McCulloh families.

"read the services to his family and neighbors. He often represented his county in the Provincial and State Assemblies. He was wealthy, a capitalist, and it is said governed many in the Assembly by lending them money. In bad weather he had every kind of work carried on in his house. Tailors, shoe-makers, saddlers--all plied their trades. In 1776 he was a member of Caswell's Council. He m. before leaving Scotland, Helen, daughter of Alexander Scrymgeour and Jane Duncan, of Scotland. This Scrymgeour was a lineal descendant of Sir Alexander Scrymgeour, of the army of King Robert de Bruce. Judge James Iredell and wife Hannah, who d. 1826, had issue: 1. Annie Isabella, b. 1785, d. 1816. 2. Helen; both died single. 3. James, b. at Edenton, N.C., 2 November, 1788.

"He was a man of great talent; by many thought the equal of his father. He was member of the House of Commons 1816, Speaker 1817-18, Judge 1819, Governor 1827, and United States Senator 1828, succeeding Macon. This office he resigned 1831 and returned to the bar. He died 1857. The old Judge died 1799.

"Governor James Iredell m. Frances Johnstone Tredwell, daughter of Samuel Tredwell and wife, Helen Scrymgeour Blair, sister of Governor Samuel Johnstone and Hannah Iredell. She, Helen, was born 1763, died 1802.

"Francis Johnstone Tredwell, who m. Governor James Iredell, was the 7th generation in direct descent from John Alden and Priscilla, the "Puritan maid"--this: from John Alden and wife to Priscilla to their son David; from David Alden to his daughter Elizabeth; from Elizabeth Alden (wife of Deacon John Seabury, a grand-son through his father, Samuel, of Dr. John Seabury, a distinguished surgeon of his day, and one of the earliest settlers of Duxbury, Mass.), to their son, Parson Seabury; from Parson Samuel Seabury (father of the first Bishop of the Episcopal Church in America, the Rt. Rev. Samuel Seabury), to his daughter Elizabeth, from Elizabeth Seabury (wife of Benjamin Tredwell, M.D., son of Col. Benjamin Tredwell, of Great Neck, Queen's County, on Nassau Island, in the colony of New York), to their son Samuel; from Samuel Tredwell to his daughter Frances Johnstone; from Frances Johnstone Tredwell, wife of Governor James Iredell, to her daughter, Annie Isabella, who married Cadwallader Jones, Esquire, 1836".

Mr. Goshen McCulloch has moved to Mocksville since the following note was made--his family claims to be of royal lineage.

A small graveyard right near Mr. Goshen McCulloch's home east of Jerusalem & near Dutchman's Creek, in which are a few stones unmarked & Elizabeth Graves born Aug. 26 1792 died July 8 1883, Philip Graves of Davie Co., erected by his wife Elizabeth (no dates); Nancy, wife of George Graves, died Feb. 20 1857. Also one to Alt Wms ? born July 15 1825 died Oct. 5 1828.

The McCulloch graveyard is a few miles away & off a bad road.

Iredell Co.N.C., book D page 232: March 6 1802, Ann & John Logan let Robert Sloan--all of Iredell Co.N.C.--have 337 acres on the head waters of Rokey River next Robert Brevard, Nathaniel John Herr & --- Jack, for 375 pounds, witnessed by Aaron Wood & James Bowman & proved by the latter in May 1802. (John McCulloch let said Ann & John Logan have this)

Iredell Co.N.C. book C page 238: Feb. 7 1798, John McCulloch of South Carolina--no wife signs--lets Ann & John Logan of Iredell Co.N.C., have 315 acres on Rokey River next Robert Brevard, for 240 pounds, witnessed by Nathl. Karns & James Harris & proved by the latter in May 1798. (This is part of the 630 acres bequeathed to the said John McCulloch by his uncle, Alexander Camuch?).

Irish Co. N.C., Book 3 page 10: Feb. 17 1801, James & Andrew Part-- arrives sign--let George S. rack (all of Irwell N.C.), have 200 acres, for 150 pounds, witnessed by John Luskay & William Luskay & prove by the latter in May 1801. (This is part of the 240 acres granted by the State to James McCulloch who willer it to his son, Lindsay McCulloch who let said James & Andrew Part have it).

Jan. 20 1762: "Andrew Neal in the Room of John Johnston" appointed Constable.
Jan. 17 1763: "Order P Cur that Alexr: McCulloh be Appointed Cunstable in Stead of Andrew Neal"
Jan. 12 1764: "James Neal in the room of Alexander McCulloh" is appointed Constable.

July 20 1758: Dec. 17 1758 from Earl Granville to Esq. Allenr. McCulloch for 6 1/2 acres on Dec. 7 1758 proved by Esq. James Carter.

Book 6 page 65: On Sept. 14 1761, Esq. Alexander McCulloch, of Halifax Co. N.C. lets John Frohock of same county, have for 40 pounds "Current Money of Virginia", all that tract of 625 acres on both sides of Grants Creek and west side of the Yalkin River next John Nesbet, witnessed by Mary Hurst, Henry E. McCulloch & proved in Wilmington, N.C. by Henry Justice McCulloch Esq. who was a witness to the deed, on April 22 1762. (This had been granted to Alexander McCulloch on Dec. 7 1758, by the Earl of Granville).

Book 3 page 348: On July 21 1756, John McCulloch--no wife signs--lets Captain Hugh Waddel Esq. (both of Rowan Co. N.C.) have 305 acres on south side of Fourth Creek next Colonel John Edwards, for 5 shillings--release price on next day was 12 pounds--witnessed by Thomas Bashford & George Davison. (This is part of 640 acres Earl Granville let John McCulloch have March 25 1752?)

Book 6 page 382: Colonel Hugh Waddell & wife Mary, of Belfont in Bladen Co. N.C., let Esq. Walter Lindsay of Rowan Co. N.C., have 305 acres on the south side of Fourth Creek next that of Colonel Edwards, for 60 pounds, witnessed by David Jenkins & Rachel Cunningham & acknowledged on May 21 1767, by Col. Hugh Waddell before Edmund Fanning. (This is part of a 640 acre tract granted John McCulloch on March 25 1752 by the Earl of Granville, & John McCulloch let Col. Hugh Waddell have on July 22 1756).

Book 3 page 33: William Newberry, a carpenter, lets Alexander Newberry, a planter, have 305 acres on the south side of Fourth Creek next land of Edwards, for 20 pounds proclamation money witnessed by William Sharpe & Joseph Wasson in Feb. term of 1773. (This is part of 640 acres granted to John McCulloch on March 25 1752, by the Earl of Granville, John McCulloch let Hugh Waddle have 305 acres by lease & release on July 22 1756, Hugh Waddle let Walter Lindsay have it on March 10 1767, William Brown let Alexander Newberry Sr. have it on Feb. 10 1769, & when Alexander Newberry Sr. died, it was willed to his sons: James & Alexander, James died & it was heired by William Newberry who is now letting his brother, Alexander Newberry have it).

Book 4 page 678: On March 25 1762, Alexander McCulloch & wife Agness of Rowan Co.N.C., let Andrew Morrison of same county, have for 46 pounds, 640 acres, witnessed by John Brandon & Hugh Hall & proved in April 1762. (This seems to have been granted Alexander McCulloch on date of above sale).

Iredell County N.C. book 1 page 164: The will of James McCulloch made Oct. 18 1791. Wife Margaret (my dwelling house). Four sons: John (150 acres on Little River in South Carolina), Lindsay & Andrew (two tracts on Back Creek which are to be divided between them) & James (320 acres near Statesville. Daughters Mary & Elizabeth. Exrs: son John, John Wisbet & Samuel Fleming.

Iredell Co.N.C. book 9 page 183: Feb. 18 1801, Lindsey McCulloch--no wife signs--lets James & Andrew Hart--all of Iredell--have 320 acres for 100 pounds, witnessed by Jas. W. Swing & B. Brevard & proved by the latter in Feb. 1801.

N.C., have 4 acres next James McCulloch, on a branch, for 3 pounds, witnessed by Phillip Hendrix & John Larch & proven by the latter in Feb. 1802. (This is part of the land which James McCulloch bought of Benjamin Kern).

Book 22 page 103: May 8 1834, John Pate & wife Rebecca of Jefferson Co. Tenn. let Alfred McCulloch of Rowan Co. The Young Family of Cabarrus Co. N.C. (given by Miss Lizzie C. Young of Davidson, N.C., to Miss Edith C. Thomason).

"The following was written by Robert Washington Allison, grandson of William Young of Cabarrus County.

"William Young was of Irish origin, born in 1750. First settled in Pennsylvania, from there removed to North Carolina previous to the War of the Revolution, and was married to Mary Campbell, they settled on Coddle Creek, which was then in the County of Mecklenburg, now the County of Cabarrus. Mary Campbell's family lived on Coddle Creek, where the Beattie's Ford road crosses said creek, near Poplar Tent Presbyterian Church.

"William Young had a brother, Joseph Young, who married and settled on a plantation adjoining his brother William's above and on the same creek, and a sister, Mary, who married David Crawford. They also lived on the same creek, but close to the Campbells and near the church. Another sister married a Robinson and another sister a Sharp. The two brothers, Joseph and William Young, and their sister, Mary Young Crawford, all had large families.

"Joseph Young had one son, William, who married and settled on the Charlotte road near the creek, his family is extinct. Joseph Young's daughters all married, one to a Ross, a Black, two married Wallaces, and one a Weddington. They all have descendents in Mecklenburg County.

"The sister, Mary Crawford, had one son Joseph, who married a Hope, they had a number of children. A daughter married John Johnston, another married Archibald Houston, one a Cook, afterwards married Abner Hope, one a McKnight, one a Hibbit (moved to Tennessee), one a Locke, afterwards Capt. John McCullough of Rowan County--she was long known as Aunt Betsey McCullough.

"William and Mary Campbell Young had 14 children. All lived to be grown except one, who died in infancy. They lived on the first place of settlement, adjoining Joseph Young, until 1787, when he bought the Campbell's place on the Beatties Ford road and settled within a hundred yards of the ford of the creek. place they bought of James and Thomas Campbell, brothers of Mary Campbell Young. Their home was noted for kindness and hospitality, having a large family connection they had a great deal of company and entertained well. Mary Young died in 1821, aged 66 years. William Young died in 1825, aged 73 years. Both are buried in Poplar Tent graveyard."

"Their first child, James Young, born July 22, 1777, was a prominent man, a sheriff of Cabarrus County for many years. He married Mary Allison, daughter of Robert and Sarah (Graham) Allison, in 1803. They had eight children. These are given in "History of Allison Family" by Leonard Allison Morrison, second child of Joseph Young, born July 29, 1779. It is from this Joseph Young, I (Lizzie C. Young) am directly descended. The Allison sketch goes on from him to my generation.

"7. Mary Ann Johnston, born Oct. 15, 1806. Married John Allison--died August 1827. No children. Poplar Tent.

Thomas Frohock, Justice of the Peace, to sell all of all lands in the county of Iredell, North Carolina, not over 10,000 acres in writing from me" and not to sell any land in the Indian land in the Yallow River, North Carolina, lying on the South side of the river, at the prices now demanded by me, recorded in the records of the county of Iredell, North Carolina, by Henry Sloan, Thomas Polk & John Johnston, attorneys at law, on Sept. 10 1797, and that the hand-writing of his deceased father, Henry Justice McCulloch, also testifies that Thomas Polk is dead, and that he believes the signature of John McCulloch is true, he thought proper to remove from this state "upwards of twenty years since".
