Elijah Alexander of North Carolina

"ALEXANDER, ELIJAH, 1780. In March there was brought to Charlotte a quantity of powder which was put into a magazine that had to be guarded. Col. Thomas Polk, afterwards General, made a demand of the companies enlisted around Charlotte to furnish a quota of men to guard the magazine, with a promise that it would constitute a tour of duty. With his father's consent he volunteered, and was put under Capt. (later Major) Thomas Alexander. After this his father, William Alexander, a blacksmith, sent him to Maryland, whence he returned the last of January, 1781.

"1781. On February 1, 1781, Cornwallis, in pursuit of prisoners taken at King's Mountain, crossed the Catawba at Cowan's Ford and General Davidson was killed. There was a call for volunteers. They rendezvoused at Big Rock, Cabarrus County, under Major William Polk (later Colonel) Maj. James Harris and Captain Brownfield. We marched past Harris's mill on Rocky River, Tennell's mill on Codale Creek and Caldwell's mill on the South Yadkin. Smallpox appeared in the camp of which Moses Alexander died. Those who had not had smallpox were sent home to be inoculated, and he was one of them.

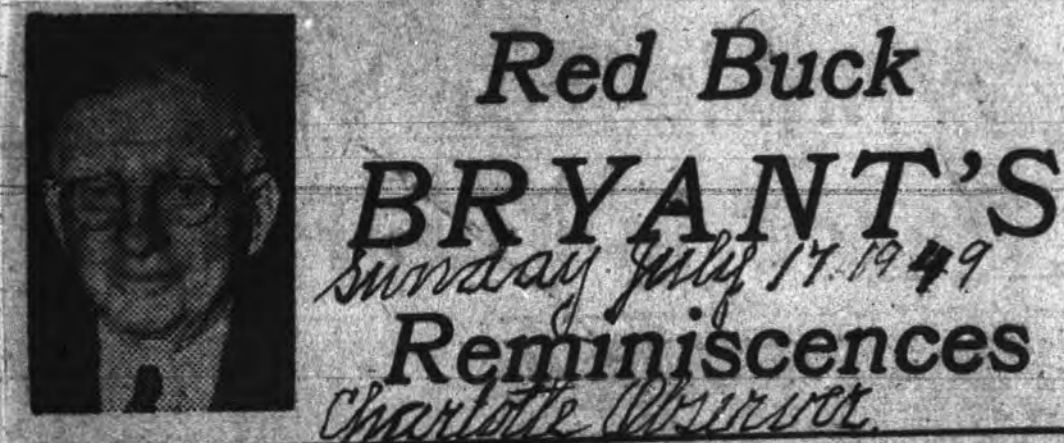

"What became of Ezra Alexander, one of the men of his clan who signed the Mecklenburg Declaration of Independence?" is a logical question. Historians differ.

Dr. J. B. Alexander, author of a history of Mecklenburg county, and who knew Alexanders, wrote:

"Four of the six Alexanders who signed the Mecklenburg Declaration were so well known in the county that they are still spoken of with reverence and affection. We know just where their homes were, and their graves are with us this day.

The principal transactions of their lives are recorded in history. But of the other two, Ezra and Charlie, diligent inquiry has revealed nothing that is satisfactory. One informant was under the impression that they lived within the bounds of Providence (township), and were neighbors of Ezekiel Polk (who lived near Pineville), and, like him, were atheists.

"If this is true they probably emigrated with him to Tennessee, carrying with them their circulating library, or infidel literature, and so both they and their books disappeared and were a good riddance to their fellow citizens."

Later, the D. A. Tompkins history of Mecklenburg, written for its author by the Rev. A. J. McKelway, a Presbyterian minister, said: "Ezra Alexander, signer of the Mecklenburg Declaration of Independence, born in 1720, was a captain in the Revolutionary War, and in 1880 fought the Tories in Lincoln county. He died in 1790 and is buried in the Sharon church yard."

Still later, Worth S. Ray in his book, "The Mecklenburg Signers," asserted: "Ezra Alexander is said by Dr. Cyrus L. Hunter, in his 'Sketches' to have been a son of Abraham Alexander, the president of the Mecklenburg Convention of 1775, although Dr. Alexander in his history does not list him among the chairman's children. If he was a son of Abraham then here is one instance where both father and son were signers, and it is, perhaps, the only instance. He and William

New Jersey, Pennsylvania, Maryland, Virginia and the Carolinas, with a view of getting material for a book she hopes to write, thought she might have scooped Dr. Alexander on Ezra. She returned to her home in the big city feeling that she and Mrs. Bailes, wife of a son of old man Joe Bailes who owned the site of the Polk burial ground for years, and Mr. Furr had found the tomb of one of the famous signers. She may be wrong, as her Ezra could have been the son of the old patriot. It may take an expert to solve the problem.

Whatever be the truth, the graveyards delvers found an Ezra Alexander tombstone hidden under three or four inches of decaying leaves and earth, and he was old enough to be a signer, and to have fought in the Revolution.

The location of the Polk plot ended a search that extended over many years. I have had visits from Charlotte people who wanted to know if I had ever heard of that particular cemetery. I had been told of its existence but could not find it. Now, I know it is in a forest, almost lost to civilization.

The late Judge Hoke, Chief Justice of the North Carolina Supreme Court for years, was named William Alexander. I have been told the Alexanders in his family were of the Ezra blood. If that be true, I do not know how it came about, but consider the report interesting.

In that hunt for old burial grounds, Mrs. Northcutt, Mrs. Bailes and Mr. Furr found the one that contains the remains of one of the most interesting women that ever lived in Mecklenburg county, Susan Barnett Smartt, who knew Andrew Jackson as a boy and who was in Charlotte for the 20th of

Recently, the tombstone of an Ezra Alexander was discovered beneath a lot of rubbish in the old Polk graveyard in the woods on Big Sugar Creek, northwest of the town of Pineville, and its finders wondered if that was the man Dr. Alexander lost, or his son, or some other relative. Saturday, Nov. 21 1848: On the petition of Andrew Mathieu (as John Fulton is the only one interested), it is ordered that two fifth parts of the land which Evan Alexander owned at time of death, be laid out to him by the commissioners, Joshua Gay, Thomas L. Cowan, Henry Sleighter, John Utzman & Michael Brown. It adjoins John Fulton & Lewis Beard.

D.A.R. Lineage, Vol. XLIX page 49: Miss Pauline Polk Potts, born in Sherman, Texas, joined as #48210 from Brigadier-General Thomas Polk of N.C. (1732-93) who served in Provincial Congress, was Commissary Provisions for Continental Troops when the army was in great need, was appointed Brig-Gen. in 1781 (to succeed William Lee Davidson who fell at Cowans Ford), is buried in the Presbyterian Churchyard at Charlotte, N.C. where he died. (See also #12193, 21349, 28289, 32318, 34395, 36321, 40456). She is a daughter of Lafayette Brown Potts & wife Mary Ophelia Polk; granddaughter of Col. Charles Ingham Polk & wife Sarah John LeNoir; great-granddaughter of Capt. Thomas Polk & wife Sarah Moore; great-great-granddaughter of Charles Polk & wife Alexander; great-great-great-granddaughter of Thomas Polk & wife Susan Spratt.

Book 14 page 153 or 253 (numbered twice): Jan. 23 1796, Esq. John Steele--no wife signs--lets Esq. Evan Alexander (both of Salisbury, N.C.) have 1/2 or 72 sq. poles of lot #9 in the north square of the town, 6 poles fronting on Ennis St., next lot #1, for 450 pounds, witnessed & proved by Archibald Henderson in ref. 1796. (This was originally granted by the Trustees of the town to Josiah Joyle who let Henry Horah have, he let William Williams have, he let John Lewis Beard have, he let James Kerr have & he let said Steele have it).

Book 16 page 592: Jan. 18 1799, Esq. Evan Alexander--no wife signs--lets Lewis Beard (both of Rowan Co. N.C.) have this for 500 pounds, witnessed by Coenred Brem & Henry Giles & proved by the latter in May 1799. (See also Book 24 page 709 on July 15 1815 in which the same land is mentioned as being sold to Evan Alexander, Esq.)

Book 20 page 481: April 23 1812, Colonel Charles T. Alexander & Isaac Alexander of Mecklenburg Co. N.C., as administrators of deceased Evan Alexander, let John Fulton of Rowan Co. N.C., have lot #62 in the great northwest square of Salisbury next Mr. Frohock (now belonging to deceased Judge Macay) on the town line next the 20 acres which Carter & Forster let Esq. John Frohock have; also 24 acres which Hugh Forster let Esq. Thomas Frohock have next the line of Benjamin Booth; & 20 acres which Hugh Forster let James Kerr have & he let Michael Troy have & conveyed by Esq. Lewis Beard to Esq. Evan Alexander, for \$100.00, witnessed by Thomas Todd, H. Chambers & Robert Torrance & proved by the last named in Aug. 1815.

Book 23 page 709: July 15 1815, Jonathan Merrell of Rowan Co. N.C.--no wife signs--lets Moses A. Lock of N.C., have in all 326 acres on north side of Yadkin River at the ferry landing where said Merrell now lives (being 320 acres which Isaac Alexander & Charles Alexander as administrators of Esq. Evan Alexander let \_\_\_\_\_ have, west of a large tract, #9 of Henry E. McCulloh & was conveyed first by McCulloh to William Giles; also another 6 acres adjoining but above it next John Adams), for \$2500.00, witnessed & proved by Lewis Beard in Feb. 1816.

Book 20 page 492: April 13 1810, Isaac Alexander & Charles T. Alexander, as administrators of deceased Evan Alexander of Rowan Co. N.C., let John Adams of N.C., have 131 acres on north side of Yadkin River next William Adams on a ranch next the tract of \_\_\_\_\_, for \$150.00, witnessed by Lewis Beard & Jonathan Merrell & proved by the latter in Nov. 1815. (Morris Davis let Evan Alexander his this & it is sold by the consent of his legatees).

Book 20 page 657: Aug. 29 1821, Sarah Springs & Mary Harris of Mecklenburg release their claims to the land which was sold by the Exrs Isaac & Charles T. Alexander, to John Adams, for \$25.00 each, witnessed by & proved by Joseph Pickett on Sept. 5 1821.

Book 25 page 867 or 857 in deed from John Fulton to Esq. Lewis Beard, it says that Esq. Evan Alexander's sisters were Catharine (wife of John Macoy) & Mary S. Harris.

The American Compendium of Genealogy (Yorkville), Vol. 11, page 306: Mrs. George W. Soy, (Marie Etha Bartley), born July 29, 1870, in Greene Co., Tenn., living at 226 Montrose Ave., Knoxville, Tenn., gave her lineage married Nov. 27 1890 to Geo W. Soy.

(2) Isa Adaline Alexander (1852-1922) married (1) in 1868, William Henry Bartley (1814-1912) (2) William Alexander (1812-1866), of Greene Co., Tenn., married in 1834, Isabel Johnson (1814-1888).

(4) Stephen King Alexander, (born 1778 in Randolph Co., N.C., died 1862 in Greene Co. Tenn., married in 1803, Sarah Kennedy, (1788-1870), daughter of Daniel Kennedy, 1750-1802, of North Carolina, Tennessee & Virginia, who served under four forms of Government 1783-1802, was a Colonel with Sever & General Brown in the Revolution at Kings Mountain & was made a Brigadier-General. He married in 1774, his cousin, Margaret Kennedy (Hughes) (1752-1803).

(5) William Alexander, (1739-1828), of Pennsylvania (whose parents had emigrated from North Ireland before the early wars of the seventeenth century) went to North Carolina before the Revolution, was Lieutenant & Captain of the P.C. Troops in this; went to Greene Co., Tenn., in 1796 on a plantation on the Holchucky River he settled with his wife Elizabeth King (1737-1817), whom he had married in 1761.
