The will of Jesse Jenkins (book D page 18) made Dec. 9 1802 & probated
wife Martha (or Merthe?). Daughters: Elizabeth Christmass & Nancy
Fuller. Sons: Joel & William. Jesse (son of David Man deceased). Others:
Martha, Polly, Thomas, Betsey, Elinder, Jacke, Luny & Jesse Jenkins. Exrs:
son Joel & David Shelton. Witnesses: John Inmon & Elizabeth Smith.

"Our kin" by Laban Miles Hoffman of Dallas, N.C., page 611 tells of this
family & says Jesse Jenkins came from Va. and is thought to have been a
brother of Hugh Jenkins. Also says that Capt. John, Reuben, Edward & Elijah
Jenkins (said to have been brothers & lived in the same neighborhood south
of Long Creek). Capt. John Jenkins bought land of Col. Frederick Hambright
and a strange fatality pursued his family. See Lincoln Co. for these.

Tuesday Aug. 6 1799; Administration on the estate of deceased David Man is granted to his
widow, Nancy, who gave bond of 500 pounds with Jesse Jenkins.

for her portion) are moving to a western county and let George Mumford have
the land (Jesse Jenkins got from Rudy Nut) for \$300.00. There were eight of
the children & six are under age, namely Jack, Ellen, Fanny, Jesse & Bethias
the wife of Jacob Hainly.

Book 21 page 538: On March 28 1808, Jones Fuller lets George Mumford have
his half of a tract on Creuses Mill Creek for \$150.00 (this is part of 88
acres which the deceased Jesse Jenkins devised to his son Joel).

William Etcherson (all of Rowan Co. N.C.) have a negro woman Jenny (which

& proved by John March in Feb. 1815. (Matthew & Polly Jenkins testified on

Atchison) & also a bond made by said "Jesse Jenkins & Osburn to my father
David Man", witnessed by S. Caldwell & C. Bell & acknowledged in Logan Co. Ky.,
before Spencer Curle (Clerk of the County) while West Maulding certified
on Dec. 9 1814 that Spencer Curle is the Clerk &c.

Book 21 page 454: Nov. 3 1807, Esq. Edward Chambers as high-sheriff of Rowan Co. N.C. (on an
execution against Jones Fuller for 17 pounds, 18 shillings & 3 pence recovered by George Mum-
ford, also another against Joel Jenkins for 9 pounds, 8 shillings & 9 pence against Joel
Jenkins recovered by said Mumford, with orders to sell the land to make the money & did sell

*Book 21 page 262: The Exrs. of the estate of Jesse Jenkins deceased (Joel Jenkins as attorney of Jones Fuller, & Martha Jenkins for herself also David Shelton for himself), William Jenkins, Jack Jinkins, Thomas Jinkins, Polly Jinkins & Patsey Shelton (the wife of aforesaid David Shelton) let George Mumford have 84 acres for \$300.00 witnessed by Semson Stephen & John Cornatzer. The deceased Jesse Jenkins bought this from Rudy Nut at that time the tract consisted of 168 acres but he let Joel Jinkins have 1/2 of it for 200 dollars & left the western half to the widow, Martha Jinkins (relict of deceased Jesse) during her widowhood but after her death to be sold & the proceeds divided among the heirs, but the family wishes to move to the western county, so on Feb. 20 1808, the widow takes \$100 dollars for her portion & right. There were eight children but six of these are under age namely, Jack, Ellen, Fanny, Jesse & Jacob Hainly & his wife Bethiah.

The amount of mortgage is \$150.00.

Book 6 page 313: On Sept. 19 1765, Robert Harden, (a planter,) & his wife Jane, let Hugh Jenkins (also a planter) have 597 acres on Second Creek next George Lock, Patrick Jack, near the "Great road by the White Glade", crossing two branches to Daniel Hare's, John Long, & Henry Skyles (?), for 5 shillings on Sept. 30. (This had been granted to Robert Harden on Feb. 22 1759 by the Earl of Granville).

Capt. Armistead Burwell of Charlotte.

Sketches of Prominent Living North Carolinians (by Jerome Dowd in 1888) page 279:
"CAPT. ARMISTEAD BURWELL, OF CHARLOTTE, was born in Hillsboro, Orange county, on October 22d, 1839, and is a son of the Rev. Robert Burwell, D.D., who was then the pastor of the Presbyterian church at that place. He entered Davidson College in 1856, and graduated in 1859 with first honor. He then engaged in teaching, and was so employed at Princeton, Arkansas, when, in the Spring of 1861, he enlisted in a cavalry company which afterwards became a part of the 3d Regiment, Arkansas Cavalry. He served with this command in Missouri and Arkansas, and afterwards in the campaigns in Tennessee, Mississippi and Georgia till severely wounded on July 28th, 1864, at Atlanta. He was Adjutant of his regiment, and in 1863 was commissioned as Captain and Assistant Adjutant General, and assigned to duty upon the staff of Brigadier General F.C. Armistead.

After the close of the war he resumed teaching at Charlotte, and while so engaged devoted himself to the study of law. He was licensed to practice upon examination by the Supreme Court, and in 1869 began his career as a lawyer. He was elected to the State Senate in 1880, and since 1877 has been one of the directors of the North Carolina Railroad Company, appointed by the Governor of the State.

Captain Burwell's professional career has been eminently successful. He practiced first in copartnership with Calvin K. Greer, Esq., then with Ex-Governor Vance, till the latter was made Senator, and since that time with Platt D. Walker, Esq., under the well known firm-name of Burwell & Walker, which has for several years been doing a commanding and lucrative practice.

Captain Burwell is of quiet and thoughtful demeanor, unostentatious in the court room and elsewhere, and is universally regarded as one of the ablest and best lawyers in the State.

His home life is beautiful. Mrs. Burwell, nee Miss Ella Jenkins, of Salisbury, is the charm of a large circle of acquaintances, while their pretty daughters Miss Bird and Miss Fannie, just budding into womanhood, and bright little Armistead, nine years old, the only son, render their hospital home in Charlotte a place of exceeding interest and attractiveness."

Same book page 212: "JOHN B. BURWELL, PRESIDENT OF PEACE INSTITUTE, is the oldest son of Rev. R. Burwell, D.D., and was born in Chesterfield county, Va., Oct. 3d, 1834. In 1835 his father moved to Hillsboro, N.C., and took charge of the Presbyterian church of that place, remaining there as pastor until the fall of 1857." With his father, managed the Charlotte Female Institute having moved to Charlotte in 1859, but they moved to Raleigh in 1872 where they organized Peace Institute with about 75 pupils.
