(This is part of a grant from the agents of Earl Granville to Robert Adams & James Neal by sale on Jan. 10 1761--see Book 6 page 413). A note from John Froheck, Clerk of Court in Feb. 1770

April 14 1767: Deed from Robert Adams & wife to Joseph Robinson for 263 acres Jan. 8 1767 proved by Joseph Robinson.

Book 6 page 413: On Jan. 8 1767, Robert Adams & wife Hallow of Mecklenburg, Co.N.C., let Samuel Robinson of Rowan Co.N.C., have 263 acres on both sides of Lamberts Mill-Creek, for 50 pounds, witnessed by Andrew Neill, William Neill, William Falls & Joseph Robeson & proved in April 1767. (This is part of a tract which Thomas Child granted Robert Adams & James Neal on Jan. 10 1761).

Aug. 9 1769: Deed from Joseph Robinson & wife to George Powders for 263 acres July 15 1769 proved by Thomas Cook.

Book 7 page 125: On July 15 1769, Joseph Roberson & wife Margrett, let George Powders (all of Rowan) have 263 acres on both sides of Lamberts Mill Creek, for 10 pounds, witnessed by James Alley, John Humphreys & Thomas Cook & proved in Aug. 1769. (This is part of a grant from Esq. Thomas Child to Robert Adams & James Neal on Jan. 10 1761).

July 13 1765: Esq. John Oliphant is the Justice for the west side of Dai's Creek in which John Edmond is the Constable.

Book 33 page 324: May 2 1837, Elizabeth A. Patterson gives power of attorney to her husband James Patterson to sell land on Fourth Creek next Wm. Gray, Wm. Hall (which belonged to deced Wm. Lowery, as if she were here

Book 19 page 407: Sept. 25 1805, Janey P lets George Beck (both of Rowan Co. N.C.) have 160 acres on Swan Creek, beginning next Philip Beck, William Elliott, Jas. Patterson, Peter Slagle, & John Cox, near a branch, for \$240.00, witnessed by Britain Js. Haymore, Abraham Beck & Philip Beck & proved by the last named in Nov. 1805.

Aug. 12 1786: Deed from James Patterson to Samuel Barns for 200 acres Aug. 8 1786 is acknowledged.

Book 10 page 461: Aug. 8 1786, James Patterson of Rowan Co. N.C.--no wife signs--lets Samuel Barns have 200 acres on both sides south fork of Swans Creek, for 20 pounds, witnessed by Henry Giles & Alexander Long & acknowledged in Aug. 1786. (This was granted to said Patterson

Book 11 page 46: Sept. 8 1786, Samuel Barns (Rachel signs) let Jacob Beck--all of Rowan Co. N.C.--have 200 acres on both sides the south fork of Swans Creek, for 100 pounds, witnessed by John Rice & Lewis Winkler (in Dutch) & proved by the latter in Aug. 1787. (James Paterson let said Barns have this)

Marriage bonds: Samuel Barns to Rachel Turner March 20 1779 signed by James Turner.

Book 11 page 815: Oct. 29 1789, Jacob Beck--no wife signs--lets Godfrey Ratz (both of Rowan Co. N.C.) have 200 acres on the south fork of Swans Creek next John Andrews, William Peaden & John Sleagol, for 250 pounds, witnessed by William Line & Thomas Carson & proved by the latter in Nov. 1789. (The State granted this to James Patterson by sale Oct. 10

1783 who indentured it to Samuel Barns Aug. 8 1786 who indentured it to said Beck on Sept. 8 1786). It is on both sides of said fork & begins at a stake, goes south 45 chains to a hickory saplin, east 44 chains & 45 links to a pine saplin; north 45 chains to a pine, then west to the beginning.

Book 10 page 120: Oct. 10 1783, The State grants (# 337 at 50 shillings the 100 acres) to James Paterson 200 acres on both sides of Swan Creek.



Book 8 page 531: On Dec. 17 1767, John Miller & wife Mary of Rowan Co.N.C., let John Paterson of Mecklenburg Co.N.C., have 300 acres on the north side of Buffalo Creek next David Miller, for 5 shillings--the release price on next day being 60 pounds--witnessed by David & Benjamin Miller & proved in Jan. 1768. (Earl Granville let John Kirkpatrick have this by sale on Nov. 11 1756 & he let John Miller have it by lease & release on Jan. 12 1764).  
Jan. 12 1764: Lease & release from John Killpatrick(?) to John Miller for 300 acres Jan. 11-12 1764

Book 8 page 143: April 30 1774, John Paterson & wife Elizabeth of Mecklenburg Co.N.C., let William Anderson of Rowan Co.N.C., have 300 acres on north side of Buffalow Creek next David Miller for 100 pounds, witnessed by Griffith Rutherford & James Rutherford & acknowledged in May 1774. (Earl Granville let John Kirkpatrick have this on Nov. 11 1756 & he let John Miller have it Jan. 12 1764, & he let John Paterson have it Dec. 18 1767).

May 4 1774: Deed from John Patterson & wife to William Anderson for 300 acres April 30 1774

Book 17 page 390: On Feb. 1 1800, William Anderson--no wife signs--gives his son Richard Anderson 300 acres on Buffalo Creek next David Miller, witnessed by Matt Brandon & Moses Bellah & proved by the latter in May 1800. (Earl Granville let John Kirkpatrick have this, he let John Miller have it, he let John Peterson have it & he let William Anderson have it).

Book 5 page 432: Jan. 11 1764, John Kirkpatrick--no wife signs--lets John Miller (both of Rowan Co.N.C.) have all of the tract next John Brandon, for 5 shillings--the release price being 30 pounds on the next day--witnessed by James Miller & John Braly & acknowledged on Jan. 1764. (This had been granted to the said Kirkpatrick on Nov. 11 1756). This begins at a white oak on the line of John Brandon on the north side of Buffalo Creek & goes north 60 chains to a white oak, east 50 chains to a hickory, south 60 chains to a black oak, west to the beginning.

July 22 1762: The Justice is John Brandon Esqr. for Capn. Kerrs and Capn. Rutherfords District Constables John Patterson & John Cathey.

Jan. 13 1763: "Order P. Cur that Robert Harvey be appointed Gunse: In Capn. Carrs District instead of John Paterson".

July 16 1763: Esq. Alexander Cathey is the Justice in Capt. Kerr's district in which Robert Harvey is the constable.

Jan. 12 1764: "John Cowen in the room of Robert Harvey" is appointed Constable

Jan. 9 1765: "Robert Luckey, in the Room of John Cowin" is

The will of William Patterson Sr. (book C page 297) made while "very sick & weak" on July 8 1790. Daughters: Mary (wife of Frederick Hunter) & Mary (the remainder of my tract). Grandsons: William Hunter & Charles Hunter (the proceeds in interest from the 150 acres where I now live next James Rutledge, Thomas Summers & William Howard on Johannes Branch until the youngest is of age). Exrs: Thomas Prather & Abraham Brandon & Elias Lovelace.

Book 11 page 388: Oct. 25 1786, The State grants (#1114 at 50 shillings the 100 acres) to William Patterson 478 acres on both sides Hunting Creek next James Rutledge (formerly the heirs of Thomas Black), James Taylor, James Patterson, William Johnston, Henry Johnston, Samuel McCollum, James Caldwell, James Andrews & James Wallens.

Book 19 page 38: Sept. 17 1792, William Bailey & wife Jane let Joseph Roberson--all of Rowan Co.N.C.--have 228 acres on the bank of Hunting Creek on the original line of said Patterson next James Rutledge, Elisha Howard & Jeremiah Jacob, for 150 pounds, witnessed by Thomas Prather & Thomas Summers & John Brandon & proved by the last named in Aug. 1804 (This is part of State Grant #1114 granted to William Patterson on Oct. 25 1786 who willed it to said Jane wife of said Bailey).

Book 19 page 173: Sept. 9 1804, Joseph Roberson & wife Mariam let David Lindsey Ward--all of Rowan Co.N.C.--have 200 acres on the bank of Hunting Creek for 400 pounds, witnessed by John B. Clarke & John Prather & proved by the latter in Feb. 1805. (This is parts of two tracts--one from Earl Granville & the other from The State to William Patterson who conveyed to William Bailey who let said Roberson have)--see more details in Roberson deed.

Book 12 page 721: Feb. 21 1791, John Brandon (as executor of deceased William Patterson), lets Elisha Howard have according to the will, 150 acres on Hunting Creek on west side of Johnstons Branch next James Taylor & William Howard, for 56 pounds, witnessed by Samuel Ellis, John Howard & Thomas Prather & proved by the last named in Aug. 1792. (This is part of a State Grant to said Patterson).

Book 11 page 127: Oct. 25 1786, The State grants (#1413 at 50 shillings the 100 acres) to James Taylor 340 acres on south side bank of Hunting Creek next the conditional line of James Patterson.

Book 12 page 164: Feb. 13 1790, William Patterson Sr.--no wife signs--lets Jeremiah Jacobs (both of Rowan Co.N.C.) have 100 acres on east bank of Hunting Creek next James Rutledge, William Patterson, James Andrews & James Wallace, for 20 pounds, witnessed by Thomas Prather & Richard Veach & proved by the latter in Aug. 1790. (This is part of a State Grant to said Patterson).

Book 8 page 449: Jan. 26 1776, Richard Anten & wife Sarah let Hugh Allen (all of Rowan Co. N.C.) have 209 1/3 acres on Sills Creek next Wm. Hart, Thos. Swan & Wm. Morrison, for 60 pounds, (part 628 acres John Peterson let now deceased Archibald Morrison have & being the 1/3 laid off off Archibald Morrison)

Book 6 page 347: On Dec. 11 1766, John Paterson, a planter--no wife signs--lets Archibald Morrison, also a planter & both of Rowan Co. N.C., have 620 acres on Sills Creek next James Erwin, Joshua Nichols & Samuel Blythe, for 5 shillings--the release price on the next day being 120 pounds--witnessed by Alexander Morrison & John Braly & proved in Jan. 1767. (Earl Granville let John Paterson have this on Dec. 21 1761).

Book 8 page 64: On Dec. 25 1770, Alexander Morrison, a planter & wife Mary, let Thomas Swann, a farmer & all of Rowan Co. N.C., have 209 1/3 acres on Sills Creek next David McDowell, Samuel Blythe, Jacob Nichols, Archibald & William Morrison, for 65 pounds, witnessed by Joseph McConnochie & James Fleming & proved in Feb. 1773. (This is 1/3 of 688 acres which Earl Granville sold John Patterson on Dec. 21 1761 & he let Archibald Morrison have on Dec. 12 1766 by lease & release, he died leaving it by will to his son, the said Alexander Morrison on Sept. 28 1769).

Book 11 page 29: On Aug. 23 1785, Esq. John Brevard, the High Sheriff of Rowan Co. N.C. (on complaint of Samuel Young to Esq. Jacob Nichols that William Morrison has left the county owing him 101 pounds, & by order of the court for restitution, executed by James Andrew, a constable) sells 209 1/3 acres on the waters of Sills Creek next Jas. Erwin, Thos. Swan & Hugh Allen & the old plantation of Joshua Nichols, for 101 pounds, 8 shillings & 7 pence plus 2 pounds, 17 shillings & 11 pence debt, witnessed by Alexander McWhorter & Benjamin Brévard & proved by the latter in May 1787. (This is 1/3 of a tract of 628 acres which John Patterson conveyed to the deceased Archibald Morrison who devised it by will, dated Sept. 20 1769, to the said William Morrison).

May 12 1787: Deed from Sheriff John Brevard Sr. to Saml Young for 209 1/3 acres April 28 1786 proved by Benj. Brevard.

The will of Archibald Morrison (book A page 97) made Sept. 28 1769 while "very sick and weak" probated in Nov. 1769. Wife Mary. Sons: Archibald, William & Alexander (among whom the homeplace is to be divided). Daughters: Sarah, Ann, Mary, Margaret & Jane. Exrs: wife & son Alexander. Witnesses: Jacob Nichols, John Brown & Agnes Nichols.

Nov. 4 1777: Agreeable to a Citation the following persons appeared at this Court and took the Oath of Fidelity to this State Vizt: John Patterson Sr. & Jr., Thomas Swan & others.

July 11 1764: Lease & release from John Gillespie to Arthur Patterson for 100 acres Feb. 1-2 1764 proved by Jno. Brawley.

Book 4 for 5 page 524: On Feb. 2 1764, John Gillespie--no wife signs--lets Arthur Patterson, both of Rowan Co. ## New Benefits Salisbury Evening Post Recommended Wednesday Jan. 20, 1944

A recommendation that the social security program be expanded to include all gainful workers, headed a list of 11 specific recommendations recently made to congress for the expansion and improvement of the old-age and survivors insurance program, according to a statement today by Louis H. Clement, manager of the Salisbury office. The 11 recommendations were included in the tenth annual report of the social security board.

The recommendation that all gainful workers be included, was in behalf of agricultural and domestic employees, public employees and employees of non-profit organizations, and self-employed persons, including farmers, he pointed out, adding that such action would promote better social and economic welfare of the area served by the Salisbury office.

It is pointed out in the annual report of the social security board that in an average week of 1944 only about three-fifths of all gainfully employed civilians were in jobs covered by old-age and survivors insurance. More than 21,000,000 civilians and between 11,000,000 and 12,000,000 servicemen were excluded.

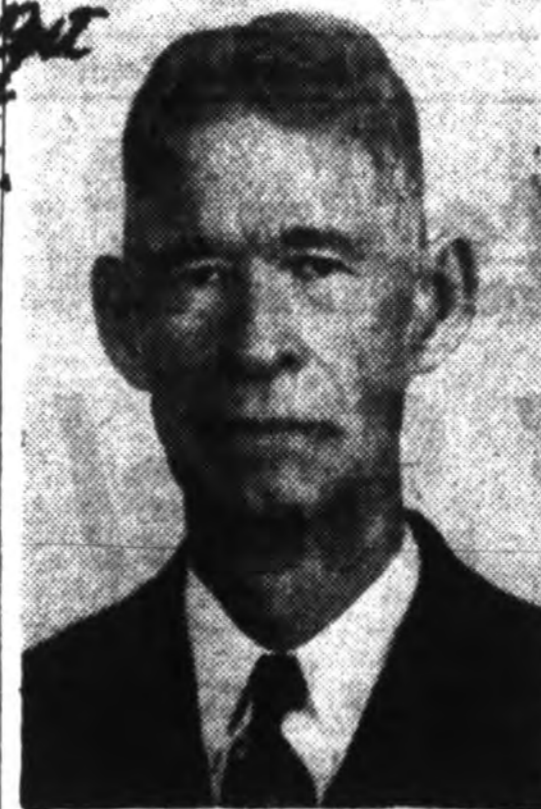
One recommendation of importance to persons already covered by the social security act is for an increase in benefit amounts particularly for low-paid workers. Another proposed change is an increase from \$3,000 to \$3,600 a year in the amount of earnings subject to contribution and counted in computation of benefits.

Three other recommendations by the social security board concerned provisions of the act which experience has shown cause hardship to those who claim benefits. These are: Reduction of the qualifying age for all women beneficiaries to 60 years, from the present 65; deletion of the requirement of school attendance as a condition of receipt of benefits by boys and girls aged 16 and 17; increased in the amount of earnings permitted a beneficiary without suspension of benefits.

In addition, the board recommended greater uniformity in defining, for purposes of the insurance system, family relations qualifying members of a worker's family for benefits; provision for assuring uniformity in coverage decisions relating to liability for contributions and eligibility for benefits; adoption of a long-range plan for financing old-age and survivors insurance, which looks toward an eventual three-way division of costs among employers, employees, and the government.

Two additional insurance provisions have been urged by the board. Clement said, to improve the health of the nation, and to temper the work for wages lost during periods of sickness or other ability.

## F. D. Patterson Called By Death

F. Dewitt Patterson, prominent 67-year-old farmer of the Patterson school community, died this morning at 6 o'clock, following an illness of several months. Mr. Patterson just recently resigned his membership on the China Grove school board because of his declining health.

Mr. Patterson, a former member of the Rowan county board of commissioners, was perhaps best known for his association with the Rowan Mutual Fire Insurance company, which organization he had headed as president since 1933.

He was a member of the POFA, agent for the farm Grange and a representative of the Zenith Chemical works. In addition to his vocation of farming, he at one time operated a roller mill in China Grove.

Mr. Patterson is survived by his widow, the former Minnie McKnight, of China Grove, and a number of nieces and nephews.

The funeral has been set for 2:30 tomorrow afternoon at St. Mark's Lutheran church on the Mooresville highway. The body will lie in state for one-half hour preceding the services. Burial will be in Greenlawn cemetery, Landis.

Active pallbearers will be the nephews of Mr. Patterson. The honorary pallbearers will be: J. M. Blake, Harold Becker, C. R. Moore, Stable Linn, Dr. F. G. Sigmon, D. C. Dungan and Harold Ervin.
