

### FRANÇOIS X. MARTIN

EDITED AND PUBLISHED THE NEWSPAPER "NORTH CAROLINA GAZETTE" FOR SEVERAL YEARS, AS WELL AS PUBLISHING SCHOOL BOOKS, NOVELS AND LAW BOOKS AND REPORTS WHICH HE WROTE HIMSELF. HE AUTHORED 34 BOOKS DURING HIS LIFETIME, AMONG THEM A HISTORY OF NORTH CAROLINA, PUBLISHED IN 1829.

HE BECAME A PROMINENT LAWYER IN NEW BERN PRACTICING 20 YEARS, AND AT ONE TIME REPRESENTED HIS TOWN IN THE STATE HOUSE OF COMMONS. IN 1809, PRES. MADISON MADE HIM

A FEDERAL JUDGE FOR MISSISSIPPI TERRITORY. TRANSFERRED TO NEW ORLEANS, HE BECAME LOUISIANA'S FIRST ATTORNEY GENERAL — LATER CHIEF JUSTICE OF LA. SUPREME COURT FROM 1836 TO 1846.

Major John Armstrong had his office in Nashville, Tenn., & the Clerk at Raleigh, N.C. (Wm. Terrell--who later fled) would issue them for a certain acreage which when measured would amount to from 10 to 100 times as much as called for. Judge Statum & John McNairy got breath that the books, which had been moved into the Comptroller's office after flight of Terrell, were to be stolen & the State House burned & notified Gov. Ashe in April 1798. This was frustrated & Jas. Glasgow (who had been secretary of State for 20 years) was fined 2000 pounds, the negro executed who was to burn the building.





Book 10 page 225: Oct. 10 1783, The State grants (#375 at 50 shillings the 100 acres) to Asa Martin 338 acres on south bank of Yadkin River next Richard Dowal & Solomon Park?
