



## One Line of Bates Men

[Contributed to GENEALOGY.]

By Mrs. E. B. Grosvenor

Of the Bates country, England, whence sprang this line of men who are "farmers all," Katherine Lee Bates says: "On midsummer noon these green levels of South Kent lie fair and tranquil, gleaming with warm sunshine. Gulls sail over the broad meadows where cattle and sheep are grazing. Glossy rooks promenade, brown hares scuttle, swallows dip and wheel. Lydd, once a member of the Cinque Port of Romney, lies only four miles from the sea which we all have an ancestral right to love." . . "Permanent barracks are established just outside the town—an artillery camp."

In the Domesday Book, in that part called the Bolden Book, a survey of the Palatinate of Durham made in 1183, it is recorded in the medieval Latin: "Obertus Bate tenet 17 bovat," etc. In the reign of Edward I., 1272-1307, a survey was made, which gives the land of one "John Bates" and others of that name. An account of the chamberlain and church warden, 1428 to 1484 and 1520 to 1558, Church of All Saints, Kent county, Lydd, England, mentions the family of Bates as having been "important in Lydd for three hundred years"; speaking of "Wm. Bate in 1429" and "Andrew Bate, a farmer under the Abbott of Battle." The poem, Vision of Piers Ploughman, written about 1362, speaks of "Bette the Bocher" and of

Of the Bates country, England, whence orang this line of men who are "farm-ars all." Katherine Lee Bates says: "On therewith."

The interchange of spelling Bette and Batte, Bette and Bate, as derivatives of Bartholomew's son or Batson, did not survive the earliest times. Some authorities derive the name from Bartholomew's son, and some insist that it comes from the old Saxon word "bate," which means "contention." The Reverend N. W. Bates says: "In the form of Bate, the name was common in England for several centuries, changing gradually and becoming fixed as Bates in America about the time of the Revolution." An inscription in the Church of All Saints, Lydd, on which the date is "Ye 6 day of September 1567," reads thus: ". . . Bate of that ancient family in the towne of Lydd." In an out of print book, Lydd and Its Church, owned by Mr. A. Butler of Lydd, is mentioned an epitaph, . . . Bate-Gent-and of the most ancient house," the date being "April ye 16 1642."

1.—The type. John Bates, October 25, 1415, was legendary soldier at the battle of Agincourt. In Shakespeare's Henry V, Act IV, Scene 1, John Bates says, "I do not desire that he (the king) should answer for me, yet I am determined to

fight lustily for him."

2.—The father. Thomas Bate was the son of one John Bate not recorded. He was born in Lydd, Kent county, and married Margaret —. He died in 1485. His sons were John and William. October 19, 1485, Thomas Bate made his will, mentioning ,with affection, his wife Margaret and his family, to whom he bequeathed his worldly goods. The abstract of this will was proved and a record of it kept in the archives of the cathedral at Canterbury, where all the records of the town of Lvdd were deposited prior to the year 1542.

4.—The zealot. Andrew Bate, son of Its roots in old earth, its crown in the John Bate (3), was born in Lydd. He died in 1533 and was buried "next his wife." His children were: Joan, Simeon, William, John, Katherine and Thomas. He was a "farmer of Dangemarsh." Following the example of his father, he also "gives liberally" to the "church in the towne of Lydd, the County of Kent, in the Parish of All Hallows," described in 1907 as "that church, whose square grey pinnacled tower, weathered and grave dominates the view, so long the church of our forefathers, holds its ground superbly, timeworn but beautiful."

5.—The jurat. John Bate, son of Andrew Bate (4), was born in Lydd. He married Mildred Ward, October 28, 1546, and had: Mary, James, Thomas and Andrew. He was buried March 1, 1580. He was possessed of "sundry articles of furniture" and left his wife a fortune of £20. "The 'fair trade' [of smuggling] was the insurgent protest of the brave men of those times against the unjust laws. The men of the 'Marsh' all followed this 'fair trade' in the good old days; almost every church setting aside an aisle or chantry for a store house. 7.—The emigrant. Clement Bate, son of James (6) and Mary (Martine) Bate, was baptized in Lydd January 22, 1595. He married Ann — and had: James, Clement, Rachel, Joseph, Benjamin and Samuel. He died in Hingham, Mass., September 17, 1671. S. G. Drake in the Founders of New England," says, "6 Apriles 1635, Theis p'ties imbarqued in ye Elizabeth Mr Wm Stagg bound for New England p'r cert from the Justices and Ministers of ye p'ish. Signed, Clement Bate 40 Ann Bate his wife 40 also five children and two servants." In New England he acquired "my house lott contayning five acres, my planting lott, tenn acres, and my nowe dwelling house," all in "Hingham towne."

8.—The boy. Joseph Bate, son of Clement and Ann Bate, was born in Lydd in 1630. In Hotten's Lists of Emigrants is "Jos. Bates aged 5." "Oh how this boy's heart leaps up when he thinks of it! Once no sailors had dared sail far out of sight of land lest they should come to the edge of the world and fall over! And now it seems as if the old world itself was longing to move westward to meet the new, so many were the gallant captains and the brave sailors who faced dangers in unknown seas." \*

In Hingham Joseph Bate married Esther Hillard, January 9, 1657-58. He died April 30, 1706. His children were: Joseph, Esther, Caleb, Hannah, Joshua, Bathsheba, Clement, Elinor and Abigail.

9.—The executor. Joshua Bates, son of Joseph and Esther (Hilliard) Bates, was born in Hingham August 14, 1671. He married Rachel Tower, January 15, 1695. His children were: Rachel, Joshua, Bathsheba, Elizabeth, Solomon Isaac, Jacob. He died September 23, 1757. "He was an executor of estates, member of the school committee and a farmer. He paid taxes on a house, 2 acres of farm, 6 acres of pasture, 2 horses, 2 oxen, 5 cows, 4 bbls. of cyder and 4 slaves of 12 years and over." So says The History of the Town of Cohasset.

10.—The constable. Jacob Bates, son of Joshua and Rachel (Tower) Bates, was born in Hingham August 20, 1710. He married Mary Lincoln Clark, a descendant of the emigrant Samuel Lincoln, November 19, 1730. His children were: Mary, Rachel, Simeon, Obediah, James, Lydia, Elijah, John, Jacob, Israel, Elizabeth. In The History of Cohasset is a list of his taxable property and a statement that he was also a farmer and, in 1745, a constable. He had a "little piece of meadow lying at Conyhassett, being about one acre." "The name

11.—The minute man. Israel Bates, Sackett's Harbor, N. Y., where he was son of Jacob and Mary Lincoln (Clark) Bates, was born in Hingham April 15, 1753. He married Mary Cooper, January 27, 1774, and died in Barr, N. Y., January 11, 1844. "Israel Bates appears in a copy of an order on Ephraim Newell, town treasurer of Attleboro dated July 5, 1775, for wages due said Bates and others for services on an alarm caused by the battle of Bunker Hill." This is from the Record Index to the Military Archives of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts, which also gives the names and dates of five other battles, in which this minute man took part. A tradition survives to this effect: "General Putnam disguised tried to pass the sentry Bates without the proper word; to test his fidelity. The General was heard to compliment the vigilance of Bates even before he himself recovered from the results of the encounter." He had these children:
