HAPPY VALLEY (by Thomas Felix Hickerson in 1940) page 34. "The family of Benjamin Martin (b. 1746) moved from Fluvanna Co., Virginia to Wilkes in the winter of 1782 and established their home on a plantation along the south side of the Yadkin about two miles west of Ronda. This Benjamin Martin, ensign and Revolutionary soldier in Va., was the son of Henry Martin and Sarah Bryan, d. of John Bryan of Pennsylvania, a relative (probably) of Col John Bryan who came to Wilkes. Henry Martin was the son of Peter Martin and Mary Anthony Rapine Martin of Goochland Co., Va., whose Huguenot ancestors came to America in the year 1700.

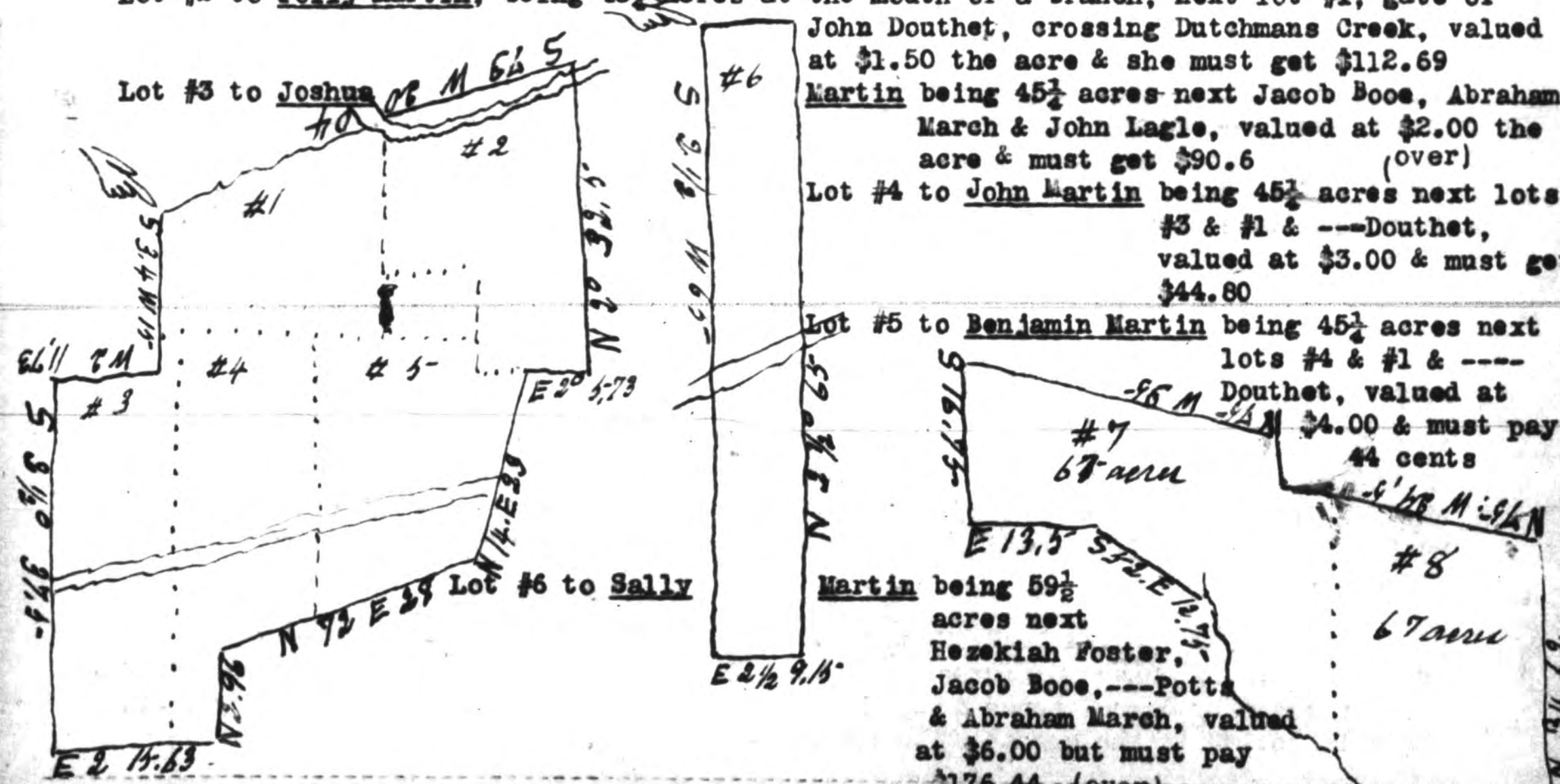

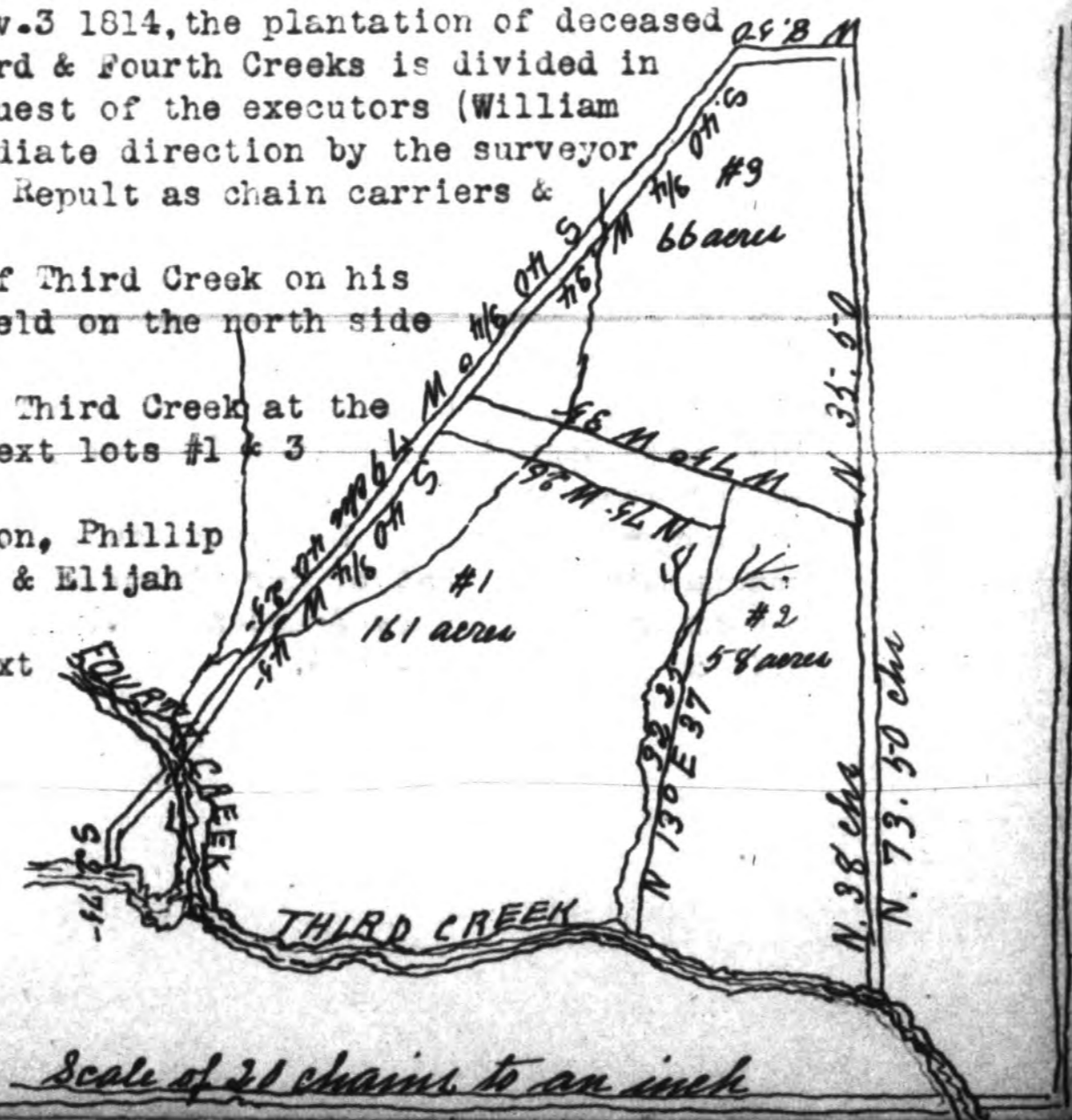
