

May 4 1774: Deed from Thomas Anderson & wife Mary to John Work for 336 acres on Feb. 22 1774 proved by Wm. Gant.

Book 8 page 136: Feb. 2 1774, Thomas Anderson & wife Mary of Tryon Co. N.C., let John Work of Rowan Co. N.C., have 336 acres on both sides of south fork of Mountain Creek on the west side of Cataba River next Robert Biggam Perkins, for 140 pounds, witnessed by Fras. McCorkle & William Gant & proved by the latter in May 1774. (This was granted to Thomas Anderson on May 10 1762).

April 16 1755: "Thos Anderson Desires his Mill Erected upon Mountain Creek to be recorded As A publick mill"

Feb. 11 1775: A road is to be laid out from John Brevard's to McKowns Ford on the Cattaba River & "from thence to Andersons Old Mill on Mountain Creek" & from thence to Sherrill's ford road.

Book 5 page 162: Aug. 27 1762, Earl Granville lets Robert Biggam Perkins have 456 acres vacant land on west side Cataba River & both sides north fork of Mountain Creek next Thomas Anderson, for 10 shillings, witnessed by John Agar & John Frohock & proved in April 1763.

Book 4 page 505: May 19 1761, Earl Granville lets John Perkins of Rowan Co. N.C., have 637 acres on both sides Mountain Creek on west side Catawba River next John Anderson, for 10 shillings, witnessed by W. Lucas & John Frohock & proved by the latter in July 1761.

Book 13 page 600: On Feb. 27 1794, Martin Steele (no wife signs) lets Thomas Anderson have 200 acres on Second & Grants Creeks next John Skiles & Elizabeth Gibson for 140 pounds, witnessed by Henry Giles & M. Stokes & proved by Henry Giles in May 1794.

Feb. 11 1775: Deed from Matthew Long & wife Elizabeth to Francis Lock for 652 acres Oct. 16 1765 proved by John Gibson.

Book 13 page 633: On Aug. 19 1793, Francis Lock Sr. (no wife signs) lets Martin Steele, a weaver, have 200 acres on Second & Grants Creeks, next John Skiles, Col. Francis Lock & Elizabeth Gibson, for 120 pounds, witnessed by Francis Locke Jr. & William Rebison & proved by Francis Locke Jr. in Aug. 1794. (This is part of some land conveyed to Matthew Long who let Francis Lock have it & some granted by The State to Francis Lock).

May 8 1790: "Thomas Anderson appointed Constable gave bond with Richd Trotter & qualified".

Book 18 page 933: On May 14 1804, Francis Marshall--no wife signs--lets Jeremiah & Moses Brown (all of Rowan Co. N.C.) have 82 acres; a tract next Tobias Furr & Thomas Anderson on the road leading to Salisbury along Anderson's line, next Jacob Utzman, & crossing the creek to Leonard Cryder's; 72 acres & another tract of 10 acres next land of deceased John Mull on above road to Salisbury, for \$900.00, witnessed by William Hampton & Edmund Burton & acknowledged in 1804. *See Mull*

Book 13 page 566: On Jan. 27 1794, Thomas Anderson & wife Amelia, let Esq. Montfort Stokes have 14 acres & two town lots of 144 sq. poles each on east side of Innis St. (#57-58) for 200 pounds witnessed by H. Pearson & Jacob Utzman & proved by the latter in May 1794. (Conrad Michael had let William Dry have it on June 24 1762, he let Griffith Rutherford have on May 9-13 1772, he let Thomas Anderson have on Nov. 3 1784) also two acres which Michael Troy let him have.

Book 13 page 568: On Nov. 3 1784, Griffith Rutherford lets Thomas Anderson have about 10 acres next town of Salisbury & Michael Troy, for 50 pounds. (Wm. Dry let Griffith Rutherford have on May 13 1772) also 2 town lots #57-58 which Wm. Dry let Griffith Rutherford have on May 9 1772).

Book 21 page 252: On June 20 1807, Mr. Jeremiah Brown buys out the portion of Moses Brown (no wife signs) for \$500.00, in the 72 acres next Tobias Furr, Thos. Anderson & Leonard Crider, also the 10 acres next John Mull--both on road to Salisbury, witnessed by Mathi Moar

Book 9 page 24: Timothy Anderson & wife Elizabeth of Camden District S.C., let John Wright of Rowan Co.N.C., have 280 acres in Surry & Rowan counties, on the south side of the Yadkin River below the mouth of Gaatz? Branch, for 300 pounds N.C. current money, witnessed by Archibald Davie, Cornelius Anderson & Robert Carr, & proved in Aug. term of 1779. A note from James Simpson of Camden District saying that Timothy & Elizabeth acknowledged the deed. (This had been granted to Samuel Bryan by deed of sale on Dec. 31 1760 by the Earl of Granville, Samuel Bryan conveyed it "to the sd Elizabeth Sloan Now Elizabeth Anderson wife of the above said Timothy Anderson" on Sept 24 1762).

Aug. 5 1779: Deed from Timothy Anderson & ux: to John Wright for 280 acres
Aug. 4 1779 proved by parity of hands.

Marriage bond in Rowan Co.N.C.: Timothy Anderson to Elizabeth Sloan March 26 1770 signed by William Moore (Thomas Frohock in office). A note from Scot? Henry Sloan giving consent for his daughter "Betty" to marry dated Thursday.

Book 4 page 909: On Sept. 23 1762, Samuel Bryan, a gentleman--no wife signs--lets Elizabeth Slone, a spinster (both of Rowan Co.N.C.), have 280 acres on the south side of the Yadkin River below the mouth of Coats Branch, for 5 shillings--the release price being 30 pounds on the next day--witnessed by Charles Cupples & Francis Beatey & acknowledged in Salisbury before Stephen Dewey, J.S.C. on Sept. 24 1762. (Earl Granville let Bryan have this on Dec. 31 1760).

(This had been granted by The State to Andrew Shields in 1780, he let Joseph Shields have it, he let William Brazil have it & he let Daniel Wood?).

Book 18 page 304: On Feb. 20 1802, Thomas Anderson & Isaac Anderson Jr. (as Exrs of deceased Richard Anderson of Rowan) let Daniel Wood have 120 acres between Fourth Creek & South Yadkin River, witnessed as above.

May 5 1778: Michael Anderson is dead, his widow relinquishes so Samuel Luckey & William Johnston qualify as Adms. giving bond of 700 pounds with John Brandon & John Luckey as security. They return an inventory of estate

May 5 1778: "Ordered by the Court that John Baker Orphan of Henry Baker, and formerly bound to Michael Anderson deceased, be bound to James Bowers till he arrive at the age of 21 Years, being 11 Years old next Septembr. to learn the Trade of a Hatter--And said Master covenants to give said Apprentice a Set of Tools proper to carry on his said Trade, at the expiration of his said Term"

Aug. 8 1778: James Bowers gives him up and (he is 10 years old at the time) he is bound to John Luckey to become a "malster". On May 5 1774, Amelia Baker, a bastard child of Henry Baker, is bound to John Johnston until 18 years old.

The will of Presley Anderson Sr. is in Bath Co., Kentucky, dated March 25 1816, & names his wife; Elizabeth; & children; 1 Nancy (married Isaac Gray); 2 Elizabeth (married John Beale Howard, Jr.--great-grandfather of Miss Beatrice Inez Day & said to have been born in Ann Arundel Co., Maryland, of which she has a rather fair record), thought to have been born in Culpepper Co. Va.; 3 John Alexander Steele, (better known as "Capt. Jack" in Missouri, where his latter years were spent--he was a noted surveyor in his early days of eastern Missouri & many interesting legends have come down of his experiences there); 4 Presley Jr. (he is said to have been born in N.C., married on his way from Tennessee to Kentucky Euphemia Jones of Tenn.--they moved to Missouri also where he died, see later); 5 Sally (married Stephen Macabee); 6 William; 7 Polly; 8 James D.; 9 Cuthbert 10 Maria; 11 Julian & 12 Eliza.

It is claimed by the descendants of Pressley Anderson Jr. that the family lived so near Cowpens during the Revolutionary War, they could hear all of the guns. The first record of Pressley Anderson Sr. & wife Elizabeth S. is a deed in Clarke Co., Kentucky in 1796.

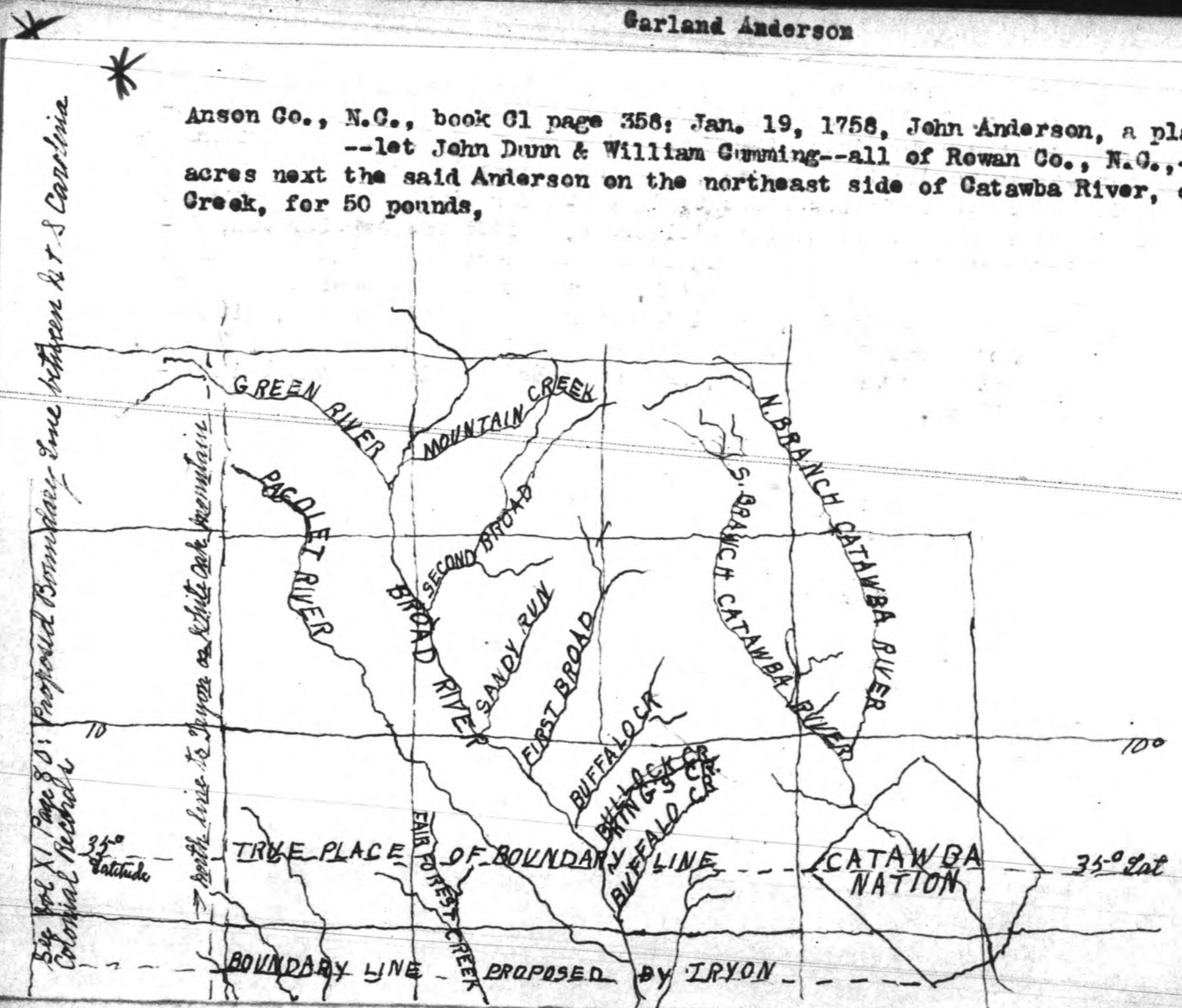
