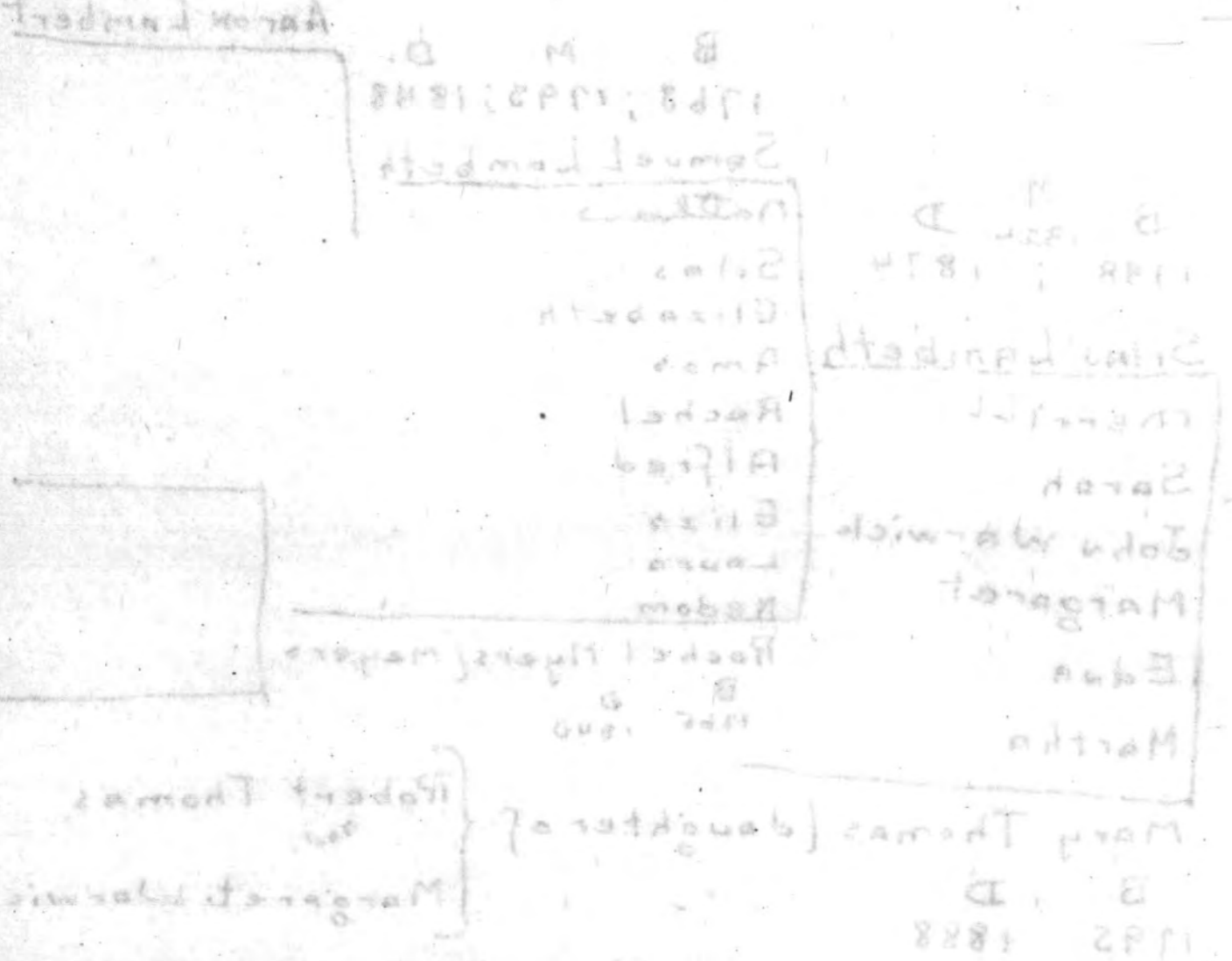

of the Quakers, his wife adhered to the established Church of England and for this reason was unwilling to accompany him to America. Leaving wife and daughter in England he came over with his son Richard in the ship "Morning Star" and took up this large tract of land. He died soon after his arrival; will dated September 18, 1683. He devised his lands in America to his son Richard² and gave his estate in Wales to his wife and daughter, Mary. Richard², his son, procured letters of administration when he became of age, and located his lands about 1695. He finally settled at Foshen Township. In 1699, he returned to his native land, found his mother, who had married again, dead, and his sister in very poor circumstances. He brought his sister, Mary, back to America with him. He married Grace Atherton and settled in West Whiteland Township, Pennsylvania. MARY AP THOMAS² (Richard¹) married Lewellyn Parry. (See Parry and Hunter Families.)"

History of Bucks Co.Pa. page 589: Hilton or Hilltown was erected in 1722, named after the country residence of the Langhorns in England by their desires. The Langhorne land was east of Perkasio manor & on Feb. 12 1718 Jeremiah Langhorne sold William Thomas 440 acres on the county-line, it being part of 1000 acres granted John Brock in 1681. James Logan was also one of the original land-holders having bought from Israel Pemberton who got it of William Penn in 1716. William Thomas, born of the middle class in 1678 in Llamvenarth, Monmouthshire Wales, disposed of his patrimony after the death of his parents & set off for America with his wife & first born, named Thomas, attracted by the generous offers of William Penn. Their effects were stolen before their ship sailed, but the finally reached Philadelphia on Feb. 14 1712. Through the assistance of friends the passage money & other debts were paid, he built a stone dwelling (which was demolished in 1812), bought 300 acres from James Logan in 1723 & through his thrift eventually had 1258 acres & was the father of seven children--it is estimated that his descendants number several thousand. (There was another family of the same name but unrelated--they owned large tracts about Telford, were wealthy & aristocratic. Richard was the head of this set & their graveyard was on the Bethlehem turnpike. One of his sons, William, was a captain in the British army while another son, Evan recruited for the tory cavalry). William had been ordained in the Baptist church before leaving Wales, so connected with the Montgomery Church which being some distance off, so another was built in 1737 on the Bethlehem road, this being replaced by a stone building in 1771 & here he was buried having died Oct. 6 1757 aged 79 years. He willed this church (erected by himself) & the graveyard to Hilltown forever naming his five sons, Thomas, John, Ephraim, Manasseh & William as caretakers of it.

His son, John, born in Radnor 1713, had been called to the ministry in 1749--he died of a paralytic stroke Oct.31 1790

Thomas Funeral

Held Today

Funeral services were held today at 2 p. m. for Arthur J. Thomas, 58, of Washington, D. C., who died at the national capital Tuesday. He had been sick for a year. He was a Rowan county native.

The funeral services were held at the Lutheran Church of the Reformation on Capitol Hill, by the pastors, Rev. Oscar F. Blackwelder and Rev. Ralph Lowe, assisted by Rev. Henry Snyder.

The deceased was the son of A. D. Thomas and the late Mrs. Evan Thomas, life long residents of this county.

Mr. Thomas has been making his home in Washington, D. C., where he held a position in the federal internal revenue department. He is survived by the widow, and a daughter, Dorothy Jean Thomas, also by his father and a sister, Jennie of the home southeast of Salisbury, Rev. L. A. Thomas, D. D., of Lincoln, N. C., Thomas of Granite Quarry, Mrs. L. A. Waggoner and W. C. Thomas of Charlotte, E. Ray Thomas of East Falls Church, Va., E. Clyde Thomas of Baltimore, A. Banks Thomas of Washington, and Mrs. Claude Wait of San Francisco, Cal. also are surviving brothers and sisters.
