Lexington, Davidson Co.N.C., book 9 page 286; June 6 1844, Jesse McBride & wife Anna of Giles Co.,Tenn., appoint Josiah Blair of Randolph Co.N.C., their attorney to get their part of the estate of "our Nephew Samuel L.Tomlinson of Davidson" CO.N.C., he being the administrator of my brother-in-law, H.Josiah Tomlinson of the same place & he is to apply to the Clerk of Court, Wilson Womack, of Davidson Co.N.C. &c.

(Thompsons Mill Creek & pond)

Book 26 page 653; April 30 1821, William Toms & Pamela Toms of Rutherford Co.N.C., let John B.Thomson of Rowan Co.N.C., have their interests in 255 acres on Thompsons Mill Creek (it being what Thomas Thompson, now deceased, devised to his son, Alexander Thompson, who died intestate, & descended to the said Pamela Toms as on of his heirs), which includes the mill & pond, beginning on the line of Jacob Adams at a hickory, going east with his line 115 poles to a stake in a field on his corner, south with his line 8 poles to a fallen hickory & a small red oak on his corner, south with his line 87 degrees east 64 poles to a post oak on his corner, south 62 east with his line & passing his & the corner of John McNeely to a hickory, at 68 poles, with the line of McNeely 84 poles more--in all 152 poles to a large Spanish oak on his corner near a small branch East 26 poles to a black Jack on the corner of said McNeely, south with his line 70 poles to a large Spanish oak on his corner near a small branch, crossing the branch, south 57 degrees west 47 poles to a black oak on the corner of the upper tract of ---Thompson, with his line north 78 degrees west 296 poles to a stake on the line of James McCollum (which is about 5 poles south of the P.O. on his corner), then north 108 poles to the beginning, for \$500.00,

Iredell Co.N.C. book A page 310: Oct.12 1791, George Lock--no wife signs--lets John Tomlinson (both of Iredell Co.N.C.) have 38 acres on north side of South Yadkin River including the hou
houses next Thomas Bell, for 30 pounds, witnessed by William Nesbit & William Summers & prove
by the latter in Nov. 1791 or 92. (This is part of 388 acres from The State to said Lock on
Oct.9 1783).

Iredell Co.N.C. book 1 page 28: The will of William Somers made June 1 1799. Wife Casadia
(100 acres where my son Bosel now lives)

Daughters: Amey Howard, Linney Summers, Berney Belt, Mary Jacob, Darkey Jacobs, Bitha
Tomblinson.

Sons: Basle (my home plantation), William (part of the land which Alexander Read let John
Summers have), Thomas (dead--his heirs get 20 shillings), William Jacob Summers (5 shill-
ings). Son Basle also gets 50 acres after the death of his mother & 100 acres where he
lives). Exrs: son Basil & trusty friend Burges Gaither. Witnesses: Joseph Alison &
Horatio Bell (both jurats).

Book 9 page 114: Oct. 10 1783, The State grants (#609 at 50 shillings the 100 acres) to George Lock 388 acres on the south side of South Yadkin next John Archibald, Thomas Bell & John Reed.

Basel Tomlinson (North side of Dutchmans Creek)

Iredell Co.N.C. book E page 173: The will of Basel Tomlinson made March 14 1865 & probated in Aug. 1865. Wife; Matilda (home-tract of 260 acres surveyed by J.M.Turner on April 13 1860 & everything)

Daughter; Eveline Steele (240 acres where she lives). Son; John S. (243 $\frac{1}{2}$ acres where he lives surveyed by J.M.Turner on April 13 1860. Exr; friend Wilfred Turner. Witnesses; P.C.Jurney (Jt.) & J.M.Holmes (Jt.)

Iredell Co.N.C., book S page 101; Feb. 24 1819, John Hall of Rowan Co.N.C.--no wife signs-- lets William Reaves of Iredell Co.N.C., have 174 acres on the north side of Dutchmans Creek next Samuel Todd, Jane Johnson & up said creek, for \$478.50, witnessed by Jacob Locke & William Hall & proved by the latter in May 1836. (This is part of the land that Nathaniel Todd let John Hall have).

Iredell Co.N.C., book S page 169; Dec. 16 1835, Levi Reeves & John Elliott (as executors of deceased William Reaves) let Basel Tomlinson--all of Iredell Co.N.C., have 174 acres on the north side of Dutchmans Creek next ---Johnson & up said creek, for \$105.00, witnessed by A.D.Gage & Levitious Gaither & proved by the latter in Aug. 1836.

Perry Tomlinson (Fifth Creek)

Iredell Co.N.C., book Q page 233: June 24 1833, Hugh M.Hall--no wife signs--lets Perry Tomlinson (both of Iredell Co.N.C.) have 284 acres on the north bank of Fifth Creek on the Statesville road, at the head of a branch, near Alexander Hall, Davidson Hall, the bottom, & corner of the grveyard, for \$1280.00, witnessed by Hugh R.Hall & William D. Hall & acknowledged in Aug. 1833. (This is part of a grant to Thomas Hall Sr. by James Hall, & said deceased Thomas Hall willed it to his said son Hugh M.Hall).

Hannah Tomlinson

D.A.R. Lineage Vol. 75 page 15: Miss Lillian Randolph Wright, born in Edwardville, Ill. joined as #74048 from

Isham Randle (1758-1835) born in Brunswick Co. Va., died in Edwardsville, Ill., enlisted in Capt. Crump's Co. of Col. Ledbetter's N.C. regiment & served 1781 under Capt. Edward Wilkins of the same regiment--he applied for a pension in 1832 & it was allowed.

Book 16 page 33: Sept. 6 1797, William Tomlinson--no wife signs--lets John English (both of Rowan Co. N.C.) have 200 acres on James Creek of Abbots Creek next Samuel Tomlinson (formerly Richardson's). Benjamin Ward & Noah Killum, for 10 pounds, witnessed by Nathan Hunt, Noah Killum & Samuel Tomlinson & proved by the last named in Feb. 1798.

Book 22 page 276 or 376 (numbered twice): Jan. 1 1811, John English of Randolph Co. N.C. --no wife signs--lets Noah Killum of Rowan Co. N.C., have 100 acres on Abbots Creek next the estate of Samuel Tomlinson, Robert Moffet, John English & Noah Killum, for \$400.00, witnessed by William Pierson & Charles Pidgeon & proved by the latter in Feb. 1812.

Book 13 page 880: Nov. 27 1793 The State grants (#2217 at 10 pounds the 100 acres) to Benjamin Ward 480 acres on James Creek next Richardson Owen & Samuel Park.

Book 14 page 673 or 773 (numbered twice): Feb. 6 1797, Benjamin Ward--no wife signs--lets William Tomlinson (both of Randolph Co. N.C.) have 480 acres on James Creek waters of Abbots Creek next Richardson Owen & Samuel Parks, for 10 pounds, witnessed by L. Ward & Samuel Tomlinson & proved by the latter in Feb. 1797.

Book 18 page 468: Sept. 6 1797, William Tomlinson of Randolph Co. N.C. ---no wife signs---lets Noah Kellum of Rowan Co. N.C., have 255 $\frac{1}{2}$ acres on Abbotts Creek next John English, for 10 pounds, witnessed by Nathan Hunt & Samuel Tomlinson & proved by the latter in Feb. 1803.

Book 18 page 100: June 20 1800, The State grants (#2701 at 50 shillings the 100 acres) to Samuel Tomlinson 40 acres on Rich Fork of Abbotts Creek next John English, said Tomlinson, Seaborn Tucker & Robert Morfit. (This had been entered on April 29 1799).

Book 22 page 276 or 376 (numbered twice): Jan. 1 1811, John English of Randolph Co. N.C. ---no wife signs---lets Noah Kellum of Rowan Co. N.C., have 100 acres on Abbotts Creek next the estate of Samuel Tomlinson, Robert Moffet, John English & Noah Kellum, for \$300.00, witnessed by William Pierson & Charles Pidgeon & proved by the latter in Feb. 1812.

James Thomason (Third Creek)

Book 41 page 580; May 1 1859, Esq. Luke Blackmer (as C.M.E., on a petition from the heirs of deceased James Thomason for a sale & was sold May 6 1845), lets Thomas R. Walton have 218 acres on the bank of Third Creek next ---Revel, ---Trott, ---Thomason & ---Armfield, for \$427.00, witnessed by W.A. Walton & acknowledged.

Bias Thomason

Book 39 page 417: Nov.11 1845, Bias Thomason--no wife signs--lets William R.Fraley (both of Rowan Co.N.C.) have $60\frac{1}{2}$ acres next George Thomason, Mary Hall & the old line, for \$250.00, witnessed by R.Locke & George H.Gheen & proved by the latter in May 1852.

Nov.22 1816: The State vs Bias Thomason, bastardy on the body of Peggy Lewis. He gave bond of 500 pounds with Daniel Clary.

HENRY TOMLINSON OF CONNECTICUT

McCall-Tidwell And Allied Families (by Ettie Tidwell McCall) page 271: "HENRY TOMLINSON¹, the son of George Tomlinson and his wife Maria Hyde (whose marriage appears in the Parish Register of St. Peters Church of St. Wurberg, Derbyshire, England, in 1600), was baptized there 1606. He came to America with his wife Alice; two sons and four daughters. He first came to New Haven, Connecticut, then Milford in 1652. He removed to Stratford in the autumn of 1656, and April 1, 1657, he purchased of Joshua Atwater, a house and lot, and several pieces of land and settled there. He was one of the most active business men in Stratford, and known as such in the Colony. He was not a military man. Was a farmer, buying, selling and cultivating lands. In 1671 he and others by permission of General Court, purchased a large tract of land from the Indians of Weanutinock, New Milford. Was Freeman 1669, and occupied positions of trust and prominence in the early days. (The old Family Bible printed 1559, which Henry Tomlinson brought with him to this country, has been preserved by a descendant in Michigan, and the Coat of Arms, in a painting of the family, has been preserved by descendants of Governor Gideon Tomlinson of Connecticut).

His wife born in 1608, died in 1698. He died in Stratford, May 16, 1681. Children:

- BATHSHEBA TOMLINSON² (Henry¹) was born in Stratford, Connecticut, January 3, 1661, Married (as second wife) Ephriam Stiles born August, 1645. He died June 21, 1714, and

COAT OF ARMS: Arms. Sable, a fesse between; three falcons, Volante, or. CREST: Out of a ducal coronet, a griffin's head, or. MOTTO: Non sibi, sed Patriae. (See Stiles Family.)" page 272:

"FRANCIS STILES OF CONNECTICUT. (Elizabeth Stiles³ and Phebe Stiles³) There arrived in the ship "Christian" of London on June 16, 1636, at Boston, four brothers, Francis Stiles, John Stiles, Henry Stiles and Thomas Stiles. They were the sons of Thomas and Marie Stiles (Stiles) of Milbrooke, England, and were baptized in the Parish Church there according to certified records.

"MR." FRANCIS STILES¹, the third son of the Milbrooke family, was baptized in St. Michael's Church, Milbrooke, Bedfordshire, England, August 1. 1602, and for some time previous to his coming to America had been a master carpenter and citizen of London. He came over as Manager of the Sir Richard Saltonsall enterprise and after the abandonment of this enterprise soon after his arrival he purchased some thousand acres of land from Sir Richard Saltonsall at Windsor, Connecticut, and together with the 500 acres he had received by allotment from the Town, he held quite a large amount of real estate. But he resold part of this to Saltonsall and in September, 1647, was residing at Saybrook. He was given the title of "Mr.", which was in those days no unmeaning phrase, but an index of social position.

Items, which have come down in court records, show him to be a man of great business ability; a quick and passionate nature, stout in affirming his rights and consequently frequently, figuring in law suits. He was admitted a Freeman at Windsor, September 10, 1640, and was on the Jury of the Particular Court of October 14, 1642. (Connecticut Colonial Record 76). He made a visit to England in 1637. In addition to his many law-suits, he was complained in March, 1654, to the Court "for peppering Naanepaquowwe, an Indian of Stratford, in his body with Swam shot, uppon a Sabbath Day." He removed to Stratford about 1660."

Franklin Tomlin

Iredell Co.N.C. book Q page 346; Sept.27 1831, Rev. Daniel Gould--no wife signs--lets Mr. Franklin Tomlin, a planter (both of Iredell Co.N.C.) have 176 acres & 23 poles on Rockey Creek next John Tomlinson, ---Tomlin, near a branch & crossing one, & Miles Dobbin, for \$300.00, witnessed by Pinkney Caldwell & Ira G.Work & acknowledged in Feb. 1834. (This is part of the tract which William Summers had been granted & let his grandson, Esq. William I. Summers have).

The will of Greenbery Gaither (book 3 page 150) made March 18 1858 & probated
Sons: Ivy (50 acres already deeded him), Martin (100 acres where he lives, a tract of
37 acres deeded by S.A1 , 8 acres of the Gideon tract south of where he lives).
Daughters: Tabitha C.Colvert, Elizabeth Colvert, Elenor Tomlinson (her children; Mary,
John, Carolina & Elizabeth), Lavina Rutledge, Emily Henly, Sarah Ann & Emeline Garner--
their deceased grandfather being John Tomlinson,

Humphrey B. Tomlinson

Iredell Co. N.C., book J page 69: Dec. 1 1810, Burgess Gaither, (as executor of late Samuel Ellis) lets Humphrey B. Tomlinson--all of Iredell Co. N.C., have 143 $\frac{1}{2}$ acres on the bank of Little Dutchmans Creek next Hugh Hall, Slate? Green, Eneas Campbell, Jonathan Cash & Jeremiah Gaither, for 71 pounds, 12 shillings & 6 pence, witnessed by Henry Clagett & William J. Summers & proved by the latter in May 1816.

Iredell Co. N.C., book 2 page 25: The will of Humphry B. Tomlinson made while "frail in Body" on March 1 1825

Wife: Casander (one third of the land till death)

Sons: William (has had his part), Archibald, Willey (one third of the land & half of my wife's), Grove, Nolley (one third of my land & half of my wife's), Humphrey, Leonard, John & George.

Daughters: Sarah Long, Polly Gill, Betsey Cowan. Betsy Cowden?

Grandchildren: by son Willey & by son Hughey. Son-in-law: Alexander Reid.

Witnesses: Abner F. Caldwell & Amos Sharpe (Jt.)

Notley D. Tomlinson (South Fork of Rocky Creek)

Iredell Co. N.C., book Q, page 344: Feb. 8 1834, Hugh Andrews--no wife signs--lets Notley D. Tomlinson (both of Iredell Co. N.C.) have $107\frac{1}{2}$ acres on the north bank of the South Fork of Rocky Creek next Amos Sharpe, Thomas M. Sharpe & a branch, for \$400.00, witnessed & proved by W. F. Cowan in Feb. 1834. (John McCreary let said Andrews have this Feb. 15 1806--see book E page 263).
