Book 15 page 44: Dr. John Hall & wife Sarah, give Joseph Hall, a planter, have as gift & 5 pounds, on April 7 1797, 51 acres on Beaverdam Branch of South Yadkin next Robert Tate's old corner & Samuel Luckey witnessed by William Lowry & Daniel Jackson in may term 1797 & proved by Wm. Lowry. (This is part of a large tract granted to John Hall on Nov. 12 1795).

Feb. 2 1779: The will of Robert Tate is proved by James Gray (a witness). Samuel Lowry, Samuel Young & the widow, Rebecca Tate, relinquish their legacies. The widow & Samuel Luckey qualify as Exrs. under 2000 pound bond. William Armstrong, John Luckey & James Brandon Sr. (or two of them) are to appraise the estate. The will in Book B page 93: wife Rebecca, daughter Rebeccah & son John. Exrs: Samuel Young & Samuel Lowry. Witnesses: James Gray, Robt. Lowry & Samuel Lowry. A codicil witnessed by Samuel Young.

His father, Dr. Robert, died leaving two young children: Samuel & Robert who went to live with their maiden aunts after the marriage of their mother to Judge Samuel Lowrie (son of Robert & Elizabeth Lowrie) was a native of Delaware but educated in Rowan under Dr. James Hall. Died 1818.

The will of Henry Eakle Sr. (book G page 249) made Sept. 28 1816, mentions among others; George Lowry. (Clemmonsville section, over.)

May 9 1789: Deed of gift from Samuel Lowry to William Lowry for sundries, May 5 1789 is proved by John Tate.

Book 8 page 307 shows that Samuel Lowrey of Rowan Co. N.C. (planter), for 5 shillings but more especially out of "Paternal Love & regard which I do Bear unto him" to John Lowrey, some land on N. bank of Fourth Creek next the claims of George Marlin & John Culbertson & land of Andrew Shields. Do not see how many acres, but it is part of an entry from Earl Granville, & the gift is witnessed by John Culbertson & James Gray in May 1775.

Book 8 page 306 shows another from him to Andrew Shields a "Taylor" next that of John Luckie on N. bank of Fourth Creek & Mathew Long. It is as above & witnessed by the same men on the same date.

Book 8 page 307 shows that Saml Lowry lets James Gray (a planter) have for 27 pounds proclamation money, land on S. bank of Fourth Creek witnessed by Saml Young & Andrew Kerr in May 1775--no amount stated.

James Gray is a tory in Capt. Wm. Willson's district in 1778, (as is Samuel Lowry Sr.).

Book 18 page 542: On May 2 1803, John Rumbol of Cabarrus Co. N.C.--no wife signs & he writes like a foreigner--lets Francis Overcast of Rowan Co. N.C., have 287 acres on Coddle Creek next Phillip Rumble, an old field & Jacob Overcast, for \$179.00, witnessed by John Houston, Phillip Rumble & Jacob Overcast & proved by Phillip Rumble in May 1803. (This is part of a tract Alexander Worke let John Rumble have).

Book 18 page 543: April 2 1801, Alexander L. Worke of Iredell Co. N.C.--no wife signs, lets John Rumble of Cabarrus Co. N.C. have 312 acres for \$360.50--part of tract Philip Slough bought of James Lowrey & James Lowrey let Edward Lowrey have.

Minute Docket April 1809: Edward Jones & Samuel Lowry (guardians of Alex. L. Worke) vs Alexr. Lock, John Brandon & wife Esther, Wm. Beatty & wife Isabella, & Alexr. McCorkle, about the will of Alexr. Worke Sr.'s will being valid. Robert Worke & wife Mary, Abraham Alexander & wife Jane, Alexr. Worke & Wm. Means (for his children) decline to contest it. Case #33. Will is all right.

Aug. 6 1795: William Lowry is chosen by Margaret (orphan of Andrew Shields) to be her guardian as she is of lawful age, and he gives bond of 100 pounds with William Young as security.

The will of William Lowry (Book 6 page 24) made March 14 1811 probated--wife Elizabeth. Nine children. Exrs: wife, Richard Gillespie & Wm. Gray. Witnesses: Samuel Robinson & Samuel M. Thrift?

Feb. 8 1794: "William Lowry from 2d. Creek-bridge to Dickey's mill" appointed overseer of the road.

Aug. 3 1795: "Isaac Cowan from Second Creek Bridge to Dickey's Mill" appointed overseer of the road.

The will of James Fisher (Book E page 164) made Aug. 6 1795, makes his friend Thomas Gray of Iredell Co., James McNeely (son of John), & his widow Esther Fisher his Exrs.

Book 16 page 518: On May 22 1798, John Beatey & wife Margaret of Mecklenburg Co. N.C., let Alexander Penny of Rowan, have 200 acres on Buffalo Creek next James Haggins, James Gibson, said Penny & John Haggins, for 100 pounds cash, witnessed by Charles Beatey & George Gibson & proved by the latter in Feb. term of 1799. (This land had been granted Charles Lowry by the State on Oct. 16 1783). Book 9 page 609: Oct. 10 1783, The State grants (1797 at 50 shillings the 100 acres) to Charles Lowry 200 acres on Buffalo Creek next John Barkley, Alexander Penny & John Haggins.

Book 23 page 409: On April 22 1815, George Lowry--no wife signs--lets Daniel Chrisman (both of Rowan Co. N.C.) have 3 acres on the Yadkin River in forks of the road leading from where Peter Clemmons Sr. now lives to his bridge & on to Salem, for \$210.00, witnessed by Jacob Leonard & John Clemmons & proved by the latter in May 1815. (this appears to be part of Peter Clemmons Sr.'s land). See Henry E. ... section about Clemmonsville.

Book 13 page 723: NOV. 27 1793, the State grants 219 1/2 acres on north side of Third Creek next William Lowry, William Cowan & John Tate at 50 shillings the 100 acres.

Book 33 page 486: Nov. 2 1837, Susanna Robly lets James Watson (both of Rowan Co. N.C.) have 61 acres next Elizabeth A. Lowry, --- Benson, James Watson & the road, for \$130.00 witnessed by J. Marlin & S. Marlin & proved by the latter in May 1838.

Book 28 page 111: Dec. 8 1824, Alexander Locke--no wife signs--lets James Huie (both of Rowan Co.N.C.) have 45 acres on the south bank of Grants Creek next said Huie, --- Nesbett & --- Locke, for \$180.00, witnessed & proved by James Martin Jr. in Feb. 1825.

Book 33 page 332: Aug. 4 1837, James Huie--no wife signs--lets Richard Lowrie (both of Rowan Co.N.C.) have 146 acres on Grants Creek (which said Huie bought of John Smith on Oct. 9 1828); 45 acres (which said Huie bought of Alexander Locke on Dec. 8 1824); 324 acres (which said Huie bought of Francis, William B. & John Lock on Feb. 25 1825) & 363 acres (the greaterpart of which said Huie bought of Francis, William B., & John Lock & the remainder from Alexander Lock), for \$5000.00, witnessed by D.F.Caldwell & acknowledged in Aug. 1837. Wife Elizabeth. Five sisters: Margaret Hall, Isabella Marlin, Lydia VanSaton, Elizabeth Patterson & Nancy Davidson.

Buried about four miles west of Salisbury: Richard Lowry died Oct. 25 1854 aged 53 years; William B. Lowry (son of R. & E. Lowry) died Feb. 6 1853 aged 14 yrs. 8 mos. & 11 days;

The will of Nathan Neely (book H page 421) made April 8 1828. Brothers: Alexander, Arthur & Washington. Sisters: Elizabeth, Rebecca, Polly & Temperance. Others: Elizabeth Lowry (the infant of Elizabeth who is now the wife of James Patterson) gets a plantation on Third Creek; & Nathan Neely (son of sister Betsy). Exr: Robert N. Fleming.
