Mr. John Daniels of Mocksville the Registrar of Deeds of Davie Co. has a book full of genealogies & in it the McCulloh family, I gather from Mr. Goshen Mc Cullloh living near Dutchman's Creek.

Mr Larry McCulloh, living 1921, in Franklin Township, Salisbury, R.F.D Route # 5. is the son of John & Hetty (Veach) McCulloh. He married about 47 years ago, Milly Jane Phelps who lived not far from Jerusalem in Davie CO, N.C. They had 9 children, three of whom are dead. book 28 page 270: Feb. 1 1825, Joseph Martin--no wife signs--lets Alfred McCulloh (both of Rowan Co. N.C.) have 67 acres on Weavers Creek next James Tatum, James McCulloh & --- Rowland, on a ranch, for 33 1/2 pounds, witnessed by George Lagle & Lawrence Daniel & proved by the latter in Nov. 1825.

Mr. Larry McCulloh's grandparents were Alfred & Jincy (Haiden ?) McCulloh who came from the old McCulloh home near Liberty Church-- about 5 miles from Mocksville. The family graveyard is here-- to get to it, take the where Lexington & Salisbury roads fork on the Mocksville & Concord Road. Turn into the Concord Road where Baldy Carter's place is-- a number of negro cabins here. Their daughters:

Alfred McCulloh had brothers: Henry who didn't marry Sister Betsy who married John Click & lived about 5 miles from Mocksville and 4 from Jerusalem and had a son Jim who is living at Franklin. Attended were Missionary Baptists.

John & Hetty (Veatch) McCulloh had: Becky & Mary who never married and may have died of tuberculoses, Lizzie (married Miram Fraley) and it was their son Bob who sent the McCulloh family history to Mr Larry McCulloh-- it was originally written upon skin and had faded terribly but might be in the keeping of Bob died unmarried and living alone, many persons came in the house and carried away what they wished) Sallie McCulloh who married Bryan Daniels may have Bibles. Address is John & Hetty also had sons: Jim, Charlie & George

Marriage bond: Jane McClallen or (McCulloh?) to Joshua Hall April 13 1765 signed Alexander McCulloch, John Mills & Moses White.

In Federal Census of 1790 in Rowan Co were: James McCulloh with 1 white male over 16, 1 under, 2 free white females & 1 slave. James 3 " " " " 2 " 6 " " " 9 "

The McCullohs attended Concord Church which is near where Prof. Hodges teaches. Go up to the road leading past Cherry Hill Church two miles.

Mr. Hobson says that the McCulloh family about 1857 consisted of Alfred, Jim, Henry and John. Alfred's son Charles is still living in Texas. Henry lived, unmarried, with John Click most of his life, and while smart, was somewhat unusual. He was drowned in their spring where it is thought he may have leaned to take a drink of water and fallen in a faint. Jim McCulloh's sons were Charley and Goshen (the latter is well informed about his family and his address is Mocksville, Route 4). Mrs. Turner Grant's mother may have been a McCulloh ? Richard Parker married M.E. Grant ? It was told that as the girls didn't seem particularly attractive to the opposite sex, and failed to marry, they became uneasy about their royal blood expiring and resorted to other means but using the McCulloh name for the offspring.

Miram Fraley was a school teacher and Mr. Hobson went to him. He had a son Rob who was deaf and peculiar, was a sort of photographer. Tom Veach lived at the Muster Ground-- someone was found dead there after a drunken spree and there was suspicion of him-- before the Civil War. Daniels lives there now. Veaches Muster Ground is where the fight between Pearson and Bryan occurred to decide whether the soldiers should be led by Tory or Rebel and Pearson won. Mr. Hobson says Linney wrote that it came off in Yadkin Co., but that old Mr. John Foard (related to Pearsons) said Linney was mistaken.

Book 18 page 9: Jan. 31 1801 George McCulloch--no wife signs--lets Coonrod Brem (both of Rowan Co.N.C.) have 237 acres on Elythes Creek of Second Creek, for \$2000.00, witnessed by Elen Braly & Hugh Braly & proved by the latter in Feb. 1801. (This is 1/2 of a tract which Jacob Lowrance let James Hart have & he let the said McCulloch have).

Book 13 page 837: Aug. 16 1793, Jacob Lowrance of Wilkes Co. Ga.--no wife signs--lets James Hart of Rowan Co.N.C., have 174 acres on both sides Blythes Creek (a fork of Second Creek of South Yadkin)-next Hugh Barr, Abraham Lowrance & John Lowrance, for 300 pounds, witnessed by Samuel E. McCorkle & John McCorkle & proved by the latter in Feb. 1795.

Book 8 page 249: Feb. 8 1774, Jacob Nichols, a planter, & wife Agness, let Samuel Barclay --have 320 acres on both sides of Elythes Creek next John Lowrance & down the creek, for 250 pounds, witnessed by Joseph Woods, Johnjobs Hankings & Matthew Woods & proved by the last named in Feb. 1775. (This is the same land which Joshua Nichols & wife Jennet confirmed to Jacob Nichols by deed of sale on Feb. 2 1774.)

Book 8 page 248: Feb. 2 1774, Joshua Nichols & wife Jennet let Jacob Nichols (both men planters of Rowan Co.N.C.) have 320 acres on both sides Elythes Creek next John Lowrance & down the creek, for 50 pounds, witnessed by Andrew Killpatrick & Joshua Nichols & proved by the latter in Feb. 1775. (This is the land which Joshua Nichols & wife Jennet let Jacob Nichols have on Oct. 7 1765 for 336 acres & this sale is again made to rectify the errors).

Feb. 1824: Administration of the estate of deceased Samuel McCulloch, as executor, is granted to Hugh Braly who gave bond of 2500 pounds with John McCulloch & Thomas Todd as security. Inventory of his estate filed. Hugh Braly died in 1825 (see below)

The will of John Carrigan (book H page 157) made Aug.28 1821 & probated in May 1822. Wife Marthew. Nephew John (son of brother James) all of my land. & the negroes: Rachel, Alleck, Susy & Jack. Exrs: John McCulloch & Samuel McCulloch. Witnesses: Alexander Lowrance & Richard Gillaspie (Jt.).

Thursday May 18 1826: Administration on the estate of deceased Samuel McCulloch is granted to John M.Doby who gave bond of 200 pounds with George McCulloch.

Monday Feb.20.1826: John M.Doby is appointed guardian of Samuel McCullochs' orphans: Theodore, John S. & James E.; John Scott renewed his bond as guardian of James H., Jane E. (orphans of Samuel McCulloch) giving security John McCulloch & John M.Doby. The sheriff is to summon a jury to lay off the dower of the widow of said deceased.

William D.Crawford goes broke

Aug.19 1829: William D.Crawford is appointed guardian of Theodore & John McCulloch (orphans of Samuel McCulloch) & gives bond of \$3500. with John Dobe & John McCulloch as security.

Aug. 1838: Power of attorney from John McCulloch / or Theodore McCulloch is proved by James F. McCulloch.

Book 33 page 536: Nov.25 1837, John S.McCollock of Rowan Co.N.C., gives attorney to Theodore McColloch to sell lands &c, witnessed by Michael Bostian & James H.McColloch & proved by the latter in Aug. 1838.

Book 30 page 408: On Jan. 3 1829, Isabella McCulloch (widow of deceased Samuel McCulloch) being indebted to John M.Doby for \$531.58, makes a deed of trust to him for \$5.00, for her dower, negroes, horses, house & kitchen furniture &c., witnessed & proved by James H.McCulloch in Feb. 1829.

McCulloch Esquire of Grogan, from Sir Cwello Oneall first Laird of Myrton in Scotland, who was a Son of the Family of Claneboy's in Ireland----"Jas McCulloch of Grogan Son of Wm McCulloch Esq. of Brandalston, Son of Alexander Laird of Myrton. *Son of* Son of Henry Killenas & Margaret of Myrton, which Henry was Son in Law of Sir Alexander Laird of Myrton. Son of Sir Norman Laird of Myrton. Son of Alexa Laird of Myrton. Son of Sir Godfrey, Laird of Myrton who assumed the Sirname of McCulloch, Son of Sir Cwello ONiel, first Laird of Morton"--Mentions relative to the House of Myrton-- About the beginning of the fourteenth Century the Irish being desirous to Shake off the English Yoke, Invited Robert de Bruce, King of Scotland, to assist them in the Intended enterprize, In case of Success, determine to make Edward de Bruce King of Ireland Edward de Bruce in Consequence thereof landed in the north of Ireland of the head of 6000 Veteran Scott Soldiers in the year 1315 drove the English out of Rolster the first campaign having defeated them in several Engagements. and himself of Carreckfergus, Conner & others places of Importance He then marched His Army through Ireland several times & forced the English into thine Strong holds & fortified Places; but always returned to Rulster to take up his Winter quarters, Edward de Bruce about the year 1316 *Perferred (?)* Collo O Neil to be Captain of horse in His Army Rob. de Bruce, King of Scotland came to Ireland with reinforcements to his Brother Edward, whose Army was then near *Waldalk*; And Robt marched his forces near Newry in order to join him; but the English having received considerable reinforcements from England, & France with several gentlemen and Volunteers under Birmingham Earl Mouth, in a manner surprized Edward de Bruce *who could not be* on to quit his Post & retreat his little Army was greatly diminished by the fatigues of the preceding Campaign; and the English Army was treble their number; he ventured at all events to give them battle. The action happened in the month of Oct. 1317, The English forced the Centre of Edward de Bruce's Army who with the assistance of his guards in deavoring to stop thir progress, was killed by one of the gentlemen volunteers named Malpas, under the command of Sir Walter Danpwlk, Captain Cwello O Neil then killed Malpafs, & recovered & brought off Edward de Bruce's retreat to the King of Scotland's Army, King Robert retreated to Corner, where he wintered his Army and quitted All his Brothers posts in Ireland in the following Spring--- Captain Cwello O Neil, and many others Irish officers of Edward's de Bruce's Army, went with King Robert to Scotland; who knighted Capt. Cwello O Neil, and preferred him to be his Standard bearer and Secretary of State, and gave Sir Cwello O Neil land in Laran as likewise the Land ap Myrton & Archawan, which comprehended Killeras & Ardwell in Galloway, Sir Cwello's Charter is dated at Dunstaffage, holding in Tree Blanch Farm, the Quit rents being a rose to the King to Smell at when he came to Myrton, Sir Cwello O Neildied in the year 1331, and left his Estate of Myrton & others Lands in Galloway to his Eldest Son, Sir Godfrey, who assumed the Sir name of McCulloch (viz "Son of Cwello",)--- Sir Godfrey McCulloch had his Charter *renewed (?)* at Perth in the year 1332, by David de Bruce the King of Scotland Sir Godfrey died in the year 1399, & was Succeeded by Eldest Son, Sir Norman McCulloch, who had his Charter renewed at Perth in the year 1400 by Robert III King of Scotland; & He was knighted in 1429 by King James, and died in the year 1524 without Issue Male; and was Succeeded by his Son in law Henry McCulloch of Killenan & Margaret daughter; (Henry was decendent from Thomas, Second Son of Sir Norman McCulloch) who got his Charter renewed by King James the fifth in the year 1525. died about the year 1561; and was Succeeded by their Eldest Son Symon McCulloch, who got his Charta renewed by Queen Mary, Daughter of King James V, and died in the year 1592 And was Succeeded by his Eldest Son Wm McCulloch who died---& was Succeeded by his Eldest Son Alexander McCulloch, who finding His Estate much Embarrassed by family Debts borrowed some large Sums of money from Doctor McCulloch in London, the *refagments (?)* of which He received by he'sitable Bonds, & put his Estate on Myrton, & C. into the hands of His Brother

McCulloch.

Book 19 page 65 Jan. 9 1804, William Bracken--no wife signs--lets Charles McCulloch have 134 acres on Weavers Creek next James Tatum, James McCulloch & --- Rowland, for witnessed by James McCulloch & Samuel Bracken & proved by the latter in Nov. 1804.

Book 19 page 59: Feb. 20 1801, John Fry Sr. of Wythe Co. Va.--no wife signs--lets William Bracken of Rowan Co. N.C., have 134 acres on Weavers Creek next James Tatum & James McCulloch on a branch, for 67 pounds, witnessed by Peter Dealy & Samuel Bracken & proved by the latter in Nov. 1804.

Book 19 page 74: Feb. 20 1801, John Fry Sr. of Wythe Co. Va.--no wife signs--lets Paul Briniger of Rowan Co. N.C., have 87½ acres on Dutchmans Creek next Coonrod Graves, Samuel Bracken & James Tatum, for 50 pounds, witnessed by William Bracken & Samuel Bracken & proved by the latter in Nov. 1804.

Book 23 page 275: Sept. 7 1805, William Bracken--no wife signs--lets Francis Keller (both of Rowan Co. N.C.) have 50 acres for \$100.00, witnessed by W. Moore & Henry Keller & proved by the latter in Feb. 1815. (This is part of the tract which John Fry let Paul Brinigar have & he let William Bracken have).

Book 32 page 126: Feb. 11 1834, Henry E. McCulloch--no wife signs--lets Asa Martin (both of Rowan Co. N.C.) have 66 1/3 acres next Josiah Daniel & Elisha Butler & McCulloch, for \$37.50, witnessed by John A. Meroney & John E. Cabard & proved by the latter in Feb. 1834. (This is Henry E. McCulloch's part from estate of his deceased father, James McCulloch).

Book 32 page 343: Oct. 8 1834, Alfred McCulloch--no wife signs--lets Josiah Daniel Sr. (both of Rowan Co. N.C.) have

N.C. have their 1/8 or 49½ acres in the estate of deceased James McCulloch--see the partition by the commissioners--next lot #7 on Weavers Creek next Joseph Pearson, Elisha Butler & Josiah Daniel, for \$111.00, witnessed by T. Cheshire & John Clement & proved by the latter in May 1835.

Book 33 page 103: Feb. 11 1834, Alfred McCulloch of Rowan Co. N.C. lets Elizabeth McCulloch Sr. & Henry McCulloch have a negro boy named Henderson aged about 10 years, for \$390.00, witnessed & proved by John A. Meroney in May 1836.

Book 32 page 405: April 13 1835, Benjamin Martin--no wife signs--lets Josiah Daniel (both of Rowan Co. N.C.) have 65 acres on Weavers Creek next the heirs of deceased James McCulloch Lawrence Clement, John Graves & the heirs of deceased John Foster, for \$100.00, witnessed by B. Bailey & John Clement & proved by the latter in May 1835. (This fell from deceased Joseph Martin & was a lot in the estate of deceased Asa Martin which fell to his son, Asa, having been bought by Asa Martin from Charles McCulloch).

North Carolina--both men "Taylors"--have 830 acres on east side Catawba River on the branches of Davidsons Creek & Lack Creek next James McCulloch & Samuel Allison, for 5 shillings--the release price being 70 pounds on the same day--witnessed by Wm. (?) Gillespie & David Dickson or Dixon & proved in Nov. 1779.

(Earl Granville let said Allison have this on Aug. 10 1759)

Book 11 page 746: --- 1787, William McRee of Mecklenburg Co. N.C.--no wife signs--lets James Byers of Rowan Co. N.C., have 380 acres between the surveys of William Hall & George Davidson next the land which said McRee sold to Wm. Davidson, for 150 pounds, witnessed by Ed Givens & Alexander Work & proved by latter in Aug. 1789. (Part of 830 acres Andrew Allison sold said McRee).

Book 8 page 49: On June 17 1772, Alexander McCulloch & wife Agness, let James Byers (all of Rowan Co. N.C.) have 386 acres next Andrew Allison on the Catawba River, next William McRee on the north, George Davison Jr. on the south, William Davison on the east & James Wilson on the west, for 150 pounds, witnessed by David Byars, James Willson & George Davison & proved in Nov. 1772. (This is the land which Earl Granville let James McCulloch of Rowan Co. N.C., have on Feb. 1 1755, he died leaving it by will to his son Samuel who died intestate, and on motion of W. Avery, the attorney of said Alexander McCulloch, admitted to Court & the oaths of Esq. John Oliphant & Mrs(?) Abraham Erwin who swore that Alexander McCulloch is the eldest brother & the heir of deceased Samuel McCulloch probate being entered on Aug. 7 1771).

Book 4? or 5 page 370: On Oct. 2 1763, Esq. Alexander Osborn--no wife signs--lets William Brison, both of Rowan Co. N.C., have 554 acres next James & John McCulloch on both sides of Back Creek, a branch of the Catawba River about 5 miles below Oliphant's Mill Creek, for 5 shillings--the release price being 70 pounds on the next day--witnessed by Adlai Osborn & Alexander McCulloch & ack. in Oct. 1763. (Earl Granville let him have it on Jan. 9 1761)

Book 3 page 348: on July 21 1756, John McCulloch--no wife signs--lets Captain Hugh Waddell Esq. (both of Rowan Co.N.C.) have 305 acres on the south side of Fourth creek next Colonel John Edwards, for 5 shillings--the release price on next day being 12 pounds--witnessed by Thomas Bashford & George Davison. (This is part of 640 acres which Earl Granville let him have on March 25 1752?)

Look 8 page 274: Jan. 12 1771, William Davidson, a planter & wife Mary let John Nisbet--all of Rowan Co.N.C.--have 320 acres on both sides of Fourth Creek, for 140 pounds, witnessed by John Brevard, Moses Winsley & Alexander Osborn & proved by the last named in Feb. 1775. (This is 1/2 of 640 acres which Earl Granville let George Davidson have on Nov. 27 1753).

Look 8 page 276: Jan. 25 1775, John McConnell & wife Eals (she makes her mark) & Andrew McConnell let John Work--all of Rowan Co.N.C.--have 238 acres on the west side of Davidsons Creek next James White, Moses White, James Willson, William Reece & said Work, for 160 pounds, witnessed by David Byars & Alexander Osborn & proved by the latter in Feb. 1775. (This is part of the 344 acres deeded to John McConnell Sr. on Nov. 5 1751 & he let said John & Andrew McConnell have this in 1760).

Book 4 page 361: Dec. 29 1760, John McConnell (as executro of the deceased Andrew McConnell) lets the children of said deceased, John & Andrew McConnell, who are now living upon said land, have 238 acres on west side of Davisons Creek on the east side of the Catau'o River next Moses White, James McCulloh & a meadow, for 21 pounds & 10 shillings (paid by the deceased in his life-time), witnessed by Francis Teatey & Samuel Young & acknowledged in Jan. 1761. (This is part of 344 acres which Earl Granville let said John McConnell have on Nov. 5 1757).

Book 4 page 359: Nov. 5 1757, Earl Granville lets John McConnell, a planter of Rowan Co.N.C., have 344 acres on both sides of North Fork of Davis's Creek on the east side of Catau'o River next Moses White on the river-bank, James McCulloh, a meadow, George Davies', said McConnell & Benjamin Winslow, for 10 shillings, witnessed by David Jones & William Haywood & proved in Jan. 1761.

Iredell Co.N.C. book C page 595: Jan. 28 1800, Robert & Alexander Work Sr. (sons & heirs of deceased John Worke Sr.) let Esq. Alexander Work Sr.--all of Iredell Co.N.C.--have (on a decree of Equity of Salisbury District when Esq. Alexander Work Sr. was the complainant with the late John Work, James Wilson by the original bill, the said Robert, Alexander Jr., John Jr. & Joseph Griswell Work were defendants, when it was decided that Robert Worke should deliver immediately & the other defendants as they arrive at age of 21 years, to said complainant their undivided parts of among other tracts, four now in Iredell Co. but formerly in Rowan, on Davidsons Creek) 1105 acres in all for 10 shillings, witnessed by Joseph Cooke & Slade Allen & proved by the latter in Feb. 1800. (Two of these tracts were bought of John McConnell Sr. & wife, the 3rd was bought of John McConnell & wife Alice & Andrew McConnell, while the 4th was a patent, including 587 acres next ---Davidson (now ---Reeses), 106 acres on bank of Davidsons Creek next Benjamin Winslow, Moses White (now Alexander Worke Sr.'s), 238 acres on bank of said creek next Eph Davidson, William Davidson & Alexander Work Sr. & 174 acres next Alexander Work Sr.--Winslow, ---Terrence & old deeded land of ---Templeton).

Book 9 page 331: Jan. 21 1776, James Templeton--no wife signs--lets John Templeton (both of Rowan Co.N.C.) have 200 acres on Davidsons Creek next James McCollough, for 5 pounds, witnessed by George Davison & Robert Byars & proved by the latter in Nov. 1783. (This is part of the land deeded James Templeton on Jan. 9 1761).

John McCulloh Laird Aidwell designing that the Rents thereof Should Clear His dbts; and after having fixed His Affairs In Such manner Laird Alexander went to Ireland with family, to Sir Henry O. Neil who gave Him land near the main Water; where He resided until the time of his death, which happened in the year 1643. He was Succeeded by His Eldest Son Wm McCulloh Esquire of Brandlerton who died---- and left 2 two Sons, viz, James of Grogwn, & Henry of Brandleston. Mrs. Fannie G. McCulloh, wife of Mr. Goshen McCulloh, Mocksville N.C. Route 4, writes that her husband had an uncle John who married Miss Nettie Veach and had mitt, who used to live in Salisbury, Stokes of Ark. and Larry of Rowan Co. N.C. Thirza McCulloh Daniels, wife of is a niece of Goshen, and on a recent visit to her she copied a few things out of a book, which she sends..

Goshen's father was James McCulloh and was born in 1818 (his father was Alfred). The family graveyard is inaccessible in bad weather and they will be glad to show the way when I go. She knows nothing of Elizabeth Locke McCulloh, but refers me to Dr. J.W. McCulloh of S. Main St Lexington N.C., a chiropractic, who has been collecting data.

She says that Henry Eustace McCulloh was a relative of the family. She enclosed a copy of the McCulloh ancestry owned by Henry Eustace McCulloh.

Her notes: Edgar Franklin McCulloch of Elizabeth town, Bladen Co, N.C. was postmaster there, John McCulloh, born in Scotland, came to Md. in early manhood and from there to Guilford Co. N.C. where he grew in importance.

A letter from Dr. J.W. McCulloch, D.C. Ph.C., of Lexington, N.C. on March 30 1922, says he knows nothing of an Eliza Lock who married John McCulloh. John is a family name since the 13th century. A John was drowned in the Tenn. River about the year 1863 but he doesn't know if he were married. Another John was killed in Davie County, N.C. near the Turrentine School House about the year 1850, but it belongs to the Goshen McCulloch family & not in his genealogy. Mr. Goshen McCulloch can tell all about it--his address= Mocksville route # 4. (I imagine that is the murder told about in the Tom Veatch home.)

Mr. McCulloch is survived by his widow, three sons and six daughters; three brothers and one sister. Deceased was a good citizen and his death brings sadness to a host of friends in Mocksville and Davie county"

A Genealogical History by Col. Cadwallader Jones, on page 61 tells of the connection between the Iredell & McCulloh families.

"A tradition which followed this family from Great Britain is, that the true name is Ireton, and that they are collateral descendants of Henry Ireton, son-in-law of Cromwell. At the Restoration this change of name was made to escape the clamor and fury of the Royalists. Certain it is that the coat of arms of the Iredells is the same as the Ireton.

"The first of the family of whom we have record is the Rev. Francis Iredell, of Dublin. He m. Eleanor McCartney, niece of Judge McCartney, of Kings Bona, Ireland, who was first cousin of Sir George McCartney, General of Bengall, 1785, and Ambassador to China, with the dignity of Earl, 1792.

"She had a sister, Isabella, who died 1765, and two brothers, James and Charles, merchants, respectively, of Bristol and Dublin. Charles m. a daughter of James McCulloh, of Grogan, and left one daughter, Margaret McCartney.

"The Rev. Francis Iredell and wife Eleanor, left two sons: Thomas, a wealthy planter in Tarroca, died unmarried; and Francis, merchant of Bristol, who m. Margaret McCulloh, 1 August, 1750 and had issue: James, b. 5 October 1751; Charles, Frances, Arthur, and Thomas, b. 1761.

"This Margaret McCulloh was a lineal descendant of Sir Cullo O'Neil, first Laird of Myrton, Scotland, and a son of the Clane boys, Ireland. In the early part of the 14th century, the Irish took up arms to throw off the British yoke, and called on Robert de Bruce, King of Scotland, to assist. He sent his brother Edward, with 6,000 men. Cullo O'Neil, an Irish patriot, was made Captain of Horse. They drove the English out of Ulster. The English being reinforced surprised Edward de Bruce near Dundolk. Here Edward was slain by Malpers; Capt. Cullo O'Neil, with heroic effort, slew Malpers, recovered and brought off the sword of Edward and made a successful retreat to King Robert de Bruce's army, coming on to join his brother. For this distinguished gallantry the King knighted Capt. O'Neil, made him his standard bearer, Secretary of State and gave him the lands of Myrton--the rendendo being "a rose for the King to smell at when he came to Myrton." Sir Cullo O'Neil died 1331, leaving his estate of Myrton to his eldest son, Sir Godfrey, who assumed the surname of McCullo. The estate was held in his name until 1524, when Sir Alexander McCullo died without issue male and was succeeded by his son-in-law, Henry McCulloh, who m. his daughter Margaret. The charter was renewed by James I. again by Queen Mary, and held by Simeon, William and Alexander McCulloh until 1643, when he died, and was succeeded by his son William, of Brandelston, who left two sons, James, of Grogan, and Henry, of Brandelston. The estate was sold for family debts and heritable bonds before James, of Grogan, came into possession. It thus appears how the name of Cullo O'Neil was changed to Cullo and again to McCulloh.

"Margaret McCulloh, wife of Francis Iredell, was daughter of James McCulloh and wife, Mary Ferguson, grand-daughter of James McCulloh, of Grogan.

"The Claneboys in the Iredell family is Clandeboys or Claeboye on Belfast Lough, the seat of Lord Dufferin, late Governor General of India, a lineal descendant of Hugh O'Neil, ancestor of Clan Hugh Buoy or Claneboys" (Sweeney).

"James Iredell, Associate Justice of the first Supreme Court of the United States, appointed by Washington, 1790, was born at Lewes, England, 5 October, 1751. His fame rests not merely on his great legal ability, but as well also on the ability and boldness with which he discussed the points in dispute between the colonies and Britain in 1774-75. These discussions were in pamphlets and private letters, being precluded by his office of Collector of the Port of Roanoke, from public effort. William Hooper says: "Whilst I was active in contest, he forged the weapons which were to give success to the cause I supported." Of his letter to Hooper, 26 April, 1774, Joseph Seawell Jones, in his defence of North Carolina, says: "I look upon this letter as not inferior to any event in the history of the country, and in the boldness and originality of its views, I say that it is a document without a rival at the period of its date. It takes precedence of the Mecklenburg Declaration, as that does of the National Declaration of Independence"--statesman and jurist, learned and bold--patriot, alongside of both.

"By the influence of his cousin, Sir George McCartney, he was appointed Deputy Collector of the Port of Roanoke at the age of 17 years; by his own talent he was elected Attorney General of the State in 1779, at the age of 28. He m. Hannah Johnstone, 18 July, 1773, youngest daughter of John Johnstone and wife, Helen Scrymgeour, daughter of Alex. Scrymgeour and wife, Jane Duncan, of Scotland.

"John Johnstone, brother of the Governor, Gabriel, emigrated to America from Dundee, Scotland, 1736, and was appointed Surveyor General of the Province. He resided in Onslow, owning large possessions in that County. He was ordained minister of the Church of England, and on Sundays would

He was tried and condemned to be hanged but, I am told, was reprieved, or possibly pardoned? but his estate was confiscated. In a short genealogy of the family, he is given as the second child of Morgan & Martha (Strode) Bryan, and the only son who did not serve for his country. Said to have married Masmilla Simpson, raised 300 men and tendered their services to the Governor of N.C. to fight for the King. After the war he was courtmarshalled & his property confiscated--no record of his descendants.

Mr. Johnson says that the M.C. family about 1827 consisted of Alfred, son Henry and John. Alfred's son Charles is still living in Texas. Henry lived unmarried with John Clark most of his life, and while smart, was somewhat unusual. The latter was well known about his family & his address in Rockwell, N.C. when he was in the army.

Dear Mrs. McCubbins:

I thank you for your courteous letter of February 7th, and apologize for not writing sooner. As yet, I have been unable to secure a copy of "Rumples History" for our library altho, we have a standing order with our Purchasing Department for same.

I am particularly interested in getting all the information I can about George McCulloch of Rowan County, who was a member of Commons of said County 1812 and 1815. Between 1730 and 1750, Henry McCulloch was granted by the King of England, for purpose of settling Protestants from Ulster in North Carolina, over a million acres of land which comprised the greater part of Anson, Mecklenburg and Rowan Counties. His son Henry Eustace McCulloch, who inherited and managed this estate (the greater part of which was confiscated by the State after the Revolutionary War) his grandson, said George McCulloch, who was a loyal citizen to the State of North Carolina. (Governor Josiah Martin, in reporting to Lord George Germain during the Revolutionary War as to who were loyal to the British, wrote to Lord George Germain, who was then stationed on Long Island, near New York, under date of April 7th, 1777, "I have heard however that George McCulloch, the only son of Mr. McCulloch, had taken open and violent rebellion".) Having retained his citizenship and rose to be a member of Commons and held other offices, and was particularly active in the establishment of the University of North Carolina and other Educational Institutions, among which was the Lincolnton Academy, and was associated with John Steele in a way, and other men of prominence of his time. I think he married in Rowan County altho he may have married in Edenton and afterward moved to Rowan County, and I am particularly anxious to get any information obtainable about him and his family. The only one that I knew of that had this data, left Atlanta, and carried with him all of his papers, we have written him several times, but get no reply to our letters from his last known address.

The land of Henry Eustace McCulloh were confiscated during the Revolution. Book 11 pages 401 & 402, show that John Armstrong got some of this land which was sold at public vendue--on the eastern side of the Yadkin River on waters of Sandy Creek.

Book 5 page 246 & elsewhere: On March 3 1745, King George II. of Great Britain granted eight tracts of 12500 acres each (100 000 acres) on Abbots Creek in Rowan Co. N.C. Esq. Henry McCulloh " of Turnham-Green in the County of Middlesex and Kingdom of Great Britain" sells it in small lots & they are entered in the Quit Rent Office of Earl Granville--according to an agreement with the latter.

Dear Mr. McCubbins:

I acknowledge with thanks your letter of December 16th, 1927, in which you were so kind as to give me information requested of the Superintendent of Schools of Roan County.

I have requested our Library Department to order from Buerbaums Book Store, a copy of Rumples History of Roan County, North Carolina, and hope to receive it within a few days. I am particularly interested in any information regarding Henry McCulloch, who between 1730 and 1740 was granted over one million acres of land which comprises a greater part of Mechlenburgh and Roan Counties. His son, Eustace McCulloch, who inherited and managed this estate (the greater part of which was confiscated by the State after the Revolutionary War) and his grandson, George McCulloch, who was a loyal citizen of the State of North Carolina, retaining his citizenship and who served North Carolina as a member of Commons from Roan County in 1812, 1813, and 1814, referente to which is made in Rumples History of North Carolina and also in the Colonial records of North Carolina.

Completed It is interesting to know that Mrs. McCubbins is engaged in writing a history of Roan County and doubtless in her ~~completion~~ *completion* of data, she will dig up matters pertaining to the McCulloch's. I understand that the old Presbyterian Church records in Salisbury contain a good deal of valuable information as the "Scotch-Irish Presbyterians" were brought in great numbers and settled on the McCulloch land.

Again thanking you for your courteous letter and wishing Mrs. McCubbins every success in her undertaking and trusting that we will have a copy of her history in our Library as soon as it is off the Press, I am
