

N.C.Biographical History (published by Lewis Co.) pages 270-1, under heading of Dr. Richard Barr Adams (& his son Dr. Minor Revere Adams) of cool Springs Iredell Co.N.C.: "Mary Elizabeth Gracey, who died in 1913, was his wife. She was educated at the famous Salem Academy, and her children, of whom there were nine, seven still living, knew and loved her as one of the finest types of womanhood and mother hood. The Gracey family has been identified with this part of north Carolina even longer than the Adamses, since the year of 1752. It was founded by Patrick Gracey, a native of the north of Ireland, who brought his family to North Carolina in 1752, locating in what is now Iredell County. His son, Capt. Robert Gracey, grandfather of Mary Elizabeth, was a gallant officer in the Revolutionary War, serving with the rank of captain in the North Carolina troops. His body is buried in the cemetery of Old Bethany Church north of Statesville. Capt. Robert Gracey was born and reared at Cool Springs, about eleven miles east of Statesville. Mary Elizabeth Gracey was the daughter of James Barnet and Clementine (Hall) Gracey. Her mother was a niece of the famous Dr. James Hall, reference to whom is made in a sketch of the Hall family of Iredell County found on other pages".

"The Adams family was established in what is now Iredell County in 1764. What has usually been called in American school books the French and Indian war had been concluded only a year before the Adams family came to North Carolina. The founder of the name was James Adams, a native of the north of Ireland. Leaving that country in 1760, after a voyage of seven weeks and three days, he landed at Philadelphia and subsequently moved to Carlisle, Pennsylvania, and from there to Augusta County, Virginia. Then in 1764 he came to old Rowan, now Iredell County, North Carolina. His early work there was as a teacher. This pioneer had a son also named James Adams, who was the father of Dr. Richard Barr Adams. James Adams, second, married Amelia Barr. John Richard Barr Adams was born April 7, 1820, in what was then known as Liberty Neighborhood in Sharpsburg Township, Iredell County. He was educated in the common schools and in Davidson College, entering the latter institution in 1837, the second year after it was founded. After four years of Davidson he went to Alabama, taught school near Selma and also began reading medicine. His medical education was finished in the University of New York, where he graduated in 1844. Returning to his native state he began practice at what was called County Line at the eastern edge of Iredell County, and in 1849 moved to another locality in the eastern part of the county, Cool Spring. Here he continued his work as a country physician, taking long rides and enduring all the hardships and trials of practice until October, 1890. Giving up his profession, he removed to Statesville, where he died June 9, 1901. He had practiced medicine forty-five or six years, and no amount of statistics could properly estimate the value

of his services. He was also active in civic organizations. During in 1851-52 he represented Tredell County in the House of Commons. During in life he united with the Presbyterian Church, and in 1854 was elected ruling elder of the Fifth Creek Presbyterian church. He was one of its most liberal contributors and staunch supporters. Outside of his profession one of his strongest interests was the matter of local history. He knew personally or by his researches all the more prominent characters of his section of the state and came to be regarded as a storehouse of historical wisdom. Mary Elizabeth Gracey, who died in 1818, was his wife. His son, Dr. Minor Revere Adams, born Oct. 14 1854, married Miss Lulu M. Rhyne (daughter of Hugh T. Rhyne of Rhyne Station, McCullough Co. They have children: Sarah Gracey & Minor Revere Adams Jr.

Wilson, 1545 Walnut Hill Circle, Birmingham, Ala., on the Adams Family—John Adams, second President of the United States, was born in that part of Braintree now known as Quincy, Mass., October 19, 1735. He died July 4, 1826. He was the eldest son of John Adams and Susanna Boylston, and was a direct descendant of Henry Adams, of Braintree. John Quincy Adams, eldest son of President John Adams and Abigail Smith Adams (1744-1818), was born in Braintree, July 11, 1767, and died at Washington, D. C., February 23, 1848. He received the name "Quincy" from his maternal grandfather, Col. John Quincy. Samuel Adams, the patriot and orator, was born in Boston, Mass., September 27, 1722. He was a direct descendant of Henry Adams, of Braintree, through Joseph Adams, of Braintree. Capt. John Adams, of Boston, and Samuel Adams, of Boston. I am a descendant of the Adams family. If you will write James Payton Adams, of Wise, Va., I think he has the Adams family records.—MRS. ETHEL BIBB, Thomasville, Ga.

TATUM, ADAMS, NELSON—I would like information concerning the ancestry of Susan Tatum (Statam or Staham), who married Samuel Greenbury (Greenberry) Adams in Georgia. When was she born? Who were her parents, and from what section of the country did they originally come? Samuel G. Adams (born May 15, 1810, in Virginia), was the son of John Jefferson Adams (died July 25, 1840). Where did John J. Adams die? Who was his wife? Where did he settle?

Samuel G. Adams was 2 years old when he was brought to Georgia. He had the following brothers: Niper, Brack and Josh. About 1855 Samuel G. Adams moved to Alabama. He and Susan Tatum had the following children: William H. Duncan (born September 28, 1830), Charles Wooten (born March 19, 1832), James Nelson (born November 23, 1833), John Jefferson (born May 28, 1835), Samuel Green (born February 28, 1837), Jepa Richard (born February 1, 1841), Ann Elizabeth (born March 31, 1843), Mary Jane (born June 6, 1839), and Susan F. (born August 1, 1845).

Ann Elizabeth Adams married Simeon Worrell Melton, son of Jesse Melton and Nancy Worrell. After the death of his wife, Susan Tatum, Samuel G. Adams married (2) June 9, 1854, Delilah Melton, daughter of Jesse Melton and Nancy Worrell. What is the ancestry of these parents of Delilah Melton? What is the connection between Samuel G. Adams and James Nelson, of South Carolina? Was Samuel's mother the daughter or sister of this James Nelson?

ADAMS-WHITCOMB—Information is desired as to the main family line, birthplace and early home, family connections, etc., of John Adams, born in Massachusetts or Connecticut. I think (about 1773) he was married to Lois Whitcomb, and their children were named Elbridge Gerry (born about 1798), Gardner, Clotilda (Mrs. Green) and John Everett (born 1817). This family moved from Massachusetts or Connecticut about 1805 to Savannah, Ga., sojourning there for a while and then moving back to the North, where they remained for an unknown period. They moved to Atlanta, Ga., about 1824, where the children mentioned resided and married. This John Adams died, evidently about 1818, and the children were adopted by an uncle and aunt. I desire to learn the names of this uncle and aunt. The dates given are approximate, except as to the birth of John Everett. The Elbridge Gerry Adams, eldest son of the John Adams referred to, is my mother's grandfather. History of Bucks County Pa. (by) page 963: "JOSEPH SWARTZLANDER, P.O. Yardley, was born at Swartzlander's mill property (now Sterners), in Southampton township, January 1. 1812. The first history of the family in America begins with Philip, who came from Steinhart in Swartzwald, Germany. He started with his wife and two children in 1752, and was five months on the voyage. Owing to the failure of water and supplies sickness occurred, and his wife and all the children on the ship died at sea except Barbara, aged seven, and Gabriel, aged five; the latter the grandfather of the subject of this sketch. Philip and his children settled in New Britain township, this county, near the Baptist church, and the former married Margaret Angel, by whom he had, as far as known, two children, Conard and Philip, Jr. The second wife's children afterward went to North Carolina, and one to Rock Island county, Ill., and married an Adams. Philip, Sen., was buried at New Britain Baptist church in 1784. Gabriel, son of Philip, was born March 11, 1747, came to this country in 1752 and died July 17, 1814. He married Salome Freed, nee Stout. They owned four hundred acres, now divided into farms and owned by Eli Nice, Oliver Jacoby, Samuel Carwithan, A. James Layman, Abraham Overholt, Nathaniel Kratz, Isaac Kratz, Jacob Bergey and Jonas Bergey. The old homestead is now owned by Jacob Bergey. The children of Gabriel Swartzlander were: John, Magdaline, Jacob, Margaret, Catherine, Abraham (died young), Joseph, Philip (died young) and David. Among these children Gabriel divided his property as follows: To Joseph he gave Jacoby's mill, also Nice's and Bergey's farms; to David the homestead, Overholt, Layman and Hubbard farms; to John the farm now occupied by Samuel Carnithan; he gave money equal in amount to Jacob who went to Southampton, and to his daughters equal amounts with their brothers. John's children were Debora Delp and Anna Godshalk. Magdaline's (Kratz) children were: Catherine and Salome; Joseph's children were: Catherine, Abel, Elizabeth, Salome, Mary and Emily. David's children were: George, Susan, Jacob, John. Jacob, father of Joseph, our subject, married first Elizabeth Cope, by whom he had the following children: Abraham, Gabriel, Joseph & Salome. By his second wife, who was Elizabeth Moot, and is still living at Bustleton, aged 97 years, were: Emily, Clara, Wilhelmina and Harriet. David Swartzlander gave the corner-stone to the Tohickon Lutheran church in Bedminster. The old Swartzlanders were mostly German Baptists and some were Mennonites." See also more page 875 & page 1027: "FRED SWARTZLANDER, physician, P.O. Richboro, was born at Yardley, Bucks county, September 21, 1846, his parents being Joseph and Abigail W. (Rankin) Swartzlander. Philip Swartzlander, great-great-grandfather of our subject, was born at Friburg, in Swartzwald, Germany, and emigrated with his family to America, and located two miles north of Doylestown, on the Dublin road, opposite the old Abraham Delp property. with him came his son, Gabriel, five years of age, who was reared here, and married Salome Stout. Their original homestead was the Cope farm opposite Delp's, and they owned other tracts adjoining, among which was the Abraham Delp tract of 400 acres. They had six children: Jacob, John, David, Joseph, Margaret and Catherine. The last lived in Doyleston and died in Philadelphia. The oldest child, Jacob, was the grandfather of Fred."****
