Book 21 page 456: On Jan.30 1809, Elizabeth Hughes (the widow of Samuel Hughes deceased) & the other administrator's of his estate( Thomas Holmes & Francis Coupee) according to an arrangement made Jan.17 1805, let Lewis Beard have lot #59 in the great north square of Salisbury, witnessed by James Wilson & D? Jacobs in Feb. term of 1809. (This is one of seven lots which James Kerr let Michael Troy have, he let Henry Young have them, he let Margaret Debruel have on July 3 1793 & "the same having become the Estate of Sarah Ellis & Sovereign Ellis" who conveyed their part, #59, to Samuel Hughes on Jan.17 1806).

Book 10 page 502: On Oct. 21 1786, John Hopkiness(?) of Montgomery Co.N.C., lets Joseph Hughes of Rowan Co.N.C., have a negro, Jim of Jeen, (12 yrs. old), for 50 pounds, witnessed by Hudson Hughes & H.Young & proved by the latter in Nov. 1786.

Marriage bond: John Henry Petchey to Margret DBruh. (no date given) signed by Adlai Osborn.

Book 17 page 362: Aug. 6 1800, John Henry Petchey & wife Margaret "formerly Margt. DeBruel" of Rowan Co.N.C., let Elizabeth D. & Sarah Debruel (the daughters of said Margaret Petchey), have lots #52-54-55-58-59-60 & 62 in the north square of Salisbury, for 5 pounds, witnessed by John Beard & Alexander Long & proved by the latter in Aug. 1800. (These are the seven lots which James Kerr let Michael Troy have, he let Henry Young have & he let Margaret DeBruel have July 3 1793).

Book 23 page 135: On May 15 1811, Lewis Beard (as attorney of the Trustees of N.C.University) lets Thomas Hughs of Rowan Co.N.C., have 334 acres in Forks of Yadkin River (which had been sold him on Sept. 25 1805 by Col. Adlai Osborn then attorney of the Trustees of University) for \$751.00, as the highest bidder at public sale, being on both sides of the public road from Salisbury to Shallow Ford on main Yadkin next the tract which George Good got of McElhaney on the original line of McElhaney, witnessed by M.Troy & acknowledged in May 1811.

*Mr J.P. Johnson in some papers the name of the natural son of the child born when Mrs Hughes was put out of bed by the Quakers. He married & had a family*

Book 30 page 267: On Aug. 17 1828, Shelby Parker (in right of his wife who doesn't sign), mortgages to Joel Jenkins for \$150.00, his interest in the land & negroes of the deceased Thomas Hughes, also a horse, wagon, "Beauro", cupboard &c., unless he pays \$108.10 & interest in 6 months, witnessed & proved by Richmond Pearson in Aug. 1828. This land is 160 acres in the Forks of the Yadkin River next A.G.Carter & others (where the deceased Thomas Hughes formerly lived & which descended to his wife & other heirs-at-law); the negroes, Dan, Peter, Louy?, Hannah & her children Nell, Sarah & Eliza, had also belonged to deceased Thomas Hughes & came to Shelby Parker in right of his wife.

Book 26 page 636: May 21 1821, David Parker--no wife signs--lets Henry Sharp Parker & Thomas Hughes--all of Rowan Co.N.C.--have a mortgage on two tracts, one is next where he lives in the forks of the Yadkin River & Bear Creek, for \$745.62½, witnessed by John H. Freeling & Milas Parker & proved by the latter in Aug. 1821.

Book 9 page 659: On June 2 1796, Hudson Hughes of Rowan Co.N.C.--no wife signs--lets Benjamin Kiddle of the City of Charleston, (merchant), have 8 negroes: Benjamin (about 40 years old), Agy (about 30 years), Jacob (about 10 years), Ben (about 12 years), Rose (about 8 years), Betsy (about 3 years), Daphney (about 30 years) & Lawney? (about 21 years), for \$150.00, witnessed & proved by Joseph Chambers before Spruce Macay (Judge of Superior Court of Law & Equity).

Book 9 page 623: Oct.10 1783, The State grants (#578 at 50 shillings the 100 acres) to John Hughes acres on south side Hunting Creek on lower line of Elizabeth C ambell Buck Shoal Creek opposite the point of the rocks over

Book 10 page 172: On Feb. 26 1785, John Hughes--no wife signs--lets Samuel Young (both of Rowan Co. N.C.) have 400 acres on south side Hunting Creek next Elizabeth Campbel, on its bank opposite Buck Shoal Creek next the point of Rock & down the creek, for 70 pounds, witnessed by Samuel Young Jr. & John Kerr & proved by the latter in May 1785. (This is a State Grant through Gov. Alexr. Martin on Oct. 10 1783 & refers to page 165 where Samuel Willson deeds to William Willson, in some way).

Book 18 page 631: On Jan. 1 1802, Samuel Hughes--no wife signs--lets David Lindsey Ward--both of Rowan Co. N.C.--have 40 acres (or lot #4 out of his father's estate) on Hunting Creek next John Hanes, for 40 pounds, witnessed by Daniel Clay? & ? Cress & acknowledged in May 1802 by Samuel.

Page 632: On Same day, Thomas Hughes--no wife signs--lets David Lindsey Ward, both of Rowan Co. N.C., have lot #5 of his father's estate, or 40 acres on Hunting Creek, for 40 pounds, witnessed by N. & George Pearson & acknowledged by Thomas in May 1802.

Book 31 page 864: On March 2 1833, Samuel Hughes of Rowan Co. N.C., lets William R. Hughes of Rowan Co. N.C., have his interest in the estate of his deceased mother, Elizabeth Hughes, for \$100.00, proved by John H. Hester in May 1833.

Book 21 page 215: On Jan. 1 1807, Joseph Hughes of Person Co. N.C., lets Samuel Vanetten of Rowan Co. N.C. have 40 acres on Hunting Creek next Thomas Hughs, John Hamm & sd. Vanetten for \$110.00 witnessed by Frs. Neely & Benjn. Willson in Feb. term of 1808. (This is lot #6 of his father's estate which was left Joseph Hughes).

Book 9 page 108: On \_\_\_\_\_, Joseph Atkins, a "house Carpenter" now of Washington Co. N.C. but late of Salisbury, lets Joseph Hughes of Salisbury have lot #12 (144 sq. poles) in Salisbury in the great south square next Wake William Brandon on N.W., the other lots of Joseph Hughes on N.W. & N.E., for 570 pounds, witnessed by Mich Troy & B. Booth Boote & proved by the latter in May term of 1780. (This land had belonged to Esq. John Dunn who conveyed it to Joseph Atkins.)

Book 19 page 477: Joseph Hughes Sr. of Salisbury N.C. died intestate; his wife Mary died; the heirs Hudson, Samuel, Betsey (alias Aunt), Joseph Jr., Bird, Epps, Catharine. Bird went to South Carolina & died, so his brothers & sisters sell for \$200.00, to John McClelland of Salisbury

Book 20 page 100: On July 6 1808: Benjamin Tores (attorney of Catharine Pennington formerly Catharine Hughes) & Ezekiel Pennington of Rowan Co. N.C. let John McClelland have \_\_\_\_\_ acres on Crane Creek formerly occupied by Joseph Hughes Sr. (the part laid off for Catharine Hughes now Pennington as Devisee of Bird Hughes deceased who was an heir of the deceased Joseph Hughes Sr.) of Charleston S.C., for 37 pounds & 10 shillings witnessed by A.L. Osborn.

Book 23 page 69: On Nov. 17 1813, Lewis Beard & Albert Torrence report to Feb. Court of 1814 their division of the 6 lots of deceased Margaret Pitchy (62-54-60-52-58-55 in \_\_\_\_\_ square) by order of Nov. court 1813, among her heirs-at-law: lot #1 going to Elizabeth Hughes (lots 62 & 54); lot #60 to the heirs of Samuel Hughes (Jack, Samuel & William) being lot #60; to Julia Pitchy lot # \_\_\_\_\_ goes (being #58 & 55,) witnessed by Daniel Cress, John Fulton & ?

Book 13 page 406: On Aug. 28 1793, John Steele of Salisbury (no wife signs), lets Margaret DeBruill & her two daughters Elizabeth & Sarah DeBruill, have lot #2 in north square of Salisbury next Main St. & Edward Yarbrough, for 5 pounds, witnessed by Samuel Dayton & J. W. Petchey & proved by Samuel Dayton in Feb. 1794.

Book 13 page 848: On Dec. 3 1794, William Giles & wife Mary, let Sargeant Hughes have 1/2 of 529 acres in forks of Yadkin River next Caleb Osborn, --- McCulloch & Richmond Pearson, for 314 pounds, witnessed by Moses Husler? & Hudson Hughes & proved by latter in Feb. 1795. (This is part of the 529 acre tract granted by Earl Granville on Nov. 8 1757 to William Giles--William Giles let Phillip Williams have the other half & he let Richmond Pearson have it).

Book 6 page 382: On Oct. 27 1752, Earl Granville lets Edward Hughes, a planter of Anson Co. N.C., have 314 acres on the north bank of the Yadkin River on upper end of Fairfield, for 3 shillings, witnessed by James Conner & Henry Johnston & proved in April 1767.

Book 5 page 418: On July 20 1763, Edward Hughes--no wife signs--of Rowan Co. N.C., lets John Howard "Ordinary Keeper" of Salisbury Township, have for 80 pistoles, 314 acres on north bank of Yadkin River at the upper end of Fairfield, it "being Called & known by the Name of Fairfield", witnessed by William Nassery & George Magoune & proved in Jan. 1764 by William Nassery. (This was granted Edward Hughes on Oct. 27 1752).

Book 6 page 384: On April 15 1767, John Howard & wife Mary, let John Mitchell, have 314 acres on the upper end of Fairfield for --the release price being 80 pounds on next day, witnessed by James Conner & Henry Johnston & proved in April 1767. (Earl Granville let Edward Hughes have this & he sold it to John Howard on July 20 1763).

Book 7 page 270: Sept. 3 1763, George Sloan--no wife signs--lets William Erwin (both planters of Rowan) have 184 acres on N.E. side Yadkin next original tract (Part 331 acres Earl G. indentured to Edward Hughes) for 30 pounds Oct. 21 1757: Lease & release from John Waggoner to Anthony Fundenburg for 331 acres is acknowledged.

Book 2 page 276: On Jan. 13 1758, Anthony Fundenburg of Rowan Co. N.C.--no wife signs--lets George Sloan late of Pennsylvania, have 184 acres on the north-east side of the Yadkin River next the original tract, for 5 shillings--the release price being 20 pounds on next day--witnessed by Edward Hughes & David Jones & proved in Jan. 1758. (This is part of 331 acres granted Edward Hughes by Earl Granville).

Jan. 18 1758: Lease & release from Anthony Fundenburg to George Sloane for 184 acres Jan. 13-14 1758 is acknowledged.

Book 2 page 281: On Jan. 13 1758, Anthony Fundenburg lets Joseph Harrison--both men of Rowan Co. N.C.--have 147 acres, for 5 shillings; witnessed & prove as above--the release price being 30 pounds on the next day. (This is part of a tract which Earl Granville let Edward Hughes have on Jan. 28 1755).

Jan. 18 1758: Lease & release from Anthony Fundenburg to Joseph Harrison for 147 acres on Jan. 13-14 1758 is acknowledged.

Jan. 24 1756: Lease & release from Esq. Edward Hughes to John Waggoner for 331 acres is acknowledged.

Jan. 24 1756: Deed from Esq. Francis Corbin to Edward Hughes for 331 acres is proved.

Book 3 page 172: On Feb. 28 1755, Earl Granville lets Esq. Edward Hughes of Rowan Co. N.C., have 331 acres on the northeast side of the Yadkin River next two corners of Joseph Harriss's, for 3 shillings, witnessed by Richard Vigers & Esq. James Carter & proved by the latter on Jan. 20 1756 in Salisbury Courthouse.

Book 3 page 133: On Oct. 8 1755, Edward Hughes--no wife signs--lets John Waggoner Jr., both of Rowan Co. N.C., have 331 acres on the north east side of the Yadkin River next two corners of Joseph Harrison, for 5 shillings--the release price being 26 pounds on the next day--witnessed by George Cathey & Thomas Poole & proved on Jan. 20 1756 in Salisbury Courthouse. (Thos. Parker is Clerk of Court).

Book 12 page 711: On \_\_\_\_\_, Edward Hughes, mill-right, out of his affection for Susannah Stoner, gives her his goods & chattels now under his name, & his home, witnessed by Samuel Welsh, Daniel Latherman & John Adams & acknowledged in Aug. 1792.

Book 18 page 454: On Oct. 18 1802, Edward Hughes, a mill-right, lets Elizabeth Sluder (both of Rowan Co. N.C.) have his goods & chattels for to be paid reb. 15 1808, witnessed by Henry Cooper & Joseph Clarke & proved by the latter in Nov. 1802.

Jan. 14 1768: Deed from Vallentine Fry to John Smith for 150 acres Jan. 14 1768 is acknowledged.

Jan. 13 1767: Deed from "Edward Hughs Mill Wright to Vallintine Fry" for 150 acres Jan. 13 1767 proved by William Temple Cole.

Book 6 page 338: On Jan. 13 1767, Edward Hughes, "Mill Wright"--no wife signs--lets Voluntine Fry--both of Rowan Co. N.C.--have 150 acres on Abbotts Creek for 70 pounds, witnessed by William Temple Coles & James Robinson & proved in Jan. 1767. (This is part of 200 acres which Henry McCulloh let Edward Hughes have).

Deed from Esq. Henry McCulloh to Edward Hughes for 200 acres on Jan. 27 1763 is proved.

Book 5 page 264 On Jan. 27 1763, Edward Hughes, a planter of Rowan Co. N.C., gets 200 acres next George Heagey & Barnard Michael from for 16 pounds, witnessed by John Frohock & Hugh McCrary & proved Esq. Edward Hughes of Rowan Co. N.C.

Book 2 page 89: On April 15 1755, John Lynn lets Edward Hughes have 930 acres in Anson Co.N.C. on east side of Cataba River & on the path which leads from the Indian Nation to McDowells, for 5 shillings. (This had been Granted by patent to Carter & Lynn in April 9 1753).

Book 2 page : On April 18 1755, Dr. John Lynn of South Carolina, makes Major James Carter of Rowan Co.N.C., his attorney to sell two tracts of land--one on Grants Creek next John Tedd & one on Reedy Branch next Captain McCullough & Robert Johnston over to Robert Johnston's other tract in Orange Co. & on the south side of the Yadkin River a little above the mouth of Hunting Creek. *of carters very*

Book 2 page 61: April 17 1755, Esq. Edward Hughes--no wife signs--lets Esq. James Carter (both of Rowan Co.N.C.) have 930 acres in Anson Co.N.C. on the east side of the Cataba River on the path which leads from the Indian Nation to McDowell's, for 5 shillings--the release price being 30 pounds on next day--witnessed by John N.Oglethorpe & William Shepperd & acknowledged on April 19 1755

Book 18 page 324: On Nov. 2 1802, Edward Hughes--no wife signs--lets Peter Michael (both of Rowan Co.N.C.) have 50 acres next said Hughes, Leonard Miller--now belonging to Adam Hedrick, Barnabus Michael & George Hagey, for \$500.00, witnessed by John K.Carson & Thomas Carson & proved by the latter in Nov. 1802. (This is part of the 500 acres which Henry McCulloch let the said Hughes have on Jan. 3d of the 3d year of the reign of King George III)

Book 4 page 651: On June? 14 1761, Jonathan Williamson--no wife signs--lets Mar. Kimbrough (both of Rowan Co.N.C.) have 579 acres on the northwest side of the Yadkin, for 5 shillings--the release price being 100 pounds on the next day--witnessed by John Douthir Sr. & Jr. & proved in Jan. 1762. (Earl Granville let Esq. Samuel Daves have this on Sept. 20 1748, he let Joseph Toops have it on June 28 1750--see Anson Co., book A #1 folio 24 & 25--he let Edward Hughes have it on April 23 1752--also see Anson Co. book B #2 folio 181, 182 & 183--he let Jonathan Williamson have it on March 23 1758--see Rowan Co. book B pages 321 & 322).

Book 2 page 320: March 22 1758, Edward Hughes & wife Anne let Jonathan Williamson (all of Rowan Co.N.C.) have 579 acres on the northeast side of the Yadkin River on its bank, for 5 shillings--the release price being 100 pounds on the next day--witnessed by Elijah Skidmore & Abraham Creson & proved by the latter in April 1758. (Earl Granville let Esq. Samuel Davise have this Sept. 20 1748--registered in Anson Co.N.C. book A #1 folios 24 & 25--he conveyed it to Edward Hughes by indenture April 23 1752--see Anson Co. book B N folios 181-182-183--).

Book 4 page 187: On Oct. 17 1759 Abraham Creson--no wife signs--lets William Montgomery, both of Rowan Co.N.C., have 200 acres on the bank of the Yadkin River next Edward Hughes & Thomas Turner over to the bank of Deep Creek, for 5 shillings--the release price being 30 pounds on the next day--witnessed by Henry Hendry & John Williamson & proved in Oct. 1759. (The agents of Earl Granville let him have this).

Book 3 page 210: On Feb. 28 1755, Earl Granville lets Esq. Edward Hughes of Rowan Co.N.C., have 188 acres on the south side of the Yadkin River next Abraham Creson, for 3 shillings, witnessed by Richard Vigers & James Carter & proved by the latter on April 24 1756.

Book 2 page 194: May 27 1757, Edward Hughes of Rowan Co.N.C.--no wife signs--lets Edward Underhill of Chowan Co.N.C., have 188 acres on south side Yadkin River on its bank next Abraham Creson, for 5 shillings--the release price being 20 pounds on next day, witnessed by John Hanby & William Shepperd & Co.

The mother of Eliza (Mrs. Wicks of Salisbury) & Stella (Mrs. Blalock of Norwood now of Wadesboro N.C. who was Mrs. Richard? Cowan of Salisbury N.C., was married in Randolph Co. N.C.; she descended of the Balfour, Blake? Dayton Drake &c families. she got up her genealogy by writing to England. May 9 1794:" Margret Balfour Orphan of Andrew Balfour deceased, being of lawful age, came into Court and did choose Elizabeth Balfour her Guardian who gave bond with Michael Brown & Samuel Dayton in 500"  
"Andrew Balfour Orphan of Andrew Balfour, being of lawful age, came into Court & elected Elizabeth Balfour his Guardian, who entered into bond with Michael Brown & Samuel Dayton Securities in 500".

Dr. Rumble's History of Rowan Co. says that Col. Andrew Balfour of Randolph County, was murdered on March 9. 1782 by Col. David Fanning the marauder & notorious Tory. Joseph Hughes, an Englishman, was keeping an inn in Salisbury about this time on the site of Hon. Theo. F. Kluttz' home. (Slaughter's Hotel afterward & still later Robard's Hotel were open there). Joseph Hughes having but one arm, decided to save himself & family by rolling out barrels of whiskey & putting cups near. It worked. His son, Hudson Hughes, married a daughter of Col. Andrew Balfour & had a daughter, Mary, who married Esq. Samuel Reeves & had Dr. Samuel & Sarah ( who married Thomas Johnston's father. Mrs. T.P. Johnston 2d also claims descent from Col. Balfour, being cousin of her husband. Samuel Reeves Sr. (1799-1873) & wife Mary, (Lied in 1852 age 55 yrs) are buried in Lutheran Cemetery, Salisbury, as is Dr. Samuel Reeves (1828-1873) their son.

Eliza Balfour was postmistress in Salisbury in 1815. (Said to have been the first post-mistress appointed in America, getting her commission from Gen'l George Washington. After her son became of age, she moved back to Randolph, says Mrs. Wicks.

Nov. 9 1793:" Ordered that the Administrators of the Estate of Joseph Hughes deceased, may if it seems to them necessary for the payment of debts, make sale of so many of the Negroes of said Estate as they may find necessary for that purpose"

May 10 1793: Mary Hughes is granted an ordinary licence with Hudson Hughes as her security.

May 11 1793:" Joseph Hughes Minor orphan of Joseph Hughes deceased being of Lawful age cam into Court and choose Hudson Hughes his Guardian who gave Bond with Henry Giles and Thomas Froback his Securities in the Sum of one thousand pounds"

Nov. 10 1793:" Account of Sales of Joseph Hughes Estate filed £ 140,,14,,6"  
"Additional Account of Sales of the same filed £ 79,,13,, " "Mary Hughes is appointed Guardian of Kitty Hugh, a Minor Orphan of Joseph Hughes decd. who gave bond with Richd Trotter and Montfort Stokes security in £ 500,,0. Also Guardian of Bird Hughes Same Security in £ 500,,0 Also Guardian of Epps Hughes Same Security in £ 500,,0"

Deed from William Hall to Hudson & Epps Hughes for land Oct. 3 1792 proved by John Rees.

Aug. 5 1794:" Administration on the Estate of Mary Hughes deceased granted to Hudson Hughes, who qualified & gave bond with Alexander Long and Edward Yarborough Securities in £ 2.000"

Nov. 6 1794:" Inventory of Mary Hughes decd. filed"

Nov. 6 1794:" Kitty Hughes, Orphan of Joseph Hughes deceased being of lawful age, came into Court and elected Maxwell Chambers her Guardian, who entered into bond Richmond Pearson Security in the Sum of £ 1000."

Nov. 8 1794:" Hardy Jones is appointed Guardian of Bird Hughes minor Orphan of Joseph Hughes decd. who gave bond with Edward Yarborough & Hudson Hughes Securities in the sum of £ 1000" " The same Guardian appointed for Epps Hughes minor Orphan of the said Joseph Hughes decd. who gave bond with the same Securities in £ 1000"

Deeds: from Adlai Osborn Commissioner to the Trustees &c. Edward Yarborough for 253 acres Aug. 7 1795 to Hudson Hughes Another for 375 acres, another for 106 &c.

Henry Young vs Mary Hughes' Admr. case # 5 on May 5 1795: Detinue for Negroes & "Jury find the Defendant did detain Negro London of the Value of £ 125. Negro Jude of the Value of £ 125 Negro Patt of the Value of £ 100 Negro Moll of the Value of £ 95. Damage £ 53,,15. & d. Costs. Appeal Prayed".

Book 3 page 147: On Dec. 7 1753, Earl Granville lets Sarah Pincher, a widow of Rowan Co. N.C., have 333 acres next a black Walnut on the bank of the Yadkin next Edward Hughes, for 3 shillings

Deed from William Giles & wife to Serjant Hughes for 264 1/2 acres Dec. 3 1794 proved by Hudson Hughes.

Feb. 3 1773: " Winifred Morgan, Orphant of William Morgan deceased Came into open Court and chose Joseph Hughes her Guardian who gave Bond with Security from 200". (Seems to connect Boone-Morgan-Bryan set).

May 3 1779: " Mr. Joseph Hughes came into Court and produced a Commission from the Governor appointing him Ranger for the County of Rowan, which was read in open Court".

Mrs. Charles F. Kiefner of Perryville, Mo. sent me a sketch of Woodrow Wilson from St. Louis Republican of Dec. 9 1912, which states that the antecedents of the Pres. were originally of Scotland but moved to Ireland where they lived for many generations.

His grandfather, Judge James Wilson, married Annie Adams, a fellow passenger on his boat coming to America. She was exceedingly pious & brought up her 10 children--3 girls & 7 boys-- very strictly. Of these, Henry, Edwin and Margaretta were triplets. Edwin studied law with Edwin M. Stanton. Henry married the daughter of Gov. Medary and was on the staff of Gen. Burnside during the Civil War and was stationed for many months at St. Louis.

The youngest son, Joseph Ruggles Wilson, was the scholar of the family. Entered college at 18 and became a minister-- it was while he was stationed at Staunton that the Pres. was born. On June 7 1890 he married Janet Woodrow in Ross Co. Va. by Rev. Thomas Woodrow.

The Wilsons were wanderers. Judge James Wilson was a printer in Philadelphia, in 1812 editing a paper there but soon after moved to he moved to Steubenville Ohio where for 35 years he edited one until his death-- is buried in the little cemetery outside of Steubenville.

Most of his children learned the printers work. Robert worked in Steubenville, and Pres. Woodrow's brother, Joseph, is a newspaper man in Nashville, Tenn.

Mrs. Addie Wilson MacCoy of St. Louis, Mo. is a first cousin of the Pres., being a daughter of his uncle Robert Wilson, of Steubenville. She has children: Mrs. Alys Redmon, Pearl and Ralph Garfield MacCoy. The family is mostly republican.

The little Cemetery just out of Steubenville, is filled with Wilsons and the eastern branches of the family have made plans for its upkeep as few remain in the hometown. Practically every state in the Union sends delegates to the Wilson Family reunion.

Mrs. Kiefner thinks that she is a member of the above through far back ancestry.

Her <sup>grand</sup>father, Robert Wilson, was born in <sup>Oct 3</sup> 1788 and died in <sup>July 30</sup> 1861. He married Rachel (Hughey) <sup>born Jan 8 1792 died Feb 9 1837</sup> and with his brother James B. Wilson, moved to Perry Co. Mo. before 1819.

Jacob Franklin Wilson-- the only child, married Hannah <sup>Martin born Oct 4 1846</sup> (whose letter to her cousin Robert MacPherson, I have). = her grand parents

A cousin, John Wilson, settled in Cape Garardeau Co.

WILL OF JACOB HUGHEY.

In the name of God, Amen.

I, Jacob Hughey, of the County of Rowan and State of North Carolina, being at this time in sound mind and perfectly in my senses, do make this my last will and testament.

I bequeath my soul to God, the father from whom I received it, and my body to the earth to be buried in a decent and christian like manner; and as to my wordly estate, my desire is that it should be disposed of in the following manner, viz.:

To my dearly beloved wife, Margaret, I bequeath the use of our plantation on which we live during her widowhood or until my son, Henry Storey, arrives of full age; should she marry before that time, then the plantation to be applied by the Executors to the benefit of the children. I also bequeath to her the negro fellow Jack on the same condition as the plantation, only that in case of marriage, the negro to be sold and to be applied with other property hereinafter mentioned to the use of the children. I also bequeath to my said wife and to her assigns to be disposed of as she thinks proper her choice two of my horses, her choice of a feather bed and bedding, two iron pots, two pewter dishes and six plates.

I Bequeath to my son, Henry Storey, my plantation on which I live and also the negro boy Andy. I desire and empower my Executors to sell a tract of land adjoining the plantation last mentioned about one hundred and forty acres, two negro wenches and all my other property not already disposed of, and, after paying all my just debts, the remainder to be equally divided among all the children (the negro fellow Jack, in case of the marriage of my wife, to be included in the above sale.)

AND WHEREAS, there is a probability that my wife may now be pregnant, if so, and that a boy should be born and arrive of age, he is to divide the plantation with his brother, Henry - should it be a girl, to have an equal dividend of the above mentioned property.

AND WHEREAS, my father left a wagon to my brother Henry and me, my will is that the said wagon continue unsold for the

use of both families as at first intended.

I do constitute and appoint my brothers,  
Henry and Robert, to be my Executors to this my  
last will and testament.

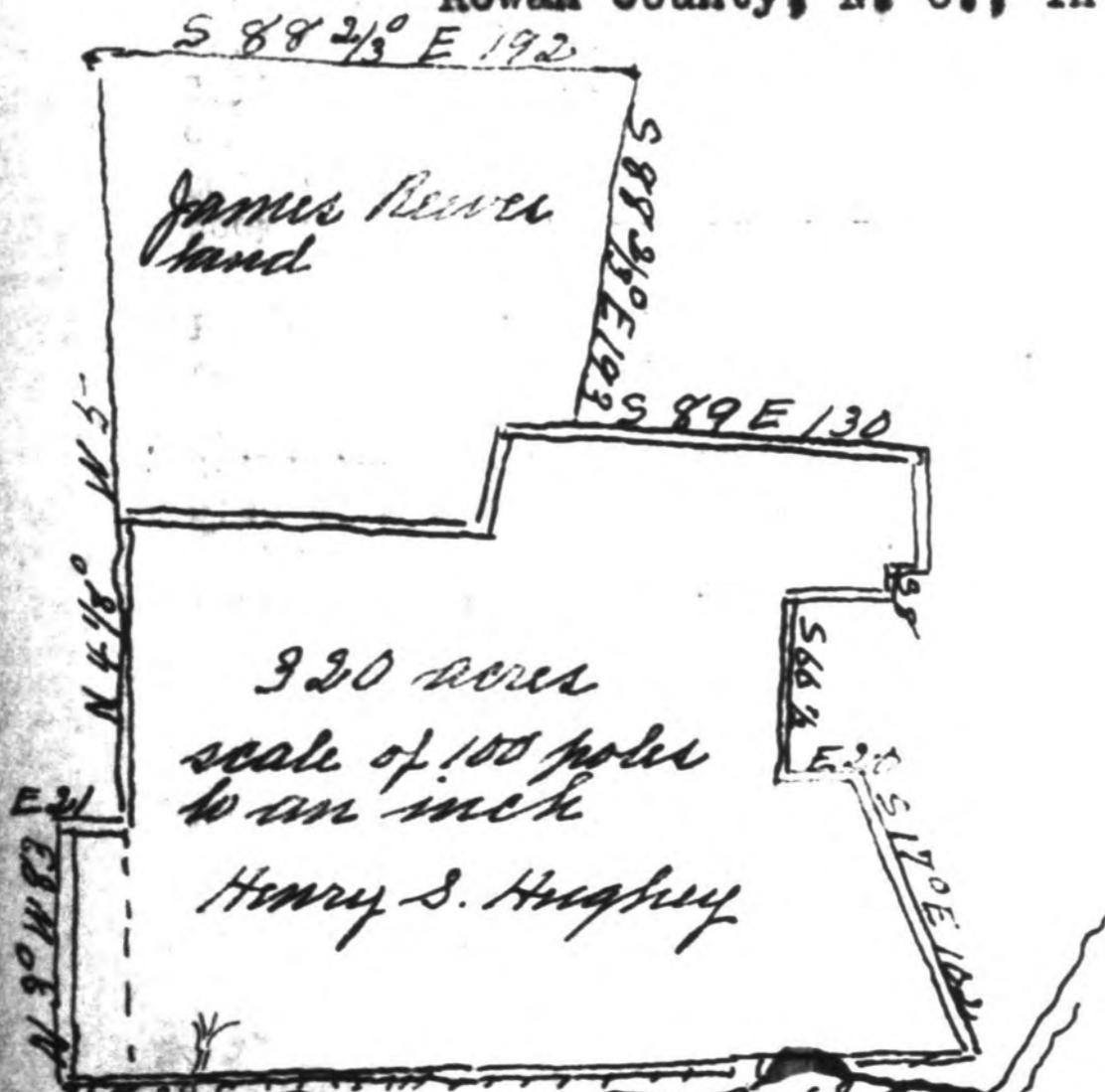

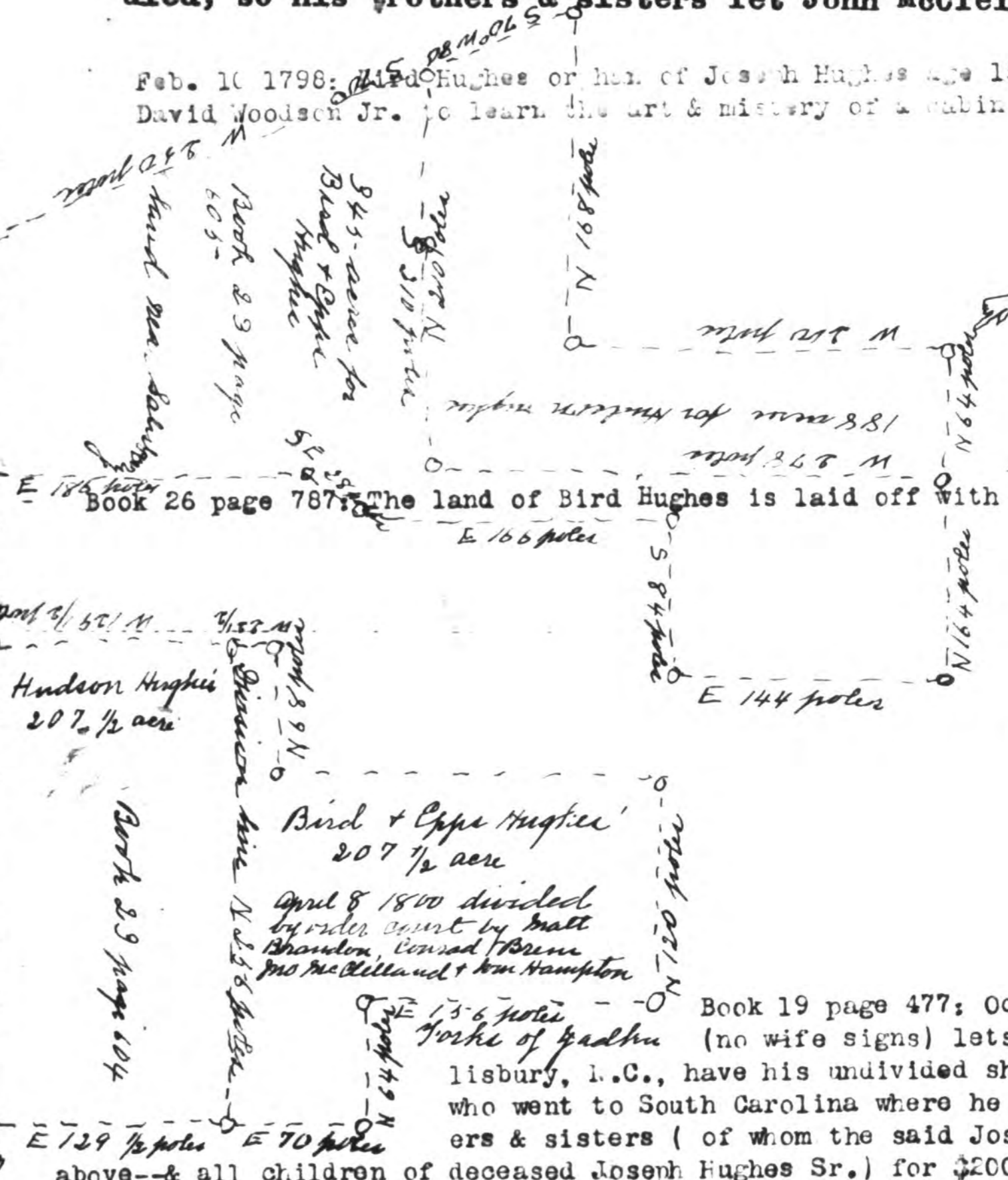
