Atlantan's Answer to Query On Robinson Family Gives Interesting Information

Answer to Query 1,541. (a), by Mrs. G. O. Kiger, 533 Boynton Terrace, Chattanooga, Tenn., on the Robinson Family: Judith Robinson (will recorded in 1806 in Cumberland County, Virginia) was the widow of Jones Robinson, whose estate was administered by his brother, Edward, and its settlement recorded in Cumberland County in April, 1793. Jones was the son of Edward Robinson, who also died intestate in Cumberland County. The settlement of Edward's estate was recorded in January, 1782. Edward Robinson was the son of John Robinson, who patented land on Muddy Creek, Goochland County (now Cumberland County), Virginia, in 1738. John's will was proved in Cumberland County in 1768. It mentioned seven sons, John, Thomas, Field, Christopher, Edward, Joseph and Hezekiah, and a daughter, Susannah, wife of William Bradshaw, who was the son of Field and Judith Bradshaw.

Wife Was Tabitha

In 1749, the wife of this early John Robinson (will proved in 1768) was Tabitha. Possibly she was Tabitha Scruggs. Because of the similarity of names, it seems probable that John was the grandson of Christopher Robinson, who in 1652 patented 600 acres with John Sturdivant "at the head of Eastern Run (called Hatcher's Run) of Swift Creek" in Henrico County, Virginia. Probably this was the Christopher Robinson given as a headright in 1642 by John Ewens, who received a grant in "Appomattox," Charles City County, Virginia. His land was in that part of Charles City County that later became Henrico County, and still later was Chesterfield County.

Christopher Robinson, of Henrico County, died prior to 1662, and his widow, Frances, married Francis Burwell, who was the administrator of the estate in 1662 and 1663. Christopher and his wife, Frances, had a son, Christopher (record 1681, in Henrico County, Virginia); a son, Edward (deed with wife, Ann, in 1677), and probably a third son, Henry, who was a witness to Edward's deed in 1677. There are no Robinsons in "The List of Tythables of Henrico County, 1679," so all of this family evidently moved elsewhere.

Some years later the Rev. George Robertson settled in Bristol Parish, Henrico County, Virginia, and

in 1703 he, with others, patented a large tract in Henrico County, giving Jeffrey Robertson as a headright. Jeffrey Robertson, a merchant, settled in Henrico County on the south side of the James River, where he died in 1734. His will records his wife, Elizabeth, and his children: William, Richard, John, Thomas, Jeffrey, George, Ann, the wife of John Hudson, and Martha Robertson. Jeffrey Robertson II evidently married the widow, Judith Mills. His will, proved in Chesterfield County, Virginia, in 1784, gives his wife, Judith, and her son, Henry Mills, and Jeffrey Robertson II's sons: Jeffrey III, Tyrea, William Nicholas, Matthew, David and Mills Robertson.

The family of Jeffrey Robertson II intermarried with that of John Robinson, of Cumberland County, Virginia, and both were intermarried with the Nichols family. Christopher Robinson, son of John (died 1768), of Cumberland County, married Sarah, daughter of John Nichols, of Caroline, Cumberland and Halifax Counties. John Nichols died (about 1764) in Halifax County, leaving a widow, Mary. It is thought that John was the brother or son of Thomas Nichols, who is on record in Henrico County about 1712 or 1714. John Nichols had a sister, Ann Agnes, who married Henry Robinson. William Nichols (died prior to 1752) married Mary Jefferson, daughter of Field Jefferson (will 1765, Mecklenburg County, Virginia), and his wife, Mary Frances Robertson.

Died Prior to 1752

William Nichols died prior to 1752, and his estate was settled by Julius Nichols (Lunenburg County records). He left a son, William Nichols, and a daughter,

chamberlain of Glasgow, 1766, etc. W. M., V, 185, 186.

Susanna, who was living in 1765. Julius Nichols is on record in Lunenburg County, Virginia, about 1750 or 1760 with his wife, Elizabeth. He then went to North Carolina, where he was high sheriff of "Old Bute" County about 1765. Julius' daughter, Susanna, married Major Charles Robertson and had a son, Julius Caesar Robertson. Major Charles Robertson was the brother of General James Robertson, known as "The Father of Nashville, Tennessee."

Thomas Nichols, on record in Henrico County about 1712, probably married a daughter or sister of Susanna Allen (a widow in 1712). Later Susanna, daughter of Susanna Allen, married Nicholas Ware. All of these branches of the Nichols, Allen and Ware families probably went to that part of King William County that is now Caroline County, Virginia. A descendant of Thomas Nichols was John Nichols, who married (1) Ann Hardy, daughter of Thomas Hardy, and settled on Cherrystone Creek, Pittsylvania County, Virginia, in 1763. He married (2) about 1780, Rhoda, daughter of William Green, and moved to Henry County, Virginia, where he died near Spencer in 1806. His will mentions his children: Thomas, Sr., John, David, Ann Burns and Thomas, Jr., only child of his second wife.

Hotten's "Emigrants" gives a William Nichols very early in Charles City County, Virginia, who was probably the ancestor of the later Nichols of Charles City County; Richard (died about 1660); John, of Prince John County (records about 1720), and the Thomas Nichols of Henrico County. "Thomas Nichols" is given as a headright by Peter Rewlett in a patent (1693) in Henrico County. Possibly this Thomas was the Thomas Nichols who was on record in Henrico County about 1712.

Nugent: 1632, James Robinson, headright of William Spencer in a patent of James City County, Virginia, Lawnes Creek; 1635, Matthew Robinson, headright of Qweyning in a patent of Charles City County, Merchants Hope; 1636, Thomas Robinson, headright of James Place in a patent of Henrico County for land adjoining Robert Hollam's; 1636, Andrew Robinson, headright of William Carter in a patent of James City County for land three miles from James River, abutting Sunken Marsh; 1636, Henry Robinson, headright of John Neale, patent of Accomac County; 1636, John Robinson, headright of Richard Bennett, patent at Craney Point; 1637, Patrick Robinson, headright of William Farrar, son of William Farrar, late of Henrico County; 1637, James Robinson, headright of Hugh Wynne,

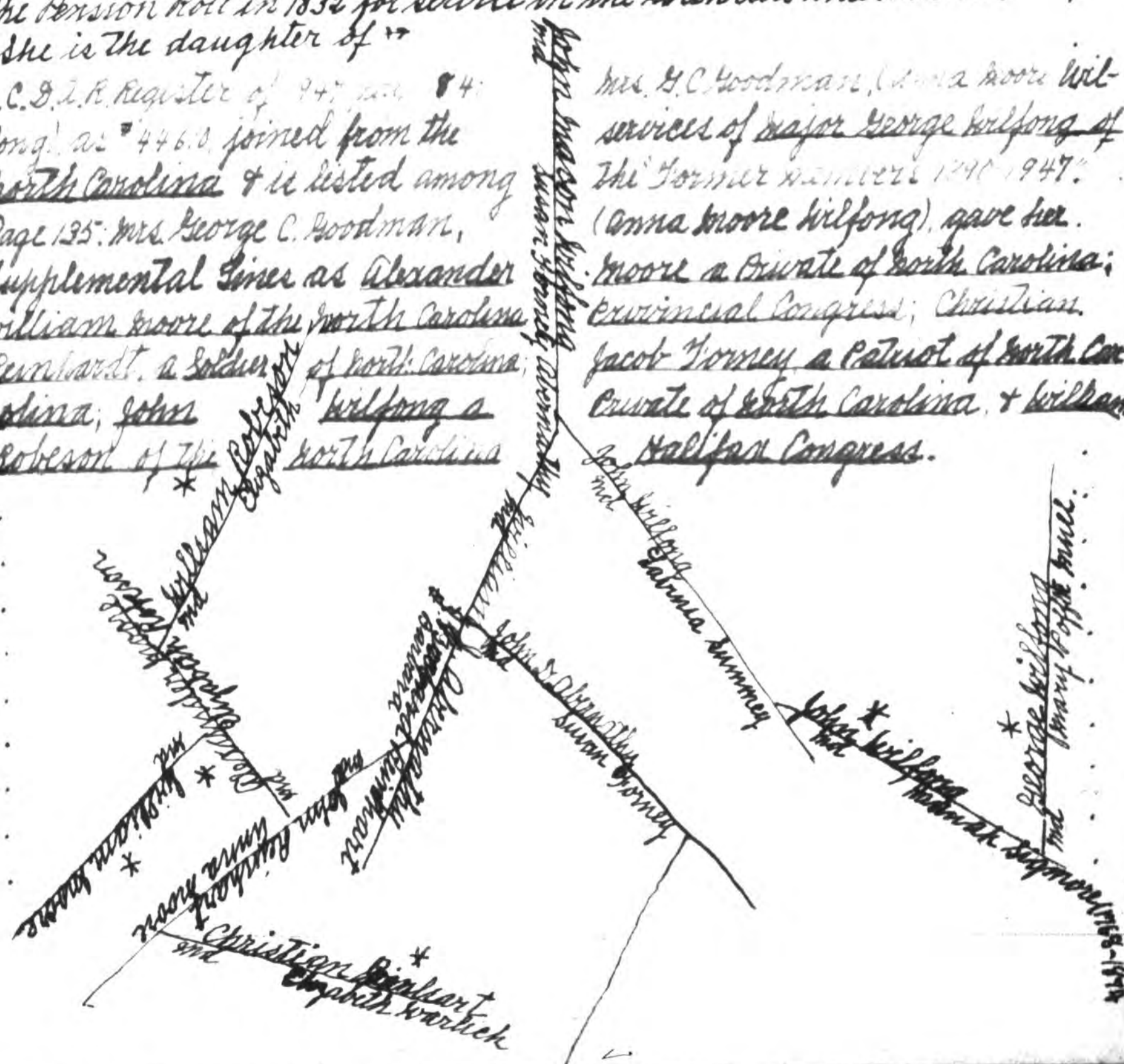

(This begins about one mile above said ford & above the Gum Logg Ford & goes south 18 degrees west 300 poles to a hickory, south 60 degrees west 120 poles to a W , west 100 poles to a red oak, north 19 degrees east 428 poles to a stake & to the beginning.)

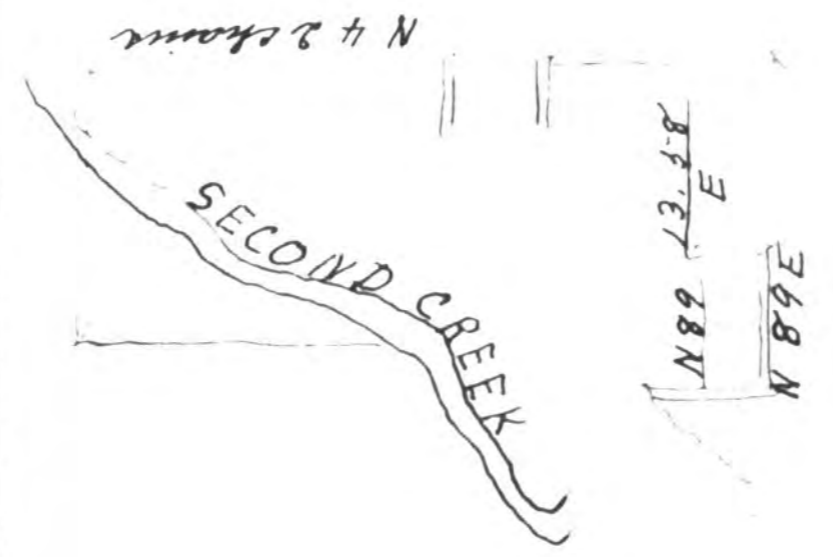
