Thomas Chunn proves the will of John Dobbins Feb. 3 1818.  
William " = to help lay out ~~one~~ one years provision ~~Dok.~~ the widow  
*J.H. McCubbins* of John Turner, deceased, & her family Nov. 1838. Her  
Clerk Superior Court Rowan County. In 1813 Thomas Chunn has 258 acres & 5 Blacks  
Salisbury N.C. see Taxes in Capt Hyde's Company.

William Chunn (Book 30 page 429), on Nov. 3 1828, mortgages the land upon  
which he lives, consisting of 360 acres, to Elias Barber Sr. for 247 dollars  
and 17 cents. The land is that of Robert Cowan, the heirs of David Webb,  
heirs of William Davenport, Jonathan Barber, heirs of James Knox, Benjamin  
Peston and Joseph Burroughs, having been conveyed from Henry D. McBroom  
through his attorney, Joseph E. Dobbins, to William Chunn.

Robert Chunn (Book 30 page 430) on Nov. 3 1830, mortgages ~~260~~ acres to Elias  
Barber, Sr. It is adjoining that of Almand Hall, the heirs of Hugh Dobbins,  
Jacob Skiles and John Lecke and was conveyed from John Dobbins to Thomas  
Chunn who devised it to Robert Chunn. <sup>#247.17</sup>

William Chunn and wife Mary, and Wm. Trent and wife, Margaret, on July 17  
1829 (Book 30 page 735) David C. Lecke for \$500.00, 408 6/10 acres of  
land next that of Mrs. Trotter, crossing Grants Creek to Alexander Leck, Willim  
Gibson on Swampy Creek next that of Matthew Leck. It descended to them from  
their father Matthew Leck D.C.

(This is another proof of the Chunn, Gaither et al, genealogy.)

William Chunn and wife Mary, and William Trent and wife Margaret, (Book 30  
page 733) get 190 acres-- the undivided one third part of David C. Lecke's  
land for \$500.00. It is situated on Poplar draught of Grant's Creek next  
that of Sophia Penninger, Maj. John Lecke, William Gibson and on south side  
of the Salisbury Road next that of the Gaither heirs and Martin Phifer.  
July 17 1829.

The will of Thomas Chunn (Book H page 216) is made July 12 1822 and probated  
May 1823. He mentions his wife: <sup>+4</sup> ~~sister~~ Susannah, daughters: Lelah and Mary; sons:  
Robert and William; executors: two sons; and witnesses are John Lecke and  
Jno. McCullough Jr. Codicil speaks of daughter, Lela Griffin

In the Appearance Bucket of Rowan in 1862-3 James Chunn & others Ex parte  
# 14 wish to sell a slave for Mary & Eliza Chunn " infants under twentyone  
years without a regular Guardian " and Thomas C. Hyde is commissioner for  
the sale Nov. 1862 and is administrator for Maria Chunn deceased, see #14.  
Thomas C. Hyde is made guardian of Eliza J. and Mary C. Chunn orphans of Robert  
Chunn, and as William Chunn didn't leave a will he is also administrator for  
with a \$ 2000,00 bond and N.F. Hall and Benjamin M Hyde are sureties for him.

Mary Chunn to John Knox April 3 1827. signed David McHenry.

Benjamin M. Hyde is the guardian of Margaret Hyde.

In Dr. Rumble's History of Rowan Co. N.C. page 436, "About the year 1794, a  
number of Episcepal families removed from Maryland to the western part of  
Rowan, among them two families of Barbers, and other families by the names  
of Gardner, Chunn, Harrison, Alexander, Lightell, Mills, Swan, Reeves, Bur-  
roughs, etc. The Rev. Richard W. Barber, of Wilkesboro, is descended from Elias  
Barber, the patriarch of one branch of the Barber family, and the Rev. Samuel  
S. Barber, of Hyde County, is descended from Jonathan Barber, the patriarch  
of the other branch. Mr. Chunn was the grandfather of the Chunks of this  
county, Mrs. Susan W. Murphy, Mrs. Betty Murphy, and many others. The late  
Archibald Henderson was often heard to remark that the Rev. Thomas F. Davis--  
afterwards Bishop of South Carolina-- said to him, that Mr. William Chunn--  
the father of Mrs. Susan W. Murphy-- was "God's gentleman", meaning thereby  
that he was endowed by nature with all the graces and genuine characteristi-  
of a true, cultured, Christian gentleman--a very high compliment indeed,

The will of Robert Chunn (book K page 119) made while weak in body on Jan. 8 1849 & probated

There was a John Thomas Chunn, Maj., R. Aug. 27 1781 of Fauquier Co. Va. (see section # 261 page 200 of McAllister's Va. Militia in the Revolution). There was a Capt. John L. Chunn (see Section 241 page 171 ( George Monroe of Fauquier on Aug. 31 1832 tells of serving him in Nov. 1780, at Williamsburg & Richmond). See also page 11 of Fauquier Co. Va.

Book 35 page 226: May 3 1841, William Chunn & wife Mary let Richard W. Gardner--all of Rowan Co. N.C.--have 102 acres on Grants Creek next Obadiah Smith near Blew Branch, for \$563.00, acknowledged in May 1841. The platte given shows this to be almost square.

Aug. 11 1812: William Trent, aged about two years, is bound to Thomas Martin to learn the trade of a blacksmith

Aug. 21 1820: "The Court binds William Trent to Daniel Jacobs, to learn the Blacksmith's Trade, and the indenture by which Thomas Martin held the Boy bound cancelled"

Nov. 20 1824: "Ordered by the Court, that Capt. William Chunn, Henry S. Hughey, William Sloan, George Barber, Samuel Miller Jr. and Jo Owens, met as Patrollers in Capt. Chunn's Company".

Book 65 page 8: May 19 1885, Lydia C. Chunn, M.B. Trollinger & wife Susan S. of Catawba Co. N.C. let W.P. Barber of Rowan Co. N.C., have 40.63? on the Western N.C. Railroad, in a field & down a branch, for \$345.35, acknowledged on May 19 1885.

Dear Mrs. Kyle:

You do not know me, but inasmuch as I always felt flattered to be called like you by some of your friends in Salisbury, I have the advantage.

Having determined to get up Mary Gaither Robinson's papers for Colonial and Revolutionary orders as a Christmas present for last year, I found the idea blocked by the ignorance concerning Elizabeth Crawford who became the wife of General Matthew Locke's son Matthew Locke, D.C. It seems that there is no getting at her birth, marriage and death nor parentage and home. Do you think that you can assist in locating her? There is no trouble in proving that your line is straight from Gen'l Matthew, but it would be so nice to include the Crawford family if possible. If I had addresses of the Trent family they might know.

Can you recall hearing where she was married? Miss Jennie Caldwell-- now deceased-- claimed relationship with the family in such way that it seems as if this Elizabeth Locke, widow, then married John McCullough. There is a Capt. John McCullough buried at the First Presbyterian Church in Statesville but no tombstone is erected to his wife. She may have been buried with others in the new cemetery which I didn't visit.

It is rather strange that such a fine family should be so careless of its dates, but suppose that life was too full of entertaining and being entertained to care.

Mary promised to bother you herself, but sickness has been almost continuous for the past years in her household, that she probably couldn't find the time.

It would be a great relief to get papers finished and off my mind and I do hope that you can give some impetus.

Mr. Allison had a stroke of paralysis many months back and was very critical-- haven't heard about his condition since. Miss Sallie Chunn lives with Mrs. Allison.

Jeanie Kluttz has been making Mrs. Vance a lengthy visit at Gombroon-- having been tied down with illness in the family for so long it is nice that she can now relax.

Mrs. Mock has been in extremis for many weeks but there is a possibility of her lasting months.

Mr. & Mr. Ed Overman's son-in-law was buried here yesterday-- results of flu last winter. Mildred's married life has been clouded by illnesses. Understood that a sick child in Asheville necessitated her return to Asheville.

Dear Mamie:

Your letter of August 15th received, and read with much pleasure. I, too, have had the geneological bee buzzing under my bonnet for quite a number of years, and have written Mary Gai-ther three times in regard to the family tree. Being told by Cousin Annie Allison that she had it compiled. I have been so wrought up over this matter I would almost cheerfully commit murder to get it. I am sending you all the ~~information~~ that I have regarding the Chunn family. I do not know where Elizabeth Crawford was born or where she was buried. Have often heard my mother speak of her in days gone by. But at that time being so busy rearing children, I did not give a thought to anything to do with our family tree. I would willingly defray any expense necessary toward securing a copy of the records of my family and will appreciate very much if you will furnish me what data you have or send me a copy of your papers when finished. I will be glad to pay for same. You ask for information regarding the Trent family. I know very little concerning their ancestry. Cousin Madge and Wm. Anderson's grandfather was Margaret Locke. She was a sister to our grandfather, Mary Locke. She married Wm. Trent, our grandfather. Wm. Chunn's grandmother was Susan Wainright. My mother was named for her. I know nothing else regarding the Wainwright family. We are related to the Barber's and DuBoe's in some way. Perhaps you can get some information from the Barber's who use to live and perhaps do now, at Wilkesboro, N. C. Think it would be a very good idea if you would write to
