I Hugh Graham of the State of North Carolina County of Rowan being very sick and weak in body but of perfect mind and memory, thanks be given unto God. Therefore calling unto mind the mortality of my body and knowing that it is appointed unto all men once to die, do make and ordain this my last Will and Testament-----

That is to say and principally and first of all I give and recommend my Soul into the hands of God that gave it. And for my body I recommend it to the Earth to be buried in a Christian like and decent manner, at the direction of my Executors not doubting that at the general Resurrection I shall receive the same again by the Mighty Power of God. And as touching such worldly estate where with it hath pleased God to bless me in this life I give and devise and dispose of the same in the following manner and form.

First I give and bequeath to Sarah my dearly beloved wife- all and singular my household goods and movables of every kind whatever, together with plow and utensils and what ever other tools are necessary for the occupation and improvement of my lands while she liveth thereon, also one least of horse king at her choice, also three milch cows to her discretion in choice also.

Likewise I ordain by this my last Will and Testament that my wife Sarah Graham and Charles Lovelace of State & County aforesaid in hereby appointed my sole executors I also empower them to pay all my just and lawful debts of every kind whatsoever, to be levied out of my effects. I also ordain my heirs, Messuages and Tenements, all and singular to the care of my said wife Sarah, to be perfectly enjoyed uninterruptedly while she continues in the Estate I leave her and if it should please her after my decease to enter into a second marriage I then ordain my Lands, Messuager and Tenements all and singular to be rented to the best advantage and the money or monies arising from the rent therefore to be equally divided amongst my children, Mary, Frances, and Susannah, Graham until they come to age of maturity, at which time I then ordain my said lands and Tenements to be sold to the best advantage and the money or monies thence arising to be appropriated equally to the use of my said children and divided equally among them.

I also ordain and appoint whatever beasts, horses or cattle, that I have not left to my wife disposal, to be sold and the money or monies thence arising to be appropriated to the payment of just debts aforesaid, at the direction my my said Executors and the residue applied to the use of my said children.

And I do hereby utterly disallow revoke and disannul all and every other former Wills and Testaments, legacies bequests and executors by me in any ways before this time made, willed and bequeathed, ratifying and confirming, this and no other to be my last Will and Testament In Witness whereof I have hereunto set my hand and seal the day and year above written.

"GRAHAM, JAMES (N.C.) 1775. Entered service under Capt. Samuel Young as a volunteer in December. To Bayburn's Creek, S.C. Two weeks.

"1776. To Fayetteville against the Tories.

"On Cherokee expedition with Captain Young and General Rutherford.

"1780. At battle of Camden, under Captain Samuel Rader, Colonel Alexander and General Rutherford.

"1781. At Cowan's Ford under Capt. Joseph Graham and General Davidson. On same tour was in a skirmish with Tories at Holt's Race Paths near Hillsborough, N.C. Was impressed as a wagoner and made a trip to Charlotte, to Virginia, and a third to Fayetteville to bring salt for the army.

"James Graham was aged 74 in November, 1832. His application for a pension was witnessed by James Houston and William Luchie, who had served with him part of the time. He explains that the only clergyman who knew him had died some time before."

I have written to the County Clerk of Rutherford to find out if there are any records of the John Graham and John Slavin families there. I might run across something there would be a big help to you in N.C. When I have a reply, will advise you and enclose another check.

I believe this John Graham was Col. John Graham of Rowan by John Slavin serving in his company. Hope you can look over that list at Raleigh. Please keep this Graham family in mind. I do not know when John Slavin came to Kentucky. I was just guessing at date. I find him paying taxes in Garrard in 1797. That is when our records here begin. This John you find was possibly the same person. I have been trying mighty hard to make my John a son of William. He seems to have had a very small family for those days. Just two sons... Robert and William. Have wondered if this Samuel who names his brother John could have been son of William.

I find an extra William and a Richard here in Garrard I cannot account for. Great-great grandfather John had a son William, but I find marriage records of two Williams dated 1817. Then a Richard marriage bond in 1797. He does not name a Richard in his will and the marriage I believe is too early to have been his son. I believe they came to Ky. with John.

Thank you very much for what you have done. I believe we are on the right track. Will be glad to have you look into the records of the other counties when you have time. Will send check when I hear from Tenn., so we will know better how to proceed.

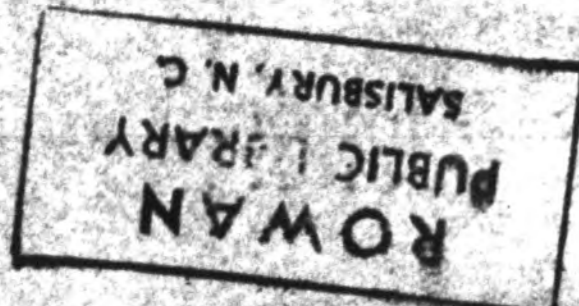

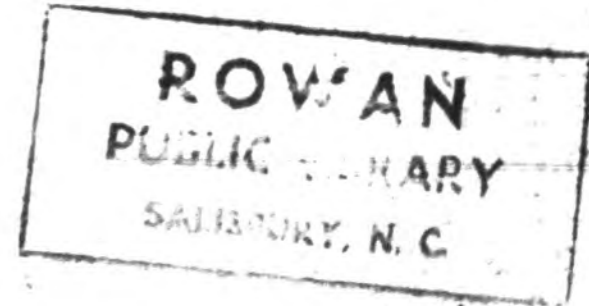
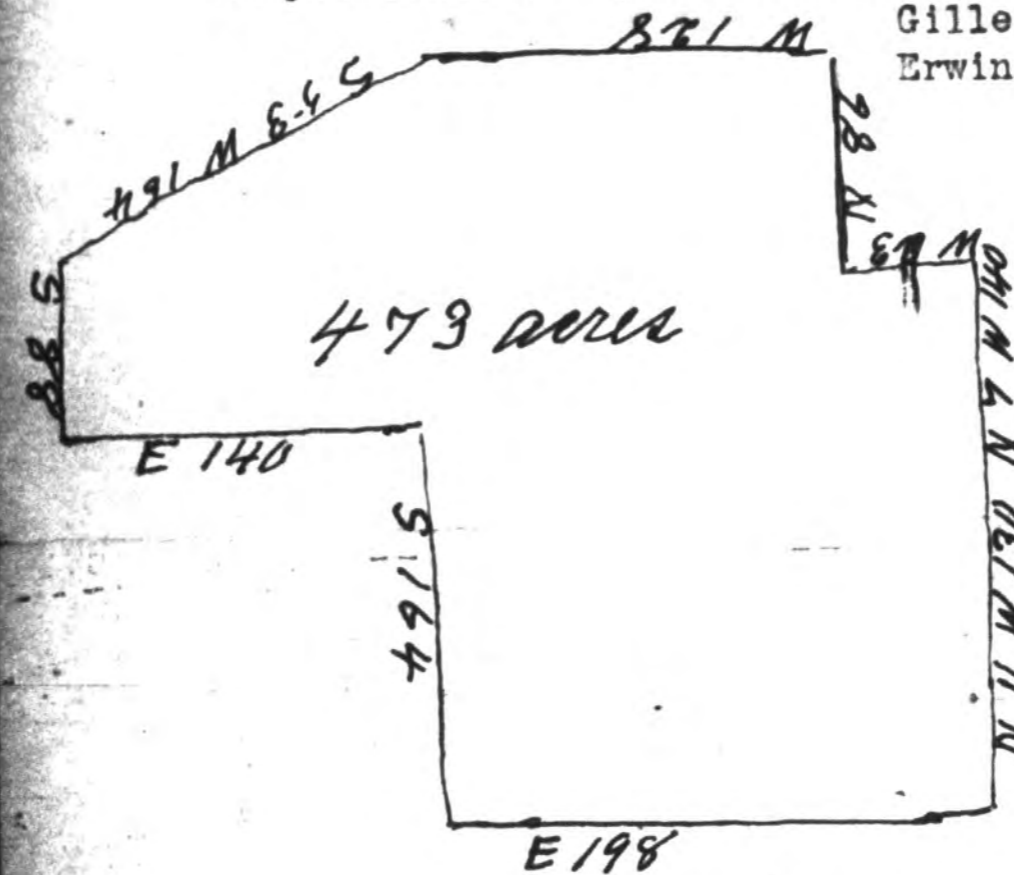

Francis Young & James Salespy

"History of The Old Cheraw." (By Rev. Alexander Gregg, D.D. in 1867) page 61: "Francis Young petitioned for 150 acres of land in the Welch Tract on the south side of the river, bounding between John Thomas's line and one Daughtry's land; and the Petitioner at the same time produced a certificate of his having died there before the settlement of the Welch, signed by two Justices of the Peace, in that place. He appeared in person, and his petition was granted.

"He was one of the earliest settlers within the limits of the upper portion of the Welch Tract of whom any record remains. He is supposed to have emigrated from Ireland." (Council Journal, 9th November, 1749)

Page 62: "James Salespy came from the North of Ireland. He was a man of energy and enterprise. In connexion with General Christopher Gadsden, of Charlestown, he was engaged in boating on the Pee Dee many years before the Revolution, and is believed to have been the first person who ever brought a boat to Cheraw. The difficulty with the Welch doubtless led to his removal higher up the river, to the neighbourhood of the present town of Cheraw. He settled on the west side of the river, a short distance below the town, and entered on a successful career as a trader. He married a daughter of Francis Young. James Salespie died before the Revolution. He left two sons to inherit his name, and two daughters" Francis, who died before the Revolution, and James (who was born in 1754, took an active part in the Revolution, married Miss Wild -- aunt of the late Judge James Wild of Darlington), and had: Francis, Samuel, James, Sarah & Mary."

The daughters of James Salespie, Sr.: -- who married John Westfield, (an emigrant from Virginia to Pede, who later returned to Virginia taking his wife, and there died), and Abedience, who married Thomas Plerby and had a large family.

The name of Salespie was changed to Gillespie probably by the spelling of the name of the Teacher

The Ellerby's came to Virginia from England

Page 64: "Notable" \*The Widow of Thomas Ellerby married Charley  
Bedingfield (called Bennisfield by the old people), a man of  
some note, but of imprincipled character, while his stepsons,

them only the landed estate of their father with which, to make

6th I give and bequeath to my son Richard Mitchell all my landed estate to him

8th I also give to my son Mitchell all my leather books and the balance of my

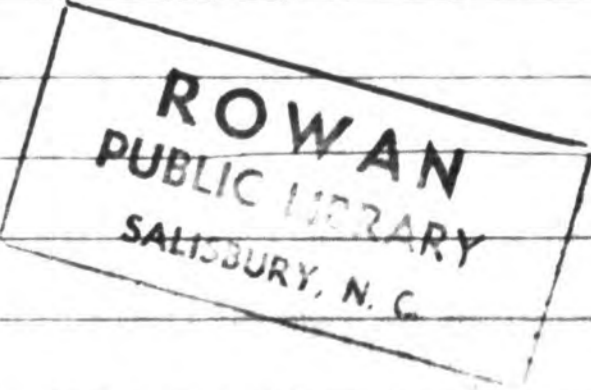

In the name of God, Amen, I, Richard Gillispie of the County of Rowan and State of North Carolina being now in a low and infirm state of body and health, the sound in mind and memory, thanks be to Almighty God; Do make certain establish and confirm this my last will and testament in manner and form following to wit: Hoping in the general Resurrection of our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ that my soul may be saved, and that after my departure from this life that my body be interred in a decent and Christian manner and the by my Executor or Executors herein after named and that all just debts be paid after my death.

Item 1st. I give and bequeath to my beloved wife Nancy the full use and benefit of the plantation, whereon I now live, (is) my home plantation with all the rights and privileges there unto belonging during her life if she should remain my widow till her death: but if she should marry: then and in that case, my said home plantation shall then immediately devolve to the whole right and title of my son James A Gillispie as will hereafter be mentioned by notes and bounds and my said wife to have no right nor claim in and to it:-

It is also my will and desire: that if my said son James A. Gillispie will and do occupy till and use the said plantation which I have bequeathed the use of to my beloved wife Nancy in the manner expressed together with her agreeably and peaceably that he shall and may quietly, peaceably and undisturbed occupy the same to his use and benefit as well as her son.

And if it should be that they might happen not to agree so that their interest and occupancy in and on the said land may have need to be separated: then and in that case the said land to be equally divided between them, each of them to have equal share of the woods and equal share of the buildings, and after her death or marriage as aforesaid the whole right and title to and of the said land and premises with all the rights waters and appurtenances therunto belonging I give and bequeath to my said son James A. I also give and bequeath to my beloved wife Nancy two negro men and two boys named Chester, Harry and Alfred, two negro girls named Alice and Mary to her whole right in and benefit, during her life if she remains my widow till her death, but if she should marry, it is my will and desire that the said negroes and their increase shall be valued by three men of veracity chosen by my Executor and equally divided and apportioned among all my children that may then be alive and not off such sum of money according to valuation as my wife then all equal in negroes or money.

I also give and bequeath to my beloved wife Nancy one chest of drawers, one bed, bedstead and furniture, her saddle, bridle and shaft, my Doll Marys, my Gig and harness two Cows of her own choice four hundred dollars in money to her and her heirs forever to her own will and disposal.

Item 2nd. I give and bequeath to my son Joseph G. Gillispie four negroes namely Mingo, Edy and Ford and my Polly mare to him and his heirs and assigns forever.

3rdly. I give and bequeath to my daughter Nancy Cathy Gillispie one negro girl Clay my Silver Mare and six hundred dollars in money to her and her heirs and assigns forever.

4thly I give and bequeath to my son James A. Gillispie my negro boy Sam Parker my negro boy Andy and my negro girl Esther and also my two old negroes Sam and Parker and my Tilly mare called bequeath to him and his heirs and assigns forever.

5thly I give and bequeath to my son Thomas G. Gillispie one negro boy Hardy, one negro boy Peter and one negro girl Dancy and two hundred dollars in money to him, his heirs and assigns forever.

6thly I give and bequeath to my daughter Flare Fannia Gillispie one negro girl Caroline and six hundred dollars in money to her, her heirs and assigns forever.

It is my will that my friend E. D. Austin and Joseph E. Debbins and Abel Corran act as commissioners to lay off one years provisions for my wife and family.

I also allow all my negroes to remain on my place and work as they have been doing in my life time and he proceeds over and above what will support them to be equally divided amongst my wife and children. But if my negroes does not do so I will then and in that case I allow my Executor to hire them out or do as he may think best for the interest of my family. 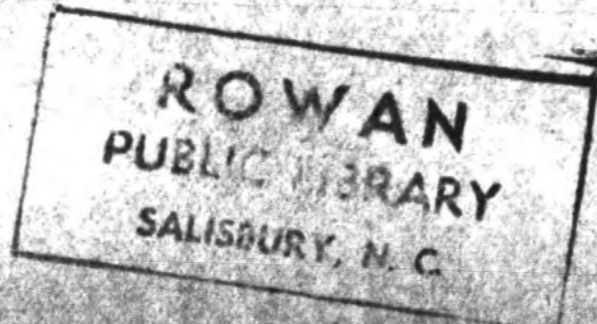

13thly It is my will and desire that if either of my daughters here before named should die in the minor state of life (i.e.) before she should become capable of the disposal of her share of my Estate herein given to her or in theirs or theirs by his my last will and Testament that then and in that case that her or either of their shares as the case maybe of the bequest to fall inwhole to the other sisters to the exclusion of the rights of her brothers.

14th It is my will and desire that my beds and furniture remain in my house under the care of my beloved wife to the use and benefit of herself for all of them. I allow her my said wife to give them to my children my need them as she may deem best so that all get equal.

15thly It is my will and desire that all my house and kitchen furniture (not before named) and all my Books, all my farming utensils (including waggons and gears) of every description my ploughs and harness, my horse and all my implements of husbandry, for field or house use of every description whatsoever, together with the horses called Bull, Katey Trim and Palty and one mare of their own choice of the girted trotting pair of saddle-tree cattle, twenty head of sheep of my wife's own choosing out of my stock and flocks with all my hogs with all provisions that maybe on hand, that is needful, my black smith tools still and vessels to remain on my premises under the care and management of my wife to the use and benefit of herself and all my children while she shall remain my widow and after her marriage or death, all the property mentioned in this item together with its increase to be sold and equally divided amongst all my children.



In the name of God, Amen, I, **John Gillispie (widow)** of the State of North Carolina and County of Rowan being weak of body but in perfect mind and memory and knowing that it is appointed unto all men to die I give bequeath and devise my property which God has given me in the following manner.

I have enjoyed going over the records as you have taken them from the family Bible in the possession of William Ellison Graham's family.

From these records you have sent me I have made out a complete set of records so far as I can at present from the information supplied.

Am I to understand that William McKnight Graham and his wife Sallie S. Krier are still living?

Can Mr Wm. Ellison Graham complete the records of birth and marriage of his parents and his brothers and sisters. These facts seem to be missing from the Bible records. From some notes I have I believe that he had a brother Theo. A. Graham and a sister Agnes Graham who married Robert L. Steele and this Steele marriage interest us as it may lead back to your Jane Locke.

The Census shows that James Graham in 1850 was living in Iredeell Co. with his wife and two children a boy and a girl and his record checks each enumeration of the Census down to 1880.

We at present cannot identify the father of James Graham in 1810 but we believe that his father must have been living in Iredeell and that he married his wife in Swan because that was where her parents lived.

In 1810 the following may lived in Iredeell and had sons old enough to marry in 1814.

If the family cannot furnish a clue we can get it when I come back to study the Iredeell Records.

Cuman and his wife Jane Lock Steel then I am sure we can lay out the plan for proving your entire record of Minian Steele.

I surely hope Whitfield Graham can add something to the story.

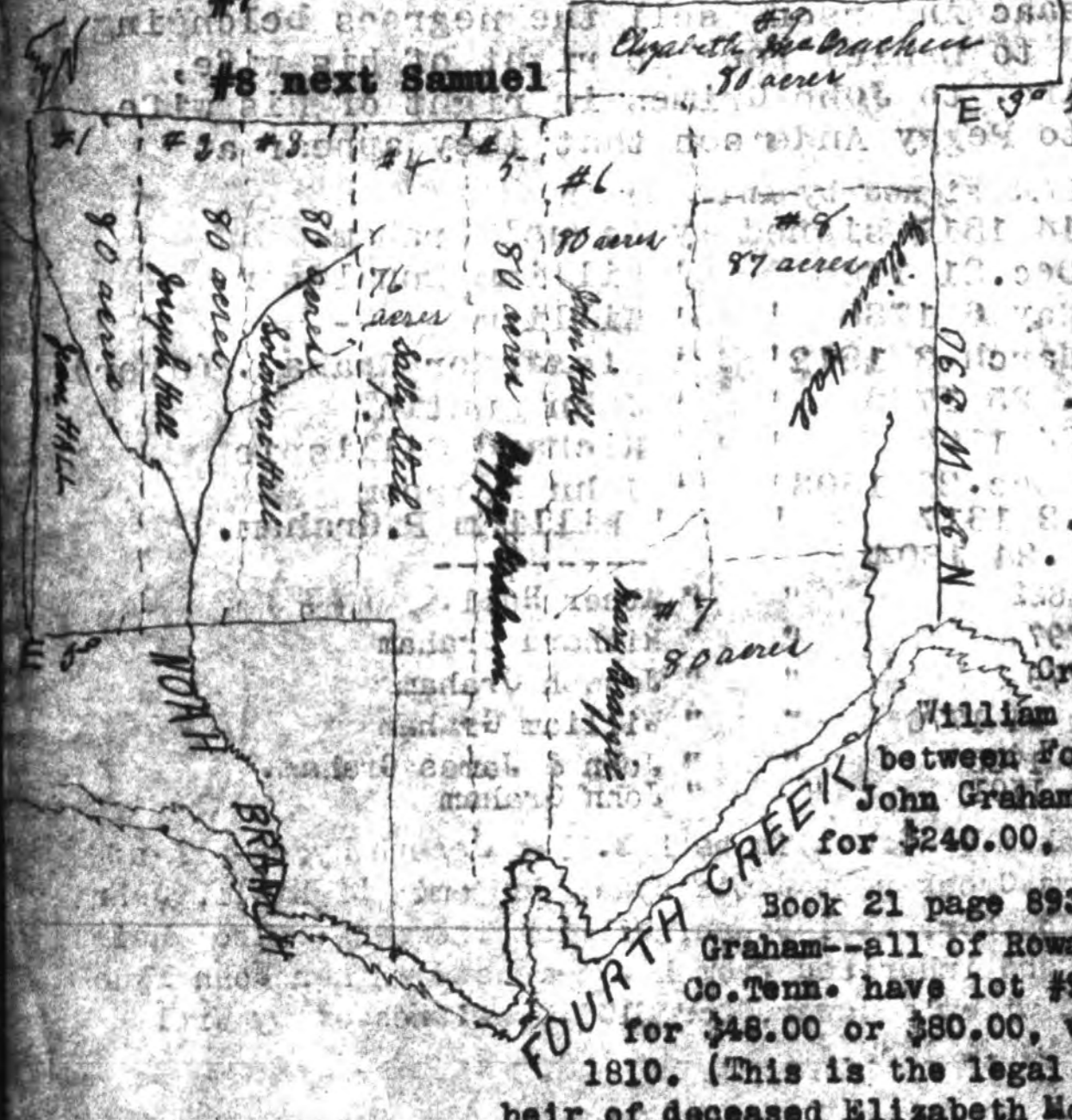
