Book 16 page 325: Nov. 12 1790, Joseph Cunningham--no wife signs--lets Robert Dial (both of Rowan Co.N.C.), have 300 acres on the waters of Dutchmans Creek & Bear Creek, beginning at a hickory, going south 50 chains to a white oak, east 60 chains to a black oak, north 50 chains to a hickory, then west to the beginning, for 50 pounds, witnessed by W. Moore & William Cunningham & acknowledged in Ang. court of 1798. (John McKleheny deeded this to George Good on May 18 1786).

Book 13 page 95: Nov. 27 1792, The State grants (#2101 at 50 shillings the 100 acres) to Hugh Cunningham & John Wilson 140 acres on the waters of Swearing Creek next Hugh McGrery, David Evans, Peter Whitaker & Charles Berger. It begins on the corner of Hugh McGrery at a stake, goes south 5 chains to a stake, west with the line of David Evans & Peter Whitaker 71 chains & 25 links to the line of Joshua Whitaker, north with his line & that of Charles Berger 71 chains & 70 links to the corner of Chas. Berger, west with his line 7 chains & 75 links to his other corner, north 23 chains to a stake, east 11 chains & 25 links to a stake on the line of McGrery, south with the same 23 chains to a stake on his other line, west with it 2 chains & 75 links to his other corner, south 51 chains & 75 links to a stake on his other corner, then to the beginning.

Book page 132: Dec. 29 1800, Hugh Cunningham, a planter of Rowan Co.N.C.,--no wife signs--lets Sarah Willison & Boyd Willison of ---, have lot #3 in the northwest square of Lexington, (144 square poles), on Main Street, being part of the 140 acres granted by The State of Hugh Cunningham & John Willison (now deceased); also parts of four lots in the town of Clinton (which had been indentured to Hugh Cunningham & John Willison, now deceased by indenture on April 20 1796, while the State grant to them was made on Nov. 27 1792), for \$5.00 & sundry articles & considerations, witnessed by a German(?) & Thomas Carson & proved by the latter in Feb. 1801.

Moore & W.L. Davidson & proven by the latter in Aug. 1827. (James Hart let said Harris have this).

Iredell Co.N.C. book M page 1054: July 28 1826, Thomas Farris--no wife signs--lets William C. Moore (both of Iredell Co.N.C.) have 438 acres partly in Mecklenburg & Cabarrus counties on Rocky River near the east side of the millpond, below the mouth of a large branch, next Angus Chisholm, fork of millcreek, James R. Neely, George F. Sloan, near the clayhole, next Barnet Torrence, William Emmerson, on the road, by the old mill, next George Torrence, James Carrigan, line of Coddle Creek Meetinghouse & Robert Sloan, for \$200.00, witnessed by John Andrews & Rankin Alexander & proven in Aug. 1826.

Polly Cunningham Pritchett

History of Buffalo Presbyterian Church and Her People (Rev. S.M. Rankin) page 67: "Col. John A. Mebane was received into membership from St. Mark's Reformed Church in 1865. He married Mary J., daughter of William and Polly Cunningham Pritchett, in 1863. In 1878 he was dismissed to Fair Grove Methodist Protestant Church."

Book 15 page 159: Dec. 30 1793, William Moore--no wife signs--lets Simon Watson (both of Rowan Co. N.C.), have 54 acres on the waters of Flat Swamp, beginning on the corner of William Briggs & line of William Moore, going with the line of said Briggs 20 chains to his corner, north 27 chains & 20 links to a red oak on the line of Francis Floyd, east with his line 20 chains to a post oak on the original corner, then south with his line to the beginning, for 35 pounds? witnessed by R^t Moore & Jacob Watson & proved by the latter in Aug. court of 1797. (This may be 3 pounds & 5 shillings & the land is part of 992 acres granted by The State to the said William Moore).

Andrew & Patrick H. Cunningham
History of Buffalo Presbyterian Church and Her People (Rev. S.M. Rankin) page 76: "Patrick H. Cunningham, son of Andrew and Elizabeth Whittington Cunningham, married Mrs. Alice Owen Mitchell, widow of Joseph, and daughter of Albert and Martha Owen, of Halifax, Va., in 1897. He united with Buffalo on profession of faith in 1915, and his wife by certificate from Bessemer Avenue Presbyterian Church. They had no children, but reared Everet Cunningham and Evelyn Hupp, daughter of Andrew and Myrtle Abbott Hupp."

Book 4 page 213: On Jan. 15 1760, Humphrey Coningham--no wife signs--lets Thomas Douglas (both of Rowan Co.N.C.) have 530 acres on both sides of Withers Creek on south side of Yadkin River next Robert Tate & ---Stewart, for 5 shillings--the release price being 37 pounds on next day--witnessed by John Howard & James Campbell & proved in Jan. 1760.

Jan. 16 1760: Lease & release from Humphry Coningham to Thomas Douglas for 330 acres Jan. 15 1760 (ere) proved by John Howard,

Jan. 16 1760: Deed from Humphrey Coningham to David Stuart for 100 acres on Jan. 15 1760, proved by John Howard.

Book 8 page 134; May 4 1774, William Millsaps & wife Nancy let Joseph Cunningham a planter (all of Rowan Co.N.C.) have 59 acres next Mr. Frohock on Swearing Creek, for 25 pounds, witnessed by James Smith & James Bradley & acknowledged in May 1774.

Book 13 page 771: May 31 1794, William Moore--no wife signs--lets David Goss (both of Rowan Co.N.C.), have 30 acres on the waters of Flat Swamp, beginning on the corner of the said William Moore at a white oak, going east 19 chains to a stake, north 30 chains to the bank of Flat Swamp as it meanders (distant enough to erect a mill-dam), to a stake in the line of said Moore, then south to the beginning, for 1 pound, witnessed by James Carson & Thomas Briggs & acknowledged in Feb. court of 1795. (This is part of the State Grant of 992 acres granted the said William Moore).

Book 23 page 755: April 4 1816, David Goss let Alexander Stephens--both of Rowan Co.N.C., have this among other land of said Goss.

Book 21 page 73; Oct. 25 1808, Hugh Cunningham (as the executor of deceased Joseph Cunningham) lets Manoah Yarbrough--all of Rowan Co.N.C.--have 59 acres on Swearing Creek next Mr. Frohock, for 60 pounds, witnessed by James Carson & James Macay & acknowledged in May 1807.

witnessed by Andrew Lopp & Daniel Waggoner & proved by the latter in re.

have 258 acres vacant land on both sides of Rich Fork of Abbots Creek, beginning on the
west side of said creek at a post oak, going north 60 chains to a post oak, east 43
chains to a white oak, south 60 chains to a black oak, then west to the beginning, for
10 shillings sterling, with the yearly rent of 10 shillings & 4 pence proclamation money,
(which is at the rate of 3 shillings sterling the 100 acres)

Aug. 8 1778: "Nonjurors in Cap: Davis' District" among them are Thomas Ledenton Sr.,
Thomas Ledenton Jr. & William Ledenton.

Book of Mortgages 11 page 199; Jan. 2 1895, Prince Cunningham & wife Maggie let J.N. Fraley--all of Rowan Co.N.C.--have 27 acres (being lot #1 in the estate of deceased J.H. Gheen) next lot #3, (as they owe him \$285.00 &c), acknowledged on the same day.

Book 76 page 217; Jan. 2 1895, J.N. Fraley & wife William Annah let Prince Cunningham--all of Rowan Co.N.C.--have 27 acres (being lot #1 in the estate of deceased G.H. Gheen) next lot #3, for \$300.00, acknowledged before J.A. Thomason on the same day.

Book 72 page 386; July 8 1889, L.F. Clement (as commissioner in the Special Proceeding of D.B. Gheen & others vs Sarah A. Creswell, & on judgement &c, sold to T.R. Pinkston, who transferred it to J.N. Fraley) let J.N. Fraley of _____ have 27 acres (being lot #1 in the estate of G.H. Gheen) next lot #3, also 43 acres (being lot #3 in the land of G.H. Gheen) next ---Hulin, D.B. Gheen & a branch, for \$331.00, witnessed & proved by J.W. Mauney on July 8 1889.

Nov. 19 1817: The will of Hugh Cunningham is proved by Robert Moore. The executor: Hugh Cunningham.

Book 11 page 396 or 398; Oct. 25 1786, The State grants (#1107 at 50 shillings the 100 acres) to Hugh Cunningham 251 acres on both sides Swearing Creek next Joshua Whitacre, crossing a branch, Daniel Hunt & ---McCulloch.

Joshua Moore (Dutchmans Creek)

Book 10 page 192; Jan. 17 1784, William Raper (Rebekah Raper also signs) of Guilford Co.N.C., let Nathaniel Moore of Rowan Co.N.C., have 258 acres on both sides of Rich Fork of Abhete Creek, beginning on the west side of said fork & going north 60 chains to a post oak, east 43 chains to a white oak, south 60 chains to a black oak, then west to the beginning, for 200 pounds specie, witnessed by Mack Ozborn & Henry Davis & proved by the latter in May court of 1781. (This is what the Sheriff, John Brevard sold to the said William Raper).

Book 24 page 811; June 20 1817, Joshua Moore (Mary also) let David Hendricks--all of Rowan Co.N.C.--have 8 acres on Dutchmans Creek next George Moore, Abraham Creson & David Hendricks, for \$24.00, witnessed by George Black & John Hendricks & proved by the latter in Nov. 1818.

Joseph Cunningham (Swearing Creek)

Book 26 page 895; Oct. 25 1820, Gasper Freadle (makes his mark & no wife signs) lets Menoah Yarbrough--both of Rowan Co. N.C.--have 157 acres on Swearing Creek next lot #2 & the 310 acre tract (which may also have belonged to Joseph Cunningham), for \$900.00, witnessed by Elyjah Hunt & E.P. Minor & acknowledged in May 1822. (This had belonged to the now deceased Joseph Cunningham).

George Moore (Dutchmans Creek)

Book 24 page 55; Jan. 30 1817, Joshua Creson Sr., of Surry Co. N.C.--no wife... signs--lets Abraham Creson of Rowan Co. N.C., have 182 $\frac{1}{2}$ acres on both sides of Dutchmans Creek next Joshua Creson & others, beginning on the corner of Joshua Creson Jr., at an ironwood, going with the line of Joshua Creson Sr. & George Moore west 30 chains & 70 links to a pine on one of the original corners of George Moore, north 3 degrees--- 60 chains to a post oak on his corner, east 30 chains to the corner of Joshua Creson Jr., then to the beginning, with the improvements, for \$500.00, witnessed by Joshua Creson Jr. & Robert Horn & proved by the latter in Feb. court of 1817.

John J. Moore (N.C. Railroad)

Book 71 page 502; Jan. 20 1886, Wesley Butler & wife Martha of Rowan Co. N.C., let John J. Moore of York Co. Pa., have 53 11/100 acres on the N.C. Railroad next S.R. Harrison, for \$1274.64, acknowledged on Feb. 20 1886.

Book 7 page 360: March 25 1752, Earl Granville lets John Lackelhenney of Anson Co.N.C., a planter, have 600 acres for 3 shillings, proved in Nov. 1771.
Book 8 page 242: May 26 1756, John Lackelhenney of Lancaster Co.Pa. lets George Good of Rowan Co.N.C., have 300 acres in Rowan Co.N.C., through his attorneys Henry Fenley & Hugh McCreey, for 10 shillings, witnessed by Robert Gillespie & John Dunn & proved (This is 1/2 the 600 acres which Earl Granville let John Lackelhenney have).
Nov. 11 1770: George Good is deceased. Joseph Cunningham qualified as administrator & gave bond of 400 pounds with Hugh McCreey & James Smith as security

Book 21 page 199: Dec.3 1807, Casper Freedle--no wife signs--mortgages to John A. Chapman (both of Rowan Co.N.C.) the land which he bought today of said Chapman for \$300.00 & a negro named Jude (a girl), for that amount, witnessed by Epinwinders & John Thomas & proved by the latter in Feb. 1807.

Book 16 page 325: Nov. 11 1790, Joseph Cunningham--no wife signs--lets Robert Dial (both of Rowan Co.N.C.) have 300 acres on Dutchmans Creek & Bear Creek, for 50 pounds, witnessed by W. Moore & William Cunningham & acknowledged in Aug. 1798. (John Lackelhenney let George Good have this on Lay 18 1756).

Marriage bond: Elizabeth Cunningham to Robert Dial Aug.24 1788 signed by William Cunningham

William Moore (south side of the Yadkin River)

Book 66 page 314: Feb. 12 1818, William Moore--no wife signs--lets Samuel Hughey (both of Rowan Co.N.C.) have 50 acres on the south side of the Yadkin River (being part of a State Grant #1109 to William Renshaw & where the said Renshaw lived) next James Dickey, John Dobbins & Thomas Collins, for \$95.00, witnessed by William Renshaw but proved by J.A.Steele on Dec.4 1865 as both the grantor & owner are dead.

Book 33 page 6: April 13 1833, John Jones--no wife signs--lets George Moore (both of Rowan Co.N.C.) have 26 1/2 acres on Dutchmans Creek next Jesiah Ingles & Abraham Hall, for \$36.75, witnessed by J.Ingles & Alexander Ingles & proved by the latter in Feb. 1836

Book 31 page 173: Jan.26 1829, Thomas Cranfill--no wife signs--lets George Moore (both of Rowan Co.N.C.) have 80 acres next Abram Hall & John Jones, for \$180.00, witnessed by William Tomlinson & John Tomlinson Jr. & proved by the latter in Feb. 1831.

Book 19 page 315: Aug. 26 1805, Jesse Lester of Surry Co. N.C.--no wife signs--lets Hugh Willson of Rowan Co. Book 30 page 883: Oct. 26 1829, Stephen Horn & wife Mary let Lemuel Kenyon--all of Rowan Co. N.C.--have on Dutchmans Creek next George Moore, John Jones, Philip Baker & George Moore Jr. (but excepts the dower of Elizabeth, widow of deceased Daniel Eton while she live however it goes to said Kenyon when she dies; also excepting the acre upon which the meetin house stands), for \$250.00, witnessed by Peter Eaton & Michael Clifford & acknowledged in Feb. 1830.

John Cunningham Jr.

History of Buffalo Presbyterian Church and Her People (Rev. S.M. Rankin) page 27: "There were two Finley families in Guilford. Andrew (1714-1780) located near Alamance Church, and George near Doggett's Mill on Reedy Fork in 1755. It appears the Finleys were the first to build a mill at that place. Some of George's children were Josiah, George, Jr., James and Joseph. Josiah married Alsey, and their children were George, James, Betsy, Rachel, Lettie, Polly and Abigail; James married Jean McQuiston, daughter of Robert, and their children were Elizabeth, who married Mr. Walker; Polly, who married first John Cunningham, Jr., and second James McIver; George B., who married Nancy, daughter of Elisha Wharton, and moved to Missouri; Sarah married Mr. Reid; Nancy never married. These were members of the congregation and some of them active members of the church."

Page 58: "James McIver came from Ireland in 1824 and located here. He married Mrs. Polly Finley Cunningham, widow of John, Jr., and daughter of James Finley, in 1828. He lived four miles north of the church for a while, then moved to Greensboro. Their only child, William, died in 1831. James McIver died in 1857."

Page 126: "John Cunningham (1765-1821) was the son of John Cunningham, Sr., who settled on the Reedy Fork in 1753. He married first Margaret, daughter of James Donnell, and second Mrs. Mary Mitchell McMurray, widow of John, and daughter of Adam Mitchell, Jr. He is listed by Rev. J.C. Alexander as a ruling elder at Buffalo. He and a number of his descendants are buried here in the church cemetery."

Page 46: "John McMurray located on Horsepen Creek in 1774. His wife was Ewing, and their children were James, Elizabeth, Margaret, John, William, Jean and Robert. James married first, Elizabeth L., daughter of Nathaniel Brown, in 1774, and second Elizabeth, daughter of John Smith, Sr., in 1795. He lived on Mears Fork for a while and in 1795 located on Rock Creek; Elizabeth married John Kerr; Margaret married Samuel Mitchell, son of

Book 18 page 582: Jan. 20 1802, Joseph Hall--a saddler--no wife signs, lets the farmer, Joseph Hoone or Moore (both of Rowan Co. N.C.), have 306 acres on McGinnis Branch waters of the South Yadkin River next James Dickey & John Forsyth, beginning on the corner of James Dickey at a hickory, going with his line south 5 chains to a hickory saplin on his corner, south 57 degrees east 15 chains to a black oak on his corner, north 21 degrees east 20 chains & 30 links to a hickory on the corner of said Hall, north with his line 37 degrees west 19 chains & 50 links to a black oak on the corner of John Forsythe, --- with his line 10 chains to a white oak grub on his corner, west with his line 35 chains & 50 links to a Spanish oak, south 89 chains to a black oak on the corner of said Dickey, then with his line to the beginning, for \$300.00, witnessed by Beckett Nichols, Thomas Nicholls & Adlai Campbell & proved by the last named in Feb. court of 1803. William Cunningham Smith
History of Buffalo Presbyterian Church and Her People (Rev. S.M. Rankin) page 38: "John Rankin (1736-1814), son of Joseph of Delaware, bought of Alexander McKnight 511 acres on the north side of Buffalo Creek in 1765. He married Hannah Carson in 1765, and their children were Rebecca, Samuel, Jane, Abigail, Joseph, Nancy, Robert, Hannah, Polly, Margaret, Anna and Ruth. Rebecca married Rev. John Rankin, son of George, in 1786, and moved to Tennessee; Samuel married Mary, daughter of William Scott, in 1800, and located three miles north of the church; Jane married John Paisley, son of William, Jr., in 1790; Abigail married Cunningham Smith, son of William, in 1794, and moved to Decatur County, Illinois; Joseph married first Mary, daughter of James Donnell, in 1805, and second Nancy, daughter of Andrew Donnell, in 1828, and lived near Alamance Church; Nancy married Thomas Donnell, son of James, in 1800; Robert married first Margaret, daughter of William Scott, in 1805, and second Margaret, daughter of William Patterson, in 1827; Hannah married Thomas Denny, son of George, in 1803; Polly married first Samuel Thom, son of John, and second, Adam Scott son of William, in 1827; Margaret married John Nelson, son of William, in 1799, and lived near High Rock on Haw River; Anna married David Wilson, son of Andrew, in 1829; Ruth married Joseph Hanner, son of Robert, in 1807.

Book 24 page 2; Nov. 1 1816, Nathaniel Pearson of Anson Co. N.C.--no wife sign-- lets John P. Hodgins of Rowan Co. N.C., have 200 acres on the west side of the Yadkin River, beginning on its bank at the corner of Jesse Haden (now owned by the heirs of William Moore & of Pearson), at a stake, going west 46 chains to a pine on the corner of Moores & Pearsons & the old line of ---Marshall (now Isaac Hendricks), north 45 chains & 12 links to a pine on the corner of Obadiah Smith (now Herod B. Pruitts), east 50 chains & 50 links to a pine & a black oak on the river bank, then down its meanders to the beginning, (but reserves the 40 acres on the northwest side of said tract which was conveyed by Robert Andrews to Levi Silvers, but is now Billy D. Jeremiah Cunningham

History of Buffalo Presbyterian Church and Her People (Rev. S.M. Rankin) page 37: "John Coots was born in Ireland; came to America and located for a short while in Halifax County, Va., then came to North Carolina about 1763 and located on Reedy Fork. He married first Sarah, daughter of James McQuiston, and second a daughter of John McClintock. His children were Jennie, Louvenia, Vertie and another daughter who married James Spence. Jennie married Alfred Dillon; Louvenia married Leven Aydelotte, son of Benjamin, in 1811; Vertie died unmarried.

John Coots, a brother of James, came with him and located on the Reedy Fork in 1763. He married Mary, daughter of Robert McQuiston, in 1769. He must have been married before this, for his daughter Hannah married Jeremiah Cunningham in 1779. After the death of his second wife he married Hannah, daughter of John Hamilton. In 1788 Samuel and Thomas Thompson and John Coots secured title to 4,260 acres of land in Tennessee, and in 1796, he sold his farm here and moved to Tennessee."

May 6 1774: Paul Cunningham is appointed Constable instead of Robert Templeton.

Feb. 9 1775: "Ordered That William Creswell serve in the room of Paul Cunningham" as a Constable.

Feb. 8 1776: In the return of Constables, William Creswell returns John Biven & John Lister.

Iredell County book A page 227: Nov. 11 1790, Paul Cunningham of Green Co. West Carolina--no wife signs--lets Abram Moore of Iredell Co. N.C., have 640 acres on Davidsons Creek next Andrew Ramsay, Widow Davidson & William Caswell, for 220 pounds, witnessed by James Wilson & John Thomson & proved by the latter in Dec. 1790. (This was granted by The State to said Cunningham on Oct. 10 1783).

Book 22 page 824 or 824 (numbered twice): Oct. 21 1813, Mary Ann Silvers, James Lucas & William Lucas--no wives sign--let William D. Haden (all of Rowan Co. N.C.), have 40 acres on the west side of the Big Yadkin waters, beginning on the original corner of Obediah Smith & James Andrews at a pine, going east with the line of the said Smith 20 chains to a hickory, south 15 chains to a stake, south 63 degrees west 22 chains & 75 links to a pine on the line of Thomas Smith, with the line of said Smart & Humphry Marshal 25 chains to the beginning, for 40 pounds, witnessed by Thomas Craige & John Craige & proved by the latter in Nov. court of 1813.

N.C.--have 317½ acres on the north bank of Lyls Creek on north side of Catawba River, for 74 pounds, witnessed by two Germans & Will Reed & proved by George Follbright on Sept. 5 1769 before Richard Henderson. (Samuel Sherrill conveyed this to the said Lewis on July 20 1761).

Cunningham.

The will of John Cunningham (book H page 311) made while "weak in body" on April 28 1825 & probated in May 1825. Wife Ruth (one third of land during her life). Four children: Elizabeth (under age), George, Robert & Margaret Anne (all share alike & some of them may still be under age). Exrs: wife & friend Ebenezer Moore. Sister Sarah Cunningham may live in my home the rest of her life. Witnesses: Robert Moore, Robert H. Wood & Ruth Cunningham.

May 17 1825: The will of John Cunningham is proved by Robert Moore. Ruth Cunningham qualified as Exx. but Ebenezer Moore relinquished.

Book 16 page 222; July 14 1797, John Beeman--no wife signs--lets John Moore (both of Rowan Co. N.C.), have 160 acres on Big Branch of Dutchmans Creek, beginning on its east side at a hickory, going south 33 chains to a dogwood on the west side of said branch & on the line of another tract of the said Beeman, west with the said line 45 chains & 50 links to a stake, north 33 chains to a stake on the line of William Steelman, east with his line 25 chains & 50 links to his corner, then with the same courses to the beginning, for 200 pounds N.C. money, witnessed by James Beeman & Joseph Ranard & proved by the latter in May court of 1798.

Book 17 page 580; Jan. 7 1800, John Moore & wife Mary let Ezeiel Griffin--all of Rowan Co. N.C.--have 150 acres on Big Branch of Dutchmans Creek, beginning on the east side of a branch at a hickory, going south 33 chains to a dogwood on the west side of said branch & the line of John Beeman, west with the said line 45 chains & 50 links to a stake, north 33 chains to a stake on the line of William Steelman, east with the said line 25 chains & 50 links to his corner, then east to the beginning, for 150 pounds N.C. money, witnessed by James Beeman & Jasper Collins & proved by the latter in Feb. court of 1801.

(Esq. William Dry let said Hugh Montgomery have them).

N.C.), have 100 acres on Dutchmans Creek--it being part of the tract of 400 acres where the said John Beeman now lives--beginning at a dead pine on the northeast corner of the said tract, west, reverse the original line, 20 chains to a white oak on the east side of a small branch, on the old line, south, crossing the creek, 50 chains to a black gum on the original line, east 20 chains to a maple on an original corner, then north to the beginning, for 50 pounds N.C. money, witnessed by Joseph Ranard & John Moore & proved by the latter in May court of 1798.

Book 16 page 262: Dec. 20 1797, John Beeman--no wife signs--lets John Moore (both of Rowan Co. N.C.), have 50 acres on Dutchmans Creek, beginning at a hickory & going south 24 chains to a dogwood, east 23 chains & 25 links to a post oak, north 24 chains to a post oak, then west to the beginning, for 30 pounds N.C. money, witnessed by James Beeman & Joseph Ranard & proved by the latter in May court of 1798. (over)

Book 11 page 336: Aug. 9 1787, The State grants (\$1498 at 50 shillings the 100 acres) to Hugh Cunningham 200 acres on the waters of Swearing Creek, beginning on the line of John Rees at a red oak, going south with his line 48 chains to a post oak, east 41 chains & 70 links to a white oak, north 48 chains to a red oak, then west to the beginning.

Book 17 page 184: Jan. 1 1800, William Moore--no wife signs--lets Peter Bird (both of Rowan Co. N.C.), have 50 acres (all the tract) on the waters of Swan Creek, beginning on the corner of Phillip Harmon at a stake, going east 47 chains & 50 links to a hickory on the corner of Phillip Peck, south 20 chains to a pine on his other corner, west 21 chains to a black oak on the line of Thomas Carson, north 16 chains & 50 links to a stake on his corner, west 26 chains & 50 links to a stake, then north to the beginning, for \$50.00, witnessed by John Deadman & Ebenezer Moore & proved by the latter in May court of 1800. (This is part of 640 acres granted by the State to the said William Moore).

Jan. 16 1794, George Niefong--no wife signs--lets Valentine Haga (both of Rowan Co.N.C.) have 100 acres on Swearing Creek next Boyd McCrary, Jacob Waggoner, John Coonce & Eldad Reed, for 65 pounds, witnessed by ? & Henry Hagey & proved by the latter in May 1794. (This is the land which The State granted Hugh Cunningham on Oct. 25 1786 & he let George Niefong have).

Book 11 page 321: Jan. 1 1788, Hugh Cunningham (Mary also signs) lets George Niefong--all of Rowan Co.N.C.-- have 100 acres on Swearing Creek next Boyd McCrary, Jacob Waggoner, John Coonce & Eldad Reed, for 50 pounds, witnessed by Joshua Whitaker & Charles Beryer & proved by the latter in Feb. 1788. (This was granted to said Cunningham on Oct. 25 1786). It begins on the corner of Boyd McCrary & the line of Jacob Waggoner, goes north with the line of Boyd McCrary 15 chains & 20 links to a stake on the line of John Coonce, west with his line 67 chains to a pine, south 14 chains to a post oak on the line of Eldad Reed, east 6 chains to a post oak on his corner, south 1 chain & 20 links to a stake, then east partly with the line of Waggoner to the beginning.

Book 23 page 397: May 10 1815, Hugh Cunningham Sr.--no wife signs--lets Henry Shofe (both of Rowan Co.N.C.) have 9 1/3 acres on Swearing Creek next Joshua Whitaker, --- Barrier & John Allen, for \$20.00, witnessed by W.Hargrave & acknowledged in May 1815. (This is part of 381 acres sold to said Cunningham on July 16 1795).

Robert Moore (Mares Fork of Haw River).

Miscellaneous papers in Guilford Co., N.C.

Rowan Co., N.C. Sarah Campbell of Rowan Co., N.C., (for John Campbell, the son & heir of deceased James Campbell), Robert Moore (the surviving husband of Polly Moore, the deceased daughter & heir of deceased James Campbell), Rowland Crump & Sarah Crump of Montgomery Co., N.C. (the son-in-law & daughter & heir of said deceased James Campbell), appoint Samuel Campbell of Guilford Co.N.C., their attorney to sue & settle a controversy respecting the land on Mares Fork of Haw River in Guilford Co., N.C., between the grant of Archibald & James Campbell & the grant to Jacob Brasill, of which Heseekiah Bevell now claims a part (by the conveyance of said Brasill) & has brought suit against the said Samuel Campbell, which is what the present attorneyship is now made on Jan. 15, 1821.

The above is attested by Pleasant J. Campbell, who saw Robert Moore & Sarah Crump sign their names to it & it is proved by him in Guilford Co.N.C. on Feb. 21, 1821.

There are a number of cases or papers in this package & over is a copy of one. In the case of Heseekiah Bevell against Samuel Campbell, the land was surveyed by Nathan Mendenhall & Charles Bruce & it appears that Samuel Campbell got 340 acres & Brazil had 268 acres of the tract. Thomas Settle is one of the lawyers & perhaps Bartlett Yancey is another since Heseekiah Bevel is to pay the latter considerable money & Philip Bevel is to pay the remaining costs.

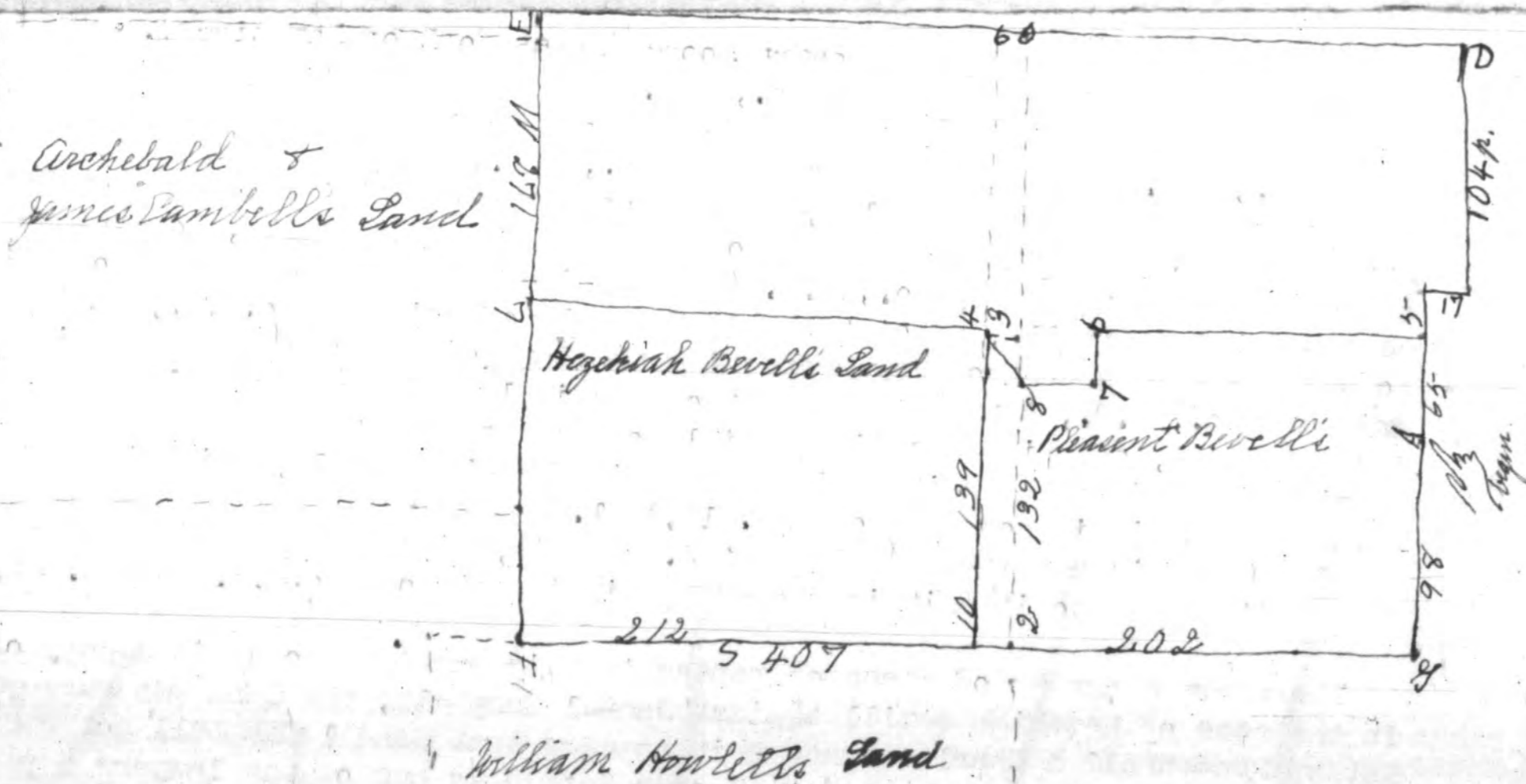

Book 13 page 105: Nov. 15 1791, Joseph Cunningham--no wife signs--lets Jacob Weaver (both of Rowan Co.N.C.), have 127 acres on the north fork of Reedy Creek, beginning at a hickory saplin, going north 17 chains, crossing said fork, 30 chains to a post oak, east 15 chains to an ash near a branch, north 25 chains to a black oak, east 15 chains east 15 chains to a black oak, south 25 chains to a stake, then west to the beginning, for 30 pounds, specie, witnessed & proved by Hugh Cunningham & recorded on Feb. 9 1793. (This is part of 320 acres granted by The State to the said Joseph Cunningham).

(This is part of the State Grant made to James Younger who sold to Joseph Moore who sold to William Smith).

Aug. 12 1786: Deed from James & Ann Younger to Joseph Moore for 25 acres Dec. 8 1784 proven by William Smith.
