Book 12 page 139: Sept. 9 1788, Jeremiah Green, a planter & wife Mary let the yeoman, Conrod Grub--all of Rowan Co. N.C.--have 181 acres on Abbotts Creek next George Grub, land lately surveyed for Hugh McCrary, & Barnet Michael, for 60 pounds, witnessed by Joanna Eggers, Landrine Eggers & Nicholas Mickle & proved by the last named in Nov. ----. (The State granted this to him on Oct. 10 1783).

In 1784, Jeremiah Green is listed as having 181 acres & 1 white poll in the company of Capt. Carson--his name appears between Peter Beaker & Lewis McCartney.

Book 13 page 513: March 21 1788, Richard Green, a planter & wife Elenor let Thomas Harper--all of Rowan Co.N.C.--have 260 acres on the waters of Potts Creek, beginning on the line of Gershim Hunt on the said creek at a hickory & going east 200 poles to a white oak saplin on the corner of Yost Cope, north 192 poles to a stake in the line of John Ford, west 220 poles to a hickory on the corner of John Ford, south 18 poles to a hickory saplin, west 39 poles to the corner of Gershom Hunt on the said creek, south 10 degrees east 170 poles down the said creek to the beginning, for 350 pounds specie, witnessed by Jacob Wiseman & John Ford & proved by the latter in Feb. 1794. (This is part of the 541 acres which Esq. Henry McCulloch let Jeremiah Green have by sale & he willed this to the abovesaid Richard Green.)

Book 12 page 631: Feb.9 1792, William Fanning --no wife signs--lets Jarret Fitz Jerrel have 100 acres on Potts Creek next Joseph Smith, on a branch & crossing a larger branch, for 100 pounds, witnessed by Laban Hartley & Richard Wilson & proved by the latter in Feb. 1792. (This is part of the State Grant of 566 acres granted Joseph Smith on Oct. 10 1783).

(This is part of a large tract formerly owned by Richard Green)

Book 25 page 106: March 6 1817, Samuel Dusenbury of Rowan Co.N.C.--no wife signs--lets Martin Trantham of ---- have 184 1/2 acres on both sides Potts Creek next --- Foarde, --- Hunt & Samuel Harper, for \$1200.00, witnessed by George Snider Sr. & acknowledged in Feb. 1819. (This is a subdivided part of a large tract which had belonged to Richard Green).

Duff Green

The Paynes of Virginia (by Col. Brooke Payne, U.S.A., in 1937) page 111: #17, Eliza Ann Payne "(d.4) b. 18 Mch 1806 at "Clifton", Fq. Co.; m. Duff Green of Falmouth, Va., 23 Dec 1824 at "Clifton", Rev. John Jones officiating; d. 27 June 1876 at Falmouth; buried at "Ridgeway", a farm three miles N. of Falmouth on W.S. of State Highway. Her grave is in the family burying-ground about one quarter of a mile from the highway. This farm is at present owned by R.C.Moncure; the old residence has long since disappeared, leaving barely a trace of its foundation. Mrs. Green's grave, that of her husband, and that of her son Col. William James Green are together and are marked by marble headstones. Mr. and Mrs. Green had 10 children, named below; the family is well represented today in Fredericksburg, Va.

GREEN

Duff Green was b. 1792 and d. 24 Jany 1854 at his residence in Falmouth. He was a native of Cu.Co.; settled early in life in Falmouth as a merchant and manufacturer; and was extensively known as a gentleman of high character and standing, and as a most successful business-man. He commanded a militia company in Falmouth, as his father-in-law had done. About two years after his marriage he lived at "Belmont", known later as Ficken's Hill, and lately the residence of the artist Gari Melchers. He had a sister Eliza who m. 1798 William A.Lane; a brother John Strother who m(I) 1812 Lavinia Jett, (II) Mrs. Jones, and moved to Mississippi; and a brother Jones who m. 1821 Susan E.M.Scott, dau. of Frances S.S.(Payne) Scott (12). They were children of James Green and w. Betsy Jones, son of James Green and w. Elizabeth Jones of Cu. Co., son of Robert Green (1695-1748) of Cu.Co., and w. Eleanor Dunn. Robert had among others Col.John Green of the Revolution (@ 1730-1793) who m. Susannah Blackwell and had Robert Green, Lieut. of Va. Line during the Revolution, who m. 1787 Frances Edmonds of Fq. Co. and d. 1789, leaving a dau. Susan Eliza (b. 9 Jany 1789) who m. Robert Payne (D-VII-32). Robert Green had also Nicholas Green of Ma. Co. who m. Elizabeth Price, and whose children moved to Kentucky, among whom was a son John who m. Jenny Hawking and had Morton, who m. Eliza Spencer and had a dau. Sallie who m. Robert Payne (B-Vi-100). Robert Green had too a son Moses who m. Mary

- o Page 187; Nathan Jenks, M.D., was Registrar & Historian of the Society of Colonial Wars of the State of Michigan. Page 189: Nathan Jenks, of Detroit, Michigan, joined that society as #48 (general society #3432) as 7th in descent from Governor Joseph Jenckes.

Society of Colonial Wars 1897-1898, page 493: Joseph Jenckes 2d. (1658-1717), was Governor's Assistant of Rhode Island 1650, et seq. (Only George P. Lawton page 82, joined on his services)

Page 82: George Perkins Lawton of Saratoga Springs, joined the New York society as #736 (general society #1587), as 8th in descent from Obadiah Holmes, William Baldwin, President John Coggeshall, President & Governor Nicholas Easton & William Ballard; 7th in descent from George Lawton, Deputy-Governor John Coggeshall 2nd, Joshua Coggeshall, Governor John Easton, Edward Thurston, Edward Smith, Governor Joseph Jenckes 2d., John Brown, William Wedell & Robert Hazard; 6th in descent from Joseph Jenckes 2d., Isaac Lawton, Edward Gray & Benjamin Hall & 5th in descent from William Anthony.

Page 493: Joseph Jenckes (1650-1740), was Deputy Governor of Rhode Island 1715-1727; Governor in 1727 & for five years; Major of the Main. (Those joining on his services were George P. Lawton page 82 & Lucius Waterman page 272.)

Page 272: the lines of descent for Lucius Waterman, D.D. are given elsewhere & as he was the Chaplain of the New Hampshire society--see page 124 of Colonial Wars 1903-1906--that James Lewis Harris, as #2942 of New Hampshire society may have inherited the honor, since I do not find his lines given.

Sons of American Revolution, page 597: Samuel James Beals of St. Paul, Minn., joined that society as #3301, son of Samuel James Beals by Susan Burrill (Greene); grandson of William Ray Greene by Susan Arnold (Burrill); great-grandson of Samuel Ward Greene by Polly (Nightingale) & of James Burrill Jr. by Sally (Arnold); great-great-grandson of William Green, Chief Justice & Governor of Rhode Island, & of Joseph Nightingale, Major-General of the Rhode Island Militia, & of Jonathan Arnold, Member of Continental Congress & Surgeon of the Continental Army.

Colonial Families of the United States: Polly Rhodes Nightingale, born Nov. 18 1772 died April 10 1835, (daughter of Joseph Nightingale, born Sept. 16 1748 died in Providence R.I. Nov. 3 1797, married Dec. 27 1769, Elizabeth Corliss, born 1750, died Jan. 1 1837, the daughter of Capt. George Corliss.) The Nightingale family is taken back to William Nightingale born 1637 & includes another daughter of Capt. Geo. Corliss, Gregory Belcher, William Brown &c. Colonial Families of U.S. 1907 page 211 gives Governor William Greene's line back to England--he was born March 16 1695 & married Dec. 30 1790. Catharine Greene (a daughter of Benjamin 3, Thomas 2, John 1. of possibly another family). This also shows another Arnold connection from the Englishman Robert; Governor William Greene, above mentioned, had a brother, Samuel, born Oct. 22 1700 who was a Lieutenant of the Militia & died Sept. 15 1780, who married Feb. 17 1724, Sarah Coggeshall of East Greenwich, R.I., (a descendant of John Coggeshall of Essex, England who came to Boston in 1632), by whom he had a daughter, Almy, born Sept. 8 1727, who married March 11 1762 Oliver Arnold. Lieutenant Samuel Greene & Sarah Coggeshall had a grandson, Caleb Greene, born June 1772 died Dec. 4 1853, who married March 8 1795, Sarah Robinson Greene (daughter of Thomas 5, Richard 4, Richard 3, Thomas 2, John 1,) & had a son Benjamin Robinson Greene, born May 22 1798, died Sept. 8 1839, who married Dec. 11 1820, Mary Gorton Arnold.

Moody & acknowledged in May 1854.

Book 40 page 38: May 2 1853, Christopher Goodman & wife? Mealey or Amelia let Noah Canup Jr. (all of Rowan Co. N.C.) have their interests in 280 acres where father, Noah Canup lived & died leaving 12 representatives &c.

Book 47 page 132; April 3 1873, Thomas Henderson & wife Ellen let Spencer Green--all of Rowan Co. N.C.--have on the north side of Church St. between Liberty & Kerr Streets next --- Henderson & the colored people's graveyard, for \$1.00

Page 414: William Anthony, (1676-1759), was Governor's Assistant of Rhode Island 1717-1722-1730; Deputy 1709-1716-1717 & Captain 1716-1717. (Those joining on his services were George P. Lawton & William H. Watson, pages 83 & 127 respectively.)

Page 126-7: William Henry Watson, M.D., Regent of the University of the State of New York, & of Utica, joined the New York society as #374 (general society also #374), as 9th in descent from Lieutenant William Baulstone, Francis Cooke & John Brown 1st; 8th in descent from Ensign John Brown 2d., Major John Mason, Captain Edward Richmond, Stukeley Westcott, Capt. The Rev. Miles (Myles) Greene married (1) Elizabeth Hunt (born 1769, died 1809), daughter of Capt. Judkins Hunt, of the Revolution, October 15, 1789. They had, among other children, Peter B. (born 1795; died in Houston County, Ga., June, 1836), who married Sarah Ingram (1804-1889), in 1823. The Rev.
