

Morris.

April 15 1755: "A Deed of Gift; from John Morris to Sarah his Wife, proved in Open Court, by the Oath of Jos. Beurcham"

Book 2 page 4: On Jan. 14 1755, John Morris gives his goods & chattels to his wife Sarah after his death, witnessed by James & Joseph Bureham & proved

1753: (Jos. Buretham?) "appointed Constable in the Room (torn) for his district.

1753: "Benjn Rodgers in Jos. Buretham District"

March 19 1754: "Wm. Morrison Appointed Constable in the Room of Joseph Buretham? on Qatoway(?)"

March 22 1754: "John Findly Appointed Constable in the Room of Joseph Burcham and for his District"

Jan. 24 1756: "Ordered that Thomas Millsap serve as a Constable in the Room of John Finly for the Succeeding Year"

Jan. 18 1758: "Ordered that Edwd. Davis Serve as Constable this Enzueing year in the Room of Thos. Milltharps"

Jan. 18 1760: "Thomas Fanning be appointed Constable of the Hugh Warry district in the Room of Edwd Davis. Qualified in Open Court".

April 23 1761: "Thomas Fanning on the Road from the Paint Spring to Cockram's Road along the Trading Path" is appointed Commissioner of the road.

July 24 1761: Esq. Christopher Nation is the Justice in Capt. Robin's district of which Thomas Fannen is the Constable. (Esq. Nation is also the Justice in Capt. Nation's district in which Thomas Stillwell is the constable)

Book 10 page 145: Nov. 4 1784, The State grants (#794 at 50 shillings the 100 acres) to Charles Parke 400 acres on both sides Cabbin Creek near a branch on the conditional line of Phineas Runyon.

Book 14 page 134: March 13 1795, Charles Parkes--no wife signs--lets Samuel Pike--both of Rowan Co. N.C.-- have 400 acres on both sides Cabbin Creek near a branch next Phineas Runyon (formerly Allen Parkes'), for 400 pounds, witnessed by James Elling^{James Lacey} & Phineas Runyan & proved by the last named in Aug. 1795. (This was granted Parkes Nov. 4-9 1784).

Book 14 page 493 or 593 (numbered twice): June 8 1796, Samuel Pike--no wife signs--lets Frederic Morris (both of Rowan Co. N.C.) have 5 acres & 10 rods crossing Cabbin Creek, for 3 pounds & 3 shillings witnessed by John Runyon & William Ward & proved by the latter in Aug. 1796. (This is part of the land which Charles Parkes let said Pike have some time in March 1795). It begins at a white oak & goes north 15 chains across said creek to a hickory saplin, east 15 chains to a hickory saplin, south 15 chains, crossing said creek, to a post oak, then west 15 chains to the beginning.

Book 16 page 693: Dec. 25 1798, Samuel Pike--no wife signs--lets Frederic Morris (both of Rowan Co. N.C.) have 2 acres & 60 rods next said Morris & Adam Smith on Cabbin Creek for 5 pounds, witnessed by Clement Lanier & Wiley Davis & proved by the latter in Aug. 1799.

Book 17 page 382: Sept. 18 1798, Samuel Pike of Rowan Co. N.C.--no wife signs--lets David Daniel of Wake Co. N.C., have 200 acres on both sides Cabbin Creek next Adam Smith, Frederic Morris & crossing said creek, for \$750.00, witnessed by James Daniel & Travers Daniel & proved by the latter in Aug. 1800. (This is part of the State Grant to Charles Parkes who let Samuel Pike have it)

Captain John Morris of Maryland,

Captain John Morris was an Original Member of the Society of the Cincinnati of Maryland - see page 299 of The Kentucky Year Book of 1913, which contains a list.

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Book 25 page 521: July 31 1819, Isaac Morris Sr. of Giles Co. Tenn--no wife signs--lets John Yokeley of Rowan Co. N.C., have 404 ^{or 464} acres on the bank of Rich Fork & Hunts Fork next Daniel Shular, Michael Shular, Thomas Jones, Joshua Tacker, Js. Gorden, John Gorden, Robert Moffett & --- Clodfelter, for \$1400.00, witnessed by Samuel E. Tomlinson & Jacob Tacker & proved by the latter in Nov. 1819. *It begins on the line of Daniel Shular at an elm on the south bank of Rich Fork, & goes south 15 chains to a dead Spanish oak on the line of Michael Shular & the corner of Thomas Jones, east 18 chains to a pine on the corner of Thomas Jones, south 44 chains to a red oak sapling on the line of Thomas Jones, east 33 chains & 65 links to a post oak on the line of Joshua Tacker, south 1 chain & 25 links to a small hickory sapling on the corner of - Morris & the line of J. Gorden, east 18 chains & 130 links to a red oak on the corner of - Gorden, north 35 chains & 57 links to a white oak on the corner of the said Gorden, east 16 chains & 63 links to a post oak on the line of Robert Moffett & the corner of the said Gorden, north 20 chains to a pine knot on the corner of - Clodfelter, west 40 chains to a white oak on the corner of - Clodfelter, north 33 chains & 48 links to a black oak on the south bank of Hunts Fork, then down the creek to the beginning.*

Book 25 page 482: Aug. 31 1819, Isaac Morriss of Giles Co. Tenn.--no wife signs--lets John Knoy of Rowan Co. N.C., have 212 acres on Rich Fork of Abbotts Creek next what was formerly Josiah Tomlinson's, Michael Shular, crossing said fork, next Samuel Pidgeon, for \$850.00, witnessed by Samuel Tomlinson & Jacob Tacker & proved by the latter in Nov. 1819.

Book 26 page 172: Oct. 25 1817, John Embler Sr., Phillip Wortman?, John Wortman?, Isaac Morris & wife Susan & George Workman (as heirs of deceased William Embler of Rowan Co. N.C.) let Andrew Byrns, of Rowan Co. N.C., have 75 acres on Stony Run next Daniel Silliven. John Embler & Jacob Clodfelter, for \$100.00, witnessed & proved in Lexington by D. Sellevan in 1820.

(Beaver Dam Creek & the County-Line)

Book 10 page 365; Nov. 4 1784, The State grants (#956 at 50 shillings the 100 acres) to John Morris 300 acres on Beaver Dam Creek, beginning on the County-line at a pine, going north 50 chains to a red oak, east 60 chains to a hickory, south 60 chains to a stake on the county-line, then with the said line to the beginning.

(Gars Creek & the County-line).
Book 10 page 372: Nov. 4 1784, The State grants (#923 at 50 shillings the 100 acres) to John Morris Jr., 200 acres on Gars Creek, beginning on the County-line in a branch at a willow oak, going north 33 chains & 50 links to a white oak saplin on the line of John Morris Sr., east with his line & past his corner, 59 chains & 70 links to a hickory saplin, south 33 chains & 50 links to a pine on the county-line, then west with the said line to the beginning.

(Waters of Rich Fork & Hunts Fork of

Book 25 page 521; July 31, 1809, Isaac Morriss Sr., of Giles Co., Term.,--no wife signs--lets John Yokley of Rowan Co., N.C., have 464 $\frac{1}{2}$ acres on the waters of Rich Fork & Hunts Fork, beginning on the line of Daniel Shular at an elm on the bank of Rich Fork & going south 15 chains to a dead Spanish oak on the line of Michael Shular & corner of Thomas Jones, east 18 chains to a pine on the corner of Thomas Jones, east 33 chains & 65 links to a post oak on the line of Joshua Tacker, south 1 chain & 25 links to a small hickory saplin on the corner of --- Morriss & the line of Js. Gorden, east 18 chains & 50 links to a red oak on the corner of Js. Gorden, north 35 chains & 75 links to a white oak on the corner of said Gorden, east 16 chains & 63 links to a post oak on the line of Robert Moffit & the corner of Js. Gorden, north 20 chains to a pine knot on the line of Moffit & the corner of --- Glodfelter, west 40 chains to a white oak on the corner of Glodfelter, north 33 chains & 40 links to a black gum on the south bank of Hunts Fork, then down the creeks to the beginning, for \$1400.00, witnessed by Samuel E. Tomlinson & Jacob Tacker & proved by the latyer in Nov. court of 1819.

Book 11 page 687: July 11 1788, The State grants (#1651 at 50 shillings the 100 acres) to Henry Agenor 197 . . acres beginning on the corner of Phillip Slough & the line of Zachariah Eary, going with the line of Eary north 50 chains & 25 links to a red oak, east 9 chains & 75 links to a black oak on the line of William Crowell, south with the line of Crowell 62 degrees east 31 chains to a hickory, east 7 chains to a stake on the corner of Phillip Kratz, south with the line of Kratz 37 chains & 50 links to a stake on the line of said Slough, then to the beginning. ---

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Joseph Morris (Rich Fork of Abbotts Creek)

Book 12 page 405; May 18 1788, The State grants (#1903 at 10 pounds the 100 acres) to Joseph Morris 260 acres on Rich Fork of Abbotts Creek next Jacob Wilson, Elijah Pope & Jonathan Hilton.

Book 25 page 521: July 31 1809, Isaac Morriss Sr. of Giles Co., Tenn.,--no wife signs--lets John Yokeley of Rowan Co.N.C., have 464 $\frac{1}{2}$ acres on the waters of Rich Fork & Hunts Fork, beginning on the line of Daniel Shular at an elm on the south bank of Rich Fork, going south 15 chains to a dead Spanish oak on the line of Michael Shular & the corner of Thomas Jones, east 18 chains to a pine on the corner of Thomas Jones, south 44 chains to a red oak saplin on the line of Thomas Jones, east 33 chains & 65 links to a post oak on the line of Joshua Tacker, south 1 chain & 25 links to a small hickory saplin on the corner of --- Morriss & the line of Js. Gorden, east 18 chains & 50 links to a red oak on the corner of Js. Gorden, north 35 chains & 50 links to a white oak on the corner of said Gorden, east 16 chains & 63 links to a post oak on the line of Robert Moffitt & the corner of Js. Gorden, north 20 chains to a pine knot on the corner of --- Clodfelter, west 40 chains to a white oak on the corner of Clodfelter, north 33 chains & 40 links to a black gum on the south bank of Hunts Fork, then down the creeks to the beginning, for \$1400.00, witnessed by Samuel E. Tomlinson & Jacob Tacker & proved by the latter in Nov. court of 1819.

Isaac Morris (Rich Fork & Hunts Fork of Abbotts Creek
Book 16 page 382; April 20 1796, David Woodson—no wife signs--lets Isaac Morris
(both of Rowan Co. N.C.), have 200 acres on Rich Fork & Hunts Fork of Abbotts Creek
beginning on the south bank of Rich Fork on the line of Michael Sluder? or Shuler
at a small elm, going south with his line 10 chains & 50 links to a small Spanish
oak on the line of Thomas Jones, east with his line 10 chains & 50 links to a pine
on his corner, south with his line again 3 chains to a red oak saplin, east 33 chains
& 65 links to a post oak on the line of Joshua Tacker, north with his line 35 chains
to a post oak on the line of Seaborn Tacker, --- with his line 13 chains & 35 links
again north 39 chains to a dead black oak on the corner of Samuel Pigeon, --- with
his line 7 chains & 75 links to a small black oak, north 42 degrees west 8 chains &
75 links to a small black oak, near Hunts Fork & Rich Fork, then with their meanders
to the beginning, for 100 pounds N.C. money, witnessed by Jacob Tacker & Josiah Tom-
linson & proved by the latter in Nov. court of 1798.

(Beaver Dam Creek)

Book 10 page 365: Nov. 4 1787, the State grants (#956 at 50 shillings the 100 acres) to John Morris 300 acres on Beaver Dam Creek on the county line. *It begins on the County line at a pine, & goes north 50 chains to a red oak, east 60 chains to a hickory, south 60 chains to a stake on the County line, Then with the said line to the beginning.*

John Morris (Beaver Dam Creek & Bennets Fork)

Book 10 page 374: Nov. 4 1785, The State grants (#884 at 50 shillings the 100 acres) to John Morris 2000 acres on Bennets Fork of Beaver Dam Creek near a road, on a branch.

Rev. Edward Morris

D.A.R. Lineage Vol. XXVII page 335; Mrs. Alice Pennebaker Campbell (wife of Edward Taylor Campbell) born in Lebanon, Tenn. joined as #26918 from

Rev. Edward Morris (1756-1830), enlisted as a soldier in 1779 & as he was a Wesleyan preacher, was detailed as chaplain. He was born in Virginia & died in Wilson county, Tenn. See also #10813, 13027, 18165.

She is the daughter of Edwin Ruthren Pennebaker & wife Martha Louise Smith; granddaughter of Henry Fuller Smith & wife Mary Dickens Morris (born 1802); great-granddaughter of Edwards Morris & wife Elizabeth Cary Whitaker.

N.C. Society of Colonial Dames of America (1912) page 196: Colonel Anthony Morris of New York (1660-1683) judge of supreme Court; Provincial Councillor 1695-96; Member of Assembly 1694-1703; Major 1703-04; Justice of Peace 1692-93 & 98. Mrs. Allan Nichols (Elizabeth van Bokelen--dropped from membership 1913 by order of board) of Wilmington, N.C., joined as #346, fifth in descent from Colonel Anthony Morris. Supplementary claims: Anthony Morris Jr. & Anthony Morris Jr., Jr.

Page 196: Anthony Morris Jr. of Pennsylvania, (-----) Member of Common Council 1715; Member of Assembly 1722-25; Founder of Philadelphia Library 1731; Major 1738; Founder of Pennsylvania Hospital 1752.

Page 196: Anthony Morris Jr. Jr., Founder of Pennsylvania Hospital 1775.
(The above probably no good.)

Page 196: Honorable Lewis Morris I. of New Jersey (1746-1761) Member of Governor's Council 1721-29; Judge & Chief Justice of Province of New Jersey 1733; Judge of Supreme Court of New York 1711; Chief Justice of New York 1720-38. Mrs. Carle A. Woodruff joined on his services.

Page 65: Mrs. Carle A. Woodruff (Effie Hicks Haywood) of New Rochelle, New York, joined as #140, fifth in descent from Colonel John Haywood. Supplementary claims: William Haywood, Philemon Hawkins, John Hicks, Thomas Hicks, James Graham & Augustus Graham.

Page 177: Colonel Augustus Graham (-----) Surveyor-General 1691-1719; Major of Militia 1700; Colonel of Militia 1715. Mrs. Carle A. Woodruff only.

Page 177: Honorable James Graham of New York (1701----) Attorney-General of New York 1685-87 & 1691-1701; Member of Governor's Council & Speaker of Colonial Assembly; Recorded on New York 1683-1700. Mrs. Carle A. Woodruff.

Society of Colonial Wars, 1903-1906, page 317: GRAHAM, COL. JAMES 1660-1701. Atty Gen. N.Y. 1685-1687, and 1691-1701. Member and Speaker, Prov. Assembly, N.Y. First Recorder of N.Y. 1683-1700. Only Samuel N. Watson joined on his services--see page 156.

Page 156: Rev. Samuel Newell Watson Watson, D.D., of Chillicothe, joined the Ohio society as #53 (general society #1273), being 6th in descent from Hon. Lewis Morris, & 7th in descent from Col. James Graham.

Book 13 page 300: July 28 1793, Ninian Beall Hamilton--no wife signs--lets John Morris (both of Rowan Co.N.C.) have 100 acres on Muddy Creek on the east side of said Hamilton next Frederic Marshall, for 300 pounds, witnessed by Jonas Catherman & George Koons & proved by the latter in Aug. 1793.

Book 16 page 317: Nov. 16 1796, John Morris of Green Co.Va. lets Fredrick Monacastle of _____ have 100 acres on the north side of Muddy Creek next Minus Griggs, the Moravian line, Adam Spaugh & William Michael, for 30 pounds, witnessed by Henry Morris & Frederick Vaughn & proved by the latter in Aug. 1798.

Book 14 page 631: or (731) (numbered twice) Dec. 20 1791, The State grants (#2066 at 10 pounds the 100 acres) to John Morris 169 acres on the north side of Muddy Creek on the Moravian line next Adam Spaugh, William Michael & Minus Griggs.

Book 16 page 667: Nov. 5 1796, John Morris of Green Co.Va.--no wife signs--lets David Boothe of Rowan Co.N.C., have 175 acres on the east side of Muddy Creek next Frederic William Marshall, for 80 pounds, witnessed by John Booth & Jacob Stallings & proved by the latter in Aug. 1799.

Book 18 page 835: David Boothe--no wife signed--lets Jonas Leatherman (both of Rowan Co.N.C.) have 172 acres on the east side of Muddy Creek beginning on the corner of Frederick Wm Marshall at a white oak & going east 40 chains to a post oak south 25 chains
