Ch: Richard, Amos, John, Joseph, Samuel & Oliver. He was the elder bro of Wm. Harding, the father of Mary, afterwards Lady George. His sons Richard, John & Joseph came to America with the party of Gov. George in 1623. Richard's 1st w. name unknown, was the mother of Stephen & John; his 2d w. Elizabeth —, was mother of Lydia. Stephen, b 1623, d Feb. 30, 1698, m Bridget Estance, dau of Thomas. Abt 1647 he left the original home at Weymouth & joined the colony established by Roger Williams, going to Swansea & then to Providence. Ch: John, Stephen, Abraham, & 4 daus. Abraham's 1st w. had ch: Israel, Stephen & John; 2d w. Deborah —, had 3 daus & 1 son, d Nov. 23, 1694. Captain Stephen, b at Providence 1681, went from there to New York, & engaged in commerce with his bro Israel, sailing from New London. His ch: John, Abraham, Stephen, Thomas & Israel. According to a book published by Amy Hardin DeWitt, on the Hardings, Stephen Harding was b in Conn. in 1723, m Amy Gardner (b 1725 in Conn.) d 1803 in Exeter, Penna.) had a son David who was about seven yrs. old at the time of the massacre, and two daughters. In 1799 David moved to Ontario Co. N.Y. and in 1832 moved to Indiana Emily Beebe Roberts, 301 Hayden St. Sayre, Penna. In "The Massacre of Wyoming" by Horace C. Hayden, pub. at Wilkesbarre, in 1895 - pgs 70-75 - in a statement made by Elisha Harding to the Congressional Committee on Rev. John Hardin of Kentucky

Page 426 of Daniel Boone and The Hunters of Kentucky (by Bogart, published in 1763), the father of the subject came to the Monongahela, a wild & exposed frontier post, a laborer. Martin Hardin, while risking the frontier in Fayette County, was found within the limit of Pennsylvania after the boundary-line was surveyed, but he thought it in Virginia on the river bank. His son, John, became one of the noted hunters & held a military commission before the Revolution, as ensign in a company raised against a foray of the Indians. When just arrived of age, he volunteered under Capt. Zack Morgan (that skillful partisan officer of the Revolution) & was in the heat of the fight & here he got a bullet in his groin which was never extracted. With the aid of crutches, he continued to follow the army, but after this campaign of 1774, he renewed his hunting on the Monongahela, so he again renewed his fight for freedom, becoming second lieutenant. Serving under Horatio Gates, he took three British soldiers prisoners before they could realize he was alone. Refusing promotion as it meant a change of regiment but accepted the thanks of Gen. Gates with humility. In 1779, he left the army & started locating a home in Kentucky, removing there in 1786 to Washington County. Like all gallant Kentuckians, he followed the banner & shared the campaigns of Gen. George Rogers Clark & wherever his rifle might be or use there it was to be found. His home was raided often by the Indians & his cattle lifted. Selected by Wilkinson to make peace with them, he went to their camp near Fort Defiance, where they shot him to death in the zenith of his life although their guest. He was a member of the pioneer Methodist Church.

William Harden (Waters of the South Yadkin River)

Book 14 page 725 or 825 (numbered twice); Oct. 13 1791. William Harden--no wife signs--lets John Guffey (both of Rowan Co N.C.), have 154 acres on the waters of the South Yadkin, beginning on its north bank on the corner of Henry Guffey at a black oak, going north 36 chains to a stone on the original corner, west 46 $\frac{1}{2}$ chs. to a stone on the original line, south 33 chains to a persimmon on the river bank, then down its meanders to the beginning, for 87 pounds & 10 shillings N.C. money, witnessed by James Orton, Samuel Hughes & John Evans & proved by the last named in Feb. term of 1797. (This is what Alexander Harden Sr. let the said William Harden have).

Book 14, page 684 or 784 (numbered twice); July 8, 1796, Alexander Harden (no wife signed), let William Hardin--both of Rowan Co. N.C. have 150 acres on the north bank of the South Yadkin River near Henry Guffey & down it, for 30 pounds witnessed by John Prather & John Evans & proved by the latter in Feb. term of 1797. (This is part of the survey upon which the said Alexander Harden Sr., now lives).

Alexander Harden (South Yadkin River)

Book 9 page 668; July 16 1795. The State grants (#2421 at .50 shillings the 100 acres) to Alexander Harden 152 acres on the waters of the Yadkin River, beginning on the corner of said Harden at a white oak, going east 35 chains to a post oak on the corner of John Evans, north $5\frac{1}{2}$ chains to a black Jack on the corner of Thomas Bean, west with his line $5\frac{1}{2}$ chains to the corner of Joseph Orten, south 34 chains to a pine on the corner of said Orten on the river bank, then down its meanders to the beginning.

Book 13, page 398 Oct 18 1795. Alexander Harden & wife Elizabeth, et al. John Evans - all of Rowan Co. N.C. - have 152 acres on the bank of South Yadkin River near the said Harden, John Evans, Thomas Bean & Joseph Orten, for 29 pounds, witnessed by John Guffy & Thomas Bean & proved by the latter in Nov. 1797. (This had been granted the said Harden by the State in 1779.)

Iredell Co.N.C., book D page 421 Nov.16 1801, William Wallace Black of Iredell Co.N.C. (no wife signs)-lets Henry Ferrel of Campbell Co.Va., have 100 acres on Middle Fork of Rockey River at the mouth of a large branch next the old survey of --- Harden & William Harden, for \$200.00, witnessed by Rd.King & William Harden & acknowledged in Nov.1801. (This was originally granted to John Archibald in trust for the legatees of deceased Robert Harden on Oct.25 1786, & said Legatees let John Griffith have it on Nov.30 1797, he let William Kennedy have on Jan. 6 1798 & he let W.W.Black have July 27 1801).

Aug. 2 1785: The will of Robert Harden is proved by Thomas Morris. Jeanne Harden & John Archibald are the Exrs.

May 10 1770: The will of James Erwyn proved by Alexr. McCorkle. It appointed Andrew Neal as Exr., but he resigned so Agness & Joseph Erwyn qualified & gave a 600 pound bond with John Houston & Robert Tate as their securities. An inventory of the estate was returned by Admrs. on May 12 1770,

Account of Sale of the estate of James Erwyn, deceased, is returned by Agness Lowther & Joseph Erwyn on Aug. 15 1770. It amounted to £16-10-7 1/2.

Feb. 13 1771: Isaac Erwyn Orphant Son of James Erwyn Dcd. came into Open Court and Chose William Erwyn as his Gardian which was Approved of by the Court & his Security is James Patterson B Smith in the Sum of £150.

Feb. 15 1771: Mary & Isabell Erwyn, orphans of "James Erwy" choose James Patterson as guardian who gives 100 pound bond with John Houston & Robert Woods as his security. Feb. 4 1773: The estate of James Erwin, by Joseph Erwin paid Alexr. Cowin P account £17.13.1; paid David Crow a legacy on behalf of his wife £17.17.6 3/4; paid John Neely P account £1.3.1; paid Patrick Jack account £1.9.0; paid John Cowen account £2.3.0; P 6 days at court on estate £0.13.0; total £40.7.7-3/4.

Constables: Matthew Gillespie is succeeded by John Haggins on Jan. 19 1757; John Haggins is succeeded by Joseph Irwin on Jan. 17 1758; April 17 1759: "Ordered that Robt. Hardin Serve as Constable this Ensueing year, in the Room of Joseph Irwin".

Argelius Hardin

Iredell Co.N.C., book 2 page 145: The will of Argelios Hardin made Aug. 20 1830 if he should not return from the West. Wants Uncle Samuel Williams to have \$50.00, to collect the notes &c & divide between sisters Adlai & Meriah--Adlai is to have the land on the east side of the branch after Mother's death & Samuel is to have the land on the west side as above.

N.C.History (Lewis Publishing Company) Vol.Iv. page 72: Dr. William C.Greene of Wilkesboro, N.C., born Dec. 3 1842 in Alexander Co.N.C., son of John B.Greene of Rutherford Co.N.C., who had moved to Alexander County (in merchandise business with his brother Cromwell) & died here aged nearly 80 years, by wife Jane Redman (daughter of Hosea Redman by wife Lucretia Williams) who died aged 91 years by whom also had: Lucretia Adeline, Martha Jane, Emma & Arthur Judson--five.

Robert Harden (Middle Fork of Rockey Creek)




HARDING

Harding is a name of Gothic origin, in use at an early period in Scandinavia and Britain prior to the introduction of the ancient feudal system. Several bearing this name are mentioned in the Domesday Book in 1086.

Burke in his General Armory gives no less than 15 distinct coats-of-arms by name of Hardin or Harding, several of which have simplicity enough to have been displayed in the Holy Wars, A. D. 1096-1291, when heraldry was in its infancy.

A Reverend Stephen Harding was rector of Trinity Church, Stratford-upon-Avon, at the time Shakespeare was buried, as is recorded upon a brass tablet in the Church.

The Harding family of Upcott, near Barnstable, had their seat at a very early period at Comb Martin, in Devonshire, and derive their descent from Fritz (son of) Harding. Of this family was the learned Theo. Harding, D.D., and probably Lady Gorgas, wife of Sir Robert, and not improbably the New England emigrant ancestors, no less than six of whom were in Massachusetts before 1650.

Abraham Harding, born in England, 1620, son of John, was living in Boston, Mass., 1640.
