Book 5 page 444: On Jan. 27 1764, William Robinson--no wife signs--lets Arthur Forbus, a weaver & both of Rowan Co.N.C., have 466 acres on both sides of Hunting Creek, a fork of Richland Creek waters of Reedy Fork of Haw River next Samuel Scott, for 70 pounds, witnessed by James McQuiston Jr. & John McKnight & proved by the latter on March 23 1764. (Fact #15)

Book 4 page 42: On June 10 1758, Earl Granville lets William Robinson of Rowan Co.N.C., have 466 acres on both sides of Hunting Creek, a fork of Rich Land the Waters of Reedy Fork of Haw River next Samuel Scott, for 10 shillings (through his agents Francis Corbin & Joshua Bodley), witnessed & proved by William Churton in Oct. 1758.

The D.A.R. Magazine of Dec. 1914 page 330, in Autobiographical Sketches of Citizens of Clay Co. Mo. by courtesy of Mrs. G.W. Clardy of Liberty, Clay Co., Mo., who copied them for the Genealogical Department from the "Tribune" of Liberty, Mo. during years 1869-1870: "ROBERTSON. I was b Orange Co. North Carolina, June 22, 1796. My father, HUGH ROBERTSON, was a soldier in the Continental Army during the greater part of the Rev. war. He was under Gen. Greene in the battle of Guilford. My father was also at Yorktown, and witnessed the surrender of Cornwallis. He emigrated to Wilson Co. Tenn. in 1798. I was raised in Wilson Co. within two miles of the "Hermitage." I was at the Hermitage during the life of Andrew Jackson many times; saw him at church and camp meeting time and again. I was in the War of 1812; was a corporal in Capt. John Wade's Co. Ralston's regiment, Carroll's Brigade Tenn. Militia. I was in the battle of New Orleans, and was on the left wing of the American army, and saw the entire advance of the British Army. They advanced in a most imposing order, and without a break in their ranks until after our fire was delivered. The recollection of their scarlet uniform and martial bearing is fresh to me as yesterday. I emigrated to Clay Co. in the fall of 1820. There were only a few settlers herethen, and among the principal ones were Col. John Thornton, Col. Shubael Allen, Major John Bartleson, Andrew Bartleson, John Dean, Thomas Campbell, Henry Estes, Peter Estes, Thomas Estes, James Hyatt, Wm. Linehart, Richard Hill, James Gilmore, Robert Hilmore, Ennis Vaughan, Eppes Tillery, Col. Martin Palmer, John Wilson, Squire Hutchinson, Samuel Telford, Edmund Munday, Eldridge Potter, Thomas Hixson, Edward piburn, Hugh Brown, Sen. and Jr. Joseph Brown, and David M. Bivens. In 1822 I helped lay off the town of Liberty, and cleared the public square of timber. I laid off the first public road in Clay Co. That road commenced on the south side of the public square in Liberty and extended south to the ford on Big Shoal Creek where the upper Kansas City Road now crosses the same. (That road is now called Ridge Road Boulevard, of which Mr. G.W. Clardy is President.) I assisted in building the first female seminary in Clay Co. The house built is the one in Liberty where Wm.H. Lane now lives. I represented Clay Co. in the legislature for two years ab. 1830; and was in some way connected with most of the public enterprises in Clay Co. from 1820 to 1861; have been a Cumberland Presbyterian since 1819; raised seven children. Andrew Robertson."

A letter from Mrs. Martha W. Kendall of 832 N.N. Jersey St., Indianapolis, Ind., on Feb. 21 1925, wanting information of Thomas Thornton (her great-grandfather) who married Elizabeth Robertson & had a son born on March 3 1783 (Mrs. Kendall's grand-father), named Henry Presley Thornton.

Witnesses: Thomas seals, Richard Williams & Robert Surminers(?).

Rowan Co.N.C. book 5 page 238: Jan. 9 1761, Earl Granville lets John Robinson, a planter of Rowan Co.N.C., have 540 acres on both sides Reedy Fork of Haw River also crossing Moons (or Moores Creek), for 10 shillings, witnessed by
& proven in July 1762.

Book 6 page 248: On Oct. 11 1765, Richard Robison & wife Sarah, let George Robison have 204 1/2 acres on both sides Second Creek next William Carson & Robert Porter, for 15 pounds, witnessed by John Mitchell & Maxwell Chambers & proved in Oct. 1765. (This is 1/2 of 409 acres which Earl Granville let him have on Aug. 28 1762 & is the plantation upon which he lives).

Book 5 page 112: On Aug. 28 1762, Earl Granville lets Richard Robinson of Rowan Co.N.C., have 409 acres, beginning at a bottom about 8 poles from Beaver Dam Branch & next ---Cowan, for 10 shillings, witnessed by John Agar & John Frohock & proved in April 1763.

Book 4 page 901: On Dec. 29 1760, Earl Granville lets George Elliott, a planter of Rowan Co.N.C., have 550 acres on the east side of the Catiba River on Buffelow Creek next Richard Robinson, for 10 shillings, witnessed by W. Lucas & William Churton & proved by the latter at Salisbury on Sept. 25 1762.

Book 5 page 7: On Jan. 3 1761, Earl Granville lets Richard Robenson, a planter of Rowan Co.N.C., have 640 acres on Eight Mile Shore Creek waters of Catiba River on the north side of the Creek, for 10 shillings, witnessed by George Disbrowe & Ws.Churton & proved by William Churton on Sept. 25 1762.

Book 6 page 198: Dec. 3 1764 Robert Woods (Margaret makes mark) lets Henry McHenry, a 'Taylor' --all of Rowan Co.N.C.--have 512 acres next Samuel Burnet, for 5 shillings--the release price being 32 pounds next day--witnessed by Matthew, Samuel & Joseph Woods & acknowledged in Oct. 1765.

Book 8 page 359: On May 3 1776, William Robinson, a yeoman, lets Archibald McHenry, a cordwinder--both of Rowan Co.N.C.--have a gray mare marked H on the buttock, for 8 pounds, witnessed by Elizabeth McGaughey & John McHenry & proved by the latter in Feb. 1777.

Aug. 9 1788: Deed from William Cowin to Henry Robison for 26 1/2 acres Aug. 29 1784 proved by Samuel Young.

Book 11 page 505: Aug. 29 1784, William Cowan--no wife signs--lets Henry Robison (both of Rowan co.N.C.) have 26 1/2 acres on the north side of Second Creek next where the said Henry Robison now lives on the original corner of his plantation, for 20 pounds, witnessed by James Wilson & Samuel Young & proved by the latter in Aug. 1788. (This is part of 450 acres which Earl Granville granted said William Cowan on Feb. 28 1760).

Book 10 page 4: Aug. 15 1784, William Cowan (Sarah also signs) let Matthew Stuart--all of Rowan Co.N.C.--have 426 1/2 acres on the north side of Second Creek next Henry Robertson & David Cowan (which he bought from Moses Thompson), for 400 pounds, witnessed by Henry Robieson & Samuel Young & acknowledged in Nov. 1784. (This is where William Cowan now lives next the land of Malcom Hamilton now belonging to Abraham Gillihan, & Henry Robertson, & is part of the land which Earl Granville indentured to said Cowan on Feb. 28 1760).

Book 4 page 306: Feb. 28 1760, Earl Granville lets William Cowan, a planter of Rowan Co.N.C., have 584 acres on the north side of Second Creek next Malcolm Hamilton, Richard Robison & William Porter, for 10 shillings (Robinson & Jas. McCuen).

Marriage Bonds: Eleanor Robinson to Isaac McHenry Jan. 17 1788 signed by Hugh

Book 6 page 315: Oct. 29 1765, Henry McHenry & wife Elenor let Archibald McHenry have 256 acres next John Hagin & Thomas Bell, for 5 shillings--the release price being 40 pounds on next day--witnessed by John Culbertson & John Traly & proved in Oct. 1766. (This is 1/2 of 512 acres which Robert Woods & wife let Henry McHenry have).

Book 29 page 419: The widow & heirs of deceased Hugh Robinson choose George Robison, Will Barber & J.E.Dobbins to lay off the 184 acres next James Briggs & the heirs of Peggy Roberson, on Sept. 21 1822

Book 23 page 331: On Nov. 19 1812, Henry Robison Sr. of Rutherford Co.Tenn.--no wife signs--lets David Fraley of Rowan Co.N.C., through his attorney Hugh Robison, have 200 acres (next the tract of 600 acres which Robert Harris let Henry Robison have) on Beaverdam Branch waters of Second Creek, for \$500.00, witnessed by J.Krider & Jno. Trexler? & proved by J.Krider in Nov. 1815.

Book 5 page 588: On Jan. 21 1763, Robert Harris & wife Francis of Becklenburg Co.N.C. (he is a planter) let Henry Robinson of Rowan Co.N.C., have 600 acres on both sides of Beaver Dam Branch waters of Second Creek above the Atkin Ford & next William Cowin & George Robinson, for 70 pounds, witnessed by Richard Robeson, George Robison & Robert Harris Jr. & sworn to on March 25 1763. (Earl Granville let Robert Harris have this on Feb. 28 1760).

Book 10 page 4: On Aug. 15 1784, William Cowan (Sarah also signs) lets Matthew Stewart have 426 1/2 acres on the north side of Second Creek next Henry Robertson & David Cowan (which he bought of Moses Thompson it being the plantation upon which said William Cowan now lives & had been next Malcome Hamilton but now Abraham Gilihans), for 400 pounds, witnessed by Henry Robieson & Samuel Young & proved in Nov. 1784. (Earl Granville's agent, Thomas Child, let William Cowan have this on Feb. 28 1760).

Book 5 page 112: On Aug. 28 1762, Earl Granville lets Richard Robinson of Rowan Co.N.C., have 409 acres beginning at a bottom about 8 poles from Beaver Dam Branch & next ---Covin, for 10 shillings, witnessed by John Agar & John Frohock & proved in April 1763.

Book 6 page 248: On Oct. 11 1765, Richard Robison & wife Sarah let George Robison have 204 1/2 acres on both sides of Second Creek next William Carson & Robert Porter, for 15 pounds, witnessed by John Mitchell & Maxl. Chambers, & proved in Oct. 1765. (This is part of 409 acres plantation upon which said Richard Robison now lives and which he got from Earl Granville on Aug. 28 1762).

: Lease & release from Richard Robison & wife Sarah to George Robison for 204 acres Oct. 11 1765 proved by Maxwell Chambers.

The will of George Robison of Second Creek (Book C page 198) made Nov. 4 1785 while 'very sick and weak'. Wife Anna. Sons: Hugh (400 acres bought of Robert Porter) & Henry (where I live & 40 acres bought of Robert Porter on Walnut Branch). Daughters: Margaret (200 acres next son Hugh which was bought of Robert Porter), Elenor, Jennett, Ann, Elizabeth & Mary. Exrs: wife, son Hugh & brother Henry Robison. Witnesses: Richard Robison, Henry Robinson & Samuel Young. He has a P.S. which appoints brother Richard Robison guardian of the children under age.

Book 10 page 540: Oct. 10 1783, The State grants (#281 at 50 shillings the 100 acres) to Jacob Sulfin 200 acres on east side of Walnut Branch next Richard, William & George Robinson & Col. Francis Lock.

Book 13 page 963: On March 2 1795, Andrew Hunter of Burke Co.N.C.--no wife signs--lets Henry Robison, a planter of Rowan Co.N.C., have 100 acres on the north side of Second Creek next the deeded land of Richard Robison, Samuel Hillis, James Raery & James Penery (formerly land of Samuel Hillis), for 100 pounds, witnessed by J.W.Petchey & J.Troy & proved by John Troy in May 1795. (This is part of a tract surveyed for Robert McBride).

May 8 1795: Deed from Andrew Hunter to Henry Robison for 100 acres March 2 1795 proved by John Troy.

May 6 1784: Deed from Robert McBride & wife to John Hunter for 100 acres Oct. 6 1783 proved by Andw. Ferguson.

Book 9 page 418: On Oct. 6 1783, Robert McBride & wife Jean "Planter & Spins-ter" let John Hunter have 100 acres on Second Creek next Richard Robison, Samuel Hillis & James Pennery, for 48 pounds, witnessed & proved by Andrew Ferguson in May 1784. (This is part of a State Grant of 275 acres to Robert McBride).

Book 9 page 281: Robert McBride has a State Grant (#102) of 275 acres next Richard Robertson, Samuel Hilliss, Samuel Willson, Lawrence Thompson & Alexander Ferguson on Second Creek, March 21 1780.

Book 10 page 205: Oct. 10 1783, The State grants (#246 at 50 shillings the 100 acres) to Richard Robison 72 acres on both sides Second Creek next said Robison.

Book 29 page 408: On _____, David I. Robison & Richard W. Robison let Henry D. McBroom (all of Rutherford Co. Tenn.) have 66 2/3 acres on Second Creek next Mrs. McBroom, Robert Cowan, the deceased Alexander Dobbins, William Davenport, Jonathan Barber, James Knox, the south side of the great road, John McBroom, W. McBroom, & John Locke, for \$726.00?, witnessed by H. Trott, Willis Snell & James Barkley Sr. & proved by the last named in Nov. 1824. (This is their undivided part of 535 acres)

Book 17 page 514: Aug. 16 1800, Hugh Robison (son of Richard Robison)--no wife signs--lets Jane Templeton Dobbins, Rachel Dobbins, Lucinda Smith Dobbins & Ann Alexander Dobbins--all of Rowan Co.N.C.--have 138 acres in the original tract of Hugh Robison, next Wm. Davenport, Col. Robison, Hugh Robison Robert Cowan & John Wincaid, for \$275.00 (paid by their deceased father Alexander Dobbins), witnessed by Wm. Davenport & Joseph Thomson & proved by the latter in Nov. 1800.

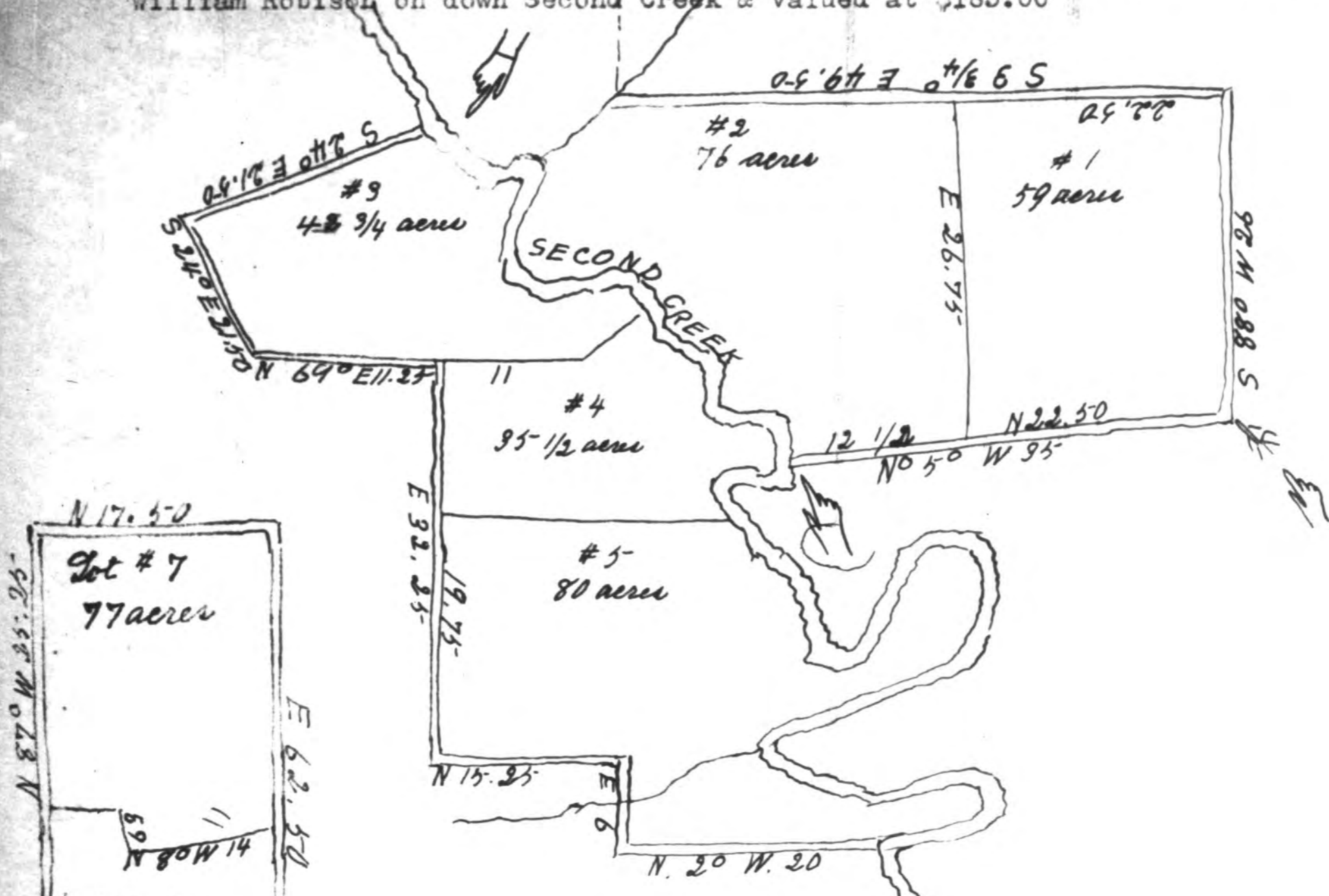
Book 12 page 371: May 4 1791, Benjamin Robison, a planter of Rowan Co.N.C.--lets his son George Robison have 158 acres on south side of Second Creek on Walnut Branch, for love, witnessed by John White & John Howard & proved by the latter in May 1791. (This is part of 409 acres granted to said Richard Robison by Earl Granville on Aug. 28 1762)

Division of Estates book A page 170: March 16 1818, the estate of deceased Henry Robison was divided by John Farner, J.S. Dobbin, William Williamson & John Marlin with J. Andrews as D.S.

Lot #1 of 59 acres goes to Jane Robison & adjoins Thomas Geen, --- Pennery, Robert Beard & John Fulton, including the dwelling house & valued at \$428.50.

Lot #2 of 76 acres goes to Eleanor Robison & is on the south bank of the creek next Thomas Gheen, lot #1, John Fulton near the east side of Beaver Dam Branch, the heirs of William Robison on down Second Creek & valued at \$183.00

Lot # 3 goes to Henry Felix Robison & is 43 3/4 acres on the south bank of the creek next the heirs of deceased William Robison, near the school house, Jacob Link, in the bottom of a branch, near the rock quarry & is valued at \$2.50 the acre or \$109.37 1/2.

Lot #4 goes to Richard Robison & is 35 1/2 acres on the bank of Second Creek next the rock quarry, lot #3, east of a branch, Jacob Link & lot #5 & is valued at \$2.50 the acre or \$88.75.

Lot #5 goes to John W. Robison & is 80 acres on the bank of Second Creek next lot #4, Jacob Link, John Elliott, the west side of a branch & Thomas Gheen & is valued at \$1.00 the acre or \$80.00.

This is called Link's Tract but is a part of the above estate & is divided into two parts: Lot #6 goes to Sally Robison & is 45 acres next William Plummer, George Robison, heirs of deceased William Robison, east side of a branch, lot #7, near Reuben Yarbrough near the low grounds of a branch & #8, valued at \$2.00 the acre or \$90.00.

Lot #7 goes to Samuel Robison & is 77 acres next William Plummer, crossing a branch, next Reubin Yarbrough, valued at 50 cents the acre or \$38.50.

John Beard (as high-sheriff of Rowan, on an execution against John W. & Eleanor Robison for \$189.98 recovered by John Fraleigh, with orders to sell & which he did on April 26 1821) lets Joseph E. Dobbins of Rowan have 76 acres on the east side of Beaver Dam Branch next --- Fulton, corner of lot #1, the heirs of William Robison & on down the Second Creek on the south side next Thomas Green for \$60.00,

Book 34 page 170: March 10 1838, George S. Robison & his mother Jane Robison let Jacob Lyerly & Daniel Lyerly--all of Rowan Co.N.C.--have 170 acres on Second Creek next the schoolhouse spring, Joseph E. Book 32 page 137: Jan. 31 1834, Andrew Lyerly--no wife signs--lets Francis Johnson (both of Rowan Co.N.C.) have lot #3 or 43 $\frac{1}{2}$ acres on the south bank of Second Creek next the heirs of William Robison, near the school-house, Jacob Link, near the rock quarry & up the said creek, for \$295.00, witnessed & proved by John Beard Jr. in Feb 1834. (This is lot #3 in estate of deceased Henry Robison).

Robison--no wife signs--lets George Parkes (both of Rowan Co.N.C.) have 60 acres on the south side of Second Creek next William Robison, Jacob Link, John Elliott, west side of a branch, Thomas Green & up said creek, for \$75.00, witnessed by Reuben Kurbrew & Samuel Elliott & proved by the latter in Feb. 1821.

Book 31 page 618: April 10 1826, George Park & Elizabeth Over of Davidson Co.N.C.--no wives sign--let Peter Josey of Rowan Co.N.C., have 115 $\frac{1}{2}$ acres on the south bank of Second Creek near the rock quarry, lot #3, east side of a branch, Jacob Link, John Elliott & Thomas Green, on up the creek, for \$750.00, witnessed by McQuire & John Link & proved by the latter in Aug. 1832.

(This is 1/2 of 200 acres which John Randleman let Richard Robison have who sold it to said Spurgin).

Book 18 page 906: June 10 1799, Leonard Heasley--no wife signs--lets William Poer (both of Rowan Co.N.C.) have 100 acres on the dividing ridge between Reedy Creek & Swearing Creek next Jacob Heagey, Esq. Joseph Clark, Jacob Clinart, Michael Sowers (called in said Heasley's deed Charles Cooper's), John Livengood & Peter Easter, for \$200.00, witnessed by Joseph Clarke & Thomas Carson & proven in Feb. 1804. (This is part of the 400 acres sold by The State to John Randleman Oct.14 1785, who let Richard Robison have this Jan.8 1787, who let William Spurgin have, who let Devolt Lock have by indenture March 2 1789, who let said Heasley have by indenture Dec.24 1785).

D.A.R.Lineage, Vol.V page 246: Mrs. Mildred Taylor (radford (wife of H.P. radford), born in Ky., joined as #4689 from General James Robertson of Tenn. who founded Nashville. He was captain in command of Fort Watauga & served in the expedition against the Indians & tories under Col. Christian & was an Indian Agent in 1777, was in N.C.Militia in 1780. She is the daughter of Dr. John Martin Taylor & wife Mary Elizabeth Robertson; granddaughter of Benjamin Franklin Robertson & wife Martha Eliza Goodloe; great-granddaughter of Jonathan Robertson & wife Ciddy Davis; great-great-granddaughter of James Robertson & wife Charlotte Reeves.

D.A.R.Lineage Vol.61 page 326: Mrs. Lillian Robertson Sherrouse (wife of Col. John Monroe Sherrouse) born in Baton Rouge La., joined as #60978 from Col. James Robertson (1742-1814) born in Brunswick Co.Va., died in Memphis, Tenn., was a captain in command of Fort Watauga; served under Col. Christian in an expedition against the Indians & Tories; was Indian Agent in 1777 & Colonel of N.C.Militia in 1780. See also #47385 & 54061. She is the daughter of Edward White Robertson & wife Mary Jane Pope; granddaughter of William Blunt Robertson (born 1785) & wife Leadicea Erwin; great-granddaughter of Col. James Robertson & wife Charlotte Reeves.

Pioneer Women of The West, page 63: "Charlotte Reeves was the second daughter of George Reeves and Mary Jordan, and was born in Northampton County, N.C., in January 1751. Her parents were poor in worldly possessions, and were able to give their children only a limited education: but they trained them to labor and habits of systematic industry, and in those strict principles which guided and preserved their parents through life, and made their example useful. Soon after the marriage of Charlotte with James Robertson, the young couple crossed the mountains and fixed their above in one of the new settlements on the Watauga or Holston River.

In 1779, Robertson went with some others to explore the Cumberland Valley, leaving his family behind. They explored the country to the neighborhood of the spot where Nashville now stands, planted there a field of corn, and leaving three of the party to keep the buffaloes out of the corn, returned to East Tennessee for their families. The fame of the fertile Cumberland lands, the salubrity of the air, the excellence of the water, and the abundance of game of all sorts, was soon diffused through all the frontier settlements, and many took the resolution of emigrating to this land of plenty. Companies came and built cabins and block houses and in the latter part of February or first of March 1780, Mrs. Robertson left her home at the mouth of Big Creek on the Holston, for the purpose of joining her husband. Her party consisted of herself and four small children, her brother William Reeves, Charles Robertson her husband's brother, her sister-in-law, and three little nieces, with two white men servants, a negro woman and her infant. These voyagers were conveyed in two of the small and frail flat boats appointed to convey the families of emigrants to their new homes in the wilderness. Capt. James Robertson

Ashe's History of N.C. Vol. II. page 27: In 1779, James Robertson went to French Lick on the Cumberland which was separated from the Watauga settlement by impassable mountains. This was a salt-lick so named because it was once occupied by French traders. Much troubles by Indians it never-the-less grew until the Assembly of N.C. established a new county with its central as Nashville, & named it Davidson County, in 1783. At the same session there was also set off for the patriots of the Revolution, a large portion from the point where the Cumberland River crosses the Va. line south 55 miles to & west to Tenn., but later these grants were mis-managed & caused many lawsuits. In the valley of the Powell River east of the Cumberland mts. more than 2000 acres were allotted to Richard Henderson, the Indians remaining from the French Broad to Chicamauga. The soldiers crossed to the Powell & Clinch & other settlers flowed to the distant Cumberland.

Annals of Tennessee (Ramsey) page 103: "A little after noon, and early in 1770, came also James Robertson, from Wake county, North-Carolina. "He is the same person" to use the language of Haywood, who was his countryman, and knew him well, "who will appear hereafter by his actions, to have merited all the eulogium, esteem and affection, which the most ardent of his countrymen have ever bestowed upon him. Like almost all those in America who have attained eminent celebrity, he had not a noble lineage to boast of, nor the escutcheoned armorials of a splendid ancestry. But he had what was far more valuable; a sound mind, healthy constitution, a robust frame, a love of virtue, an intrepid soul, and an emulous desire for honest fame. He visited the delightful country on the waters of Holston, to view the new settlements which then began to be formed on the Watauga. Here he found one honeycut living in a hut, who furnished him with food. He made a crop there the first year. On re-crossing the mountains he got lost for some time, and coming to a precipice, over which his horse could not be led, he left him there and travelled on foot. His powder was wetted by repeated showers and could not be used in the procurement of game for food. Fourteen days he wandered without eating, till he was so much reduced and weakened that he began seriously to despair of reaching his home again. *** met two hunters who gave him food, reached home, but soon returned to Watauga with a few others, and there settled." "This is the man who will figure in the future so deservedly as the greatest benefactor of the first settlers of the country". (Page 104).

Page 141: "James Robertson lived on the north side of the river, at the upper end of the island, on lands since the property of A.M. Carter, Esq., deceased, late of Elizabethton."

Page 142: "Mr. honeycut, whose hospitality furnished the first home to James Robertson, lived about Roane's Creek, near the Watauga."

Page 664: "At this session, Tennessee county was divided, and the counties of Robertson and Montgomery established out of its territory.

The former was so named in honour of General James Robertson, the patriarch of Watauga and the founder of the Cumberland settlements. He was a native of North Carolina, and emigrated to Watauga in 1769. These Annals have abounded with incidents of his life"***"To his wife he was indebted for a knowledge of the alphabet, and for instruction how to read and write."

REV. NATHANIEL IRWIN (ERWIN) OF PENNSYLVANIA AND SOUTH CAROLINA.
(ALEXANDER ERWIN²) (ARTHUR ERWIN²)

NATHANIEL IRWIN¹ (Erwin) came to America in 1740 from the North of Ireland, probably Londonberry, landed at Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, and settled at Fagg's Manor Township, Bucks County, Pennsylvania. He was a preacher and maker of spinning wheels. This township was largely settled by Scotch-Irish Presbyterians where a Church was established 1731 and was often called New Londonberry. He moved to York County, South Carolina, about 1768. He was a Revolutionary Soldier. Served in the Mecklenburg militia. (N.S.D.A.R. No. 93009). He married Leah Julian in Ireland and several of their children were born in Ireland. His will is on file in York County Court-house, Yorkville, South Carolina, Case 65, Book A. Vol. 50, pages 91-93. Made his will December 13, 1793, with his wife Leah (Julian) Irwin, Executrix.-----

+LEAH JULIAN (wife of Nathaniel Irwin) was a member of the Julian family who came over to England and later to Ireland from France. The Julian family were originally Roman or Italian. The few who bear the name in Great Britain and America are descendants of the Frenchman who immigrated to these places; the name as we know is purely French origin, having died out in Italy at the downfall of Rome. Jacob Julian, brother of Leah, was Executor of the will of Nathaniel Irwin. (From Virginia Historical Magazine).

+ ARTHUR ERWIN² (Nathaniel¹) born 1726, in Ireland; mar. (2) Margaret Brandon. They lived in Bucks County, Pennsylvania, where he was a large land holder. He laid out the town of Erwinia on the Delaware River and also the town called Erwin, in Steuben County, New York. Arthur Erwin was a Revolutionary Soldier, Captain in 1776; Colonel in 1778, under Gen. Israel Putnam of Bucks County, Pennsylvania, militia (the original order now in Philadelphia). The Point where Washington crossed the Delaware lay but a few miles below where Colonel Arthur Erwin's plantation stretched for ten miles along the Delaware about what is now called Erwinia opposite Frenchtown, New Jersey. Colonel Erwin furnished most of the boats for that event, manning them with his own slaves and tenants. He equipped his Company largely at his own expense. (From Bucks County History.)

ALEXANDER ERWIN³ (NATHANIEL¹)

+ ALEXANDER ERWIN² (Nathaniel¹) was born in Bucks County, Pennsylvania, Dec. 29, 1750, and died in North Carolina, June 20, 1830. He married 1770, in Morganton, Burke County, N.C., Sarah Ann Robinson of Lancaster, South Carolina (dau. of James and Catherine Robinson) born in 1750, and died in 1785, Burke County, North Carolina. He held in Colonial times, the official position of District Auditor for settling claims. Member North Carolina State Legislature 1793-4-5-6. Was Founder of the Morganton Academy. He was a Revolutionary Soldier. Private in North Carolina troops; non-commissioned officer, then Captain and in 1780 was promoted to Colonel. Was in active service 7 years. Was given 575 acres of land in Washington County, Georgia, June 25, 1784, for his services as a Revolutionary Soldier. 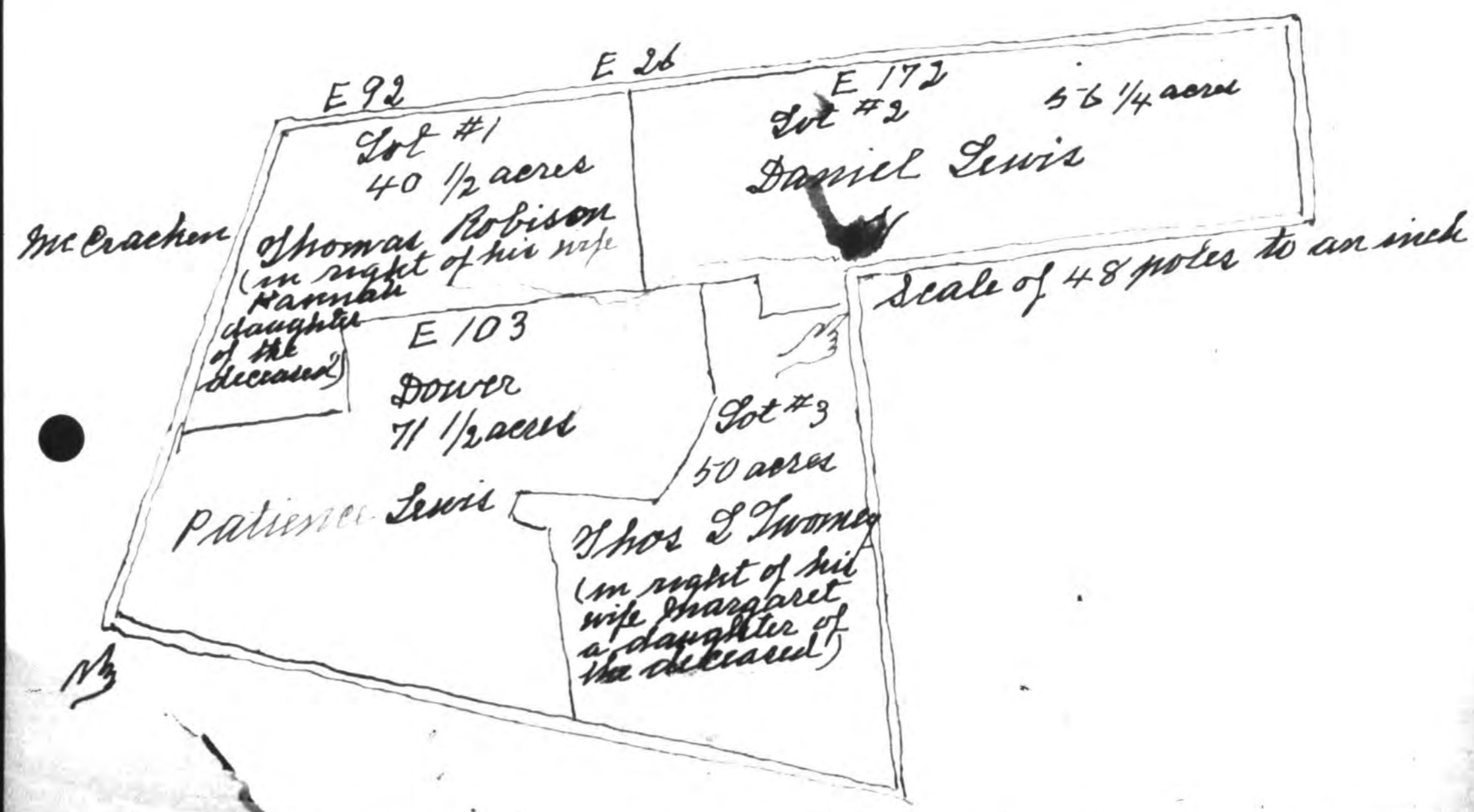

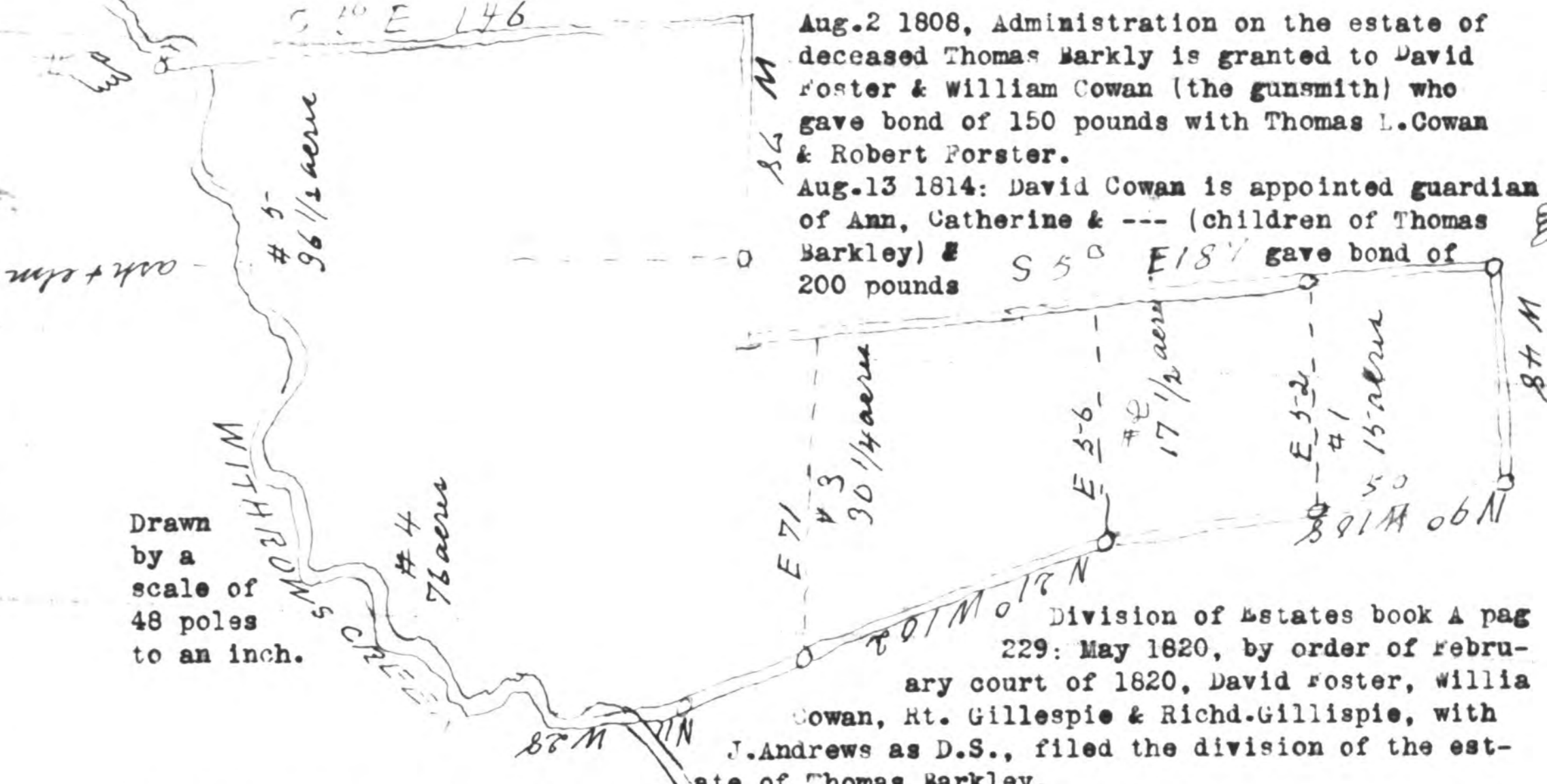
