who was a niece of Alexander Martin. Ann Martin, another daughter of Col. James Martin, married Thomas Searcy, born Jan 28 1767, a son of ^{the} Searcy Reuben Searcy of Granville County, by his wife Susan (who was a sister of Richard, Thomas & Pleasant Henderson). Susan, the daughter of Thomas & Ann Martin Searcy, married Nathaniel Henderson, the son of Thomas & Jane Martin Henderson. Thomas Searcy & Thomas Henderson conducted a store at Guilford Courthouse--later named Martinville in honor of Gov. Alexr. Martin. The Searcy brothers, Reuben, Bartlett & Richard, went west with Richard Henderson and received grants of 1,400 acres each in Kentucky in 1779. Richard Searcy was captured by Indians at Boonsborough, the Transylvania fort, in 1777, & his brother, Bartlett received death from them in an engagement.

Edmund Fanning's land was seized and sold to the highest bidder by The State when that gentleman joined the army of Lord Cornwallis, so Alexander Martin & his brother-in-law, Thomas Henderson, bought 350 acres of it for 8,000 pounds, then they secured an act of the Assembly, Dec. 29, 1785 the name of Martinville, to 100 acres upon which the Guilford courthouse stood & adjoining it, which they had purchased & had been laid off by Esq. William Dent. William Dent, Ralph Gorrell, Robert Lindsay, John Hamilton, William Dick were named in the incorporation act, later Alexander Martin's name was added. This being the center it was the logical place to sell land in Guilford, but unfortunately the county was divided on the same day, so that the land lost its value and their real estate venture failed, for it was not now the center of either county.

Thomas Henderson resigned as Clerk of Guilford County on Feb. 25, 1786, and accepted that position in Rockingham County, living in Guilford until his removal to Mt. Pleasant, Rockingham County, he probably remained at the latter place until after 1796, when Chapel Hill became his home. Searcy succeeded his as Clerk of Guilford County--but Thomas Searcy removed his family to his old home, Mt. Pleasant before 1810 and died at "Mill Grove" on Aug. 1 1831, having never left the State. Bennett Searcy did fill several honorable positions in Davidson County, having appointed attorney-at law for Tennessee county (cut off Davidson) with Hopkins Lacy. He was practicing law in Williamson County (cut off Davidson County in 1799) in 1800 at what is now Franklin. ~~and~~ His younger brother, Robert Searcy, who was born in Granville County, N.C. on Nov. 10, 1768, also studied law and removed to Nashville--here in 1799, he, John McNairy, Joseph Coleman, Joseph Philips & David McGavock were on the committee to build a stone courthouse in Nashville. He also was on the board of trustees of Davidson Academy with Andrew Jackson, John McNairy & William Polk. Rev. Thomas B. Craighead was president of this academy and Bennett Searcy was thought to have been the librarian. Robert Searcy, the 1st mason of Nashville, married Susan Wendell & lived on corner of Deaderick & Cherry streets--he became a judge and died about 1821.

"MARTIN, JAMES 1776. Colonel of Guilford County militia regiment, by appointment of Samuel Johnson, called by General Rutherford to meet him at the Catawba River and then on to destroy the Cherokee towns. "Accordingly I marched about 400 militia (from Guilford County) and joined the General, as he ordered me. Lt. Col. John Patsley assisted me to raise the men and marched with us. Thence we marched into Turkey Cove, at the foot of the Blue Ridge, then on to Swannano, then to the Pigeon River, then to the French Broad, then the Tennessee, where we found some of their towns, which we burnt, and cut down their corn, starting from one town as we destroyed it and marching to another. Our Commissary (McAdoo) had about 3,000 bevers and as many horses loaded with sacks of flour, and where we encamped one night the bevers destroyed the whole of it (the surrounding growth), even to the stumps, and destroyed the grass to the bare ground."

"General Rutherford took the pick of the better half of the army and went to the Overhill towns. He left me with the remainder of the troops to guard the provisions. He was gone two or three weeks but had no skirmish, having seen no Indians, but he destroyed some of their towns. While he was gone the southern army of militia (Major Williamson's South Carolinians) "on the same intentions as we had," Martin says, "marched through our camp and fell into an ambuscade with the Indians about one and a half miles from the camp." "I heard their guns firing," he recalled, "and the commander sent to me for assistance" and I sent Colonel Cleveland with about 150 men, but before he got there they had routed the Indians and killed ten or twelve, losing about the same number of their men. I had sent out scouts every day but they never happened to fall in with this ambuscade."

"After destroying all towns and corn of the Indians they took their march home on orders of the General. "A few Indians skulked around our camp and a few of our men when they caught them out single killed them but had no battle with them."
