Page 408 of Newberry County South Carolina, by George Selavid Sumner, Sr. in 1950: James Young (of Abbeville District), owned land on Ruddy Branch, on Long cane, which he conveyed to his son Samuel who sold it to David Cannon of Newberry County in year 1821. He came from Guilford County, North Carolina, to Abbeville District in year 1783, he calling on the Keronelly Creek, Ten miles west of Abbeville Court House. He married Jane Caruthers, daughter of Mrs. Martha Caruthers, and sister of James and John Caruthers and Mrs. Benj. Terry. Their children were: Francis, John, Samuel, and Joseph, Isabella, Mary Jane, Margaret, Martha, and Susanmah. Francis married Nancy Little. Samuel married Emma. Isabella married a Magill. In August, 1822, Francis Young died, leaving (Will Book No. 2, Page 122, Public Records of Abbeville County) legatees: Sons, Francis, John, Samuel, Joseph; daughters, Isabella, Mary, Jane and Margaret; children of deceased daughter, Martha Mitchell; Francis, Thomas, Samuel and Jane; children of deceased daughter, Susannah Kerr; Martha VanLandingham, Rachel Sims, Francis, John and David Kerr. Isabella married the Rev. James Magill with issue Jane Young. Jane married John Bashin, with issue, Francis, James S., Jane, Margaret, Susannah, Isabella, Mary and Martha M. Margaret married Elihu Beard (Baird). Francis married Nancy Little, daughter of William Little and Mary New, John T. James and John N. Nancy C. the others I have no record of. Everything possible to be done.

All the children were born in Virginia except Robert. All married and lived in South Carolina except Benjamin and Robert, who married and moved to Hopkinsville, Ky., and then to Alabama in 1817. Since Robert was born in South Carolina, his mother must have been born there. Who were the parents of Samuel Worthington and his wife? Was Samuel in the Revolutionary War? War and was granted land in the Stony Hills of Newberry County in year 1768. He lived on Bush River in 1790. In 1796 he and his wife, Mary, conveyed three hundred four acres on Bush River to Patrick Carmichael. He died about 1810 leaving his widow Mary and children, 898 acres land between Broad and Saluda Rivers. The children who sold all their rights and claims to these lands to the widow, Mary Young, were the following (sale made 1812): Elizabeth (wife of William "Fair" Mary (wife of Charles Thompson), Joseph Young (married Marvarina ...), Hannah (wife of Robert Carmichael), Anne (wife of Robert Brown), Abram Young (married Sarah ...), Esther (wife of Archibald Boyd), James Young (married Isabella ...), Robert and Hannah Carmichael had a daughter, Hannah P., who married William W. 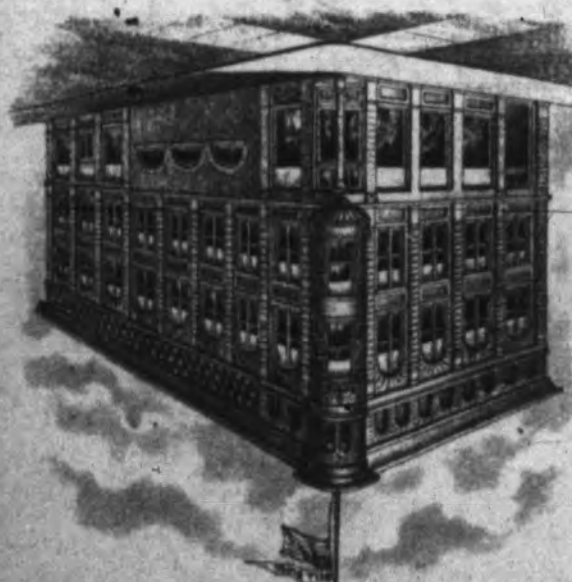

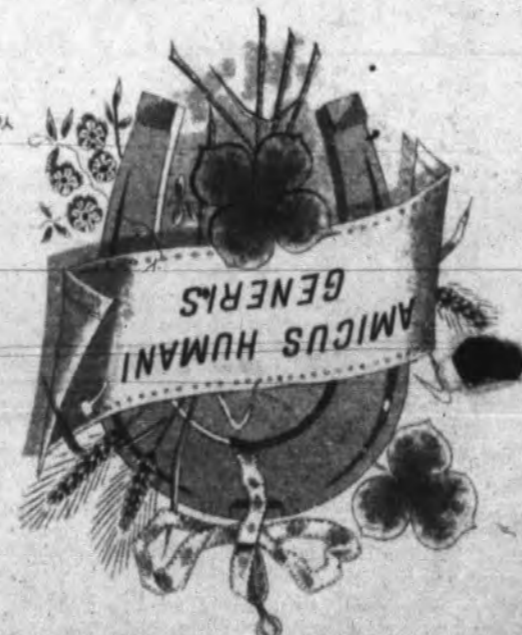
