Book 6 page 405: On Feb. 17 1767, Arthur Patterson & wife Elizabeth let William McMillin (all of Rowan Co. N.C.) have 100 acres where Samuel Blythe now dwells next James Dougherty & a meadow, for 5 shillings--the release price being 40 pounds on the next day--witnessed by Sarah & John Braly & proved in April 1767. (This is part of 665 acres which Earl Granville let Samuel Blythe have on March 25 1752, he let John Gillespie have by lease & release on Nov. 15-16 1759 & he let said Patterson have by lease & release on Feb. 1-2 1764).

Book 6 page 225: On Oct. 7 1765, Joshua Nichols & wife Jenmet let Jacob Nichols (all of Rowan Co. N.C.) have 336 acres on both sides of Blythes Creek, for 50 pounds, witnessed by John Paterson, John Hankins & John McCulloh & proved in Oct. 1765. (This is part of a tract which William Alexander owned & let said Nichols have by lease & release on Jan. 11-12 1753).

: Deed from Samuel & Jean Love to Isaac Mitchell for 123 acres Nov. 5 1785 is proved by Thomas Mall.

Book 17 page 707; Sept. 18 1797, Archibald Patterson (a legatee of deceased James Patterson late of Rowan) & Mildred Patterson (the widow of said deceased) let John Elliot of --- have 140 acres on both sides of the north fork of Swans Creek next Charles Paine & George Peek, for \$210.00, witnessed by Canady Patterson & Frederic Cleavers & proved by the latter in Aug. 1801. (This is part of the 320 acres granted to the said deceased on Oct. 8 1783 & laid off for the said Archibald).

Book 29 page 507; May 2 1827. William Elliott of Clay Co. Illinois for himself and as attorney of the other heirs of deceased John Elliott of Rowan Co. N.C. (who are Thomas & Isaac Elliott & Milly Meisenhimer, formerly an Elliott of Clay Co. Ill., David Elliott & Jacob Elliott of Fayette Co. Ill., John Elliott & Willis Elliott of Ray Co. Missouri) lets Benjamin Heartly of Davidson Co. N.C., have 147 9/10 acres on both sides the north fork of Swan Creek next Orston Bradshaw on the original line, for \$300.00, acknowledged in Oct. 1827. (This had originally been granted by The State to James Patterson on Oct. 8 1783, who died & it descended to Archibald Patterson who let the deceased John Elliott have this on Sept. 18 1797).

HAPPY VALLEY (by Thomas Felix Hickerson, in 1940), page 47: "The name of Patterson, in various spellings, is found from early times in England, Scotland, Ireland, and Scandinavia. A consecutive line (traced by Dr Adelaide Fries of Salem, N.C.) begins in Scotland with Robert Patirsen, who m. Janet Hair, and had sons; John, Patrik, Andrew, Alexander. This John Paterson m. Maren Knox; had sons, John, Patrick, Andrew. John Paterson (son of John and Maren Knox) m. 2nd Christina Dickson; had sons, Wm, Robert, James. This Robert Paterson m. Margaret Kerr, emigrated to Ireland, had sons; John, James, Thomas, Andrew, Alexander. James Patterson (son of Robert and Margaret Kerr) settled at Coleraine, Ireland; his son, James Patterson, born in 1657, m. in 1698, Anne Ewing, had children; Robert (1699-1705), Anne, James, Samuel (b. 1707), and probably others.

"The earliest American record of the Patterson family is in Chester Co., Pa., where there is a tax list (1722) and a probated will (1741) of James Patterson. His wife Anne and children Margaret, Mary, Anne, Samuel, Rebecca, and James are mentioned. It appears certain that the said James Patterson, whose will was probated in 1741 was the James Patterson (b. 1657, in Ireland).

"Samuel Patterson (b. 1707) emigrated from Ireland with his father, James, to Chester Co., Pa., and then moved to Augusta Co., Va., which later became Rockbridge Co. He m. Martha Legerwood and lived at Brownsburg, Va. Their three children were: (1) Wm (b. 1765); (2) James; (3) Samuel (1770-1841) m. 1st (1797) Mary Finley (1778-1804), 2nd (1805) Susan Waugh (no issue), 3rd (1808) Ellenor S. Tate (8 children). The two children of Samuel and Mary (Finley) Patterson were: (1) Samuel Finley (1799-1874); (2) Andrew (1802-1881). In about 1811, Samuel Finley Patterson moved to Wilkesboro, N.C., where his uncle John Finley lived.

The will of Margret Guffey (book G page 200) made while "Sick and Weak" on June 18 1811 & probated in Aug. 1811. Four children; son John (who is executor), Margret Luckey (& her children).

Granddaughters: Polly & Patsy Guffey.

Witnesses: John Luckey & Thomas Kenshaw.

William Peterson (Timber Fork of Mill Creek)
Book 9 page 40: Aug. 17 1779, The State grants (#36-at 50 shillings the 100 acres) to William Peterson 250 acres on Timber Fork of Mill Creek, beginning on the corner of Janet Kennedy, going with her line south 22 chains & 50 links to a Spanish oak, crossing the Timber Branch, west 8 chains & 40 links to a Spanish oak near the corner of David Huston, south with his line 23 chains & 50 links to a post oak, east 62 chains & 75 links to a post oak, north 42 chains & 50 links to a black oak, west 16.25 chains to the corner P.O. of John Lowery, with his line the same course 49 chains & 25 links in all to a black oak on his corner, then north 57 degrees west to the beginning.

Book 14 page 514 or 614 (numbered twice): Nov. 26 1789, William Peterson (Rachel Peterson makes her mark), lets Charles Buck--all of Rowan Co.N.C.--have 250 acres on Timber Fork of Mill Creek, next Janet Kennedy, crossing Timber Branch, next David Houston & John Lowry, for 100 pounds, witnessed by ? & ? & proved by Phillip Slough in Aug. 1796.

Book 9 page 53: July 1 1779, The State grants (#26 at 50 shillings the 100 acres) to Janet Kennedy 400 acres beginning on the corner of John Lowery at a hickory, going with his line south 57 degrees east, crossing the mill creek at 20 chains, in all 44 chains to a post oak, south 22 chains & 50 links to a Spanish oak, west, crossing the mill creek at 45 chains--in all 79 chains partly along the line of --- Houston to a black oak grub on the line of Hugh Park, north with his line 2 degrees west 59 chains to a pine on his corner & the line of --- Jamison, east with his line 8 chains & 17 links to a hickory on his corner, north with his line 7 chains, crossing the creek at 5 chains, to a pawpaw, east 36 chains & 75 links to a white oak on the line of John Lowery, then with his line south 17 chains & 85 links to the beginning.

Makers of America (Leonard Wilson & others), Vol. II page 283: "One of the most conspicuous of North Carolina families during the last one hundred years, whether measured by personal qualities or public service, is the Patterson family, which comes of that strong Scotch stock which has contributed so much to North Carolina. A present-day member of that family, who, though yet a young man, has made a most eminent success in business, and who is a community leader, is John Legerwood Patterson, born at Winston-Salem, North Carolina, November 23, 1874, son of Rufus Lenoir and Mary Elizabeth (Fries) Patterson. His father, who will be referred to later, was one of the strong figures of his generation. In business he was a cotton manufacturer and merchant. His mother was the daughter of Francis Fries, who was a pioneer, manufacturer, merchant, farmer and member of the Legislature. His three sons are manufacturers, bankers and presidents of railroads. His mother's grandfather, J.C.W. Fries, was one of the celebrated Moravian Colony, which settled at Salem in 1766, and was a native of Saxony, Germany. In the paternal line, his father was a son of General Samuel Finley Patterson, to be referred to later, and one of his great-great-grandfathers was General William Lenoir, one of the most notable men in Carolina history. An uncle of John L. Patterson, Samuel Legerwood Patterson, the younger son of General Samuel Finley Patterson, is credited by Ashe in his biographies as having contributed as much to the agricultural development of North Carolina as any man in its history."****

"Born in a town noted for its educational advantages"****"He was married in Atlanta, Georgia, on October 26, 1904, to Margaret Newman, born in that city, April 2, 1875, daughter of Judge William Truslow and Frances Alexander Newman. The children of this marriage are: Margaret Newman, Frances Elizabeth, and John Legerwood Patterson, Jr.

"The mere multiplication of words would not add anything to the brief record here presented. But something of the history of this remarkable family is worthy of record. The stock is Scotch, originally descended from the clan Mac Anlay, of which the Patterson family was a sept. The Gaelic form of the name was Mac Pheidran or Mac Phedron. From this stock is descended seven distinct families in Great Britain, having amongst

(This is on the east side of a branch or creek and is where David Houston lived at the time of his death--see his will dated Aug. 13 1761--being one half moiety of his onehalf part of the 640 acres which Earl Granville let him have).

The will of David Houston (book A page 63) made Aug. 13 1761 & proved in Oct. ? 1762? Wife Mary. Sons: William (the plantation where he lives), Aaron (land next Thos. McQuown, also a tract in Anson Co. N.C. on Twelve Mile Creek), John (1/2 of my home tract on west side of a branch, he must go to school six months) & David (the other half of my home tract on the east side of a branch, he must go to school two years). Daughters: Ann, Mary, Jane, Agness, Hannah, Margaret & Elizabeth (get two pounds each, I think). Exrs: wife & son Aaron. Witnesses: Hance Hamilton, Mary Parks & Hugh Parks.

Book 5 page 185: March 8 1763, Mary Houston (makes her mark, as executrix & relict of deceased David Houston) let his son David have 320 acres of the above land for 5 shillings--the release price being 1 shilling on the next day (being $\frac{1}{2}$ of the 640 acres which Earl Granville let said deceased have

them ten Coats of Arms. These families are given as of Dalkeith, of Dunmure, of Stirling, of Ross, of Castle Huntly (Perthshire), of Kinnettles (County Forfar) and of London. There are three Coats of Arms in the Ross family and one in the Patterson-Wallace family, which makes the ten.

"Numerous branches of the family are found in America but the study of many records justifies the belief that this particular Patterson family is descended from the Pattersons of Dalkeith. Incidentally, it may be mentioned here that the Scotch family of the name used one "t" only and the double "t" is an American or English addition. Reasons for the belief that this family is descended from the Pattersons of Dalkeith is found in the fact that they are credited with being the progenitors of the Galloway and the Ayrshire Pattersons. These Galloway and Ayrshire Pattersons were uncompromising Covenanters and got themselves into trouble with the government, by reason of their frowardness in matters of religion. Patterson of Balliurd and his Galloway associates took part in the abortive uprising which ended so disastrously at Bothwell Brig, and it was that expedition which gave rise to the old doggerel which runs: "The black and the brown gaed thro' the town, But Patterson's filly gaes foremost."

"Robert Patterson, said to have been the original of Sir Walter Scott's world-renowned "Old Mortality," is said to have been an humble scion of this race whose blood now mixes with the imperial Bonaparte family of France. In a work entitled "Concerning the Forefathers," written by Charlotte Reeve Conover, herself of Patterson blood, it gives what appears to be the most nearly authentic account of the history of this branch of the family.

"John Patterson was born in 1640, and left southwest Scotland after the downfall of the Covenanters, and went to Londonderry, where he took part in the famous siege of that town as one of its defenders. His son Robert was half grown at the time of the siege, and John Patterson was at that time a man nearly fifty. Robert grew to manhood and had a large family of children, ten in number, six of whom emigrated to America. There were two separate sailings of the family. Old John, then a man of eighty-three, came over

about 1723 with his son Robert, his wife Margaret and six children. They were in New London, Connecticut, in 1728. The family decided to move farther south and stopped in New Jersey where the old father, John, died at nearly ninety years of age. Robert moved on into Pennsylvania, where he afterwards became known as Robert of Lancaster, to distinguish him from other members of the family. He was probably one of the organizers of Big Spring congregation in the western part of what is now Cumberland County, in 1737, as his name appears as one of the elders. At the time of his going into Pennsylvania the children of Robert and Margaret appear to have been: John, aged thirteen (ancestor of the Shaker Pattersons); Mary, eleven; Francis, of Bedford, aged nine, said to have been the father of Robert who is credited with taking part in the battle of Lexington; William, seventeen; Robert, fourteen, and Thomas, a baby. Eight of the children of Robert and Margaret Patterson lived to become heads of families, some of them in Pennsylvania, and three of his sons, John, Francis and William, were enrolled in a company of troopers organized in York and Lancaster Counties to defend the frontiers.

"William married a Virginia girl and moved to Berkeley County. He appears on the list of Berkeley County soldiers in 1776, was a Justice of the Peace in that County in 1778, and appears to have participated in the battle of King's Mountain in 1780. Here there comes a break in the story, and it will be remembered that Robert and Margaret had eight children and we do not know the names of all of them.

"In 1758 Robert appears in Augusta County, Virginia, as a soldier in the old French and Indian War. Twenty years later Samuel appears in the Revolutionary War as a lieutenant in the Rockbridge militia, and thirty-five years later Samuel Finley Patterson, then aged fifteen, went, at the invitation of his uncle, to North Carolina and became the founder of the family with which we are dealing. The actual line cannot be determined, but all the evidence points to Samuel Finley having been the son of Samuel, who was the son of Robert, the son of Robert, the son of John. The Scotch-Irish of the Valley of Virginia came in a direct line from the Pennsylvania Counties, and it is a fair conclusion that other members of William's family, attracted by the fertility of the

N.C.) have 100 acres on Blyth's Creek next James Dougherty on the south side of a meadow (which is part of the tract Earl Granville sold to Samuel Blyth March 25 1752 who let John Gillespey have by lease & release, who let Arthur Paterson, who let William McMullen, who let James Gilmore have on Feb. 12-13 1768): also the adjoining 250 acres on the east side of said creek next Jacob Nichols, David McDowell, William McMullen & James Blyth on down the creek (which Samuel Blyth let William McKnight have & he sold on Nov. 12 1774) -- in all 350 acres, for 400 pounds, witnessed by Henry Murray, David Forster & Samuel Young & proved by the latter in May 1778.

country, moved into the valley and went on farther up. Among these upper valley Pattersons the names of Robert, William and Samuel seem to have been favorites"****

"The father, General Samuel Finley Patterson, was born in Rockbridge County, Virginia, March 11, 1799. Under the advice of his uncle, Major John Finley, at the age of fifteen he moved to Wilkesboro, North Carolina, where for the next six years he was employed in the store of Waugh and Finley. At the age of twenty-two he was elected engrossing clerk in the House of Commons, and re-elected annually for fourteen years. In 1835 he was made chief clerk of the Senate. In May, 1824, he married Phebe Caroline Jones, daughter of General Edmund Jones, a granddaughter of General William Lenoir. This marriage brought him into association and relationship with the leaders of the State. His main occupation through life was that of farming, but in other business lines he was successful and was known as a strong financier. He served two years as State Treasurer, and was President of the first railroad completed in the State, the Raleigh and Gaston Railroad. He had moved to Raleigh, but on the death of his father-in-law, General Jones, he returned permanently to the Yadkin Valley.

"Largely through his instrumentality Caldwell County was created in 1841 out of Burke and Wilkes. His home, "Palmyra," fell in the new County."*****The elder of these sons, Rufus Lenoir, was born June 22, 1830, at "Palmyra," in that part of the Upper Yadkin known as "Happy Valley."****In 1852 he married Marie Louise, daughter of Governor J.M. Morehead. The children of this marriage were Jesse Lindsay, a prominent lawyer of Winston-Salem; Caroline Finley, wife of Judge A.L.Coble, of Statesville; Letitia Walker, who became the wife of Frank H. Fries and died soon after, and Louis Morehead, who died after an honorable course at the State University and the University of Virginia. Mr. Patterson's first wife died in May, 1862."****After the death of his wife he became manager of a cottonmill at Patterson on the Yadkin, which was burned by General Stoneman in 1865."****In 1864 he married Mary E. Fries, daughter of Francis Fries. Lindsay, together with William and Arthur Patterson, Jr., ran through an opening in the British lines, and escaped unharmed--Arthur with a portion of the rope, with which he had been fastened, still dangling from his neck. Thomas Patterson, possession perhaps more of a belligerent nature, watched his opportunity, between fires, and made a bold dash for the Whig lines, reaching Shelby's corps, where he picked up the rifle of a wounded soldier, and fought bravely until victory was proclaimed. His aged father was less fortunate. His old Irish blood, as he came in view of the noble army of patriots, was stirred within him; and hoping that he might aid in liberating both his sons and his country, he warmly joined in the fray, and was killed."
