D.A.R. Lineage vol. 78 page 312: Mrs. Elizabeth Hodge Moseley Posey (wife of Theodore Posey), born in Henderson Co. Kentucky, joined as #77841 from Lieut-Col. 'Hal' or Henry Dixon (1750-82) born & died in Caswell Co. N.C., entered army 1775 as captain of 1st Regiment under Gates at Camden when his command was driven back, served as Inspector-General after Greene succeeded Gates, & was in battles of Wetzell's Mills, Guilford & Eutaw. See also #12084, 50397

Page 31: Mrs. Margaret Dixon Jonas (wife of Edward A. Jonas), born in Ky., joined as #12084 from Col. Henry Dixon who entered the army in 1775 as captain of the first regiment, and by precept & example to troops, inspired them with courage--they called him 'Hal' in affection. Among the shattered legion of Gates at Camden when his command was driven back, he wouldn't retreat but scattered his way through the foes. He also served as Inspector-General after Gates was succeeded by Greene. Was in battles of Wetzells Mills, Eutaw & Guilford. Wasted with wounds, he died at age of 42 in 1782. (See also #10472). She is a daughter of Dr. Archibald Dixon & wife Margaret Herndon; granddaughter of Honorable Archibald Dixon & wife Elizabeth Cattell; great-granddaughter of Wynn Dixon & wife Rebecca Hart; great-great-granddaughter of Henry Dixon & wife Francis Wynn.

D.A.R. Lineage, Vol. LXXVI page 332: Miss Mary Dixon, born in Union Co. Ky., joined as #75888 from Col. Henry Dixon (1750-82) who was captain of First N.C. regiment in 1775, major in 1777 of third N.C. regiment, promoted to lieut-col. in 1778, wounded at Stono Ferry in 1779, transferred to second N.C. regiment in 1782 served in this until death. He was born & died in Caswell Co. N.C. (See also #66301).

Also from George Taylor (1711-92) born in Caroline Co. died in Orange Co. Va., fought in early wars, organized & drilled the Orange Co. Va. militia, was member of Committee of Safety & of the Convention in 1774. Had ten sons in the American army & navy during the Revolution.

Also from Lieutenant Jonathan Taylor (1742-1803) born in Orange Co. Va., died in Jason Spring Ky., served as lieutenant in Va. Convention Guards in 1779-81. (See also #74109).

Also from William Taylor (1753-1829) born in Orange Co. Va., died in Louisville Ky., entered the army as lieut. in 1776, rose to major of ninth Va. in 1779 & was retired in 1781. (See also #53996). She is a daughter of George Wynne Dixon (1841-81) & wife Julia Taylor (born 1852) whom he married in 1873; granddaughter of Norel Taylor (1824-58) & wife Lucy Mary Howard (1828-1905), also of John Robert Dixon & wife Sarah Green Powell (died 1874); great-granddaughter of Henry Dixon Jr. & first wife Mary Johnson, of Francis Taylor (1783-1846) & his cousin, Ann Elizabeth (Taylor 1788-1862) whom he married in 1804; great-great-granddaughter of William Taylor (1753-1829) & wife Lucy Herd (whom he married in 1786), of Jonathan Taylor (1742-1803) & wife Anne Jerry Henry Dixon; great-great-granddaughter of George Taylor & wife R. 



Book 44 page 339: June 20 1868, Luke Blackmer as Clerk of Court (On petition of the heirs of Margaretta Dixon for sale of property Nov. 29 1862) lets William H. Crawford have 2 acres in east square of town at corner to Innis & Lee Streets (fronting Innis 200 feet & 200 feet to Lee) next Mr. Bell & John I. Shaver, for \$2000.00 in Confederate money with 6 months credit.

Book 26 page 300: Feb. 17 1820, Thomas Dickson of Salisbury, N.C. (Margaretta M. also signs) lets Moses Brown Sr. of Rowan Co. N.C., have his interest in 48 acres on Crane creek called Brown's meadow, also the town lots where Jeremiah Brown's widow now lives, the Tarkill Branch tract, 3 beds, cattle household & kitchen furniture, if he will pay \$300.00 to Jn. Utzman & \$220.00 to Maxwell, witnessed & proved by Samuel Reeves in Feb. 1821.

Book 25 page 409: April 12 1819, John Fulton--no wife signs--lets Thomas Dickson (both of Rowan Co.N.C.) have 12 sq. poles of lot #17 in the great south square of Salisbury, for \$450.00, witnessed by R.P.Pearson & Mk. Pinkston & acknowledged in Aug. 1819. (This had been sold by the Fullen-wider heirs to Francis Gardner who died & the sheriff sold it to me as the highest bidder).

Book 27 page 703 or 750 (numbered twice): July 17 1824, William Dickson makes a deed to trust to Thomas Dickson, as he is indebted to said Thomas \$324.93 & wants to pay &c) lets him have all his title to lots #53 & 54 in great---- square of Salisbury where said William now lives, but these are not to be put up for sale until after next Aug. 10th, witnessed & proved by John L.Henderson in Aug. 1824.

Book 34 page 383: March 25 1839, Maxwell Chambers--no wife signs--lets Stephen Frentis (both of Rowan Co.N.C.) have lots #53,54,61 & 62 in the great west square of Salisbury where said Frentis now lives, for \$1200.00 witnessed by Thomas L.Cowan & James Biles & acknowledged in May 1840. (Thomas Dickson & William Chambers sold these to said Maxwell Chambers).

Feb. 9 1788: Deed from John Carson & wife to James Bridges for lot #5 in the south square of Salisbury Sept. 19 1787 is acknowledged.

Book 11 page 315: Sept. 19 1787, "John Carson (Eldest Son & heir of James Carson the Elder deceased) & Margrett his wife" of Rowan Co.N.C., let James Bridges, a "Millright" of have lot #5 in the south square of Salisbury (144 sq. poles), for 120 pounds & subject to the quit-rents, witnessed by H.Horah & Wm. Hamton & acknowledged in Feb. 1788.

May 11 1792: Deed from James Bridges to Martin Fifer for 1/2 lot #5 in the south square of Salisbury March 23 1792 proved by Richard Trotter.

Book 12 page 582: March 23 1792, James Bridges of Mecklenburg Co.N.C.--no wife signs--lets Martin Phifer have the upper part of lot #5 in great south square of Salisbury on corner of Corbin & Temple Streets nearest the courthouse containing a dwelling house at west corner; also lot #13 at west corner of said lot on Temple St., being 144 sq poles for 113 pounds, witnessed by William Lee Alexander & M. Trotter & proved by the latter in May 1792.

Book 18 page 94: July 3 1802, James Bridges of Cabarrus Co.N.C.--no wife signs--lets Richard Dickson of have 1/2 of lot #5 in the great south square of Salisbury, being the wouthwestern 72 sq. poles which runs of Main St., for \$225.00, witnessed & proved by George Betz in Nov. 1802.



ook 9 page 404: March 16 1784, Joseph Dickson, Gentleman, late of Rowan Co.N.C.--no wife signs--lets Robert Cochran of Rowan Co.N.C., have 30 acres next Robert Cochran, Joseph Dickson & James Hennight, for 500 pounds, witnessed by John Traly Jr. & John Traly Sr. & proved by the latter in May 1784. (This is part of 720 acres granted to said Dickson).

Draper's King's Mountain, page 477: Joseph Dickson of Scotch-Irish descent, born about 1745 married Margaret McEwen, a Scotch lady & migrated to N.C. ^{before the Revolution} & settled in Rowan Co. first but moved to Lincoln Co. He was a captain as early & probably prior to April 1779. Joined Gen. Rutherford in June 1780 & aided in the riddance of tories in the country, served under Col. McDowell, was a major of Lincoln Co. at King's Mountain, became a colonel. He was Clerk of Lincoln Co. Court in 1781; Senator 1788-95; General of the Militia, Congressman etc. moved to Caldwell Co (now) in 1803 but moved to Rutherford Co. Tenn. in 1806 where he died April 14 1825 aged about 80 years.
