Charles Martin (1745-1808), born in Albemarle Co., Virginia, died in Abbeville District, South Carolina, who served as a soldier, as did his brothers;

Jacob Moon (1737-1781) who served as a Lieutenant & Paymaster was wounded at Guilford Court House & died from the effects of his wound;

William Bibb, (1735-1796), born in Hanover Co., Virginia, died at Petersburg, Georgia, who was a member of the Convention from Prince Edward County & a member of the Committee of Safety - see also numbers 23028, 25045 & 35688; & of Bolling Hall (1767-1836), born in Dinwiddie Co., Virginia, enlisted at the age of 16 years, removed to Georgia & died in Alabama City, Ala. - see also #33681.

Page 310 of "Newberry County South Carolina" (by George Se-kind Summer, Sr., in 1956) - James Abercrombie of Laurens County, made will dated November 29, 1819, which was proven in court February 9, 1820, in which year he died, his wife having already died. His children named in the will were: Mary O'Shael, Isabella Blackwell, Susannah Matthews, Hannah Brooks, Margaret Buchner, Elizabeth and James. A stepson was Archibald Daniel, Jr. A grandson was James Abercrombie. Other legatees were: Rebecca Gosnell, wife of Gabriel Gosnell. Executors named were: Elias Brooks, and James Abercrombie (his son)."

Dr. James Abercrombie of England & Pennsylvania

Page 458 of "Founders of Anne Arundel and Howard Counties, Maryland", (by J. D. Warfield, A.M., in 1905): "William Collock Warfield married Mary Elizabeth Griffith, daughter of John T. Griffith, of New Jersey, who, when that state was made free, with his brother, William Thomas Griffith, moved their slaves to Galches. They were direct descendants of Griffith ap Griffith, the last native Prince of Wales. John T. Griffith was a prominent lawyer of Mississippi and married Harriet Abercrombie, daughter of Dr. James Abercrombie, who was sent to the State of Pennsylvania by King George III, to establish the English Church. He was the younger son of Lord Abercrombie."
